This comparative study of the Cleveland Regional Union Catalog located at Case Western Reserve University and the Ohio State Library Catalog located in Columbus had as its purpose evaluation of the effectiveness of the catalogs and determination of their potential roles in Ohio library service. Data gathered on questionnaires and from analysis of the catalogs are used to compare the catalogs' administration, operation, services, holdings, and contributing libraries. Because the cost of the two catalogs is judged to be excessive in relation to the amount of service provided, the following recommendations are included: (1) establishment of unified administration of the two catalogs, (2) establishment of a single means of financial support for the two catalogs, (3) physical merger of the two catalogs into an Ohio Union Catalog, and (4) use of the proposed Ohio Union Catalog as the nucleus for a statewide bibliographic center complete with automatic data processing equipment and methods (6C)

Prefatory Note

Within the time-span of this project it was possible, in general, only to describe the status quo. We have not been able, for example, to stipulate the optimal number of libraries which should participate, or to identify those collections which might most usefully be represented in the catalogs (although we have indicated some criteria for such decisions). Nor have we been able to take into the fullest consideration the <u>future</u> library situation, both public and academic, in the State. The burgeoning State-supported higher-education network and the nascent Ohio College Library Center are forces the effect of which can only dimly be perceived. On the other hand, the shortage of manpower and the possibility of an altered tax base are pressures sure to change the public library picture and probably, by accelerating a tendency toward regionalization, to add to the responsibility of the State Library of Ohio as a strong central resource.

We see the establishment of a merged union catalog and a centralized ILL service based on it as a step which is immediately feasible, providing a useful and usable adjunct to the services of the SLO and the OCLC. The telephone/ teletype connections proposed (see page 16) are only elaborations of the present system and do not represent any dramatic automatization, even in terms of today's technology.

We are aware that, particularly in reference to the financial support of the proposed Bibliographic Center, we are challenging traditional (and logical) resistance to "still another" meta-authority in the library world. But a centralized access to regional and, thence, to Statewide and national resources, is a fact of cur time. These recommendations are based on that fact.

INTRODUCTION

Š

This is a comparative study of two union catalogs: the Cleveland Regional Union Catalog, located at Case Western Reserve University, and the Ohio State Library Union Catalog, located in Columbus. Data have been collected by questionnaire and by analysis of the operations of the catalogs themselves, on the following aspects:

Administration and operation

Services

Holdings

Contributors and their contributions

The purpose of the study is to evaluate the present contributions of the catalogs to library service, and to determine their potential role in support of libraries in the State of Ohio. The comparative approach is intended to aid in determining the feasibility of cooperation or combination of the two operations. The study also aims at finding means of improvement and extension of services. Conclusions drawn from the findings have been used in formulating specific recommendations.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The 1930's were difficult years in many ways for the library world, but in one aspect they were a most beneficial time. As one result of support by the Works Progress Administration (WPA), several union catalogs were set up all over the country—a most important service for libraries and their patrons. These were the beginnings of the two union catalogs in Ohio, the Cleveland Regional Union Catalog and The State Library of Ohio Union Catalog in Columbus. Credit for the Cleveland Catalog goes chiefly to Herbert S. Hirshberg, Dean of the School of Library Science and Director of the University Libraries at the (then) Western Reserve University, and to Dr. Robert Brinkley of the history department, who conceived the idea of a Union Catalog for Cleveland libraries. They received the backing of the President of Reserve, and the promise of cooperation from the major Cleveland libraries. It was then authorized by the WPA, and the date July 27, 1937 marks the starting point of the Cleveland Regional Union Catalog. It took three more WPA projects over the next two years to complete the enterprise; in 1941 the compilation of the Union Catalog was still being reported.

The Union Catalog in Columbus was also the result of a WPA project. For years Ohio had needed a central clearinghouse for interlibrary loans. From the Ohio State Library resources, only a third of the requests coming from all parts of the state could be answered. Through the efforts of Paul A. T. Noon, State Librarian, on October 4, 1937, only three months later than in Cleveland, the union catalog project for the State of Ohio was launched. Many major public libraries became charter members, along with a considerable number of secondary libraries throughout the state. The libraries contributed by sending catalog cards for their bibliographic holdings. The recorded cost of the establishment of the CRUC was \$293,191; the cost in Columbus was probably somewhat less, since it contained fewer cards. The initial holdings of the CRUC are indicated as

having been 2,077,500 cards in 20 cabinets (there are 37 today). Early records for SLOUC show 26 cabinets with a total of 1560 drawers, but the number of cards is not given.

The method used for the establishing of both catalogs was the same. The cards of the participating libraries were photographed by means of the Eastman Recordak machine, and later cards were typed from the microfilm and filed into drawers, in one alphabetical file. Both catalogs were set up as a main entry catalog; author card (individual and corporate), joint author, editor, author analytic, cross-references, and title cards as main entries, such as periodical titles. For the establishment of both catalogs the rules set up in the Manual of Procedures, published by the Division of Professional and Service Projects, WPA, were applied.

These Union Catalogs were designed to be a type of book-finding index, primarily an aid to libraries for interlibrary loans, book buying and location of printed material in general. Both catalogs have been constantly in use since 1937, even in their incomplete form. Yet they have been used in somewhat different ways. The Cleveland Regional Union Catalog (CRUC), housed in the main library at (now) Case Western Reserve University (CWRU), is consulted mostly by individual patrons in person. Although requests come in by local calls or by mail, there are very few long distance calls. The State Library of Onio Union Catalog (SLOUC), housed with the processing center of the State Library at a location which is physically remote from the Library itself, has never been open to the public. Requests come by mail and by telephone, including a large proportion of long distance calls. The number of long distance calls has increased spectacularly since 1964 when the State Library established a collect-call service, so that each out-of-town library is now able to call the UC whenever it needs to locate an item in a hurry.

METHODOLOGY

The following procedures were employed:

- A. Background study: documents describing the origin and early state of the catalogs were searched for and studied.
- B. Review of recent pertinent literature: a search was made for recent literature (1960-67) on union catalogs and on bibliographic aspects of state-wide
 reference networks. The material is reviewed in a bibliographic essay.
- C. Description of the union catalogs, based on questionnaires and other data as indicated.
 - 1. Administration and Operation. Based on Questionnaires I and II.
 - 2. Services. Based on:
 - (a) Questionnaires I and IV, sent to operators of both catalogs.
 - (b) Interviews and discussions with the Director of the Cleveland Regional Union Catalog (CRUC), and with the Director of the Catalog Center of the State Library of Ohio (SLOUC).
 - (c) Interviews with the catalog staffs involved in operation and management.
 - (d) Interviews with users of Cleveland Regional Union Catalog.

 Questionnaires were presented to users at the CRUC during two
 time periods, totalling 20 days: October 2-16 and November 1-4.

 Coverage was for the hours of operation of the Freiberger Library,
 where the catalog is located, whether or not members of the catalog
 staff were on duty. The catalog at Columbus is not open to individual users; requests there are received by mail and telephone.
 - (e) Annual reports, statistics, and correspondence of both catalogs.
 - 3. Contributors and their contributions. Based on Questionnaires III-A and III-B.



- 4. Use and users. Based on replies to Questionnaires III-A and III-B, which were sent to all contributing libraries. Additional data were derived from Questionnaire III-B, sent out to non-contributing libraries listed in the Ohio State Library Directory of 1967. Data derived from these questionnaires has been arrayed by type, size, and location of library.
- 5. Holdings, Based on replies to Questionnaire II, and on a random sampling of 13 drawers of cards from the Cleveland catalog (18,234 items) and of 12 drawers of cards from the Columbus catalog (12,180). Where feasible, analyzed portions of both catalogs covered the same section of the alphabet.
- 6. Comparison of Holdings. To determine the extent of duplication of materials in both catalogs, twelve drawers of the Columbus catalog were microfilmed, and compared with the same section of the Cleveland catalog. The samples were selected in such a way as to represent a diversity of entries and materials: e.g., corporate author entries as well as individual author entries, and entries for obscure as well as well-known writers.

In data concerned with catalog use, discrepancies will be noted between use records maintained by the union catalogs and those reported by the using libraries. Some libraries do not keep such records, and among those which do, there is no standard formula for statistical record keeping.

The analysis of catalog content must be treated as a rough approximation, in view of the inadequate maintenance of the catalogs themselves. This results both from a lack of resources, at least in the case of the Cleveland catalog, and from the fact that contributing libraries are frequently remiss in updating their additions and deletions, especially the latter.

- 7. In addition to the questionnaires mailed to the various libraries, and the other procedures listed in 1-6 above, the Project Manager made several trips to Columbus to familiarize herself with operations there.
- 8. Finally, for a period of 20 days, a constant watch was maintained at CRUC during all of the time (generally from 8:30 a.m. to midnight) that it was accessible to the public, regardless of whether the regular University staff was on duty or not. In this way for the first time a complete record of use was made possible.



RECOMMENDATIONS IN BRIEF

Following is a summary of recommendations and observations based on the study of the two Union Catalogs.

- A. The catalogs make an important contribution to library service in Ohio.
- B. They operate at a cost which is excessive in terms of the amount of service provided.
- C. Service should be continued only if certain conditions are met, conditions which hopefully will result in significant improvement in quality and scope of service, with a lower per-unit cost. The conditions are:
 - 1. Establishment of a unified administration for the two catalogs.
 - a. The formation of a governing board representing member libraries and including representation both from the State Library of Ohio and the Ohio College Library Center.
 - b. The appointment of a permanent, full-time Director with authority and resources to staff and operate the Center (see 4, below) in a professional and efficient manner.
 - information and publicity, designed to increase the use of and cooperation with the Center. Casual and random access characteristic of present use (particularly in Cleveland) is perhaps the most important reason for the general lack of enthusiasm evidenced in user response.
 - 2. Establishment of a single, firm, permanent financial structure to support the two catalogs. (See Financial Base, page 10.)
 - 3. Physical merger of the two catalog operations, with radical improvements to be made in the quality of the catalogs themselves.



- a. "Radical improvements" is interpreted to mean careful and complete editing of both files, the cost of which must be considered in any planning. It should be noted that a merged catalog would be considerably smaller than a total of the two present ones, for two reasons: (1) the considerable overlapping (due mainly though not entirely to the presence of Cleveland Public Library cards in both files) would be eliminated; and (2) editing would eliminate the present redundancy of main-entry cards in both files caused by clerical failure over the years to recognize new cards for old titles.
- proximate both to the State Library and to the Ohio College Library

 Center, and more or less equidistant from Cincinnati, Cleveland, etc.
- c. Teletype connections should be established at remote locations, in Cleveland at once and elsewhere as soon as possible.
- 4. The use of the resultant Ohio Union Catalog as the nucleus for a professionally staffed Bibliographic Center, equipped with a comprehensive set of bibliographic tools and publications, offering full service to libraries in support of their interlibrary loan requirements.
 - for the State, in full cooperation with the Ohio College Library
 Center.
 - b. The dependably-edited and merged file should serve as a check point*

 to prevent the discard of the last known copy of a book in the State.

 A library holding the last known copy and wishing to discard it could be requested to transfer the book to the State Library.

FINANCIAL BASE: FURTHER COMMENTS

The establishment of a firm financial structure is absolutely essential to effective and efficient operation of any bibliographic service. The high perunit cost of operation of the union catalogs today is a function of both economy-induced inefficiencies and of inadequate planning for extension of service. The service gets worse because of poor coordination of contributions and insufficient staffing of the catalogs. As the service gets worse, the motivation for support is weakened. (Another problem, particularly in Cleveland, is the by now traditional role of the catalog as a stepchild or unwanted legacy.)

At the present time, the burdens are poorly distributed. Certain institutions are carrying an inordinate share of the burden for upkeep and for bibliographic contributions. A more equitable distribution of the burden is essential, with equalization proportionate to the costs involved in each organization's contribution to the catalog. Such reimbursement should begin immediately with support for the operation at Cleveland, which until now has been operated entirely at the expense of Case Western Reserve University. This support should be sufficient to obtain the services of a competent professional person to direct the phase-out of the Cleveland catalog as an autonomous operation, and the establishment of the new lines of communication between the proposed Center and the libraries now using the Cleveland catalog. At present the Cleveland catalog is without professional staff.

The present duplication of effort is indefensible. It is true that the clientele using the present catalogs differs, but the services are essentially the same. A well-planned merger will deemphasize the parochial differences between public, academic and special libraries in the interest of better bibliographic service to all. At present, there is substantial duplication in the bibliographic work done by libraries. In order to promote the efficient opera-

tion of all member libraries, the merged union catalog should be made part of a complete bibliographic search service, properly staffed and equipped. It would be ideal for this service to be operated at Columbus by the State Library, which is the logical coordinator for state-wide cooperative effort. Its location at Columbus would also facilitate cooperation with the efforts of the Ohio College Library Center. And finally, coordination with the activities of the Processing Center of the State Library would provide both administrative and operational benefits.



FUTURE TASKS

As indicated in the Prefatory Note, the recommendations of the present study are mainly for immediate first steps. The following recommendations and observations are intended to advise the future administration of the combined resource.

A. Nature of bibliographic contributions

A thorough study should be made of the contributions needed from various kinds of libraries in order to provide for effective identification and inter-library loan operation. The Ohio Union Catalog should not be expected to represent the entire holdings of all libraries in the State, but it should contain entries for unique, rare, or specialized bodies of materials.

B. Types of Contributors

Careful planning will be needed to assure the optimum mix of contributor libraries and the exact nature of their bibliographic contributions. The contributing libraries should be appropriately distributed geographically and by type of library. It should be determined as part of a system study, what the point of diminishing returns is for recording of multiple locations. Factors involved in this decision include present and projected interlibrary loan needs, and expense involved. The latter should be considered in terms both of present operations and of the economies which will eventually be possible through the use of automatic data-processing techniques.

Implicit here and throughout these recommendations is the mandate for cooperation with the Ohio College Library Center.

C. Types of Contributions

The final determination of the subject and forms of materials to be included should be made after further consultation with the member libraries. We recommend that the following types of materials not be included:

Periodicals

Fiction

Juvenile literature

However, the Ohio Bibliographic Center should coordinate its efforts with those of the several now-current projects for the development of Union Lists of Serials in Ohio.

D. Effect of ALA ILL Code

In planning the mix of bibliographic contributions, attention should be paid to the Interlibrary Loan Code now being revised by a committee of the American Library Association. Entries included should bear clear indication of restrictions of their use.

E. Standardization of Entry Form

Effort should be made to get agreement by member libraries on form of entry; this will facilitate greatly both input and output operations. In this effort, consultation with appropriate data-processing authority should be sought, since any major revision should be implemented with an awareness of the pressures for an increasingly available technological possibilities of automation or mechanization of I/O (see I, below).

F. Schedules

Contributions should be scheduled to prevent pile-ups and seasonal backlogs in filing.

G. Withdrawals

It is especially important that contributing libraries make rapid notification of withdrawals, since at present a great deal of time is wasted by attempts to borrow books no longer in libraries which once had them.

H. Relations with National Union Catalog

The proposed Ohio Union Catalog will provide an information source supplementary to the National Union Catalog (NUC). The printed catalogs of



NUC are not obtained by many small and medium sized libraries because of their cost. Further, expected development of centralized cataloging will mean a decrease in the usefulness of having these publications in every small library. The proposed Ohio Bibliographic Center can provide full reference service upon the base of its own full set of such bibliographic publications. It would also make possible through the Ohio Union Catalog identification of other libraries holding specific titles, thus facilitating interlibrary loan beyond the scope of NUC.

Libraries contributing cards to the National Union Catalog should arrange to send the cards directly to NUC, rather than sending them, as at present, via the Cleveland Regional Union Catalog. This will result in less delay in incorporating new entries in both NUC and in the Ohio Union Catalog.

I. Use of Automatic Data Processing Methods

We suggest that the system analysis and planning of the merger and of the subsequent operation of the proposed Center be conducted with full cognizance of the potential use of automatic data processing methods. Since it is unlikely that these methods will be available in the immediate future for the work which needs to be done now, the most urgent needs, in terms of processing, relate to the preparation of proper input. (See G, above.) And basic to the future of the combined catalog is a user-oriented system study which will itself influence forms of input and access.

(1) Conversion to Machine-readable Form

The present state of maintenance in both catalogs is deplorable, and it would be a waste of scarce resources to convert them to machine-readable form at present. The history of the catalogs, as referred to elsewhere in this report, serves as the unfortunate reason for their state.

But even if the catalogs were in good condition, they should not be converted to machine form except as part of a well-considered plan which would take into account the future operation of the Center, and the imminent changes in conventions for bibliographic format. (e.g., Project MARC.) Further, by the time the input has been prepared, and plans are formulated for the services of the Center, the technical means for conversion of files may have changed radically.

(2) Suggestions for Book Catalogs

Book catalogs for the system are a possibility suggested by some respondents. But this is not an innovation which can or should be begun lightly, without much planning. The book catalogs which have found to be economical and feasible are those of well-unified systems. The proposed Center could do much to meld the libraries of Ohio into an effective library network, but this is not possibly by any such simple expedient as a book catalog. It depends most of all upon a great deal of planning and the development of effective liaison among the people in the libraries and library systems which would become part of such an integrated network. It would be a tragedy to expend scarce resources in an ill-considered and abortive book catalog effort, when less money could more wisely be spent in the development of accurate and useful input adequate for today's environment.

(3) Input-output Mechanisms

The same might be said for terminal devices which are now available for input-output. Attention to these has become extremely fashionable, and in certain developmental systems, a great deal of money has been spent to provide machinery for use by installations or individuals. On-line processing, like any other tool, is useful only in

terms of the use made of it. In our opinion, there is no present justification for use of any such exotic tools in the development of the catalog or of the proposed Center. This is not to rule them out for the future. But the attention of the Governing Board and of the Director should not be diverted from the more pressing needs outlined here.

J. Communication Networks

During the period of consolidation of the two catalogs, it will be necessary to have improved communication facilities between them, including a direct telephone service and teletypewriter linkage. After completion of the merger, it will also be desirable to retain a Cleveland office equipped with these communication channels, for liaison between the Center and the libraries in this area, since these libraries are oriented to the use of the Cleveland catalog. If so, it should probably be supported cooperatively, either with provision for payment upon use, or with a set annual levy on each cooperating institution which would guarantee unlimited access. Service to individual users, under such an arrangement, would be available only through a cooperating library. Similar offices should then be established, as feasible, in such locations as Cincinnati, Toledo, Youngstown, Dayton, etc.

CARD PROCESSING

CLEVELAND

The Cleveland Regional Union Catalog (CRUC) receives cards from 42 contributing libraries (27 Academic, 2 Public, 13 Special). All cards should be stamped by the contributing library—if not, they are stamped after arrival. Then the cards are counted and their number is acknowledged on a special form for this purpose. Prior to filing to the Permanent Catalog, the titles of the cards are combined according to the Combining and Editing Rules and after filing the number of cards is recorded. On request current imprints of eleven libraries are sent monthly to the Library of Congress. These libraries are as follows:

Cleveland Public Library
University of Cincinnati Library
Miami University Library
Oberlin College Library
Hebrew Union College Library

Cards of all other contributors are sent only twice a year to Washington, D. C.

Procedure of accession and processing cards at Cleveland Regional Union Catalog.

- 1. The new cards from contributors are counted, location-name of library, stamped, alphabetized and acknowledged.
- 2. Then they are separated into the following catagories:
 - a) 1956 to date published items from the 10 selected libraries for monthly shipments to LC, N.U.C.
 - b) Pre-1956 and all cards received from the rest of contributing libraries are combined.
 - c) According to the Combining and Editing Rules. Then the cards filed into the Preliminary Catalog, and twice a year (each six months--June and December) they are shipped to the LC, N.U.C.
 - d) When returned from Washington, all locations combined on one card and filed into the Permanent Catalog.

See "Procedure Descriptions" (Difference: Columbus does not send cards to LC.)



POLICY OF THE CLEVELAND REGIONAL UNION CATALOG FOR CONTRIBUTING LIBRARIES

The cards should be rag content and should be either in Library of Congress or an equally acceptable form of reproduction. The entries should conform to standard library practice in main entry, collation, etc. There should be one main card for each title in your library. If it is not possible for you to send a main card for each title in your library up to the present date, you might set a starting date and inform me that you will send a main card for each title added from such a date hereafter. This should include only books fully cataloged in your library.

In the case of <u>Journals</u>: journals that began publication <u>before</u> 1950 are to be reported to Cleveland Regional Union Catalog. Journals that began publication in 1950 and after that date are to be reported to <u>New Serial Titles</u> and not to the Union Catalog. In journals started prior to 1950 you need to indicate on the Union Catalog Card only your starting date and not every additional continuation thereafter—just an open entry, if it is still published. Please send us cancellation notices also.

We will have stamps made with the abbreviation of your library and send you two of them; we ask that you stamp your cards in the upper left-hand corner on the front of the card and alphabetize your cards and send them to Cleveland Regional Union Catalog, Freiberger Library, Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio, 44106.

In the case of titles cataloged as a set, you need only send a main set card, and not cards for each title in the set. Each month we send cards received for the month for imprints for 1956 to date into the National Union Catalog, Washington, D. C., of 10 major libraries selected by Library of Congress.

Twice a year we send cards for imprints prior to 1956 to the National Union Catalog. These cards are filmed there for their master file and returned to us to be filed in our permanent file. We will be glad to have cards from your library. If it is not practical for you to send cards for all the books you catalog, and you wish to be selective and send only part, you may do so; but it is better to be all-inclusive, if possible. You might send cards once a month if that is practical. We will acknowledge receipt of cards by count.

B. PHYSICAL ARRANGEMENT AT CRUC

There are five different units at the CRUC, viz.:

I. Preliminary Catalog**

It is divided into two parts according to the frequency of cards shipments to the National Union Catalog:

- books published in 1956 and after which are sent monthly to the Library of Congress.
- b) Current Accession File II--for cards of the same libraries for books published before 1956 and all cards from all contributing libraries of all periods. There cards are sent only twice a year (in January and July) to the Pational Union Catalog.
- c) There is a separate compartment of the eliminary Catalog at the CRUC containing the cards of U.S. Government Publications which are not sent to the Library of Congress.

II. Permanent Catalog

When the cards are returned to the CRUC they are filed into the Permanent Catalog which is the main CRUC catalog.




FIGURE 8: QUESTIONNAIRE I

### NOTE TO FIGURE 14

Figure 27 presents a list of all libraries--academic, public and special, which contribute either to the Cleveland or the Columbus Union Catalogs. There are two Public Libraries, Cleveland P.L. and East Cleveland P.L. which contribute to both catalogs. Information as to the number of cards contributed and withdrawn, the frequency and regularity of contributions and withdrawals is given for each library for the last five years, as well as the year of beginning. This table enables us to detect the largest contributors. Among the 27 academic libraries contributing to the Cleveland UC, Oberlin leads this year with 21,397 (3,872 w.), the Case WRU libraries contributed 16,432 cds., withdrew 238, which compared with last year's 17,063 is more than 2,000 cds. less, but more than in 1965-13,535 cds. and more than in 1964-10,309 and in 1963-10,023. The next largest contributor among the academic libraries is the University of Cincinnati including its Medical School Library with 12,928 cds. in 1966-67, 13,878 in 1965-66, 11,732 in 1964-65, and 7,258 in 1963-64, and 7,749 in 1962-63.

Conclusion: Number of contributions is growing especially among the academic libraries as compared with 1965 and before.

### NOTE TO FIGURE 20

Acad.Libraries contributing to Clev.UC make their contributions mostly on a regular basis, but only 50% of them inform about their withdrawals. The public libraries, the largest and almost exclusive contributors to the Col. UC are also very regular in their contributions and in their withdrawals; yet 10 do not send any information about discarded material.

The special libraries do not show such regularity-only 50% have an established policy as to the time of contributions, and only one sends withdrawal notices monthly. The other 50% do not send withdrawal notices at all.

Thus, a total of 32 libraries out of 42 members of the Clev. UC make their contributions regularly, 22 of them also inform about their discarded material, 10 libraries are irregular in their contributions, 7 in their withdrawal notices, and 20 do not report on this matter at all. Out of 36 library members of the Col. UC, 31 do it on a regular basis, 5 irregularly. Withdrawal notices are sent by 16 libraries-more than 50%, b6 8 irregularly, 10 libraries-30%-do not send withdrawal notices at all.

The fact that a comparatively high number of libraries do not send in their withdrawal notices at all explains the high proportion of dead material in both UC and the misinformation given as to the location of certain items.

### NOTE TO FIGURE 24-A

Figure 37 shows the contributions of material on different subject fields. Twenty-two of the Ac. libraries contribute cards on all subjects represented in their libraries, 5 only on special subjects; medicine and law. Among the 22 the material seems well distributed, however, there are certain Ac. libraries with emphasis on special subjects. All public libraries seem to represent all subject areas, only one reported its emphasis on science and technology, giving as reason the frequent requests on these subjects from the industries. From 13 special libraries only 3 report their material on all subject fields. All the others contribute on the special material which composes their collections.

Since 13 special libraries, 4 industrial, 5 medical, and 9 academic special libraries contribute to the Cleveland UC, and only 2 special libraries (history) and one special academic library (religion) contribute to the Col. UC there should be considerably more material on science and technology in the Cleveland UC than in the Columbus UC. For better illustration of this aspect, see also chapter on esources and Holdings.

### NOTE TO FIGURE 24-B

Figure shows the variety of forms and types of material for which the contributing libraries send records. Five academic libraries contributing to Cleveland and one to Columbus answered that they send cards for any form of bibliographic material that is cataloged and/or classified.

All of the academic libraries send to the Cleveland UC cards for books and monographs; more than 50% of them send cards for periodicals and serials, and one library, Akron University Library, reports only their theses. Among the public libraries contributing to the Columbus UC besides for book and monographs, only few send records for other type of material. Since not all libraries answered this particular question, it is difficult to draw any definite conclusion. On this aspect the corresponding table in the Chapter on the Resources and Holdings of the UC will throw more light.

In general, more forms of bibliographic material should be represented in the UC's. This means the libraries should catalog more of their bibliographic material other than books.

#### NOTE TO FIGURE 27

Figure 27 shows the cost of contribution borne by the member libraries, as reported by the libraries. Thirteen of the twenty-five academic libraries contributing to Cleveland UC show a great range of cost which varies between \$8.00 and \$1,820 for the last year; five report it as "negligible" and seven "as impossible to evaluate". The amount of \$1,820 has been given by the Freiberger Library, \$1,062 by Oberlin University Library.

The two public libraries contributing to both UC's report a total of \$775. and \$67.50; the special libraries contributing to Cleveland estimate their cost from \$25 to \$433. Three of these members consider it as "negligible" and five "impossible to evaluate".

Among the 14 public libraries contributing to the Columbus UC, estimates of the cost range between \$25 and \$218 for the last year; five consider it "negligible" and eleven "impossible to evaluate".

The Figure shows, however, that the cost is actually negligible for the smaller contributors, but amounts to hundreds of dollars for the larger ones.
