I. BASIC SCIENCES AND BASIC INFORMATION

ABNORMAL INVOLUNTARY MOVEMENTS, 1949, B&W, Silent, 42 min., Rental fee - \$6.00. Available from Armed Forces Institute of Pathology, Walter Reed Army Medical Center, 6825 Sixteenth Street, N.W., Washington 25, D. C.

Shows abnormal involuntary movements caused by certain types of lesions at various levels. Demonstrates involuntary spasms in injuries of the peripheral nerve, fascicular twitching in slow degeneration of the anterior horn cells and involuntary movements in the form of mass flexion reflex that may rise in the isolated segment, in lesions of the spinal cord. Includes involuntary movements characteristic in lesions of the brain stem, such as myoclonus, alternating tremor, chorea, ballism, athetosis and dystonic movements and postures. For general practitioners, house officers and medical students.

ANIMAL REASONING, 1964, 9 min., B&W, Sound, Rental fee - \$5.40 for 1-5 days. Available from Audio Visual Center, Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana 47405.

Loh Tsai of Tulane University shows experiments in the laboratory of conditioning and reinforcing behavior. Deals with research on reasoning ability of lower family of animals.

BEHAVIOR THEORY IN PRACTICE, FOUR PARTS, Appleton-Century Crofts Film Library, 227 West 25th Street, New York, New York 10001.

Part I. Respondent and Operant Behavior; basic terms; selection of responses as basic research topics; the cumulative record; operant conditioning and extinction. Part II. Shaping Various Operants; schedules of reinforcement. Part III. Generalization; discrimination; measurement of sensory capabilities; discriminative stimuli and the control of behavior. Motivation; intercranial self-stimulation, conditioned reinforcement, avoidance. Part IV. Sequence of behavior: homogeneous and heterogeneous chains; alternative responses; programmed instruction. For professional audience.

THE BRAIN AND BEHAVIOR, 1965, 22min., B&W, Sd., Available on rental basis from Visual Aids Service, University of Illinois, Champaign, Illinois.

Two ways by which we can study the function of different brain areas in human behavior; one method is to stimulate artificially, different parts of the brain with an electrode and observe the results. The other method is to measure, by means of tests, the changes in behavior following injuries in different areas of the brain. Measurement tests are demonstrated with patients, showing how a particular brain injury affects either vision, touch, movement, speech, problem solving, or a combination of these activities.

CHEMISTRY OF BEHAVIOR, 1963, Audio-Visual Center, Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana 47405. 30 min., B&W, Sd., for lay audience. Rental - \$5.40 1-5 days.

Roger Russell of Indiana University shows some of the tests being conducted to measure the effect of drugs on behavior. Sebastian Grossman of the State University of Iowa demonstrates the methods used to introduce drugs in specific areas of the brain and how these drugs affect behavior.

Combines a presentation of the anatomy and physiology of the human nervous system and a re-enactment of segments of current research activities.

Illustrates normal function of the muscles of the hand and forearm.

Film begins with a brief enumeration of the principal founders and investigators of genetics and their contribution. Process of meiosis and mitosis and the evaluation of the different chromosomes (position of kinetochore, size, satellites) is discussed. Technique of bone marrow culture and preparation of chromosomal slides is presented. Finally, three main chromosomal aberrations, mongolism, Klinefelter's and Turner's Syndrome are discussed.

Demonstrates the cortical differences between normal persons and epileptic patients and presents good demonstrations of actual cases of grand mal, petit mal, Jacksonian seizures and psychomotor epilepsy. The therapy by various anticonvulsant drugs is also covered, though doses are not mentioned. The film shows that epilepsy is a controllable condition when treated with full reference to the patient and his environmental situation.
