

LITTLE ACTION HAS BEEN TAKEN TO MELIORATE THE POOR CONDITIONS OF THESE WORKERS UNTIL PASSAGE OF THE ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY ACT OF 1964. OEO HAS APPROVED GRANTS FOR FARM WORKER ANTIPOVERTY PROGRAMS IN 35 STATES. THE GRANTEES HAVE PLACED A HIGH PRIORITY ON EDUCATION, HOWEVER, THE EMPHASES IN THESE PROGRAMS ARE VARIED. OEO MIGRANT AND SEASONAL FARM WORKER PROJECT

INTRODUCTION

Traditionally, migrant and seasonal farm workers have been among the most disadvantaged and abused members of our society. Numbering $7\frac{1}{2}$ million, they comprise one quarter of the nation's poor. Until recently, however, but a few halting steps were taken to meliorate their conditions. The passage of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 represented the first large-scale public attempt to assist this population.

The Office of Economic Opportunity has approved grants for farm worker antipoverty programs in 35 states. This publication summarizes these programs funded principally under Section 311 of the Economic Opportunity Act, through February 15, 1967.

Although grantees place a high priority on education, the emphases in these programs vary. The variations are indicative of the grantees' responsiveness to the populations they serve and reflect the involvement of those populations in the development of the programs.

Recognizing that job training is a major vehicle out of poverty, many programs emphasize basic literacy and pre-vocational education. Such programs are designed to prepare farm workers for the transition to semi-skilled or skilled employment. In addition, the programs seek to stabilize farm workers as valuable citizens of the community through day care, housing and sanitation programs.

A cursory examination of the types of grantees indicates the breadth of concern for farm worker problems. State agencies, private non-profit groups, religious organizations, and local government agencies have applied to the Office of Special Field Programs for farm worker antipoverty grants. Although their approaches and programs vary, these grantees share a common objective: to help the farm worker help himself as he moves along the roads leading out of poverty.
