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THIS ENROLLMENT SURVEY OF FOREIGN LANGUAGE STUDY IN RELIGIOUS SECONDARY SCHOOLS IS THE COMPANION PIECE TO FIVE OTHERS CONDUCTED BY THE MODERN LANGUAGE ASSOCIATION IN THE FALL TERM OF 1959, THE TERM SELECTED AS THE NORM FOR FUTURE CALCULATIONS. THE INTRODUCTORY SURVEY OF THE GROSS NATIONAL PICTURE WITH AN ANALYSIS OF ATTRITION AMONG FOREIGN LANGUAGE STUDENTS IS FOLLOWED BY A STUDY OF INFORMATION PROVIDED BY 47 SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST SECONDARY SCHOOLS FOR ENROLLMENT IN GRADES 9 TO 12 AND BY 1,463 CATHOLIC PAROCHIAL SECONDARY SCHOOLS, SOME OF WHICH COVERED GRADES 7 TO 12. DATA ARE GIVEN WITH BREAKDOWN BY MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGE ENROLLMENT AS COMPARED WITH TOTAL FOREIGN LANGUAGE ENROLLMENT, BY INDIVIDUAL LANGUAGE, AND BY LEVEL. FOREIGN LANGUAGES IN RELIGIOUS SECONDARY SCHOOLS, FALL 1959

Introduction

I

The following report on foreign language enrollments in religious secondary schools was not made by the use of government funds. It was deemed necessary information, however, for the profession of modern foreign language teachers. It should be read in conjunction with the following reports made by the Modern Language Association under contract from the United States Office of Education: "Foreign Languages in the Elementary Schools of the United States," by Marjorie Breunig, 12 April 1961; "Foreign Language Offerings and Enrollments in Public Secondary Schools, Fall 1959," by J. Wesley Childers, 14 April 1961; "Foreign Languages in Independent Secondary Schools, Fall 1959," by John Harmon, 20 January 1961; "Modern Foreign Language Teaching in Junior Colleges, Fall 1959 and Fall 1960," by J. Wesley Childers and Barbara Bell, 9 May 1961; and "Modern Foreign Language Enrollments in Colleges and Universities, Fall 1958 and Fall 1959," by Mara Vamos, Harry Margulis and Frank White, 23 January 1961.

We specify these five reports in particular since they yield information on enrollments during the first term of the academic year 1959-60, and together with this one form the most complete picture yet published of the foreign language enrollments in all segments of schooling in a single term. We in the Modern Language Association, therefore, intend to take this fall term of 1959 as the comprehensive base for future calculations. The year was a good one for foreign language study, and is significant as the first one after a full year's operation of the National Defense Education Act. Increase or decrease in enrollments from this complete norm may enable us in the future to determine with some accuracy where national needs are being met, and where they are not being fulfilled.

Each of the reports gives a full breakdown by language, by level, state by state and nationally. The chart which follows on the next page extracts from them the gross national picture under the categories listed for the fall term 1959.

Surveys of this sort are perhaps most useful in the questions they raise. The one to which the profession must soon address itself concerns the holding power (or lack of it) of language teaching. Student attrition has many causes. Perhaps a figure exists somewhere which may be called a "normal per cent of attrition." The profession must be doubly sure that a main cause for it is not unimaginative or unresourceful teaching. Per cents seem to us to be too high for the national or individual good. Oddly enough they are parallel in a crude sort of way in secondary schools across the board (though we lack this precise information for the Independent Schools).

In public schools, enrollments in modern foreign languages show a drop, in round figures, from about 950,000 in Course I, to 470,000 in Course II, to 103,000 in Course III, to 21,000 in Course IV. In the Catholic parochial schools attrition flowed from an initial 88,000 in Course I to 68,000 in Course II, to 16,000 in Course III, to 2,700 in Course IV. In College and University--the main sources for future foreign language teachers--the 460,000 undergraduates enrolled in modern foreign languages dropped off to 15,500 in graduate schools. There are, to be sure, total population changes in the various schools and colleges from course to course, and from year to year. The number of competent speakers, however, who have experienced long sequences of language study seems miniscule for the national needs.

Reasons for attrition are various: multiplicity of methods and texts, rapid changes of interest, completion of stated "requirements," an influx of students into secondary schools who have taken foreign languages in elementary school and whose high hopes of continuing are dashed by ineffective articulation in the sequences of language learning, lack of course offerings above a beginning level, school drop-outs, and occasionally, no doubt, dull imperceptive teaching. It is hoped that the NDEA institutes may provide needed stimulus to the last of these. It behooves the profession for its own good, as well as for the national interest, to eradicate bad teaching as one of the causes.

The three charts which follow present numerical and per cent data on course level enrollments in each of three divisions: public secondary schools, Catholic parochial secondary schools, and senior colleges (undergraduate and graduate levels). Chart II gives numerical enrollments by language and by course level. Chart III gives the per cent which each course represents of the total enrollment in each language, in each division. Chart IV gives the per cent of decrease at each course level from the preceding course level for total foreign language and for total modern foreign language, in each division.

The following report covers enrollments in Roman Catholic Parochial Secondary Schools, and in Seventh-Day Adventist Secondary Schools. Questionnaires were also addressed to the Communal Agencies for Jewish Education throughout the United States to gather general enrollment and language enrollment figures concerning Jewish Five-Day-a-Week Secondary Schools. It was found, however, either that the schools in this category had already been included in the previous Modern Language Association study of Independent Schools,¹ or that the information was not available.

Information on Seventh-Day Adventist Schools was taken from the "Opening Reports for Fall 1959," submitted by each school principal to the Department of Education, General Conference of Seventh-Day Adventists, 6840 Eastern Avenue, N. W., Washington 12, D. C.

Data on Catholic Parochial Secondary Schools were obtained from questionnaires sent to principals whose addresses were furnished by the National Catholic Educational Association, 1785 Massachusetts Avenue, N. W., Washington 6, D. C.

To the persons in the several religious organizations whose advice and cooperation made this survey possible, the Modern Language Association expresses its appreciation, and particularly to Dr. Morris Engleman of the American Association for Jewish Education; to Mr. G. Although some Roman Catholic "private" schools and a few Seventh-Day Adventist schools are also included in the above-named report, schools in the present report do not duplicate those covered by "Foreign Languages in Independent Secondary Schools, Fall 1959."

SECTION I: SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST SECONDARY SCHOOLS

In a total of 47 Seventh-Day Adventist secondary schools not covered by previous MIA reports, enrollments in grades 9-12 in Fall 1959 were 8,581. There were no enrollments in grades 7-8.

All language enrollments were in French, German, and Spanish, at course levels I and II. The total MFL¹ enrollment, 2,118, represented 24.7 per cent of the total student enrollment.

The breakdown of numerical and per cent data on enrollments in each language is given below:

The total enrollment in Course I of all languages was 1,356 (64 per cent of the total MFL enrollment); enrollment in Course II of all languages was 762 (36 per cent of the total MFL enrollment).

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SECTION II: ROMAN CATHOLIC PAROCHIAL SECONDARY SCHOOLS

All information in this section of the present report concerns the 1,463 Catholic Parochial Secondary Schools which furnished data on FL enrollments, grades 7-12, for Fall 1959. Most of these schools offered FL instruction only in grades 9-12 (here reported as Courses I-V). A few reported FL instruction in grades 7-8. In the accompanying tables, enrollments for these grades are separated from enrollments in Courses I-V.

Brief questionnaires were originally mailed to principals of the 2,018 Catholic Parochial Secondary Schools, addresses for which were provided by the National Catholic Educational Association. A total of 1,562 schools answered the questionnaire. Of these, 99 stated that they did not teach FL. The total number of applicable replies (1,463) represented 72.5 per cent of the schools originally canvassed. Answers were not received from 456 schools.

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¹Two abbreviations occur throughout this report: FL, foreign language; and MFL, modern foreign language.

Forty-nine states and the District of Columbia furnished information contained herein. The excepted state is Idaho, from which no replies were received.

Summary of Total Enrollment Data

In Fall 1959, the total enrollment, grades 7-12, in the 1,463 Catholic Parochial Secondary Schools which furnished data for this report was 571,739. The total enrollment in grades 9-12 was 554,742; in grades 7-8, 16,997.

The FL enrollment, grades 7-12, was 394,957, of which the MFL enrollment, 178,247, was less than half (45.1 per cent). The per cent of the total number of students enrolled in all FLs was 69.1; in MFLs, 31.2.

The breakdown of the per cents of each language out of the total Catholic Parochial Secondary School enrollment, grades 7-12, is given in the table below:

Individual Language Per Cents of Total FL
and of Total MFL Enrollments, Courses I-V

The breakdown of the per cents of each language of the total FL enrollment and of the total MFL enrollment, Courses I-V, is given in the table below. Instruction in French and/or Latin at the Course V level was offered in California, Connecticut, District of Columbia, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Rhode Island.

Enrollments in French and Latin accounted for more than 75 per cent of the total FL enrollment. Latin was first among individual language enrollments. German, Greek, and "Other" languages accounted for less than five per cent of the total FL enrollment.

Among MFL enrollments, French and Spanish were foremost, and together accounted for more than 90 per cent of the total MFL enrollment. The remainder of the enrollments were accounted for by German (6.7) and by "Other" languages (2.3).

MFL enrollments included in "Other" are Italian (1,999), Polish (1,042), Russian (589), Japanese (39), Ukrainian (32), Hungarian (13), and General Language (229).

Grades 7-8

A total of 42 schools in 17 states and the District of Columbia gave FL instruction in grades 7-8. The total FL enrollment in these schools was 2,223, of which the MFL enrollment, 1,736, represented 78.1 per cent. The breakdown of FL enrollments and the per cent of each language of the total FL and of the total MFL enrollments follows:
