IN FALL 1967, THE 32 ILLINOIS PUBLIC JUNIOR COLLEGES ENROLLED 83,804 STUDENTS, REPRESENTING 52,327 FULL-TIME EQUIVALENTS. THIS REPORT PROVIDES DETAILED INFORMATION FOR THE SYSTEM AND FOR EACH COLLEGE-- (1) ENROLLMENT DATA, (2) APPLICATIONS, ADMISSIONS, AND ENROLLMENTS, (3) HIGH SCHOOL RANKS AND ENTRANCE TEST SCORES OF ENTERING FRESHMEN, (4) DISTRIBUTION OF COURSES, SECTIONS AND CREDIT HOURS OFFERED, (5) GRADUATES, (6) LIBRARY DATA, (7) FACULTY BACKGROUND, COURSE, TEACHING LOAD, AND SALARY SCHEDULES, (8) DISTRICT WEALTH, AND (9) COSTS, REVENUES, AND CURRENT EXPENSES. 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Preface

The data presented herein is a cooperative effort of the Illinois Junior College Board and the University of Illinois to provide basic data on all Illinois public junior colleges to be used by junior colleges and other institutions and agencies of higher education in the planning and development of educational programs and facilities. Upon request of the Illinois Junior College Board, the University of Illinois collaborated with the Board in processing and analyzing the data. Funds for publishing the report were provided by the Illinois Junior College Board.

The major source of these data is Illinois Junior College Board Form No. 1, Application for Recognition, and the accuracy thereof is contingent upon the data supplied in the application form and a supplementary enrollment study conducted by the Board during 1967. Errors in presentation and analysis are the responsibility of the writers.

The writers recognize that this report is based entirely on quantitative data and the reader is cautioned against making unwarranted qualitative analyses and conclusions.

Appreciation is expressed by the writers to the presidents and administrative staff of the Illinois public junior colleges; Mr. Gerald W. Smith, Executive Secretary, Illinois Junior College Board; and Dr. E. 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Section I

ENROLLMENT

The number of junior college students enrolled in credit courses during 1965, 1966, 1967, and the projected enrollments through 1972 are shown in Tables 1 through 4 for each of the public junior colleges in Illinois. Non-resident student enrollment for 1967 is shown in Table 5, and enrollments by college class are shown in Tables 6 and 7.

Table 1 presents a three year history of the actual head count enrollments and the projected enrollments through 1972 for the public junior colleges in Illinois. The 1967 head count enrollment in 34 junior colleges was 83,804 as shown in Column 4. This is an increase of approximately 13,000 or 18 percent over the 1966 enrollment. The projected head count enrollment for 39 institutions in 1968 is 133,100, an increase of approximately 49,000 or 58 percent over the 1967 figure. These same colleges project a head count enrollment of 225,362 students in 1972. This is a total increase of 141,558 students during this five year period and an average increase of approximately 28,000 per year.

The total full-time equivalent student enrollment is shown in Table 2 for the same colleges and years reported in Table 1. In 1967, there was a full-time-equivalent student enrollment of 52,327, an increase of 10,799 or 26 percent over the 41,528 FTE students enrolled in 1966. The projected FTE student enrollment for 1968 for 34 colleges presently operating and five new colleges is 76,953. This is an increase of approximately 24,000 FTE students in one year. The projected FTE student enrollment for these same 39 institutions in 1972 is 133,841 as shown in

Column 9. This is a projected total increase of 81,514 FTE students during the next five years or an average annual increase of approximately 16,000 FTE students.

Tables 3 and 4 show a breakdown between the FTE day students and the FTE evening students. Column 4 shows that 36,749 or 70 percent of the total FTE students were enrolled in day programs and 30 percent in evening programs. The FTE day student enrollment represented 72 percent of the total in 1966 and 67 percent in 1965. Analysis of the 1972 projection shows that the 98,179 FTE day students shown in Column 9 of Table 3 represents 73 percent of the total FTE students projected for that year. It is clear from this analysis that a major shift is not expected in the proportion of students planning to enroll in day or evening programs.

Non-Resident Enrollment

The 1967 non-resident student enrollment in public junior colleges is shown in Column 2 of Table 5. A total of 10,459 Illinois residents were enrolled in a junior college district outside the area where they maintain official residence. There were 489 students enrolled who are not residents of the State of Illinois. There was a total non-resident head count of 10,948 enrolled in junior colleges in 1967. This represents 13 percent of the total head count for 1967. Approximately 15.5 percent of the FTE student enrollment consists of students who are not residents of the junior college district in which they are enrolled.

Full-Time and Part-Time Students by College Class

The distribution between full-time and part-time students by

College class is shown in Table 6. Approximately 33 percent of the 83,804 students enrolled in junior colleges are full-time freshmen, 11 percent are full-time sophomores and about 1 percent of the students are full-time and unclassified. Forty-five percent of the total head count are full-time students. Approximately 31 percent of the students are part-time freshmen, 10 percent are part-time sophomores, and 14 percent are unclassified sophomores. A total of 55 percent of the students enrolled in the junior colleges of Illinois are part-time students.

Section II
STUDENT CHARACTERISTICS

Entering freshmen were grouped into quartiles on the basis of rank in class and these data are presented in Table 8. Inspection of the data show that junior colleges are accepting students with a wide range of abilities in accord with the purposes and tasks of the Illinois system of public junior colleges. Eleven of the 33 institutions which supplied data on this variable reported more than 50 percent of their entering freshmen to be from the upper half of their high school graduating class. Rock Valley reported 72 percent from the upper half. Twenty-two institutions reported a majority of their entering freshman class to be from the lower half of their high school graduating class. Fifteen of these colleges report 60 or more percent of their students to be from the lower half of their class.

The ability of entering freshmen in public junior colleges, as measured by scores on the American College Test, is reported by institution in Table 9. Mean and median ACT scores are shown in Columns 7 and 8 respectively. Mean scores vary from a low of 11 at one institution to a high of 20 at five institutions. Only four institutions have mean scores less than 18.

Approximately 37,600 students applied for admission to junior colleges in the fall of 1967, and 34,481 or 92 percent of those were approved for admission as shown in Table 10. Column 4 shows that almost as many students enrolled as were approved for admission, but there is no reason to assume that all of these were the same students.

Section III

INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

A quantitative analysis of programs, the enrollments in courses and programs for 1967-68, and the number of graduates during 1966-67 are presented in Tables 11 through 22.

The distribution of full-time and part-time students in each of six baccalaureate oriented curricular areas is shown for each institution in Table 11. Of the 28,347 (Column 2, Table 13) full-time students enrolled in baccalaureate oriented programs, 17,118 or 60 percent are enrolled in liberal arts and general education curriculums. Twenty-two percent of this group are enrolled in business curriculums while only 8 percent are enrolled in fine arts, laboratory sciences, and math and engineering curriculums. Part-time students are distributed in approximately the same proportions among curriculums.

Enrollments in occupation oriented curriculums are presented in Table 12. Approximately 42 percent of the full-time students enrolled in occupation oriented courses are found in business and office occupation courses. Only 855 or 10 percent of the full-time students in this group are enrolled in engineering technology curriculums.

The enrollments in each of four major curricular areas are shown in Table 13. There is approximately an equal number of full-time students and part-time students enrolled in each curricular area. A majority of the students enrolled in Illinois junior colleges continue to elect the baccalaureate oriented curriculums as shown in Column 2 of Table 13. Sixty-seven percent of the full-time students are enrolled in

curriculums leading to a bachelor's degree while only 21 percent are pursuing programs designed to prepare students for immediate employment upon completion of the curriculum. An increasing number of junior colleges are developing general studies curriculums for those students not served by baccalaureate or occupation curriculums. Twenty colleges report a total of 4,519 full-time students in programs of this type, as shown in Column 6. However, approximately one-half of this total is at one campus of the Chicago City College.

The summary of courses offered at each college in each of four broad curricular areas is one measure of comprehensiveness of program. The data presented in Table 18 shows that approximately 61 percent of the courses offered in Illinois junior colleges are baccalaureate oriented, 5 percent are general studies courses, 11 percent occupation oriented courses, and 23 percent are non-business occupation oriented courses. A combination of the last two categories demonstrates that 34 percent of all courses offered in junior colleges are designed to prepare students to go directly into an occupation. This is an increase of 10 percent over the comparable figure for 1966.

Another measure of comprehensiveness is reported in Table 19. The number and proportion of student credit hours generated in each of four major curricular areas is shown for each college and the State. Almost three-fourths of the credit hours generated are in baccalaureate oriented courses, 8.9 percent in general studies, 7.7 percent in occupation oriented courses. A summation of business and non-business occupation oriented courses shows that 17 percent of the student credit hours are in courses designed for entry into an occupation upon completion of the program. This is an increase of 5 percent over the comparable figure for 1966.

A comparison of the data in Table 18 and 19 shows that 34 percent of the occupation oriented courses are generating only 17 percent of the credit hours. The explanation for this discrepancy is due to the smaller average class size in occupation oriented courses as shown in the data presented in Tables 40 and 42 of Section VI. It is usually accepted that the occupation oriented classes will have a lower average class size than baccalaureate oriented courses. In order to achieve a reasonable level of financial efficiency, class size in this vital curricular area should be increased to utilize as fully as possible available equipment and facilities.

The number of junior college graduates in each of several curricular areas are shown in Tables 20 through 22. A total of only 3,956 students graduated from junior college in 1966 and 2,866 or 72 percent of these were in baccalaureate curriculums. The number for 1966 represents an increase of 600 or 18 percent over the 1965 figure. The increase in FTE student enrollment for the same period was 17 percent. Even though the total number of graduates is small when compared with the number of students enrolled, it should be emphasized that we do not yet have sufficient historical data in this area to evaluate institutions on this factor. It is possible that graduation is not an important objective of a large number of students who attend junior colleges.

Summary

Illinois public junior colleges are enrolling an increasing number and proportion of their full-time and part-time students in occupation oriented curriculums. They are increasing the number and percentage of curriculums, courses, and student credit hours generated

in occupation oriented areas and in doing so are developing comprehensive junior colleges. The graduates from junior colleges are increasing at about the same rate as the FTE student enrollment.

Section IV

LIBRARIES

Aspects of the library operation which lend themselves to some degree of quantitative analysis are presented in Tables 23 through 28. These data are supplemented by data in Column 4 of Table 45 in Section VI which provides a measure of the commitment of professional library staff to the college program. It is readily discernible that this commitment varies widely from college to college, specifically from 649 students per FTE librarian to 172 students per FTE librarian, or by a ratio of about 4.0 to 1.0. In addition, persons interested in the salaries of professional librarians may refer to Table 49 in Section VII wherein this information is tabulated separately. Finally, additional information related to the library is that of the professional preparation of librarians which is contained in Table 35 in Section V entitled Professional Staff.

The number and type of library materials are reported for each junior college in Table 23. Column 2 shows that approximately 105,000 volumes were added during 1966-67 to bring the total volumes in junior college libraries up to approximately 555,000 volumes, shown in Column 3. The volumes per full-time-equivalent student range from 43 to 3 with a state average of 11.

An analysis of total library collections and current acquisitions by subject areas is reported for each college in Tables 24 and 25.

An analysis of space for library facilities is presented in Table 26. These data should not be accepted for what ought to be because

all of these campuses except two are now operating in temporary buildings. The range in square feet per FTE student is from a high of 16 to a low of one. The State average is three feet per FTE student.

The availability of library facilities and financial support for the library is shown for each college in Table 28. The maximum seating capacity is shown in Column 2 for each college. Five colleges have seating capacities for 200 or more students and 16 of the colleges have less than 100 seats available in their library.

The number of hours the library is open per week at each school varies from a low of 40 hours at Harper to a high of 78 hours at Black Hawk. Twenty-one of the colleges have their libraries open during vacations, but none have library hours on holidays.

One important standard for measuring libraries is the percent of the total operating budget allocated to the library. These data are reported for each college in Table 28. Column 6 shows the percent of the total budget allocated to libraries (excluding salaries of library staff) and Column 7 shows the percentage including salaries. That figure varies from a low of 1.0 percent to a high of 15.5 percent when salaries are excluded. The 15.5 percent is in a new college operating a program for the first time in 1967-68. The median figure is 2.6 percent for Column 6.

If salaries are included, the percentage of financial resources allocated to the library varies from a high of 16.1 percent to a low of 2.0 percent with a median of 5.7.

Section V
PROFESSIONAL STAFF

Table 29 provides basic data on the number of teaching staff in Illinois public junior colleges. State totals indicate 2,064 full-time; 1,754 part-time, for a total of 3,818 faculty members for a full-time equivalency of 2,587. These totals represent a significant increase over last year. There are 655 more full-time faculty and 435 more part-time faculty for a total increase of 1,100 individual faculty members. The increase in full-time equivalency is 736, approximately 40 percent over 1966.

The full-time equivalency of teaching staff according to curricular area is: baccalaureate oriented 1,844; occupation oriented 505; and adult and continuing education 185. The number of teaching faculty reported in Tables 29 and 30 do not agree in some institutions. The reason for this discrepancy is that full-time teachers who are assigned teaching duties in more than one curricular area are reported as part-time in each area that they teach.

Tables 31 and 32 present degree attainment of full and part-time faculty by individual college. These data are summarized in Table 33. The most significant statistic in Table 33 is that 93 percent of all full-time teachers possess the earned Master's or above. The comparable statistic for part-time teachers is 76. Degree attainment of supportive staff is presented in Tables 34, 35, and 36.

Concern has been expressed from many sectors regarding the ability of the junior colleges to employ high quality staff and the effect

that such staffing will have on other levels of education. In the initial study of this problem in 1966 it was determined that the secondary school supplied 39.6 percent of all full-time faculty and 40.7 percent of all part-time faculty. Table 39 summarizes the Institution of Prior Appointment for persons new to the staff this year. This table shows that 1,658 staff members are classified as new to their institution of employment. Of these 876 are full-time and 782 are part-time, and 34 percent of the new full-time and 40 percent of the new part-time faculty were last employed in secondary schools.

Again the secondary school is the foremost source of new staff but in the case of full-time faculty an increasing number are coming from junior colleges (15 percent) and senior institutions (22 percent). The number of part-time faculty coming from high schools is down 1 percent from 1966 (39 percent), and business and industry is supplying 3 percent more of the new faculty than was true of the total faculty of a year ago. It would appear that the secondary school will remain the primary source of supply for the junior college staff in the future, but the percentage of the total from this source is likely to decline as junior colleges mature and become more competitive with other institutions of higher education.

Section VI

CLASS SIZE, STUDENT-STAFF RATIOS, AND TEACHING LOAD

The number of baccalaureate oriented class sections in each of six size categories is shown in Table 40 for each junior college. Column 5 shows that nineteen of the 34 operating colleges have more class sections with 26 to 50 students enrolled than for any other category. Only one college teaches a majority of its baccalaureate oriented classes in groups over 100 in size. Thirteen of the colleges are teaching most of their classes in sections with 11 to 25 students.

The distribution of occupation oriented class sections by size of class is shown in Table 42. It is clear that a majority of these classes are being taught in groups of 11 to 25.

The commitment of teaching faculty and other supportive personnel in relation to number of FTE students served is shown in Table 45. The ratio of students to faculty is shown in Column 2. This ratio varies from a high of 26 to 1 at Rock Valley and Illinois Central to a low of 13 to 1 at Highland. The median ratio of students to faculty for 34 operating colleges is 20 to 1.

The ratio of FTE students to each administrator, librarian, counselor, or other professional staff member is shown in Columns 3 through 6 of Table 45. A comparison of these data with 1966-67 indicates that the junior colleges are devoting an increasing amount of staff time to these important functions of the junior college. The ratio of students per professional staff member is shown in Column 8 of Table 45. The median number of FTE students for each FTE professional staff member is

17 for the 34 operating colleges. The comparable median for the 28 colleges operating in 1966-67 was 20. This is conclusive evidence that junior colleges are increasing their professional staff at a faster rate than their student enrollment. Twenty-one of the 28 colleges operating in 1966-67 reduced their ratio of students to professional staff in 1967.

The teaching load for faculty is shown for each junior college in Table 46. The normal teaching load as shown in Column 2 is 14 to 16 semester hours in a majority of the institutions outside the Chicago City College. Only one college reported a normal load of 18 semester hours. The most significant change in these data from 1966-67 is noted at the eight colleges which are a part of the Chicago City College district. As a result of a collective bargaining agreement, teaching load was reduced from 15-16 hours to 12-13 hours for all or almost all of the full-time faculty in those eight colleges which enroll approximately 40 percent of the FTE students in Illinois public junior colleges. Even though the normal teaching load for junior college faculty has decreased, the number of faculty teaching some overload as shown in Column 8 seems to be greater than might be desirable. There appears to be an unusually large number of faculty members teaching an overload in seven of the eight Chicago City Colleges where the normal teaching load has been reduced to 12 to 13 hours.

Section VIII
FINANCIAL SUPPORT

An analysis of the financial support in 30 Illinois public junior college districts is presented in Tables 51 through 61.

The district population, equalized assessed valuation, and maximum authorized tax rate is shown in Table 51 for each of 30 junior college districts in 1967-68. These 30 districts have an estimated total population of 8,043,000 as shown in Column 2. This figure represents approximately 75 percent of an estimated 10.7¹ population of Illinois in 1967. This is an increase of approximately 14 percent over the comparable figure for 1966. These same 30 districts have an equalized assessed valuation of \$27.8 billion as shown in Column 3 of Table 51. This total does not include the additional assessed valuation which will be added to the Olney and Southeastern districts when they begin operating as a Class I junior college in July, 1968. The \$27.8 billion assessed valuation represents approximately 77 percent of the 1965 total equalized assessed valuation of \$38.6² billion.

The estimated per capita cost for 1967 is presented for 27 districts in Column 4 of Table 52. The per capita costs range from a high of \$1700 at Parkland and Sauk Valley to a low of \$650 at Southeastern. The low figure for Southeastern is based on the 1967-68 year during which it is operating as a Class II district at or near the

maximum educational and building fund tax rates. This is a ratio of 2.6 to 1.0 between the highest and the lowest per capita cost. The ratio for 1966-67 was 3.1 to 1.0. If only Class I districts are included in this comparison, the ratio between the highest and the lowest per capita cost is 2.3 to 1.0.

Tuition

Twenty-two of the 30 junior college districts reported in Table 53 charge tuition to students who reside in their district. Eight districts do not charge tuition, and one of the eight is Chicago City College which has eight colleges and represents approximately 40 percent of the FTE student enrollment in the State. The amount charged per semester hour for the districts which charge tuition ranges from a high of \$10.00 per hour at Kankakee to a low of \$2.00 per semester hour at Kaskaskia with a median of \$5.00. The annual rate per student based on 30 hours is \$300 at the highest school and \$60 at the lowest with a median of \$150.

The tuition charged for non-residents of Illinois is shown for each district in Column 3 of Table 53. The amount charged per semester credit hour ranges from a high of \$60.00 at Sauk Valley to a low of \$10.50 with a median of \$27.50.

Junior college districts are required to pay the local share of the per capita cost for resident students who want to enroll in a program which is not available at their junior college. The number of students who took advantage of this opportunity in the first term of 1967 was 3,064 as shown in Column 4 of Table 53. However, a majority of these students were from districts which were not operating programs or those in their

first year of operation and not yet offering sophomore level courses. Column 5 shows the number of "charge backs" received from other Illinois junior college districts and Column 6 specifies the number of "charge backs" received from high school districts. The Public Junior College Act of 1965 requires high school and unit school districts not included in a junior college district pay the local share of the per capita cost of students from their district who want to attend a public Class I junior college. There were 4,503 students in this category during the first term of 1967.

The estimated amount of current fund revenue by source of income is presented for each institution in Table 54. Table 55 shows the percent of that current revenue from each source. Approximately 11 percent of the total revenue comes from tuition and fees for all the districts reported in Column 2. This ranges from about 2 percent at Chicago City College to 45 percent at Canton. The high percentage at Canton is due to the large proportion of students who are not residents of the Canton district. It is not due to a high tuition rate. Local revenue accounts for approximately 52 percent of the total revenue for all junior colleges and state funds account for 26 percent. Only 3.7 percent of the revenue is from federal funds.

Current fund expenditures by object are reported for each district and for the State in Table 56. A total of \$54,778,641 is budgeted in education and general funds in 1967-68 for a FTE student enrollment of 52,327. This is an average budgeted expenditure of \$1,047 per FTE student. This is an increase of \$116 or 12 percent over the \$931 budgeted per FTE student in 1966-67. The State average budgeted expenditure for 1965-66 was \$687 per student.

The equalized assessed valuation per full-time-equivalent resident student is one important measure of the ability of a district to finance the local share of any educational program. The equalized assessed valuation per resident FTE student is shown for 27 operating districts in Column 6 of Table 58. The State average assessed valuation is approximately \$577,000 per FTE resident student. However, 17 of the 27 operating districts have an average assessed valuation less than the weighted average. This can be explained by the concentration of approximately 40 percent of the students and 42 percent of the total assessed valuation in Chicago City College which has an average assessed valuation of \$584,637 per student. This is approximately \$43,000 per student lower than the comparable figure for Chicago City College in 1966.

The average wealth per resident student in Class I districts which have operated for more than one year ranges from a high of \$665,976 at Black Hawk to a low of \$221,014 at Belleville. This means that a tax rate of ten cents per \$100 assessed valuation levied in the Black Hawk district brings in approximately \$660 and only \$220 when levied in the Belleville district. This is a ratio of 3.0 to 1.0 between the wealthiest and poorest districts within this limited category, and this ratio would be even greater if the seven relatively rich districts operating programs for the first time in 1967 and the four Class II districts were included in the comparison.

The estimated local tax revenue available per FTE student is shown for each institution in Column 7 of Table 59. This figure is based on the assumption that the maximum tax rate is levied in both the educational and building funds. Some districts have elected to use part

of this revenue for capital outlay, but all of these funds could be available for current operation if needed. When the various tax rates are applied to the equalized assessed valuations per FTE resident student to obtain the local revenue available per FTE student, it is clear that there is extreme variation among the districts. These data are presented in Column 7. Wabash Valley College has only \$290 available per FTE resident student while Illinois Central College has \$1963 available if the maximum tax is levied and applied to current operation. However, Illinois Central College is in its first year of operation and will have less local funds per FTE student when the resident enrollment is increased by the addition of second year students.

The estimated amount and percent of funds available per FTE resident student by source of funds is shown in Table 61 for each junior college district. Local funds make up 76 percent of the total funds available at Chicago City College while only 41 percent of the funds at Belleville come from this source. The percentage from state apportionment varies from 50 percent at Wabash Valley to 13 percent at Illinois Central. Twelve of the districts receive from 20 to 30 percent from state apportionment and Chicago City College falls within this group. Only Class II districts which charge essentially no tuition receive more than 40 percent of their funds per FTE resident student from state funds. The percent of funds per FTE from tuition varies from 21 percent to zero.

The estimated total funds per FTE student for current operation is shown in Column 10 of Table 61. Twenty of the 27 operating districts have more than \$1000 per FTE resident student available for current operation. Only three districts have less than \$700 per FTE student

available, and all of those were operating as Class II districts during 1967-68. It is expected that all of these Class II districts will become Class I districts within the near future. This should provide a more adequate financial structure for these low expenditure districts.
