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




PROPORTION OF WORKERS IN WHITE COLLAR, BLUE COLLAR, SERVICE, AND FARM JOBS 1947-1965













Recent job growth has been spurred by the goods-producing and related industries, especially manufacturing and construction.




Employment in the service-related sector — except Federal Government — continued its sharp rise.






Percent change in employment, by industry, 1960-65, and projected 1965-70













OCCUPATIONAL TRENDS IN THE UNITED STATES 1947-1965

EMPLOYMENT IN WHITE COLLAR AND SERVICE OCCUPATIONS




EMPLOYMENT IN BLUE COLLAR AND FARM OCCUPATIONS






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





Proportion of young men out of school and not working is especially high among nonwhites






