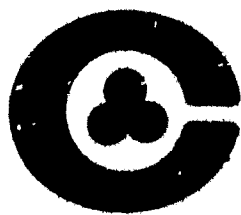

An investigation of how state agencies administer certain federal funds allocated for public higher education. The questionnaire used identified the particular agency, commission, council, or board of various states which is responsible for the administration of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 and 1965 plus amendments, Vocational Education grants, and State Technical Services Act of 1965. Responses were obtained from 36 of 39 state agencies. Data was tallied by--(1) state agency governing board with central coordinating committee, and (2) states without a central coordinating committee. The information is charted for states in the survey and states not in the survey. An appendix gives the data collection form. (HH)

In recent years, various state agencies have been established to administer federal funds granted for statewide higher educational purposes. It can be assumed that the agencies responsible for these funds might vary from state to state since the committees, commissions, councils, or boards established for the coordination or administration of higher educational institutions vary.

Being interested in how certain federal funds are administered, the staff of the Wisconsin Coordinating Council for Higher Education in August 1967 sent a questionnaire, "State Agency, Commission, Council, or Board Responsible for Administration of Certain Federal Higher Education Acts,"¹ to 29 state agencies having a responsibility for coordination or administration of all public higher educational institutions in the state, and to 10 selected state agencies having responsibility for the bulk of the higher educational institutions in the state. Responses were received from 36 of the 39 agencies.

The questionnaire covered the agency, commission, council, or board responsible for the administration of: (1) the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963--Public Law 88-204, 88th Congress (Titles I and III), (2) the Vocational Education grants--Public Law 88-210, 88th Congress, (3) the Higher Education Act of 1965--Public Law 89-329, 89th Congress (Titles I, IV, and VI), (4) the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963--Public Law 88-204 as amended by Public Law 89-752, and (5) the State Technical Services Act of 1965. It requested also the means of representation of private colleges and universities, if any, on the administering agency or advisory committee working with that agency. Finally, information was requested on whether or not the administering agency had encountered any serious problems in the coordination, development of statewide plans, or funding of the various "Acts" or "Titles."

Subsequent to sending the questionnaires, a new publication covering some of the same information, and much more, has been received. This publication² is found to be a very useful one and one which every governing board, coordinating agency, or agency for the administration of facility and medical funds undoubtedly also would find useful. It supplements and further clarifies some of the data and information of this report.

AGENCIES HAVING PRIME RESPONSIBILITY FOR PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION

Of the 39 states to which questionnaires were sent, 29 have a board, commission, council, or bureau responsible for administration or coordination of all public institutions of higher education in the state (Table IA). Of the 29 agencies, five serve as a governing board. All, with the exception of one, report directly to the legislature and/or the governor. The Michigan Bureau of Higher Education, a division of the State Board of Education, is the coordinating agency for public higher education and reports to the State Board of Higher Education.

Twenty-one states do not have a central board or agency which has an administrative or coordinating responsibility for all public higher educational institutions in the state. Ten of these states (Table IB) are included in this report. The agency listed for these 10 states is the governing board for the major public higher educational institutions. All of these agencies, with the exception of two, report to the legislature and/or the governor; these two report to the State Board of Education.

The 11 states not requested to complete a questionnaire are listed in Table IC. None of these states has a central coordinating agency set up by the legislature of the state. Indiana has a voluntary Conference of Higher Education which carries out some coordinating functions of both public and private institutions through voluntary communication and exchange; the public institutions submit their budget requests commonly to the legislature.

STATE AGENCY RESPONSIBLE FOR FEDERAL HIGHER EDUCATION ACTS

The federal acts covered by the questionnaire, with a brief description of each, are:

HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES ACT OF 1963

1. Title I: Grants for Construction of Undergraduate Academic Facilities (Public Law 88-204, 88th Congress) -- Provides funds, through a state agency, for the construction of academic facilities for public community colleges and public technical institutes (Section 103), and construction of academic facilities for institutions of higher education other than public community colleges and public technical institutes (Section 104).
2. Higher Education Facilities Comprehensive Planning (Public Law 88-204 as Amended by Public Law 89-752) -- Provides a grant, to the State Commission for Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, for conducting either directly or through other appropriate agencies or institutions comprehensive planning to determine the construction needs of institutions of higher education.
3. Title III: Loans for Construction of Academic Facilities (Public Law 88-204, 88th Congress) -- Provides loans to institutions of higher education or to higher education building agencies for construction of academic facilities. (Loan funds are not allotted to the states but higher education building agencies may qualify.)

HIGHER EDUCATION ACT OF 1965 (Public Law 89-329, 89th Congress)

1. Title I: Community Service and Continuing Education Programs -- Provides funds, through a state agency or institution serving the statewide functions for this purpose, for programs to help meet rural, urban, or suburban community needs with special emphasis on solving problems in urban and suburban areas.
2. Title VI: Financial Assistance for the Improvement of Undergraduate Instruction -- Provides funds, through a state agency or commission, to colleges and universities for teaching equipment including the purchase of TV equipment, and minor remodeling of undergraduate facilities; funds are to be used to supply classrooms, libraries, or audio-visual centers with equipment (such as projectors, screens, recorders, and sound systems), audio-visual materials (such as films, film strips, transparencies, and tape and disc recordings), closed-circuit television, published materials other than textbooks, etc.
3. Title IV: Student Assistance -- Provides funds to states and/or private agencies for insurance on loans. Funds are administered by a state, by a private non-profit agency within a state, by a combination of both, or by the Federal Government.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION (Public Law 88-210, 88th Congress)

Grants are to states, through respective State Boards, to assist in maintaining, extending, and improving existing programs of vocational education; to develop new programs of vocational education; and to provide part-time employment for youths who need the earnings from such employment to continue their vocational training on a full-time basis. It includes construction of area vocational education school facilities.

STATE TECHNICAL SERVICES ACT OF 1965

Provides grants through the Office of State Technical Services, U.S. Department of Commerce, to a designated state agency or university to enable U.S. business firms (not directly involved in defense or space projects) to secure knowledge and results of research and development programs. The State Technical Services include short courses in special topics and general material on new technologies and sources of assistance in solving particular problems confronting operations on a short term basis.

In the analyses to follow, there is no analysis made with respect to Title III of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 (Public Law 88-204, 88th Congress). Where applicable for the states surveyed, the administration of the loans to institutions of higher education for the construction of academic facilities rests with the respective institution.

States with Central Coordinating Agency for Public Higher Educational Institutions

Table IIA lists the name of the body, within each of the 29 states, which has responsibility for coordination of public higher educational institutions within the respective state. It lists also the agency within the state which administers the federal higher education acts for which data were collected.

In 14 of the 29 states (48%), the central coordinating agency for public institutions administers Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 and Title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965. The former involves grants for construction of undergraduate academic facilities and for higher education facilities comprehensive planning. The latter is for financial assistance for the improvement of undergraduate instruction.

Among the 14 public coordinating boards, commissions, or councils having the responsibility for the above "Titles," nine have private college representation on the board, commission, or council itself; four have private college representation on an Advisory Committee for the "Titles"; and one has no private college representation.

Eleven of the 29 central coordinating agencies (38%) administer Title I of the Higher Education Act of 1965--the Community Service and Continuing Education Programs. Six of the 11 have private college representation on the board, commission, or council itself; four have private college representation on an Advisory Committee for Title I; and one state has no private college which is eligible.

Nine of the 29 central coordinating agencies (31%) have the administrative responsibility for Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965--the Student Assistance Act. Five of the nine have private college representation on the board, commission, or council itself; one has private college representation on an Advisory Committee for Title IV; and one has no private college which is eligible.

One of the 29 central coordinating agencies has the administrative responsibility for Vocational Education grants. There is private college representation on the central board.

Four of the 29 central coordinating agencies have administrative responsibility for the State Technical Services Act of 1965. One of the four has private college representation on the central coordinating agency, two have no private college representation on the coordinating agency and no private college representation on an Advisory Committee, and one state has no private college which is eligible.

For no state in which the central coordinating agency for public educational institutions has the responsibility for administering the "Acts" or "Titles" was any evidence given that there are any serious problems in the coordination of planning of the "Acts" or "Titles," in the development of statewide plans, or in the funding to the public vs. private institutions. This is little different, however, from the reactions relative to problems by states in which an agency other than a central coordinating agency for all public institutions has the administrative responsibility for the "Act" or "Title"; one state indicated that there are minor problems in the coordination of agencies and some problems in public-private relationships, and one state pointed out that the private colleges are not able to provide matching funds where such matching funds are required.

States Without a Central Coordinating Agency
for Public Higher Educational Institutions
Or In Which Coordinating Agency Does Not Administer Funds

Ten of the states in the survey do not have a central coordinating agency for all public higher educational institutions. The agencies having responsibility for the administration of the federal "Acts" or "Titles" in these states are listed in Table IIB.

In addition to these 10 states, there are 12 states which responded to the questionnaire (three did not respond) and which have a central coordinating agency for all public institutions of higher education in the state but in which the central coordinating agency does not have the administrative responsibility for Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 or Title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

Twenty-two states among the 36 states responding to the questionnaire, therefore, have an agency, other than a coordinating agency for all of public higher education, which has the administrative responsibility for Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 and Title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965. An analysis was made of private college representation, for these 22 states, on the agency having the administrative responsibility for the respective "Act" or "Title." Private college representation is as follows:

1. Title I - Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963: Grants for Construction of Undergraduate Academic Facilities. Sixteen states have representation of the private colleges on the agency administering the "Title"; five states have private college representation on the Advisory Committee for the "Title," and one state has no private college representation.

2. Title I - Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 (Amended by Public Law 89-752): Higher Education Facilities Comprehensive Planning. Fourteen states have representation of the private colleges on the agency administering the planning grant; six states have private representation on the Advisory Committee for the grant; one state has no private college representation; and for one state the funds are not administered by the state.

3. Title VI - Higher Education Act of 1965: Financial Assistance for the Improvement of Undergraduate Instruction. Fourteen states have representation of the private colleges on the agency administering the "Title"; seven states have private college representation on the Advisory Committee for the "Title"; and one state has no private college representation.

Eleven of the 29 central coordinating agencies (38%) administer Title I of the Higher Education Act of 1965--the Community Service and Continuing Education Programs. Six of the 11 have private college representation on the board, commission, or council itself; four have private college representation on an Advisory Committee for Title I; and one state has no private college which is eligible.

Nine of the 29 central coordinating agencies (31%) have the administrative responsibility for Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965--the Student Assistance Act. Five of the nine have private college representation on the board, commission, or council itself; one has private college representation on an Advisory Committee for Title IV; and one has no private college which is eligible.

One of the 29 central coordinating agencies has the administrative responsibility for Vocational Education grants. There is private college representation on the central board.

Four of the 29 central coordinating agencies have administrative responsibility for the State Technical Services Act of 1965. One of the four has private college representation on the central coordinating agency, two have no private college representation on the coordinating agency and no private college representation on an Advisory Committee, and one state has no private college which is eligible.

For no state in which the central coordinating agency for public educational institutions has the responsibility for administering the "Acts" or "Titles" was any evidence given that there are any serious problems in the coordination of planning of the "Acts" or "Titles," in the development of statewide plans, or in the funding to the public vs. private institutions. This is little different, however, from the reactions relative to problems by states in which an agency other than a central coordinating agency for all public institutions has the administrative responsibility for the "Act" or "Title"; one state indicated that there are minor problems in the coordination of agencies and some problems in public-private relationships, and one state pointed out that the private colleges are not able to provide matching funds where such matching funds are required.

States Without a Central Coordinating Agency
for Public Higher Educational Institutions
Or In Which Coordinating Agency Does Not Administer Funds

Ten of the states in the survey do not have a central coordinating agency for all public higher educational institutions. The agencies having responsibility for the administration of the federal "Acts" or "Titles" in these states are listed in Table IIB.

In addition to these 10 states, there are 12 states which responded to the questionnaire (three did not respond) and which have a central coordinating agency for all public institutions of higher education in the state but in which the central coordinating agency does not have the administrative responsibility for Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 or Title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

Twenty-two states among the 36 states responding to the questionnaire, therefore, have an agency, other than a coordinating agency for all of public higher education, which has the administrative responsibility for Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 and Title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965. An analysis was made of private college representation, for these 22 states, on the agency having the administrative responsibility for the respective "Act" or "Title." Private college representation is as follows:

1. Title I - Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963: Grants for Construction of Undergraduate Academic Facilities. Sixteen states have representation of the private colleges on the agency administering the "Title"; five states have private college representation on the Advisory Committee for the "Title," and one state has no private college representation.

2. Title I - Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 (Amended by Public Law 89-752): Higher Education Facilities Comprehensive Planning. Fourteen states have representation of the private colleges on the agency administering the planning grant; six states have private representation on the Advisory Committee for the grant; one state has no private college representation; and for one state the funds are not administered by the state.

3. Title VI - Higher Education Act of 1965: Financial Assistance for the Improvement of Undergraduate Instruction. Fourteen states have representation of the private colleges on the agency administering the "Title"; seven states have private college representation on the Advisory Committee for the "Title"; and one state has no private college representation.
