In November, 1964, we propared a Selected List of Recent Basic Readings related to the "War on Poverty", a copy of which is attached to this revised May, 1966 Guide.

As anti-poverty programs developed, the need for additional information became apparent, and in April, 1965, a second edition was issued, with major emphasis on the economic, training, and vocational adjustment aspects of the poverty problems.
