

FOREWORD

During the past few years great interest has arisen in this country in using work processes and work settings in the therapeutic handling of the mentally ill and in their rehabilitation. Work centers are being introduced in follow-up and day-care programs, and sheltered workshops for the physically handicapped are being induced to introduce services to the mentally ill as well. More recently, the use of work is being promoted also as therapeutic and for training value for the adolescent delinquent, the alcoholic, and the addicted.

This Directory of Sheltered Workshops Serving the Emotionally Disturbed was undertaken to provide information for use by mental health, mental hospital, and vocational rehabilitation authorities as to prospective resources to assist in the planning for augmented mental health services. The information was obtained in response to mailed questionnaires during the latter part of 1964 and 1965.

Inclusion in this publication does not imply endorsement, nor does exclusion infer disapproval. The listing has been printed exactly as it was submitted on the questionnaires which were sent to each agency. Items left blank indicate the information was not supplied.

A definition of emotional disturbance was not provided. We accepted each shop's own working definition. Likewise, no definition of "sheltered workshop" was tendered, but we eliminated those rehabilitation centers which do not have work-oriented programs with a work-for-pay environment.

We are indebted to the workshops that responded to our questionnaires; to the various state offices of Vocational Rehabilitation, Mental Health and Mental Hospitals for their assistance in editing and revising the lists of workshops which we sent to them; to the National Association of Sheltered Workshops and Homebound Programs for their assistance and support; and to the Wage and Hour Division of the U. S. Department of Labor. This directory and the statistical analysis accompanying it were made possible by the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, through Project RD 1471-P.

INTRODUCTION

This study was undertaken as a survey of the extent and variety of Sheltered Workshop facilities for the mentally ill and the emotionally disturbed in this country. During the past few years great interest has arisen in using work processes and work settings in the therapeutic handling of the mentally ill and in their rehabilitation. Work centers are being introduced in follow-up and day-care programs, and sheltered workshops for the physically handicapped are being induced to undertake services to the mentally ill as well. More recently the use of work is also being promoted for its therapeutic and training value to the adolescent delinquent, the alcoholic and the addicted.

There is little information available as to the nature and extent of these services. The developing programs for increasing treatment and aftercare services to the mentally ill and disabled (growing from the Joint Commission Report and the President's message to Congress) call for state and local planning, which is already under way. An increasing number of psychiatric and rehabilitation specialists express a desire for building in some form of work oriented programs in planning for "Comprehensive Mental Health Centers." However, in but few instances is this desire predicated upon understanding as to the form, dimensions or methods of sheltered work or of knowledge as to the already existing community rehabilitation resources that might be put to use or be called on for help and guidance.

The specific purposes of this study include:

1. Providing information as to the availability of workshops which have had some experience serving the emotionally disturbed.

2. Gathering data in a simple form about the programs, professional staff, size and referral sources of these

shops.

3. Disseminating this information to sheltered workshops and rehabilitation centers, as well as to national and state vocational rehabilitation, mental hospital, and mental health authorities.

The only survey material previously available is contained in the directories of sheltered workshops referred to in the methodology section of this report. An inquiry of resources for serving the mentally ill was conducted as part of the Joint Commission Report on Mental Illness and Health, and a survey of rehabilitation center interest was undertaken a few years ago by the National Association for Mental Health. Neither of these was directly focused on the questions of vocational preparation or sheltered work, and both listings are now out of date.



The Federal Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, in the preparation four years ago of the Directory of Sheltered Workshops, had obtained the first "across-the-country" set of clues as to the existence of workshops claiming services for the emotionally disturbed. The present study was undertaken in an effort to list more completely the programs that do exist. It was felt that a study of this nature would supply much needed data for planning and program development.

METHODOLOGY

The Questionnaire survey method was adopted as being the most practical. Initial post card questionnaires (Appendix B) were sent to all workshops listed in: Directory of Workshops for the Handicapped (Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, 1961); in Sheltered Workshops and Homebound Programs (NASWHP 1957); in 1964 Directory of Rehabilitation Facilities (Journal of Rehabilitation 1964); and in the June 1964 revised list of workshops certificated by the Wage and Hour Public Contracts Division of the U.S. Department of Labor. Galleys of the names and addresses of all workshops in each state were sent to the respective state Vocational Rehabilitation authorities, and those for Mental Health and Hospitals. These galleys were edited by these state offices and many additional workshops were identified. The 1962 directory Outpatient Psychiatric Clinics (NAMH and NIMH 1962) was examined for those clinics which possibly used work therapy. The names and addresses of comprehensive rehabilitation centers were also solicited from the various state agencies. Post card questionnaires were mailed to all these possible rehabilitation centers.

The purpose of the initial questionnaire was twofold: 1. To verify the continued existence of the workshops listed in the source materials; and 2. to determine which of these workshops actually serve the emotionally disturbed. Those workshops which replied to this post card questionnaire saying that they served the emotionally disturbed received a second, two-page questionnaire (Appendix C) requesting additional information on the workshop's program and client population. Of the workshops surveyed, 91% replied to the first questionnaire and 66% to the second.

The statistical, clerical, printing and mailing processes were accomplished by the Altro Service Bureau of Altro Work Shops, Inc., itself a sheltered workshop employing tuberculosis, cardiac, mentally ill and emotionally disturbed workers.

Several visits to sheltered workshops in various parts of the country were made to supplement with personal interviews the information gathered by questionnaire.



RESULTS

The following statistical profile of the sheltered workshops serving the emotionally disturbed in the United States represents a summary of information obtained from many individual workshops, which employ different statistical record keeping and reporting procedures. An attempt has been made in the questionnaire and in the interpretation of the results to standardize the form of replies so that comparisons may be possible and meaningful.

Replies to the Initial Questionnaire:

Twelve hundred and eighty-one (1281) initial post card questionnaires were mailed. Six hundred and thirty-eight (638) agencies answered that they served the emotionally disturbed in a sheltered workshop. Three hundred and sixty-two (362) agencies replied that they did not. One hundred and four (104) indicated that they did not operate a sheltered workshop and seventy-two (72) were returned by the post office as being not deliverable. One hundred and five (105) agencies did not answer, and our record of them was closed after repeated follow-up attempts failed to coax a reply. In total, 1104 of the 1209 (91%) post cards which reached their destination were answered.

Replies to the Second Questionnaire:

All of the 638 workshops which initially stated that they served emotionally disturbed clients received the second questionnaire. To this, however, many replied that they do not operate a workshop, or that they do not serve the emotionally disturbed. Others reported that they are branches of larger workshops and are therefore subsumed under the parent shops. The final total of workshops which serve the emotionally disturbed is thereby reduced to 490. Of these, 318 (66%) replied to the second questionnaire in whole or in part (See Table I) and an additional eleven (11) shops returned a draft letter sent to them for the selected information which appears in the directory proper.

The 172 workshops which did not reply to the second questionnaire are fairly evenly distributed throughout the country (See Table I). Many of them are local units of national philanthropic organizations which place a vocational emphasis on the rehabilitation of the derrived and destitute, rather than on the emotionally disturbed a 1ch. The 172 workshops which did not reply claim to serve 25% of the total number of emotionally disturbed clients reported for the 490 workshops. These shops, therefore, are generally smaller in size than the workshops which answered, and presumably offer less intensive and varied vocational rehabilitation services.



Size of the Workshops:

Of the 490 replies to the first questionnaire, 454 reported the number of clients served each day. These shops claim to care for a daily average of 12,353 emotionally disturbed and 24,511 physically handicapped clients. The median number served each day is eleven (11) for the emotionally disturbed clients and thirty-five (35) for the physically handicapped clients. In fully two-thirds of the states, the workshops reporting stated that for the emotionally disturbed they have in census less than the country wide average.

That so many shops serve so few emotionally disturbed clients each points to the unused potential throughout the country in the vocational rehabilitation of the mentally ill. Almost one-quarter of the emotionally disturbed clients are served in forty-seven (47) workshops that serve no other disabilities. Of these workshops, twenty-four (24) are in mental hospitals.

It is apparently true (the rank order correlation-coefficient equals .74) that the states with large populations serve greater numbers of emotionally disturbed clients in their workshops, than do the less populated states. A related assumption often made in regard to services for the handicapped, especially the emotionally disturbed, was tested by another rank order correlation. It is often believed that the workshops in the more populous states carry more than their share of the burden, and serve more clients per unit of population than do the less populous. The coefficient equalled nearly zero, lending no support to this hypothesis. (See Table III and the Map).

, Age:

The age of the clients served was also surveyed. By and large, most workshops provide vocational rehabilitation services for the late adolescent and young adult age group — that group which is most acutely in need of this type of service. Only a few of the shops replied that they had a maximum age limit for accepting clients. There is a sprinkling of shops throughout the country which offers its services to geriatric clients and a few to young adolescents. The former are most often found in Homes for the Elderly, and the latter in agencies serving the mentally retarded.

Types of Emotionally Disturbed Clients Served:

For the purpose of this study the term emotional disturbance was sub-divided into six categories (See Table IV); three with associated physical handicaps and three without. Ninety per cent (90%) of the 329 workshops replying to this question indicated that they serve at least some clients whose emotional disturbance is not secondary to a physicial disability. These clients with "pure"



emotional disturbance are those who are considered to be part of what is sometimes referred to as the "community mental health problem" (the sub-categories include: mental illness, behavioral disorders, and social and cultural deprivation). These workshops then, have experience with, and presumably are available for, more extensive vocational training of the mentally ill.

Ninety-eight (98) of the workshops report serving clients in all six of the categories. Mentally retarded clients with emotional disturbance is the group most frequently served. Almost all of the workshops which do not serve clients with "pure" emotional disturbance stated that they work with mentally retarded clients with concomitant emotional disturbance. Often in the workshops serving this group, clients are accepted solely on the basis of their primary disability of mental retardation.

The information derived from this analysis demonstrates how many workshops are potentially available for increased rehabilitation services to the emotionally disturbed. Some of these shops are now serving only a very few clients with this disability, some of them are serving the emotionally disturbed only when the client has another disability, but more than 300 workshops across the country now have experience in the vocational rehabilitation of the emotionally disturbed.

Sources of Referral:

Three hundred and twenty-seven (327) workshops replied to this question (see Table V) stating from which of five source categories they receive clients. As would be expected, the workshops within the 20 largest cities accept clients from more sources than do those in the rest of the country.

Over 80% of the workshops obtain at least some of their clients from their state vocational rehabilitation agencies, and therefore receive payment for the training and employment of these clients. However, almost 90% of these workshops have at least one other source of referral. Almost all of the workshops operating within mental hospitals, and some in the community with exclusive ties to hospitals, use only the one source — the hospital — for referrals.

From this information it is apparent that most of these workshops have developed close ties with several community resources. This finding is in keeping with the need for multi-agency service to the mentally disabled.

Rehabilitation Functions:

Many kinds of work-oriented services are subsumed under the rubric of sheltered workshops, with each shop placing a different



emphasis in its particular program (see Table VI). Of the different facets of vocational rehabilitation, work hardening and personal adjustment training are offered more frequently than any other service (by almost 90% of the workshops). Homebound employment, a traditional mainstay in the vocational rehabilitation of the physically handicapped, is offered by very few of the shops which serve the emotionally disturbed.

Job placement is performed for more than one-third of the shops by outside agencies, with vocational evaluation second in frequency of provision. One-quarter of the shops seek vocational evaluation services from other rehabilitation centers (see Table VII). It is noteworthy that there are no significant differences between the 20 largest cities and the rest of the country in the percentage of shops offering the variety of rehabilitation services.

Professionals Employed by the Workshops:

As would be expected, since the workshops carry on as their most frequent own rehabilitation function, personal adjustment training and work hardening and conditioning, the most frequent professional category employed in the workshops are the Vocational Rehabilitation Counselors (See Table VIII). These counselors are employed in nearly two-thirds of the sheltered workshops reporting. It is interesting that less than 60% of the shops employ Business Managers. In the other 40% of the workshops the business needs must be met by people trained in the rehabilitation professions.

Because of the present distribution of professionals throughout the country, with most preferring to reside in or near metropolitan and/or university centers, it is not surprising that workships in the 20 largest cities employ significantly more Psychiatrists, other Medical Doctors, Psychologists and Vocational Counselors than do the shops in the rest of the country.

While the "team" approach has been emphasized in the literature, it is apparent that many shops use the services of only one or perhaps two different kinds of professional practitioners. The average for the 317 workshops that replied to this question is 2.8 different kinds of professional staff per workshop. This is not an average of the number of professional staff, but of the different categories of staff that are employed. Many workshops employ more than one person in a category.

Length of Stay of Emotionally Disturbed and Physically Handicapped Clients:

Recent vocational rehabilitation literature emphasizes the need for providing the emotionally disturbed with longer workshop programs than has been customary for physically handicapped



clients. It is recognized that job training alone can rarely succeed without a longer adjustment period than many rehabilitation services are accustomed to. However, the reports from workshops in this survey (See Table IX) indicate that on the average the emotionally disturbed client stays a slightly shorter time than does the physically handicapped client. Perhaps part of this discrepancy between the optimal and the real conditions may be accounted for by a greater drop-out rate of the emotionally disturbed in the early stages of the workshop program. It is also possible that it is still too recent for most workshops working with the emotionally disturbed to have introduced some of the changes in their programs necessary to provide longer average stay.

Year Began Serving the Emotionally Disturbed:

That the sheltered workshop movement is by and large a recent innovation in the field of mental health is illustrated by a few statistics (See Table X). Less than 16% of the workshops polled had begun operations for the emotionally disturbed before 1950. The largest number (97 or nearly 32%) of the workshops began operation between 1955 and 1959 — the years immediately following the passage of the Federal Vocational Rehabilitation Amendments of 1954. Another 40% started serving the emotionally disturbed in the past five years. There is every indication that the spectacular growth, in the past decade, of work-oriented programs for the emotionally disturbed is continuing. In replying to the first questionnaire a number of agencies indicated that they do not yet have, but are planning in the near future to institute sheltered workshop services for the emotionally disturbed.

Percentage of Clients Accepted by the Workshops:

An issue often raised regards the selectivity of workshops in accepting emotionally disturbed clients. One clue to the fact is that we found almost one-fifth of the workshops accepting all clients referred to them (See Table XI). Almost one-half accept 90% or more of their applicants; and 70% of the shops accept more than 70% of those referred. At the other extreme only 9% accept 30% or less of their clients referred to them. In sum, the overwhelming majority of workshops do accept most of the clients referred to them.

Clients Successfully Rehabilitated:

Two hundred and thirty-four (234) of the workshops reported on the number of emotionally disturbed clients that they considered successfully rehabilitated during their last fiscal year. This figure totalled 6,462 or approximately 50% of the clients that these workshops had served during that whole year. No comparable figure was solicited for physically handicapped clients.



Personal Interviews:

The information gathered by personal interviews of sheltered workshop directors during the course of visits to a few sheltered workshops in various parts of the country, while not easily quantifiable, does demonstrate that the workshops are dependent upon the community for referrals, professional resources, financing, and work for the clients. This last seems to be a major problem with which workshops are constantly contending.

UPDATING

This survey has updated information about the location, size and programs of sheltered workshops serving the emotionally disturbed. It should be kept in mind that the information contained in this directory and statistical report will not remain current long. The single most striking finding of this survey was the tremendous rate of growth of the number of sheltered workshops for the emotionally disturbed. Even by now, only a few months since the bulk of the information has been compiled, there are already several new workshops, and some of the shops listed have probably increased in size or expanded their services. According to estimates of experts in the field, our workshops may double or even triple in number during the next decade.*

One of the problems in compiling a directory of this sort, and keeping the information current, is the difficulty in getting statistics from the agencies involved. As the statistical reporting are often not comparable. Since workshop directors are the reciprequirements of the workshops differ, their record keeping systems ients of many questionnaires each aimed at a different problem, and each requiring a new appraisal of the workshop records, many directors are reluctant to assign these queries to overworked staff members. A possible way out of this impasse might be a "uniform data form" that would be acceptable to the vast majority of workshops, and would satisfy their statistical reporting requirements. An attempt of this sort is, to say the least, a large undertaking, but it may very well be necessary if the record of growth of the workshop movement is not to be spasmodic and uncontrolled.


