This description of the probation-retention-disqualification policy at Santa Monica City College (Calif.) may provide guidelines for other institutions. A student may be placed on probation if he (1) has a GPA below 2.0 in all college units attempted. (2) is a transfer while on probation from or disqualified by another school, or (3) is readmitted after disqualification by SMCC. He may be removed from probation by improving his GPA, or by changing other applicable conditions. A probationary student can be disqualified if (1) with less than 60 units attempted, he has a deficiency of 15 or more grade points, (2) with 60-85 units attempted, he has a deficiency of 10 or more grade points, or (3) with more than 85 units attempted, he has a deficiency of one or more grade points. He may remain on probation if, with eight or more units attempted, he earns two or more grade points above 2.0 each semester, or if, with less than eight units attempted, he maintains a 2.0 average each semester. If dismissed for poor scholarship, he may ask for readmission after a lapse of one semester. His chance of readmission will be improved if (1) he has completed at least six months' military service. (2) he has worked in an area related to his SMCC studies. (3) he has satisfactorily completed studies at another school. (4) he has had professional counseling (vocational and educational) for a planned program at SMCC, or (5) his environmental conditions (financial, social, etc.) have improved enough to justify reconsideration. SANTA MONICA CITY COLLEGE Probation and Dismissal Policy

A. Placement on Probation

A student will be placed on scholastic probation when:

- 1. He has a deficiency of grade points below a C (2.0) average in all college units attempted.
- 2. He is a transfer while on probation or disqualified from another college.
- 3. He is readmitted after disqualification from SMCC.

B. Removal from Probation

A student will be removed from probation when he no longer meets the requirements for being placed on probation.

C. Disqualification

A student, having been on probation, will be subject to disqualification when:

- 1. Less than 60 units have been attempted and there is a deficiency of 15 or more grade points.
- 2. 60-85 units have been attempted and there is a deficiency of 10 or more grade points.
- 3. Over 85 units have been attempted and there is a deficiency of 1 or more grade points.
- 4. Students who have grade point deficiencies greater than those stated in 1, 2, or 3 above will be continued on probation provided they meet one of the following conditions.
 - (a) If 8 or more units are attempted, they earn 2 or more grade points above a C (2.0) average each semester; or
 - (b) If fewer than 8 units are attempted, a C (2.0) average is maintained each semester.

D. Readmission after dismissal for poor scholarship

Petition for readmission consideration must be submitted to the Probation Committee prior to August 1 for fall, and January 1 for spring semesters. Petition forms may be obtained from the Records Office.

Students who, by maintaining a B (3.0) average, cannot raise their cumulative GPA to a C (2.0) average before 90 units have been attempted, will not normally be admitted to transfer programs.

One regular semester must elapse after dismissal for poor scholarship before a student is eligible to petition for readmission. The following experiences will enhance the student's opportunity for readmission after disqualification:

- 1. Completion of at least a 6 month term of military service.
- 2. Vocational experience in an area related to the desired studies at SMCC.
- 3. Completion of studies with recommending grades at another school: UCLA Extension Division, or correspondence course from UC Berkeley.
- 4. Completion of vocational and education counseling at a professional agency with a planned program at SMCC that is well supported by available data.
- 5. Clear evidence of changed environmental conditions, financial, social, etc. that would justify reconsideration.

STUDY

This study is an analysis of the results of the SMCC Probation-Retention-Disqualification Policy during and prior to the Spring 1968 Semester. A copy of this policy is attached as Appendix A.

Plan of the Study

Each student placed on probation at the beginning of a semester was given a code representing the reason for his probationary status. The reasons used were as follows:

- Code 3 Returned to Probation: A student formerly on probation who was removed from probation and is now being returned to a probationary status.
- Code 4: High School: First time college students who are non-high school graduates or who have earned less than a C average in high school. This code is no longer part of the SMCC probation policy, although a few readmissions are still classified here.
- Code 5 New Probation, SMCC: A student being placed on probation for the first time because of deficiencies at SMCC.
- Code 6 Continuing Probation: A student on probation the previous semester and continued on probation.
- Code 7 Transfer Frobation: A student transferring from another college and being placed on probation because of previous deficiencies.
- Code 8 SMCC Disq. Readmit.: A former SMCC student readmitted after a previous disqualification.
- Code 9 Transfer Disqualified: A student transferring from another college after disqualification at that college.

When the semester was completed, an end of semester decision was made. In addition, a count was made of students on probation who withdrew from school during the semester.

SPRING 1968

At the beginning of the Spring 1968 semester, there were 12,137 students officially enrolled in the college. (Enrolled at the end of the third week of classes.) Of these, 2986 (24.6%) were on probation for various reasons as indicated below.

SUMMARY OF POLICY RESULTS Spring 1968

At the end of the semester, a decision is made concerning the status of each student on probation. These decisions are tabulated below. Students are notified by messages printed on their grade reports. All disqualified students are given an opportunity for a personal interview concerning their problems. Many are reinstated and allowed to continue in school on probation.

Table IV gives information as to the varying effect of the probation-disqualification policy on different types of students. The characteristics of load, class, and entry status are separated. The number of students on probation at the beginning of the semester and those disqualified at the end are indicated. The percentages of those on probation who were disqualified is given for each category.

Example: 36 full time freshmen who transferred from another school were on probation during the spring semester. Of these students, 6 (or 17%) were disqualified in June.

It is interesting to note that the disqualification policy has gradually been changed to apply much more to the full time students than to the part time. 22% of the full time probationers were disqualified while only 6% of the part time probationers were disqualified.



Data concerning the results of the Probation-Disqualification Policy has now been collected for a period of three years. Because of changes in the policy itself, variations in data from year to year can be expected.

The following tables V, VI and VII display past experience with probationers and disqualified students. Data for the Spring 1967 semester is not available.
