THE REPORT CONSISTS OF -- A SHORT EVALUATION WHICH INDICATES A CONTINUING NEED FOR MAXIMUM FUND ASSISTANCE IN SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAMS AND SPECIAL PROGRAMS (COUNSELING, SUPERVISING STUDY SITUATIONS, ETC.), AN ENUMERATION OF INDIAN--ALL STUDENT ENROLLMENT DATA BY SCHOOL DISTRICT, A LISTING OF TAX RATES FOR EDUCATION FOR ELEMENTARY AND HIGH SCHOOLS (ON A COUNTY BASIS), A FINANCIAL STATEMENT AND LIST OF EXPENDITURES, A LIST OF JOHNSON-O'MALLEY SPECIAL FUND ALLOCATIONS AND USES BY COUNTY, AND A THREE-YEAR INDIAN DROP-OUT STUDY GIVEN BY GEOGRAPHIC AREA, MALE AND FEMALE DISTRIBUTION, GRADE AND SEMESTER LEVELS, ACHIEVEMENT LEVELS (ARITHMETIC AND READING), ATTENDANCE, AND CATEGORICAL REASON FOR WITHDRAWING. THE STUDY SHOWS THAT A LARGE FORTION OF THE . DROPOUTS OCCURRED IN THE SECOND SEMESTER OF THE SENIOR YEAR, DUE IN LARGE MEASURE TO PREVIOUS FAILURES WHICH NECESSITATED LONGER ATTENDANCE TO GRADUATE. THIS SEEMS TO INDICATE THE NEED FOR MORE INTENSIVE COUNSELING SERVICE BEGINNING AT THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL. (BR)



NARRATIVE REPORT ON JOHNSON-O'MALLEY PROGRAM IN NEVADA FOR FISCAL YEAR 1965-1966

Fiscal Year 1965-1966 was the fourth year of the revised Johnson-O'Malley Program in the State of Nevada.

Evaluation of the program indicates there is a continuing need at the maximum level in two areas for financial assistance to school districts: namely, School Lunch Programs and Special Programs.

In the case of School Lunch Programs, we find that with the increasing enrollment, plus the rising costs for producing school lunches, as well as reduced reimbursements from the Federal Government, both financial and in surplus commodities, necessitates additional financial support to the school districts in this category.

While Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act has opened a number of doors leading to programs that benefit Indian students, it has failed to be the panecea for all problems in Indian education as seems to be the thinking in some areas at the Washington level. On the contrary, Title I programs have created a greater demand for Johnson-O'Malley funds, i.e., a new needed program is now possible but Title I allocations alone are insufficient. A joint financial effort between Johnson-O'Malley and Title I funds makes this program possible.

We wish to acknowledge the cooperation of the various school districts, the Nevada Indian Agency, and numerous other agencies in the state who have made the past year most successful in the education of our Indian students.

REMARKS:

This is the third year that a dropout study has been made and it is hoped that the program has established a pattern that will aid in pin-pointing specia? problems.

It will be noted that a large portion of dropouts occurred in the second semester of the senice year in high school. On investigation it was found that due to failures in the preceding two or three years to pass certain subjects the student would find it necessary to attend high school an additional semester, or year, in order to obtain the required number of subjects, or credits, to graduate. This would indicate that counseling services need special emphasis relating to these matters on a continuing basis beginning at the junior high school level.



SPECIAL FUND ALLOCATIONS 1965-1966

CHURCHILL COUNTY

A grant in the amount of \$1500.00 was made on a matching fund basis to be applied toward the salary of a half time elementary counselor.

ELKO COUNTY

A grant in the amount of \$1,000.00 was made for the Owyhee Attendance Area to be applied toward the salary of a full time counselor.

A grant of \$1,800.00 was made for the operation of a night supervised study hall at the Owyhee Attendance Area.

A grant of \$1,000.00 was made to the Owyhee High School experimental livestock farm.

The amount of \$250.00 was granted to the student body fund of the Owyhee Attendance Area.

HUMBOLDT COUNTY

A grant of \$3,000.00 was made on a matching basis to be applied toward the salary of a full time counselor for the McDermitt Attendance Area.

A grant in the amount of \$1,200.00 was made for the night supervised study hall.

A grant of \$1,200.00 was made to the student body fund in the McDermitt Attendance Area.

LYON COUNTY

A grant in the amount of \$600.00 was made for the Fernley Attendance Area to defray the transportation cost for Pyramid Lake Indian Reservation high school students to participate in extra curricular activities.

A \$3,000.00 grant was made on a matching basis to be applied to the salary of a full time counselor in the Fernley Attendance Area.

A grant of \$75.00 was made for tuition for three Indian students to participate in a practical nurse training program in the Yerington Attendance Area.

A grant of \$500.00 was made for the purchase of band instruments to be loaned to needy Indian students who wish to participate in the school band in the Fernley Attendance Area.

MINERAL COUNTY

A grant of \$600.00 was made for the purpose of defraying part of the cost of transporting students from Schurz to the Mineral County High School to participate in extra curricular activities.



Special Fund Allocations (continued)

NYE COUNTY

A grant in the amount of \$500.00 was made to Nye County; \$250.00 to be used at Duckwater and \$250.00 at Yomba Attendance Area for the purpose of field trips and remedial materials.

ORMSBY COUNTY

A grant in the amount of \$90.00 was made for summer school tuition for an Indian student.

WASHOE COUNTY

A \$300.00 grant was made to Washoe County for field trips for students at Natchez School on the Pyramid Lake Reservation.

A \$121.95 grant was made for tuition for an Indian student attending night school to earn a high school diploma.

A grant of \$2,000.00 was made to finance a night supervised study hall for Junior and Senior high school students in the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony.
