## PREFACE

This is the first volume of what will be a continuing series undertaking to report research in progress in health economics, medical care organization and medical care administration. This volume has been developed to supply the health economist and the medical care researcher and planner with a resource document through which he may keep current with ongoing research in advance of its appearance in the literature.

*The Health Economics Studies Information Exchange* supersedes two earlier series which reported similar information. *Sources of Morbidity Data* issued for 11 years by the Public Health Service will no longer appear. The other, more directly related to the subject matter of the *Health Economics Studies Information Exchange*, is *An Inventory of Social and Economic Research in Health* published annually by the Health Information Foundation. Through the kindness of Mr. George Bugbee and Dr. Odin Anderson, the *Health Economics Studies Information Exchange* has had access to all the sources used by the University of Chicago in preparing the *Inventory*.

As a first step in preparing these reports, questionnaires were sent to all graduate schools offering degrees in the health professions, sociology, economics, public administration and public health. All the charitable foundations who listed any interest in medicine or medical care were contacted. Persons and institutions receiving grants or contracts from the Public Health Service relating to health economics or medical care administration also received the questionnaire. In all, about 4,000 questionnaires were mailed. Copies of the form used may be found at the rear of this volume.

The first issuance of the *Health Economics Studies Information Exchange* reports on 355 projects. There is no way of determining the degree of completeness of coverage achieved. Hopefully, each succeeding year will see expansion in the listing, reflecting the Nation's mounting concern about the economics of health and improvement in organizing its delivery.

Any suggestions our readers may have as to ways to make the *Health Economics Studies Information Exchange* more useful will be welcome.

## A-1 The Effect of the Third Party Reimbursement System upon Hospital Costs and Financing (1/19/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To test the hypothesis that cost-based third party reimbursement formulae serve to increase hospital costs.

**Content:** The project will attempt to isolate and identify managerial responses to various payment techniques, and the subsequent effect of these responses upon long-term hospital costs and finances, with special emphasis on the following: the effect of Blue Cross and Welfare reimbursement formulae upon hospital costs and finances, and the effect of an all-inclusive per diem reimbursement formulae (Welfare) as opposed to the split rate for routine and non-routine services (Blue Cross).

**Methods:** Information will be gathered from Massachusetts because of the large proportion of the population (almost 50 percent) that is insured by Blue Cross and because of the State's position as one of the most active participants in the Federally sponsored Medical-Aid-to-the-Aged Program.

## **A-3 Nationwide Study of Hospital Costs in the Period since World War II (1/25/66)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To determine the forces and influences responsible for changes in hospital costs during the postwar period, to measure these effects, and to relate them to changes in hospital use, quality of care, medical technology, organization of people and resources, and environmental factors such as price trends, insurance coverage and legislation. The purpose is to understand the fundamental relationships of the factors going into the production of hospital service rather than to explain the particular trends of the study period.

**Content:** The study is in 3 parts: an analytical study of trends based on accounting and operating data from a group of Western New York hospitals with a uniform accounting and reporting system; a detailed case-by-case study of a selected group of hospitals selected from across the country; and an econometric study of the cost function to determine statistically how costs respond to variations in hospital characteristics and operating conditions.

**Methods:** The three parts use different techniques. The first uses the tools of accounting and cost analysis in a traditional approach, the second employs a wide variety of investigative and statistical techniques to pinpoint the reasons for particular cost changes in case study hospitals, and the last study uses a co-variance analysis technique to test the applicability of a number of economic models of cost behavior with the Western New York data.

## A-6 Study of Costs and Patient Characteristics in Proprietary Nursing Homes (6/30/66)

## A-7 Cost Study of Nursing Homes in California (8/4/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To foster the development of cost reporting programs for nursing homes using data already collected and to assist in the development of a reimbursement formula based on "reasonable costs."

**A-8 Study of the Costs to a Teaching Hospital of a Program of Consultation to Nursing Homes (9/14/66)**

**ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To determine types of costs borne by a hospital in providing consultation to nursing homes and estimate the costs incurred by nursing homes in bringing up their levels of care in meeting the hospital's standards.

## A-10 Hospital Cost Trends in Western Pennsylvania (1/13/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To interpret hospital cost trends in western Pennsylvania.

## **A-12 Factors Affecting the Costs of Hospital Care in the Western Pennsylvania Area (1/12/66)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To seek out factors affecting the costs of hospital care and to evaluate the relative impact of specific factors on these costs. (Inpatient hospital care per patient day and per admission.) It is hoped that this study will reveal something about the shape of marginal cost and the existence or absence of economies of scale in hospital operations.

**Content:** Tentative Table of Contents: Introduction; Data; Analytical Model; Hypothesized Factors Related to Hospital Costs; Hypothesized Forms of Relationship; Results; Summary of Findings; Implications of Findings. Appendix A—List of Equations and Computer Programs; Appendix B—Data Forms and Work Sheets.

**Methods:** Twenty-four variables and two dummy variables are initially chosen on the basis of the frequency of their inclusion in the literature and on a theoretical expectation of their "causal" relationship with the costs. Using the variables thus chosen, 5 families of hypotheses about the nature of the variables' association with the costs will be tested through various forms of multiple regressions. These multiple regressions are of linear and additive forms with interaction terms and segmented variables. Curvilinear forms (quadratic) and multiplicative relationships (logarithmic) are also included. In order to incorporate all the data available, a computer program of covariance analysis is adopted in combining cross section and time series data. The data used are the financial reports of 68 non-profit, general hospi-

tals in Western Pennsylvania for an 11-year period from 1952 to 1963, except 1956. These reports are filed semi-annually with the Blue Cross of Western Pennsylvania Plan by the hospitals participating in the Plan.

## A-14 Comparative Costs of Alternative Institutional Arrangements in the Treatment of the Mentally Ill (5/6/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** What are the relative economic efficiencies of the alternative institutional arrangements in the treatment of the mentally ill? Are there economic advantages for treating the mentally ill in general hospitals and local facilities rather than in State hospitals? And specifically, what are the problems to be overcome in making judgments about the relative economic efficiencies of these types of institutions?

**Content:** Three institutions were selected: a State mental hospital, a general community hospital, and a day treatment center. From these institutions, records were obtained concerning the patient populations, including personal, social, pre- and post-care data. Actual costs of treatment and the care provided were determined, and, on the basis of these data and the length of stay, comparisons were developed on a per patient and case basis.

**Conclusions:** (1) Care and treatment in community facilities and general hospitals are less costly than in State hospitals for intensive treatment programs, although the margin is not great, and the State mental hospital cannot be ruled out for developing short term and intensive care; (2) the crucial consideration in making comparison among institutions is the comparability of the patient populations and the severity of illness experienced by those patients; (3) emphasis is

being given to the opinion that public institutions neglect capital carrying costs and therefore appear to have low costs, when such may not be the case.

## B-9 Charges for Complex Surgery (6/10/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** The purpose of the study is to open inquiry into the financial aspects of complex surgery. Charges for the more difficult and complex surgical procedures, some of which are rather new and require large teams supported by elaborate equipment and detailed protocols, are compared with charges for simpler procedures.

**Objectives:** The general purpose of the project was to investigate chronic illness and the aged in a Florida county with special concern for the role of public health in view of the significance of long-term conditions as causes of morbidity and mortality. ## D-15 A Study of Home Care in Psychiatric Patients (3/30/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To increase the general practitioner's understanding of psychiatric problems by making available to them support and facilities not otherwise provided. For the patients the main objectives are (1) to treat them in their own home, (2) to shorten the period of illness, (3) to treat them more effectively by involving the family and the home, and (4) to treat them after discharge and prevent or reduce any readmissions.

**Content:** Initially the patients eligible for this project were Saskatoon residents who had been admitted to the psychiatric ward and showed residual disability and great likelihood of a relapse. Finally there had to be likelihood of benefiting from support given to the patient and his family in the home. Later on patients were admitted to the program who had not necessarily been in the psychiatric ward previously, provided they met the other criteria.

**Methods:** Patients who were eligible were randomly allocated to home care and control groups. The groups received treatment prescribed for them by physicians in the usual way, except they did not receive the extra facilities provided through the home care staff. A special questionnaire is used to assess the effects of the patient's illness on his nearest relative. The relative is then interviewed about the patient's condition immediately prior to his referral and reinterviewed approximately three months after

the patient enters the program or becomes a control patient.

**Objectives:** To measure the need for public health nurses in acute general hospitals to plan care for patients after discharge.

**Objectives:** To determine the influence of economic level upon dental health status, voting behaviour in a fluoridation plebiscite, and interest response to another public health measure, specifically a Sabin oral Poliomyelitis Immunization Program,

In this study, better dental health was found in children from high economic groups as compared with low economic groups. The high and middle economic groups voted strongly in favor of fluoridation while low economic groups voted strongly against it.

For the response program, records were obtained from the town health unit. The records showed responses from adults, preschool children and school children. Finally, for the plebiscite survey, municipal records were studied and differences

## E-24 New Methods of Establishing a Continuum of Community Care for Problem Drinkers (6/2/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To demonstrate new methods of establishing a continuum of community care for problem drinkers.

**Content:** The project will consist of the following endeavors: (1) development of new methods of intervening into the lives of problem drinkers by attempting changes in their environment as well as in their personalities, (2) dissemination of community mental health principles and procedures of comprehensive and continuous care for chronic abusers of alcohol to the staffs of community agencies and organizations, to medical students and hospital personnel, and to other actual or potential caretakers, and (3) evaluation of these new methods aimed at individual intervention and attempts of educating staffs of referral agencies and representatives of community agencies and organizations.

## E-26 A Study of Patient Care in a General Hospital (8/2/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To define and observe human variables which have a significant influence upon the care of patients in a general hospital. It is assumed that patient care is influenced by the family, the patient, the physicians, the nurses, other hospital personnel, other patients, and friends. Interactions of patients with each of the above groups are being explored.

## E-31 Evaluation of Disability and Rehabilitation Potential (5/18/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** (1) To assess the validity of determinations regarding the disability and rehabilitation potential of applicants for Old Age and Survivors Insurance benefits; and (2) to delineate the important sources of errors in these determinations.

**Content:** In evaluating the potential of disability and rehabilitation, information about several factors characteristic of the individual are required. ## G-2 Study of Home Nursing Services in California (12/13/65)

## H-26 Continuing Master Sample Survey of Health and Welfare Services (2/14/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** The Master Sample Survey will provide systematic information which will (1) characterize the whole population of Puerto Rico, (2) reveal the dimensions and magnitude of the chronic illness problem and other health problems of the island as a whole, (3) indicate the net consequences of the programs created to deal with the prevention, control and care of these problems, and (4) characterize the impact of chronic illness on family units, as well as on individuals.

**ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To describe, for a wide variety of areas including health and health care, the condition of low income families in Eastern Kentucky.

## **H-29 Socioethnologic Factors in the Etiology of Toxemia of Pregnancy, Congenital Malformations and Hospitalization of Infants under Three (1/9/66)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** In a total population, to measure (1) the incidence of pregnancy and labor, (2) the incidence of congenital malformations, (3) the causes of infant deaths, (4) the rates and causes of hospitalization under the age of three. ## H-30 Study of Relationship of Environmental Factors to the Type and Frequency of Cancer Causing Deaths in Catholic Nuns during Calendar Years of 1963, 1964, 1965, and 1966

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To study relationship of environmental factors to the type of frequency of cancer causing deaths in Catholic nuns during the years 1963, 1964, 1965, and 1966.

**Content:** The infrequency of cancer of the cervix in nuns has been attributed to celibacy and virginity, yet nuns frequently develop cancer of the uterine fundus, cancer of the ovary and cancer of the breast. Undoubtedly the restrictions of religious life affect the incidence of cancer and other diseases.

**Methods:** The notification of death for each nun is checked by the community or personal physician, verified by the Mother Provincial, as well as by the Health Secretary of the Conference of Major Religious Superiors for Women. A detailed medical history, along with death certificate, is compiled for each nun from 223 communities with a population of 108,342. After notice of death is received, the personal physician of the deceased sister is contacted for all medical information on the past history, hospitalization and autopsy data, and the State Board of Health is contacted to provide a copy of her death certificate.

## H-35 Impact of Water Fluoridation on the Practice of Dentistry (1/20/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** The study is being done to determine the effect that water fluoridation has on dental practice, and to determine prevalent and significant differences between dental practice in fluoridated and fluoride-deficient communities. All previous findings have been based on examination of teeth in children in both types of communities, rather than on detailed examination of dental practice.

**Content:** The study is designed to help establish possible dental needs of future generations, and methods of meeting these needs. The results of the investigation should provide information for public officials to help judge future dental manpower needs, and for public health officials, dental educators, dental students and recent graduates, prospective dental students and counselors, and organized dentistry to help plan for the future. It will help dentists comprehend economic changes which may occur.

**Methods:** Surveys will be conducted in two groups of communities which have been matched socio-economically, demographically, and culturally. One group has community water fluoridated to the optimum level naturally and the other group is fluoride-deficient. Records of each dentist in practice in these communities will be studied, and pertinent data recorded. Results of a feasibility study provide the basis for the final study.

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** Development and maintenance of two population laboratories to provide (a) data on mental disorders, (b) a base for field studies, and (c) training of research workers. This syndrome is commonly caused by depersonalized institutionalization. It is believed to be the major cause of mental disorder which is preventable.

**Methods:** The populations studied are the residents of Dutchess County, New York, and of the Washington Heights Health District, Manhattan, New York City. A register of patients with mental disorders is compiled from reports from mental hospitals. A community survey of Washington Heights has also been utilized for case finding. The social breakdown syndrome is diagnosed by interview of the patient or attendants. Model, continual, community-oriented care was made available to Dutchess County residents beginning in 1960. The effectiveness of treatment can be evaluated by the trend of incidence and prevalence of long-term hospitalization and the social breakdown syndrome.

## I-4 Development of a Methodology to Differentiate Quantities of Normal Nursing Services Delivered to Different Groups of Patients

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To investigate the feasibility of a method of measuring standard nursing services to different groups of patients and, if the test is successful, to determine the size of a sample for a full test that will be statistically significant.

**Content:** This study consists of 3 phases. Phase 1 consists of review of literature, development of a methodology, and selection of 4 hospitals for the pilot test of the study. ## I-8 Professional Activity Study and the Medical Audit Program

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To develop and make available to hospitals the use of an information system relevant to the quality of medical practice and hospital administration, and to train physicians and other hospital personnel in the use of the system.

**Content:** The major program is the development of a medical information system for a large number of hospitals. The system involves the condensation of the patient's medical record into a concise abstract suitable for computer processing. ## I-11 Duration of Maternal Postpartum Hospital Stay—An Economic or Medical Problem? (11/23/65)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To investigate some of the factors relating to duration of mothers' hospital stay.

**Content:** The patients surveyed were patients having no maternal or infant complications. The cases were distributed in each hospital in accordance with the individual doctor identification. The results showed an amazing range of variation in postpartum stay of healthy mothers and babies. It was found that the range of stay varied between 2 and 9 days with 4 and 5 days postpartum stay representing the majority of patients. Several factors were also found to be associated with postpartum stay: economic reasons, medical background, accommodations, and shortage of beds.

**Methods:** The duration of postpartum maternal stay in the data was determined from the length of the infant stay. Individual hospital data were studied in relation to time of the year. It was noticed that the lower postpartum stay tends to occur at certain peaks which are definitely not uniform in timing for all hospitals.

## I-12 Use of Inpatient Facilities of a University Hospital (5/9/66)

### ABSTRACT

## I-18 Personal Health Services: Utilization and Charges (1/7/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** (1) To contribute to the development of valid and reliable instruments for compiling data about utilization of and charges for personal health services; (2) to estimate rates of utilization and average charges for specific personal health services of persons in an area of New York City, and of subgroups of this population.

**Content:** Indices of utilization of services in one year include the following: hospital stays and hospital days; out-of-hospital visits for medical and mental health services, by payment status (paid, prepaid, free) and by location (office, clinic, home). Indices of charges in one year include costs of in-hospital care, out-of-hospital services, prescriptions, medicines, appliances, etc. Gross charges, insurance benefits and net charges will be obtained.

**Methods:** Household interview survey with two probability samples of housing units. One interview schedule asks about specific conditions, and then asks for services and charges for each condition. The other interview schedule probes for types of facilities used, and then asks for services and charges of each facility. Verification of a sample of reported services will compare the two schedules as to under- and over-reporting of services, and over-reporting of facilities. To measure under-reporting of facilities, persons in 5 samples of known users of medical services will randomly be assigned to be interviewed by one of the two schedules.

## I-19 Psychiatric Treatment and Patterns of Medical Care (5/9/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To examine the impact of the introduction of a psychiatric therapy service on patterns of medical care provided for emotional disorders. From the point of view of the patient, the study would examine the impact of the psychiatric service on (1) changes in patterns of medical care and other aid sought and received by those with emotional disorders, and (2) social and psychological characteristics of patients as these relate to patterns of medical care for emotional disorders and changes in these patterns resulting from the introduction of psychiatric therapy.

**Content:** The study focuses largely on the family physician and the patterns of medical care he provides for emotional disorders seen during his regular practice. The study will measure (1) changes of patterns of patients with emotional disorders, and (2) differences in treatment provided for patients referred to the psychiatrist and those retained for family physician care.

**Methods:** Interviews conducted with both family physicians and their patients among 2 patient samples seen by a family physician during a 3-month period prior to the offering of psychiatric services. One sample is of patients with a psychiatric diagnosis, the other of all other patients. New patient samples are drawn and similar interviews conducted two years later. A sample of patients who had received psychiatric care would be interviewed about psychiatric treatment they might have received subsequently.

## I-20 Development of Standard Medical Care and Utilization Measurements Methodology (7/13/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To develop and test a methodology for deriving comparable utilization and cost data from a wide variety of ambulatory, home, and other types of medical care programs other than in-hospital.

measures were age and sex adjusted by the direct method.

## I-31 Inpatient Hospital Utilization of Pittsburgh Residents by Patient Characteristics and Socioeconomic Level (Census Tract Residence), 1963 (1/12/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** The ultimate objective is to determine the relationship of patient characteristics and socioeconomic level to hospital admission and the type and extent of inpatient hospital services received. It is expected that hospital admission rates and utilization of services will vary among patients of different socioeconomic levels. Of major interest is the study of the possible effect of hospital coverage in minimizing any socioeconomic differences in utilization practices.

**Content:** (1) Introduction (including significance of problem); (2) critical review of literature (including gaps in knowledge); (3) hypotheses; (4) study design; (5) data (including checks on accuracy); (6) analysis; (7) implications of findings.

**Methods:** A systematic sample of approximately 10,000, or one out of each 8 Pittsburgh residents, discharged from all of the 23 voluntary short-term hospitals in the Pittsburgh-Allegheny County area during 1963 was deemed advisable. It has been estimated that the hospitals designated for study inclusion account for approximately 97 percent of the Pittsburgh residents utilizing short-term hospital care.

For each patient selected, the medical and business office records were abstracted. The data collected included age, sex, race, accommodation, residence, employment status, marital status, all diagnoses and operative procedures, diagnostic and therapeutic services, total hospital bill, and source of payment (i.e., self-pay, Blue Cross, commercial insurance, etc.). Patients were assigned the socioeconomic level of the census tract in which they lived at time of hospital admission. The four socioeconomic classifications employed, based on income, occupation,

and education data available from the 1960 Census, were determined by rank correlation methods.

As population estimates are available for Blue Cross and non-Blue Cross members for each of the socio-economic classifications, the initial analyses will be concerned with differential hospital admission rates. Additional analysis concerning the number of services received will be made by employing multivariate analytical techniques.

## I-34 International Comparative Study of Medical Care (1/6/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To determine the utilization and non-utilization of medical care by socioeconomic group and the outcomes of care by disease category, and to make certain comparisons with studies in Sweden and England.

**Content:** This socioeconomic status and morbidity experience of individuals studied, with the characteristics of the hospitals, physicians and other elements of the medical care system will be noted. Appropriate criteria of the outcome of treatment, e.g., survival, relief of symptoms, return to activity, etc., will be identified.

## I-35 Trends in Hospital Use Under Hospital Insurance (4/22/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To determine the extent to which changes in age, sex, and diagnostic patterns of inpatient care under hospital insurance, depart from trends already established before the Plan came into effect. Also being studied are the principal components of a marked increase in the volume of outpatient services that has followed their inclusion under the Plan.

**Content:** Prince Edward Island, with its low income levels, rural characteristics, shortage of physicians but a generous supply of hospital beds, represents a Province in which a marked increase in hospital utilization might have been expected to follow the introduction of universal hospital insurance. The project is devoted to a better understanding of what actually did happen. Throughout the study particular attention will be paid to evidence of what effect the comprehensive coverage of outpatient services has had upon inpatient use.

**Methods:** The comparison of inpatient trends before and since the introduction of hospital insurance on October 1, 1959, is to be based upon the utilization statistics of four observation years—1955, 1958, 1961, and 1965. The study of outpatient utilization under hospital insurance involves comparisons of the nature and volume of services in 1961 and 1964. The records of all services received by an individual during a given year have been linked mechanically, and analyses are being based upon 25 percent samples of the patient populations.

## I-36 International Collaborative Study of Medical Care Utilization (12/20/65)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To ascertain the feasibility of comparing rates for utilization of out of hospital and hospital services in defined populations in three different countries.

**Content:** Age and sex adjusted standardized rates for visits to nurses, physicians, and other health personnel, for admissions to hospitals and other institutions, together with rates for the presence of selected symptom complexes, disability days, bed disability days, and for availability of certain services will be available from all three areas.

## **I-45 Utilization of Professional Personnel in the New York City School Health Service (1/28/66)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** The primary purpose of this study is the development of a school health team that will employ an optimum percentage of professional time for professional purposes. It will also be used to develop methodology for studying public health personnel utilization patterns.

**Content:** Phase I data show that approximately one-third of the professional nursing time assigned to elementary and junior high schools in the New York City school health program is now spent on activities that could be accomplished by ancillary non-professional personnel. This means a total of 125,000 hours of nursing time used below professional nursing skills out of an estimated total of 373,000 nursing hours in the school program.

## **I-49 Impact of Medicare on the Aging and on Health Institutions in Selected Settings of the Midwest (6/27/66)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To study the impact of the Social Security Amendments of 1965 (Medicare) on the provision and utilization of health care facilities and resources in the Midwest Region of the United States.

## J-1 Household Activity Patterns and Community Health (1/10/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** This research is concerned with characteristics, attitudes and activities of urban residents as considerations to be taken into account in the location of health and medical care facilities. The work seeks to develop an approach in which the siting of facilities in a metropolitan area takes into account "user" as well as "supplier" considerations.

**Content:** It is presently funded as a "pretest study" which aims to develop and test a survey research instrument for eventual use in a full-scale study in several metropolitan areas of different size. These later studies would focus on the utilization of medical care and health services in the context of daily living patterns of "users" of different socioeconomic status and other characteristics.

**Methods:** Conventional social science methods will be used to control for the effects of non-spatial variables such as age and socioeconomic status. Alternative means of studying spatial relationships will be explored, including non-quantitative analysis of mapped data, distance models, intervening opportunity models, and analysis of centers and moments of distributions in space. Some such method will be adopted for use in studying the interactions of spatial variables and time budgets, or activity patterns.

## K-2 Social-Psychological Factors in Outpatient Attrition (3/17/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To study social-psychological factors as related to outpatient attrition.

## **K-11 Nurse-Patient Conferences and Patterns of Compliance (5/5/66)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** The study seeks to ascertain the effects of different types of contact with a nurse on patients' patterns of compliance, specifically regularity in filling and taking medication, obtaining laboratory tests and appearing at scheduled visits.

**Content:** A sample of 240 patients will be divided as follows: a) category I—control group, b) category II—the individual patients will see a nurse after each visit with the physician, and c) category III—small groups of patients will be invited over a period of time to regular health education sessions. Compliance patterns between these categories will be compared. In addition, this study tries to obtain intensive information about patients' views of medical authority, the impact of their life structure on their ability to submit to regular medical care, the degree of social support which is available to them during their illness and their judgments of clinics and methods of health care. Before- and after-interviews will compare attitudes within and between the three groups. Congruence measures will be sought between the patients' assessment of illness and that of the physician.

**Methods:** The study utilizes interviews, interaction-processes analysis, and seeks to develop a number of attitude scales which can be meaningfully applied to the study of compliance. Measures of compliance include the attempt to trace through the urine the presence or absence of a placebo which is given to all patients in the three groups. The va-

lidity of using a combined compliance index will be investigated.

## L-4 Doctor/Patient Contacts in General Practice (5/16/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** From evidence available from several studies, one is impressed by the fact that much of medical practice and public behavior in terms of the utilization of medical care may be described as "contingent doctoring"—the medical services operating when certain situations are brought to their notice. The initiative rests with the patient rather than with the doctor. If this concept of the role of family doctor (and the hospital-based doctor) is generally accepted by the medical profession and the public, then this must seriously impede the introduction of a pattern of practice based on prevention.

**Content:** The specific aim of this project is to determine the nature of contacts between physician and patient and thereby to assess the role of the G.P.; the diagnostic and therapeutic level at which he operates; the pattern of morbidity and the related pattern of prescribing. It is believed that an assessment of the involvement of general practitioners in preventive medicine can be made using a method to be described.

**Method:** For one day (24-hour period) during each week for 7 successive weeks, 12 physicians participating in the study will be asked to complete a questionnaire for each doctor/patient contact. Each day of the week will be taken in rotation and in this way a composite picture of the work of a full week will

be obtained. Forms will therefore be completed for contacts in the office, home, hospital, at work, and by telephone. A study is presently under way.

## L-5 The Nurse-Monitor in a Patient-Care System (12/9/65)

### ABSTRACT

## L-8 Hospital Utilization Review (11/24/65)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To develop methodology for improving the functioning of utilization committees in individual hospitals.

**Content:** In the first two years of its operation, the project has: (1) devised a system of abstracting medical records which enables automatic data processing; (2) developed methods for identifying cases of unusual hospital stay; (3) developed criteria for appropriate utilization in each of 50 disease categories; and (4) begun to test the effectiveness of these criteria, as well as produced reports of patterns of utilization on a hospital-by-hospital basis. Specifically, the following activities are projected for the years 1966-68: (1) continued consultation with utilization committee; (2) refinement and application of criteria of utilization; (3) extension of electronic data processing; and (4) development of comparative studies of utilization.

**Methods:** Visits have been made to nearly all utilization committees. A special abstract was designed in order to supply physicians with basic objective data. After the data processing techniques had been perfected, specialty panels were established to formulate criteria for appropriate hospital use. An area in which intensive work has begun is the development of statistical reports. The reports cover common causes of hospitalization and reveal existing utilization patterns. The data include inter-hospital comparisons

of variations in length of stay. The project staff carries out its work under direction of a steering committee appointed by the Allegheny County Medical Society Foundation and the Executive Committee of the Hospital Council of Western Pennsylvania.

## L-16 Development of an Automated Data Retrieval System for Utilization Review and Scheduling Hospital Admissions (9/12/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To develop a flexible, replicable system of data collection of patients and beds which can provide major assistance in solving problems of inappropriate and poorly coordinated use of facilities as well as supplying current and complete information for review of utilization in a single facility or on a community-wide basis. A major part of the study will be the construction of a system to predict bed availability.

**Content:** The study consists of two phases. Phase one will develop and define the system. Criteria and information will be computed of a physician's reliability index which will be used as a mechanism to determine the accuracy of estimates of length of stay and admission diagnosis for physicians with staff privileges at the Presbyterian Medical Center. Other developments in this first phase include: (1) specification of output reports; (2) development of the scheduling strategy; (3) development of the diagnosis priority scheme; (4) computer program planning and flow charting; (5) orientation of the medical and administrative personnel to the system usage. The second phase will include a complete analysis of the system. During this phase system input information will continually be collected and stored. Data analysis and subsequent report generation shall be conducted in a batch processing mode when a preselected number of transactions have been collected. The final testing shall represent the ultimate community oriented system in which the availability of beds and facilities with future occupancy predictions are updated and available with each transaction.

**Methods:** Computer program planning and flow charting will be used in this project.

In order to conduct a preliminary system test the contractor of this project will utilize (1) a computer of the Institute of Medical Sciences, and (2) a time shared computer available in the community on a leased basis. The contractor shall also compile a final report of the project which will contain a description of the project and the computer programs for the system in a common computer language.

## L-19 Prescribing Habits of Physicians with Respect to Brand Name versus Generic Prescription Products (12/7/65)

### ABSTRACT

## M-10 A Longitudinal Study of the Students Entering Medical School in 1956 (2/15/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To assess, covering the time before, during, and after medical school, the changes in personality characteristics, interests, career patterns, and performance of future physicians.

**Content:** The study makes a detailed analysis of the development of the medical student through his medical education, correlating, among other things, the following information: (1) personality traits of entering medical students vs. all college males, (2) personality traits of entering medical students vs. graduating medical students, (3) personality traits of students at research-oriented medical schools vs. students at schools whose graduates usually become private practitioners, (4) school budget vs. the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) scores of students, and (5) school budget vs. student career choice.

## M-11 Training in Community Mental Health (6/2/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To train groups composed of six professional persons, each from a variety of disciplines, in principles and skills of community mental health as they apply to problems of social deviation such as narcotic addiction and alcohol abuse. The ultimate goal is to encourage and prepare such professional personnel to put this experience into practice in research, teaching and service programs in local community agencies, institutions and planning bodies.

**Content:** The Pilot Project is committed to interdisciplinary integration of psychiatric casework, public health nursing, psychology, sociology, community organization and psychiatry, and is carefully designed to provide research, education and service content in individual, group and community aspects of pathology in addictions.

**Methods:** Curriculum will be based on the cumulative experiences of the Division of Community Mental Health, New York College of Medicine, and will present the six person group with a broad grounding in the principles and skills of community mental health practice.

## **M-12 A New Training Program for Nurses Which Will Prepare Them to Give Improved Health Care to Children in Medically Depressed Areas (12/6/65)**

### **ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To establish a new training program in pediatrics for public health nurses which will increase their knowledge and skills so that they can fill an expanded role in maternal and child health as independent practitioners of nursing; and to train nurses so that they may act as more effective associates of physicians to allow conservation of presently existing medical resources in medically depressed areas.

**Content:** In the first phase, each nurse will receive about four months of intensive theory and practice in pediatrics. This phase is a clinically-oriented educational program and includes management of the well child, identification and care of acute and chronic conditions in childhood, and care of emergency situations. The second phase of the project is the application of the nurse's newly acquired knowledge and skills in a medically depressed area.

**Methods:** The first (training) phase of the program will be conducted at the University of Colorado Medical Center and will be four to six months in length. The second phase (18 to 20 months in length) will be performed at the family health service at Trinidad, Colorado, an area with limited medical resources.

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To develop programmed units of instruction in rehabilitative aspects of nursing and to test their effectiveness.

## M-15 Neighborhood Health Aid Program (1/3/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To strengthen motivation for the increased use of health facilities and services existing in the city and to channel simple health information into the formal and informal communications network of the neighborhood.

**Content:** Health aid personnel go into homes and initially help families to solve immediate health problems. After rapport has been established, an inventory of health needs for the families is taken. Health need priorities are established during conferences with health aide personnel and public health nurse supervisors. Functions of the health aide include: teaching the importance of seeking health care, informing persons of the available health facilities, caring for children in the home while others attend clinics, providing transportation, health teaching in various areas, etc.

**Methods:** A neighborhood, with a population of about 100,000, in Washington, D. C., has been selected for the program. The neighborhood health aid personnel are selected from people who are well respected in the community and have demonstrated interest in community problems. Families become known to the Neighborhood Health Aid Program through casefinding activities and referrals.

**M-20 The Wisconsin Pharmacist-Preceptor as a Teacher—A Preliminary Study of Role Effectiveness (1/6/66)**

**ABSTRACT**

**Objectives:** To illuminate the function of the pharmacist-preceptor as a practical teacher, and to characterize the circumstances of preceptorship rated as superior by a sample of interns after completion of their legally required period of training.

**Content:** Traditional importance of the preceptor in pharmacy; purposes and methodology; rated effectiveness of preceptorial teaching (intern's view in relation to the preceptor's view); instructional setting of the preceptor; attitudes toward some aspects of the preceptorship; suggestions from the field for improving the educational value of the preceptorship; bibliography.

**Methods:** Selected sample represents 17 percent of Wisconsin preceptors. Questionnaire devised for self-rating and for rating by former pharmacy interns. ## M-21 Appraisal of Extension of Graduate Instruction for Psychiatric Nurse Therapists (5/12/66)

### ABSTRACT

**Objectives:** To make a critical appraisal of the extension of graduate instruction in psychiatric nursing which is designed to enhance the competence of clinical specialists in psychiatric nursing in establishing and maintaining an ongoing program of therapy in a designated psychiatric clinical area.

**Content:** For the pilot project, nurses will be given special training in various aspects of psychiatric nursing with actual supervised experience with patients and methods and practice in teaching and supervision. The students, after completing the instruction, will be assigned to groups of patients in psychiatric hospitals and will evaluate patients in psychiatric hospitals and will evaluate patient status and proceed to develop an ongoing plan for patient care. Subsequent analysis will be made over a five-year period to determine the effectiveness of the program.

**Methods:** Nurses participating in the project will have had three semesters of full-time study in psychiatric nursing at the Master's level at the University of Maryland. They will then be assigned to a unit of about 25 patients in a selected Maryland State mental

hospital for the extended training. The appraisal of the program will be based on five years' experience of the pilot program.
