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A REPORT OF THE STUDENT VOCATIONAL INTEREST SURVEYS IN OHIO SCHOOLS, JULY 1964 TO JUNE 1965 (INCLUDES SUMMARY FOR 1954 TO 1965).

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A QUESTIONNAIRE WAS ADMINISTERED TO ALL TENTH AND ELEVENTH GRADE STUDENTS IN 142 SCHOOLS (44,429 STUDENTS) FOR THE 1964-65 SURVEY. THE PURPOSE OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE WAS TO OBTAIN AN ESTIMATE OF (1) STUDENTS' PLANS FOR EMPLOYMENT OR FURTHER SCHOOLING AFTER HIGH SCHOOL, (2) VOCATIONS WHICH STUDENTS THINK THEY MIGHT LIKE TO ENTER, AND (3) THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS WHO WOULD HAVE DESIRED SPECIFIC VOCATIONAL COURSES HAD THEY BELT OFFERED AS PART OF THEIR HIGH SCHOOL CURRICULUM. SOME FINDINGS OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE WERE--(1) 32,257 STUDENTS (72.6 PERCENT) DESIRED HIGH SCHOOL VOCATIONAL EDUCATION, (2) 20,262 (45.6 PERCENT) PLANNED TO ATTEND COLLEGE, (3) 16,642 (37.5 PERCENT) INDICATED PLANS FOR FURTHER EDUCATION OR TRAINING AFTER HIGH SCHOOL OTHER THAN COLLEGE, AND (4) 5,809 (13.1 PERCENT) INDICATED A DESIRE FOR HIGH SCHOOL VOCATIONAL TRAINING AND HAD NO PLANS TO ATTEND COLLEGE OR GET FURTHER EDUCATION AFTER HIGH SCHOOL. STUDENTS WERE ASKED TO MAKE FIRST AND SECOND CHOICE SELECTIONS FOR VOCATIONAL COURSES THEY FELT WOULD MEET THEIR EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL NEEDS. THE COURSE SELECTIONS ARE LISTED WITH NUMBERS AND PERCENTAGES. A SEPARATE SHEET WAS INCLUDED IN THE QUESTIONNAIRE FOR HOME ECONOMICS. A TOTAL OF 21,514 GIRLS COMPLETED THE QUESTIONNAIRE, AND A SUMMARY OF THE FINDINGS IS INCLUDED. (PS)

The following report summarizes the findings of the Student Vocational Surveys conducted from 1954 to 1965 and reports the specific findings for the 1964-65 surveys.

During the past eleven years the Student Vocational Planning Questionnaire has been administered to 144,625 students in 520 Ohio High Schools. The questionnaire was developed in 1953 by members of the Committee on Inter-Service Relationships to be included in the publication Course Selection and Career Planning.

The Division of Guidance and Testing has cooperated with the Division of Vocational Education in determining the needs for vocational education in school districts requesting a vocational education survey. In conducting a vocational educational survey, one of the important needs is to obtain the educational and vocational plans for students and determine the number who would have desired vocational education if it were available in high school.

The opening phase of the Student Surveys was the presentation of orientation programs to the students for the purpose of acquainting them with the specific areas of vocational education and the purpose of the survey questionnaire. A slide-tape presentation was used to give an overview of the five areas of vocational education. The Student Vocational Flanning Questionnaire was then administered to all tenth and eleventh grade students. The purpose of the questionnaire was to obtain an estimate of (1) students' plans for employment or further schooling after high school; (2) vocations which students think they might like to enter; and (3) the number of students who would have desired specific vocational courses if they were offered as part of their high school curriculum.

RESULTS OF THE 1964-65 STUDENT INTEREST SURVEYS 142 Schools --- 44,429 Students

The findings for the Student General Interest section of the questionnaire are as follows:

- 1. 32,257 students (72.6%) desire high school vocational education.
 - a) 5,809 students (13.1%) indicated a desire for vocational training and have no plans to attend college or for further education after high school.

- b) 11,872 students (26.7%) indicated a desire for vocational training and also have plans to attend college.
- c) 14,576 students (32.8%) indicated a desire for vocational training and also have plans for further education or training after high school other than college.

2. 20,262 students (45.6%) are planning to attend college.

- a) 11,872 students (26.7%) indicated interest in vocational training, are making plans to attend college.
- b) 8,390 students (18.%) indicated college plans and have no desire for vocational training.
- 3. 16,642 students (37.5%) indicated plans for further education or training after high school other than college.
 - a) 14,576 students (32.8%) indicated plans for further education or training after high school and desire vocational training.
 - b) 2,066 students (4.7%) indicated plans for further education or training after high school and have no desire for vocational training.
- 4. 1,716 students (3.9%) were undecided or had no preference.



1964-65 STUDENT VOCATIONAL INTEREST SURVEY RESULTS



Those students interested in high school vocational training were asked to make first and second choice selections for vocational courses they felt would meet their educational and vocational needs. First choice selections were made by 32,257 students. Of this number 27,363 students (84.8%) selected vocational courses listed on the questionnaire. The other 4,894 students wrote in vocational courses other than those listed on the questionnaire as a first choice selection. The vocational course selections are listed below:

An analysis of the consistency between items on the Interest and Experience Check List section of the Student Vocational Planning Questionnaire related to the area of first choice course selection was made. Of the 27,363 students making first choice selections for vocational courses listed on the questionnaire, 19,800 students (72.4%) indicated

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interest in activities consistent with the area of their vocational course selection. The courses and per cent of consistency are listed below:

The low percent of consistency between some vocational courses checked as first choice selections by students and the items on the Interest and Experience Check List related to these courses, may indicate limitations of the questionnaire rather than real inconsistency between activities liked and the vocational course selected.

HOME ECONOMICS

A separate sheet was included on The Student Vocational Planning Questionnaire for Home Economics. A total of 21,514 girls completed the questionnaire. A summary of the findings is below:

- 1. 15,832 girls (75.6%) indicated interest in vocational education.
 - a) 2,652 girls (12.3%) indicated a desire for vocational training and have no plans to attend college or further education after high school.
 - b) 4,961 girls (23.1%) indicated a desire for vocational training and also have plans to attend college.
 - e) 8,219 girls (38.2%) indicated a desire for vocational training and also have plans for further education or training other than college.
- 2. 8,657 (40.3%) are planning to attend college.
 - a) 4,961 girls (23.1%) indicated interest in vocational training, are making college plans.
 - b) 3,696 girls (17.2%) indicated college plans and have no desire for vocational training.
- 3. 9,432 girls (43.8%) indicated plans for further education or training after high school.
 - a) 8,219 girls (38.2%) indicated a desire for vocational training and also have plans for further education or training other then college.
 - b) 1,213 girls (5.6%) indicated plans for further education or training after high school and have no desire for vocational training.



4. 773 girls (3.6%) were undecided or had no preference.

High school vocational training was desired by 15,832 girls (73.6%).

Of this number 4,961 girls indicated a desire for vocational courses

(other than Home Economics) along with their college preparatory courses.

Eighty-four percent (18,089 girls) have college or post high school education or training plans.

Of the 21,514 girls completing the Home Economics section of the questionnaire, 11,858 (55.1%) have had or were enrolled in Home Economics. A total of 8,187 (38.1%) had not taken or were not enrolled in Home Economics, but expressed a desire to take it.

The 11,858 girls having had or were enrolled in Home Economics indicated they would like to have additional courses in that curriculum area. The courses, along with the number and percent of students expressing an interest in them are listed below:



GUIDANCE SERVICES IN CAREER PLANNING

Students in Ohio high schools want vocational education. This has been determined through student vocational interest surveys conducted in 520 Ohio high schools since 1954 by the Division of Guidance and Testing in cooperation with the Division of Vocational Education, State of Ohio, Department of Education. During the 1964-1965 school year, 44,429 sophomore and junior students from 142 city, exempted village, and local (county) schools completed the Student Vocational Planning Questionnaire as a part of school-community surveys to determine the practicability of initiating or expanding vocational course offerings in the high school curriculum. A total of 32,257 (72.6%) indicated an interest in vocational education as a part of their high school educational program. Of this group, 5,809 students (13.1% of all those surveyed) indicated a desire for vocational training and have no plans for further education or training after high school; 14,576 (32.8% of the total) desired vocational training and also have plans for further education or training after high school, other than college; and 11,872 (26.7%) wanted a combination of college preparatory and vocational courses. A total of 36,904 students (83.1%) had plans for post high school education or training. Of this group 20,262 students (45.6% of the total) are planning to attend college, while 16,642 (37.5%) indicated plans for further education or training after high school, other than college.



One function of the school counselor in Ohio is to assist each student in considering vocational goals or areas which will utilize his strongest potentials of intelligence, special talents, personality, interests, and values. This is a part of the overall purpose of guidance in assisting each student to understand himself better, to plan his education, to make a vocational choice, and to grow personally.
