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A STUDY OF COMMUNITY OPINION CONCERNING JUNIOR COLLEGE FUNCTIONS.

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A SURVEY TO DETERMINE WHAT THE COMMUNITY UNDERSTANDS OF THE LOCAL JUNIOR COLLEGE AND ITS FUNCTIONS WAS CONDUCTED BY PERSONAL INTERVIEWS WITH 367 RANDOMLY SELECTED HOUSEHOLDERS. OF THOSE INTERVIEWED, 52.6 PERCENT HAD NO OPINION ON THE COLLEGE, 37.9 PERCENT FELT THAT THE COLLEGE WAS PERFORMING WELL OR ADEQUATELY, AND 9.5 PERCENT FELT IT WAS NOT. IN MANY CASES, THOSE WHO EXPRESSED AN OPINION GAVE NO REASONS FOR THEIR CONCLUSIONS. AFTER REPLIES WERE CLASSIFIED BY AGE, INCOME, EDUCATION, AND INFORMATION SOURCE OF THE RESPONDENTS, IT WAS FOUND THAT NO PARTICULAR SEGMENT OF THE POPULATION WAS MORE GROSSLY UNINFORMED THAN ANOTHER. THE NEED FOR MORE PUBLIC INFORMATION ON THE COLLEGE WAS APPARENT. (HH)

Problem: "What does the local community understand of the local junior college and its functions?

Methodology:

Survey of opinions of householders In Napa on a random basis. Questionnaire developed for this purpose was used. Householders were interviewed in person.

Conclusions:

- 1. Four times as many people in the local community have the opinion that Napa College is performing junior college functions as those who think it is not.
 More than half of the people have no opinion.
- 2. No single group characterized by age, income or education is grossly less well informed than any other. The need for general information concerning Mapa College is evident.

A STUDY OF COMMUNITY OPINION CONCERNING JUNIOR COLLEGE FUNCTIONS

This study grew out of the interest of the Napa College Board of Trustees, Administration and Faculty concerning the understanding, or lack of it, of the junior college and its functions in the local community. A search of the literature revealed no model by which to conduct such a study. An instrument for this purpose and a design for this study was developed by the Dean of Guidance Services at Napa College at the California Junior College Association Institute on Institutional Research at Berkeley, California in July of 1966.

This survey was designed to sample opinions of householders in Napa on a 1 out of 40 basis. Households were selected at random. This method was chosen so that comparisons could be made between parts of the district, between age groups or between groups selected on any other criteria. Differences in responses between groups can be accounted for as occurring by chance only on the basis of 3 out of 100. In other words a response of 106 householders expressing the opinion that Napa College is doing a good job represents 4,240 householders (1 in 40) with this opinion. If the response to this question from residents in St. Helena were to be compared with those in one of the census divisions in Napa, the chances that the differences were due to chance would be 3 in 100. Of the total of 367 householders interviewed, 139 or 37.% thought Napa College was performing the functions a junior college should perform. Thirty-five persons or 9.5% thought Napa College was not performing these functions and 193 or 52.6% had no opinion.

Workers interviewed householders in eight census divisions in Napa County. These divisions constituted the attendance area for Napa College. Responses from each division have been tabulated separately and percentages of responses recorded and compiled. The census divisions closest to the campus showed the least variation of opinion on all questions. All others were more strongly positive or more strongly negative on each issue.



In addition to comparing census divisions the responses on the questionnaire have been studied in other ways. Of the 139 respondents who thought Napa College was performing the functions appropriate for a junior college, 47 or 12.6% gave no reason for their opinion. The other 92 gave reasons expressed as follows:

One hundred fifty or 41% of those questioned had household incomes between \$6,100 and \$10,000. These respondents indicated first and second choices of sources of information concerning Napa College as follows:

It is apparent that the newspaper is the best single source of information for this category of respondents. This was true for the total survey, also. However, personal contact as indicated in the categories of friends, students, and other, accounts for 57.2% of the first choice sources and 40.6% of the second choice sources.

The 193 or 52.6% of those questioned who had no opinion concerning how well Napa College is performing its functions were in the following educational categories based on the highest grade completed by the husband in the household:

SUMMARY

This survey indicates that four times as many people in the local community have the opinion that Napa College is performing junior college functions as those who think it is not. However, more than half of the people have no opinion on this question. The responses of persons who did not have an opinion have been studied in the categories of household income and age and level of education of the male head of the household. There were 41% with household incomes between \$6,100 and \$10,000. In the age bracket 32 to 50 there was 32.1%. In these 193 households 12.3% had no male head of the household, 24.7% of the male heads of the households completed less than twelve years of school, 31.8% completed high school, 31% completed work in school beyond high school.

It seems apparent that no single group characterized by age, income or education is grossly less well informed than any other. The need for general information concerning the function and purposes of Napa college is evident.
