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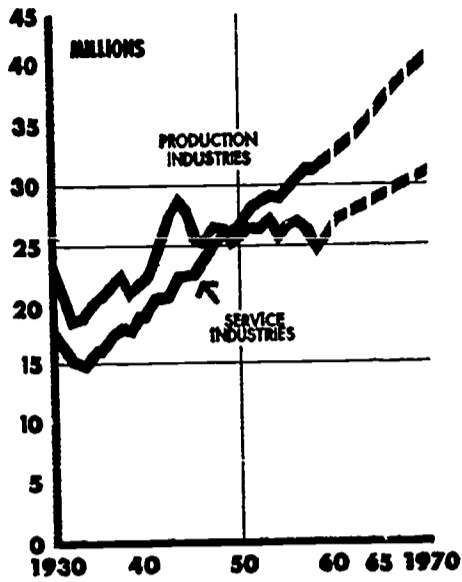

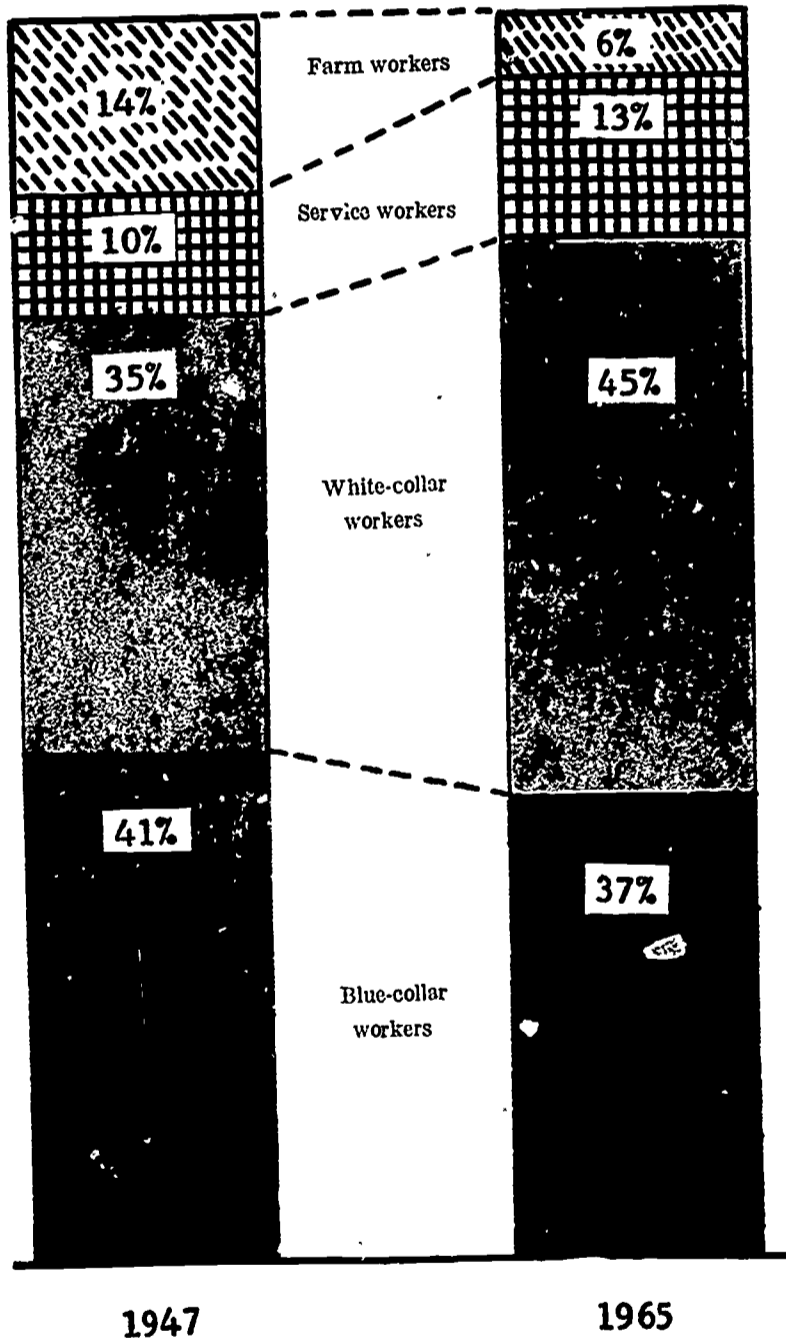

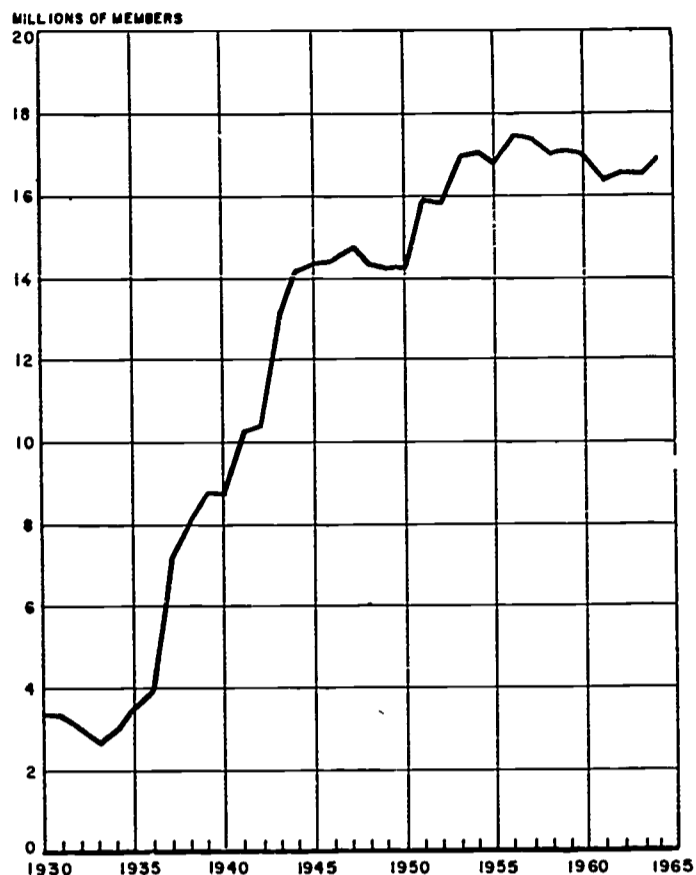
PROPORTION OF WORKERS IN WHITE COLLAR, BLUE COLLAR, SERVICE, AND FARM JOBS 1947-1965

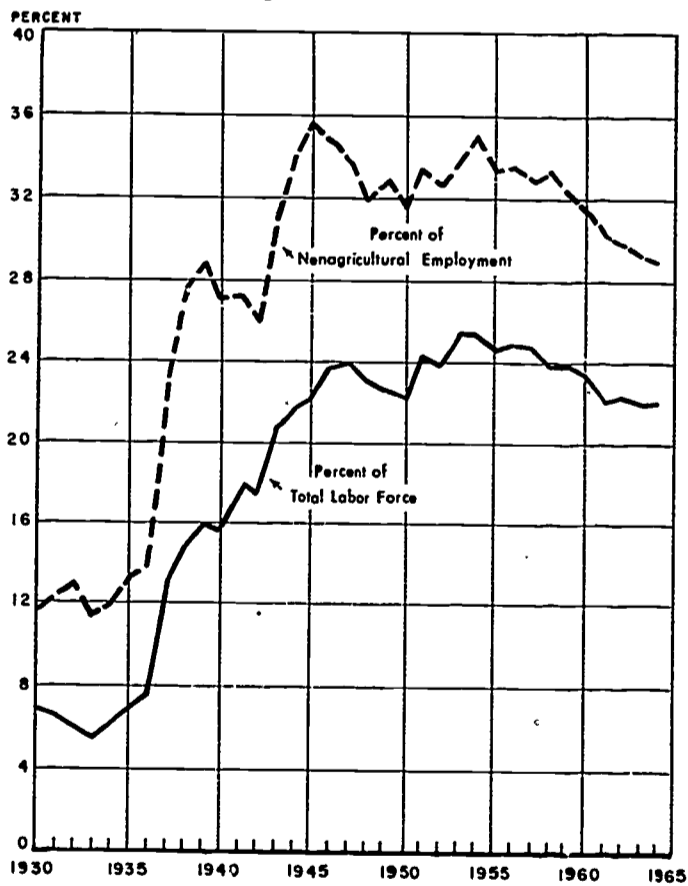


Membership¹ of National¹ and International Unions, 1930-64



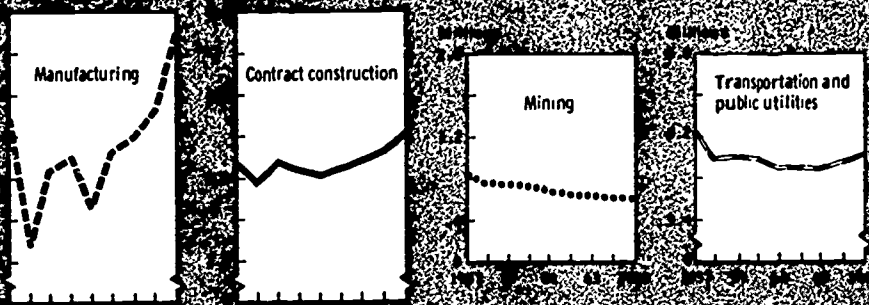

Membership¹ as a Percent of Total Labor Force of the Employees in Nonagricultural Establishments, 1930-64

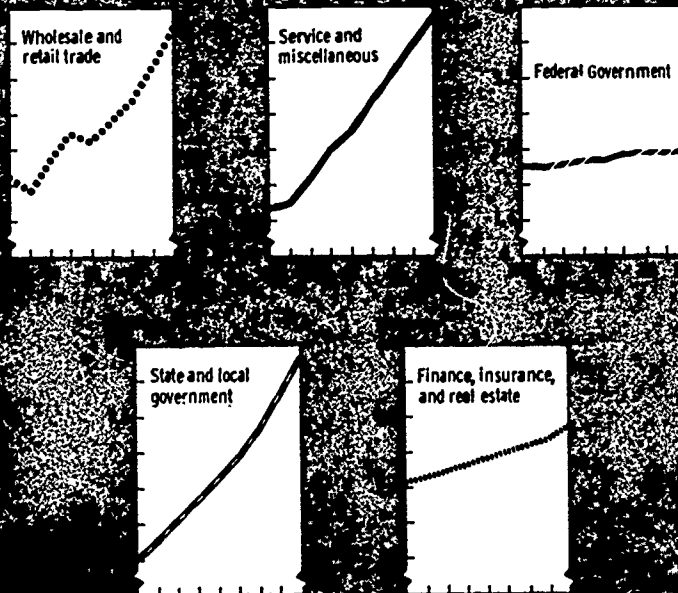

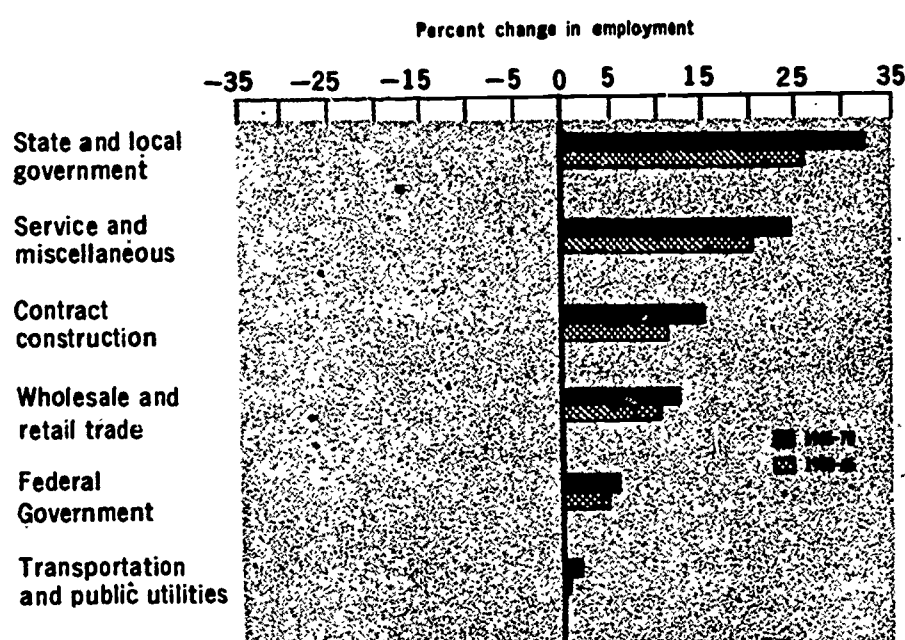


Employment in the service-related sector – except Federal Government – continued its sharp rise.



Percent change in employment, by industry, 1960-65, and projected 1965-70

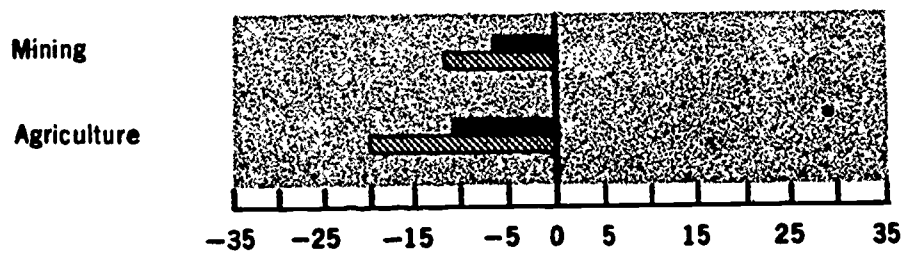
Employment growth will speed up over next half decade in 6 industries . . .

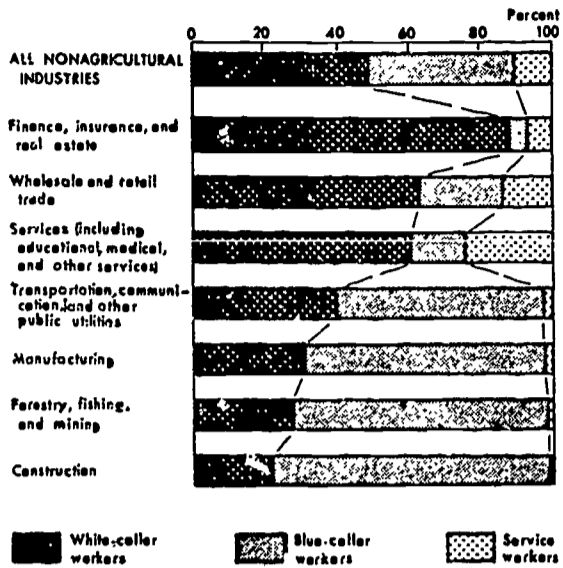

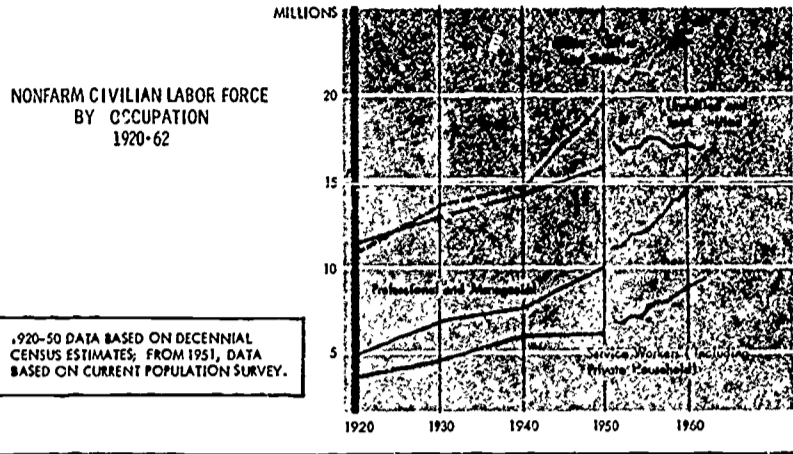

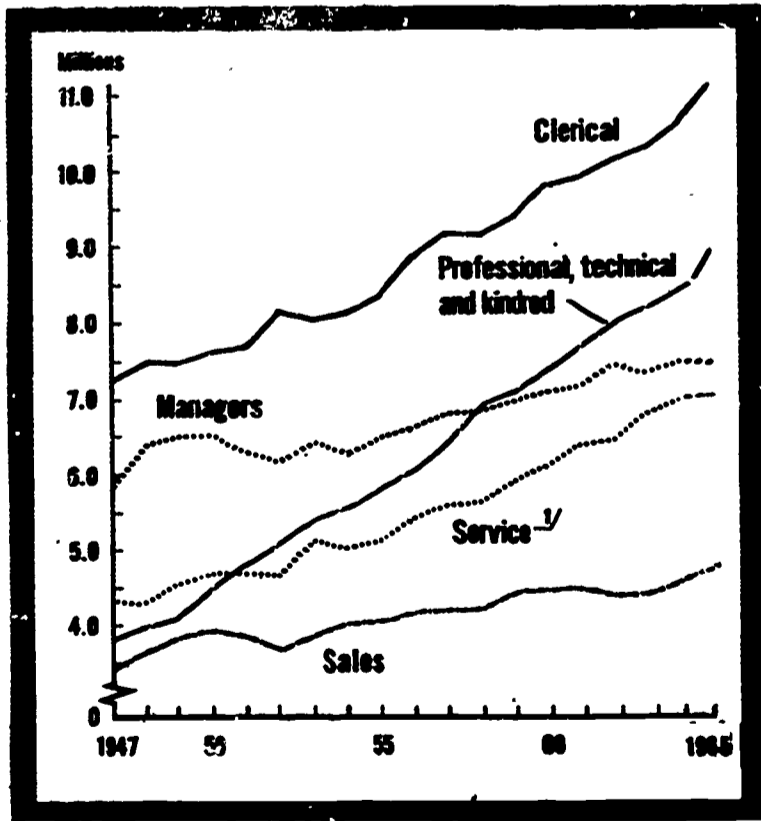

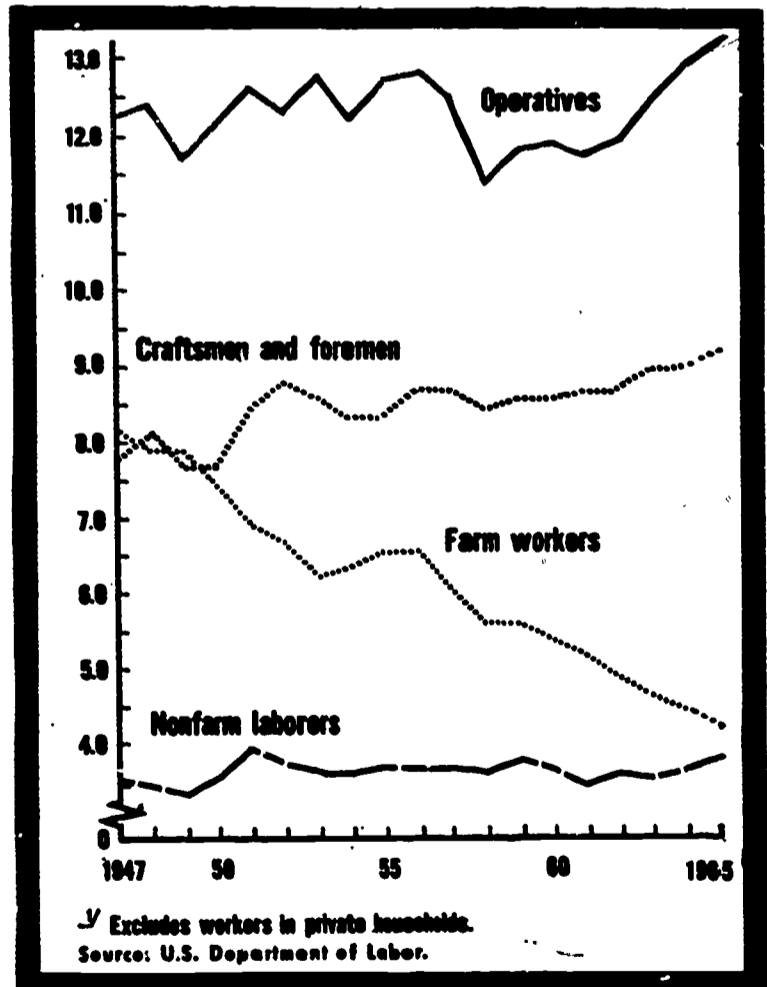


OCCUPATIONAL TRENDS IN THE UNITED STATES 1947-1965

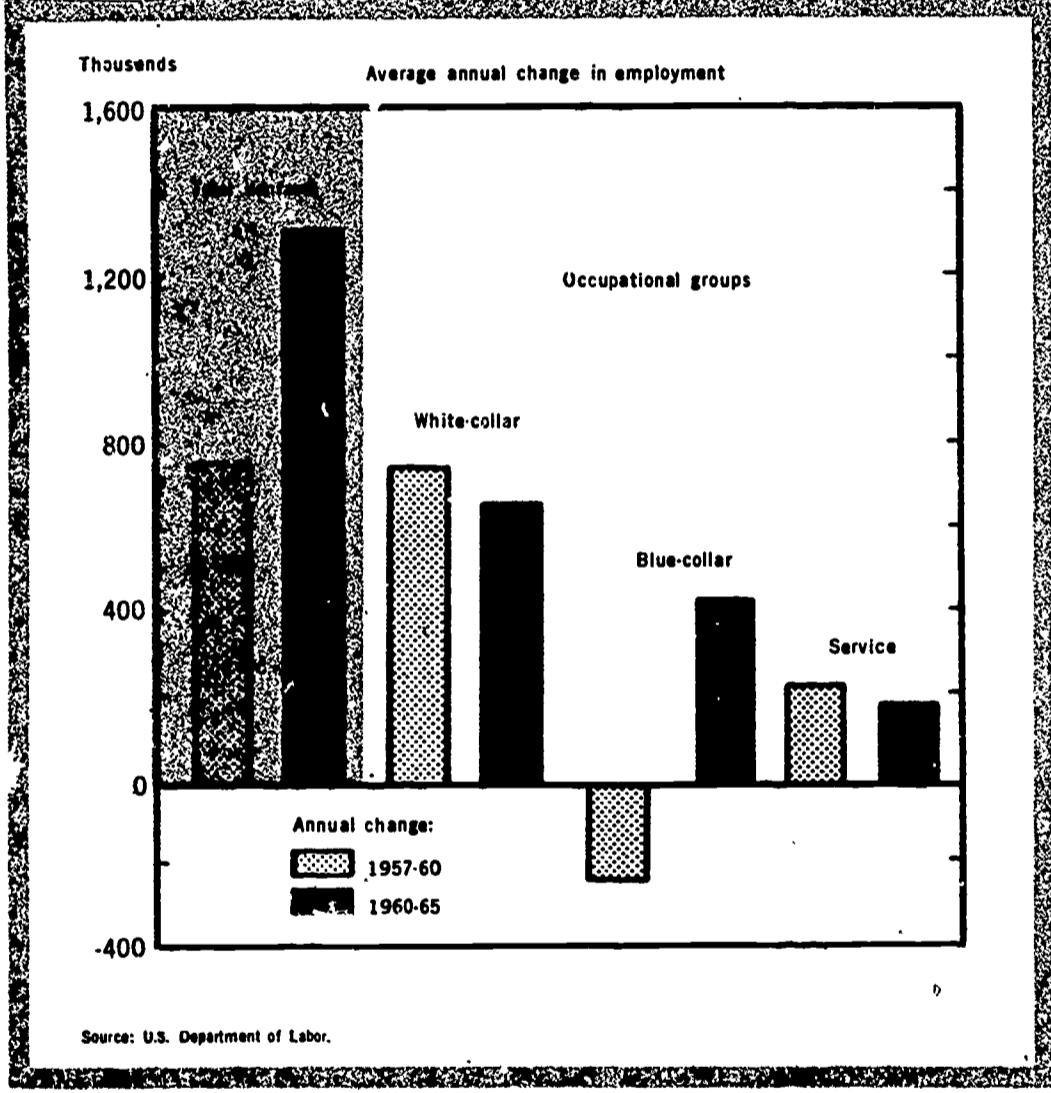
EMPLOYMENT IN WHITE COLLAR AND SERVICE OCCUPATIONS



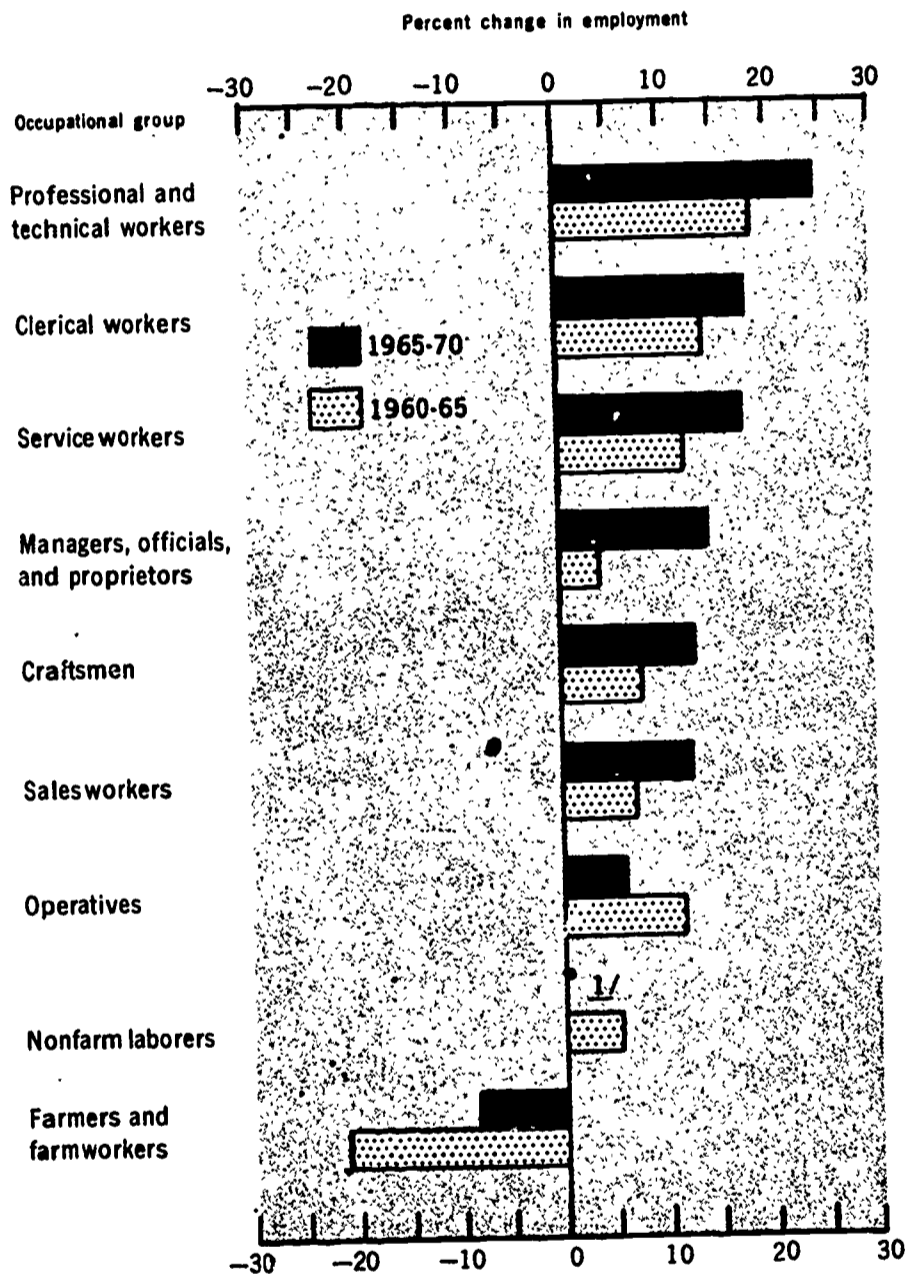
EMPLOYMENT IN BLUE COLLAR AND FARM OCCUPATIONS



Turnabout in 1960: Total employment has been 90% of current expansion

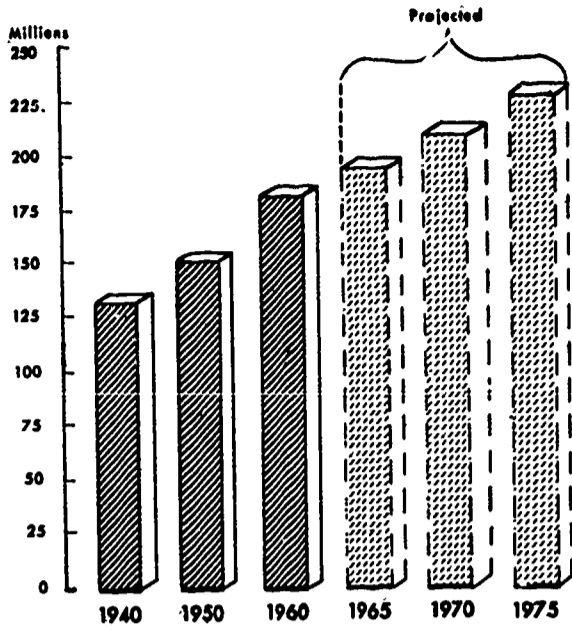


Employment growth in most occupations will speed up over next half decade.

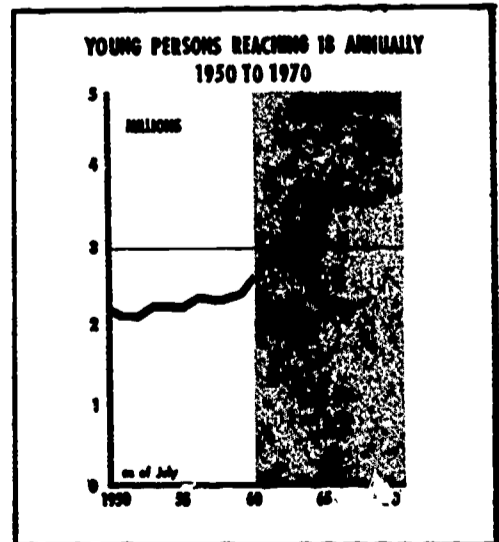

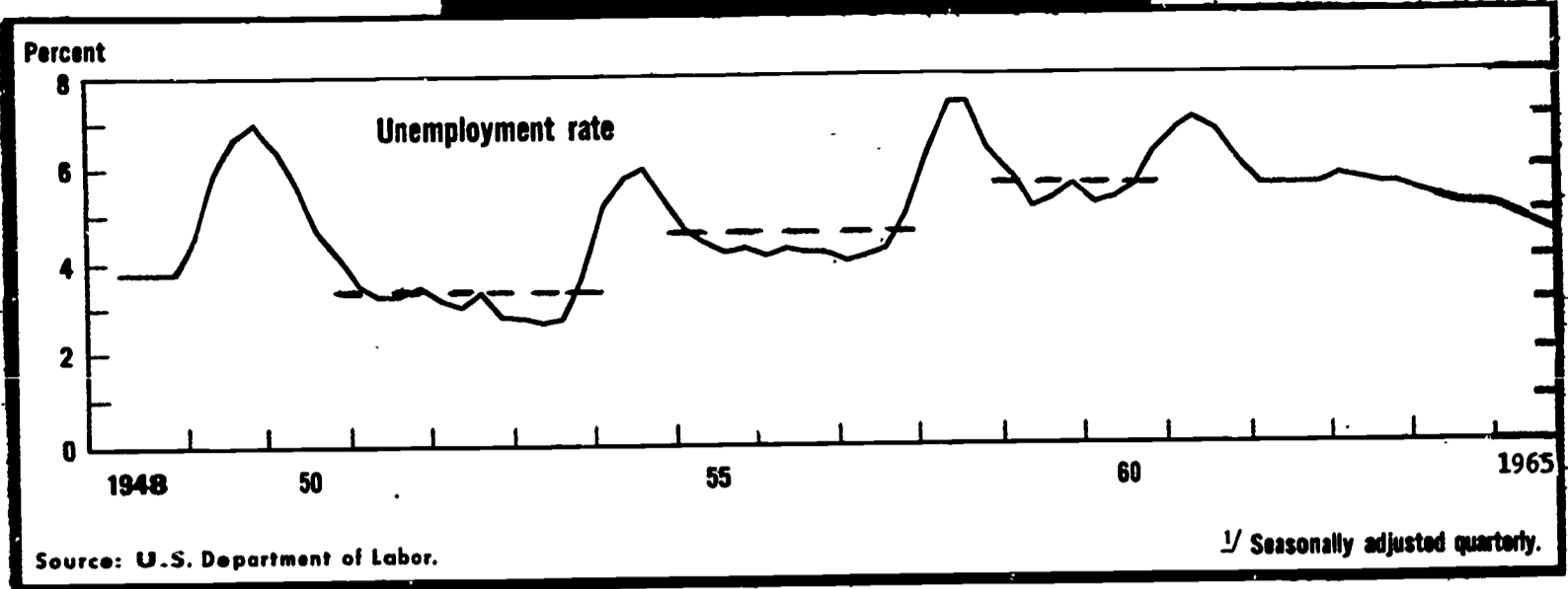

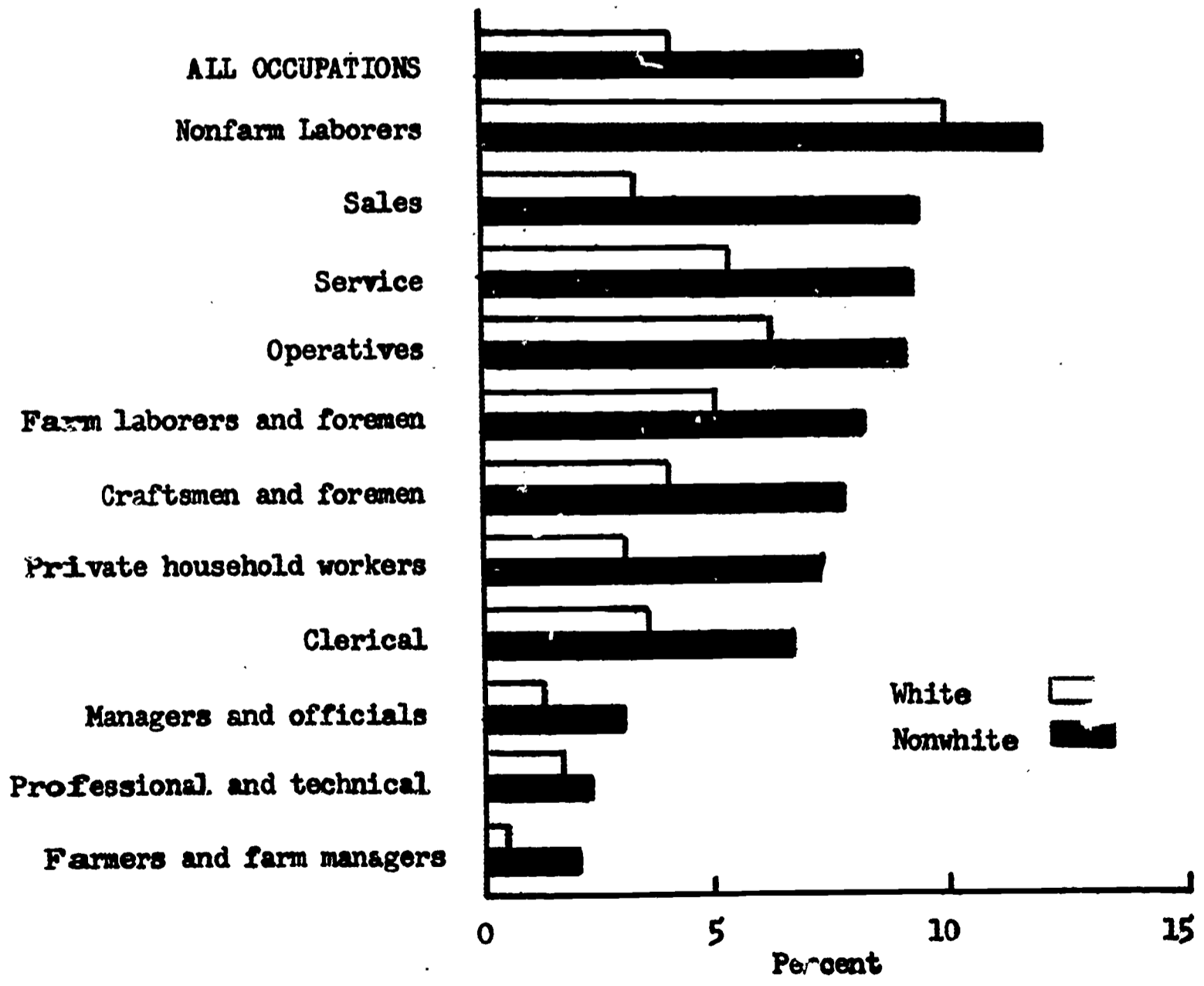


UNEMPLOYMENT HAS BEEN TRENDING UPWARD DURING THE PAST DECADE.



UNEMPLOYMENT RATES ARE HIGHER FOR NONWHITE WORKERS, REGARDLESS OF OCCUPATION

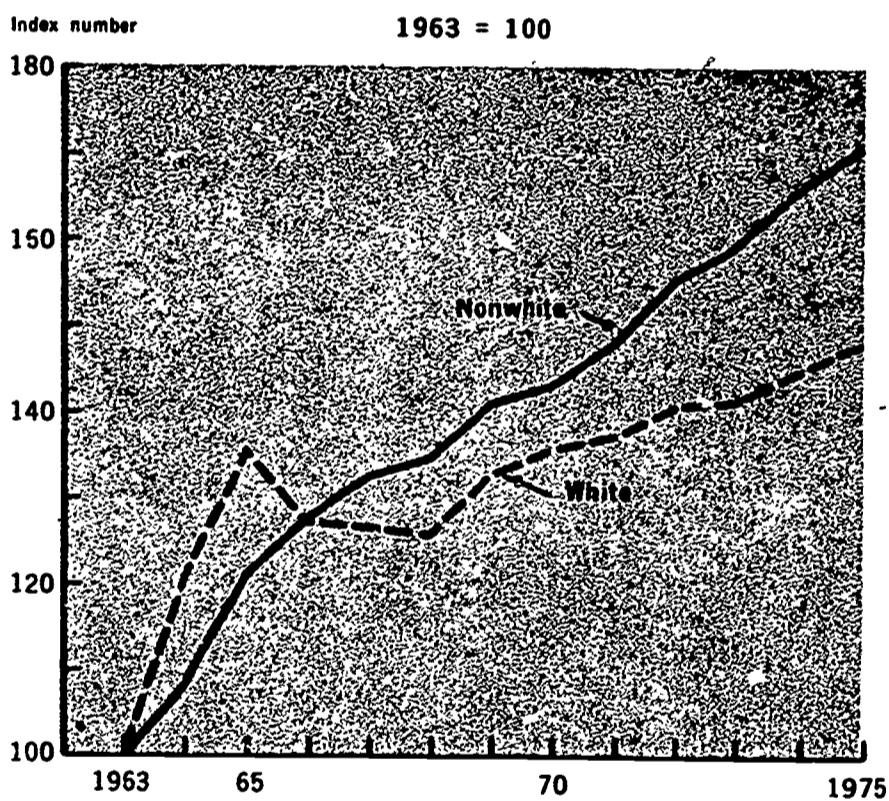
UNEMPLOYMENT RATES, BY COLOR AND OCCUPATION, 1964

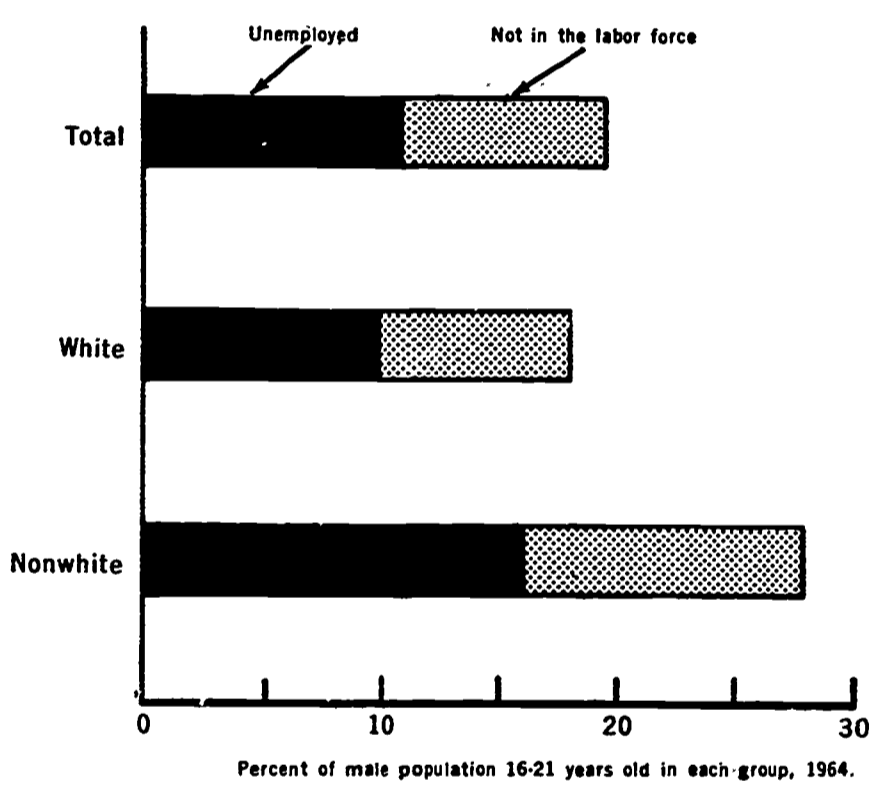

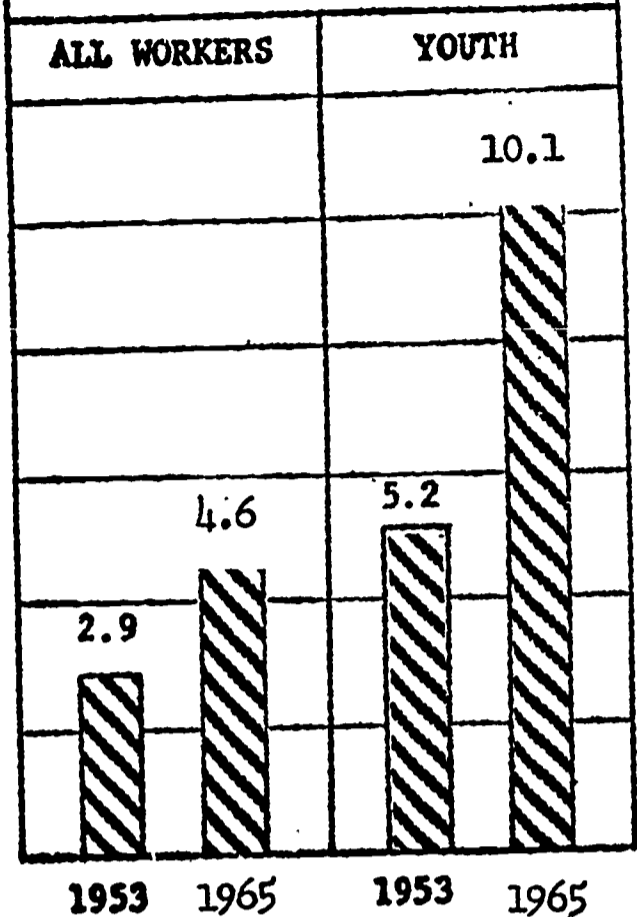
Proportion of young men out of school and not working is especially high among nonwhites

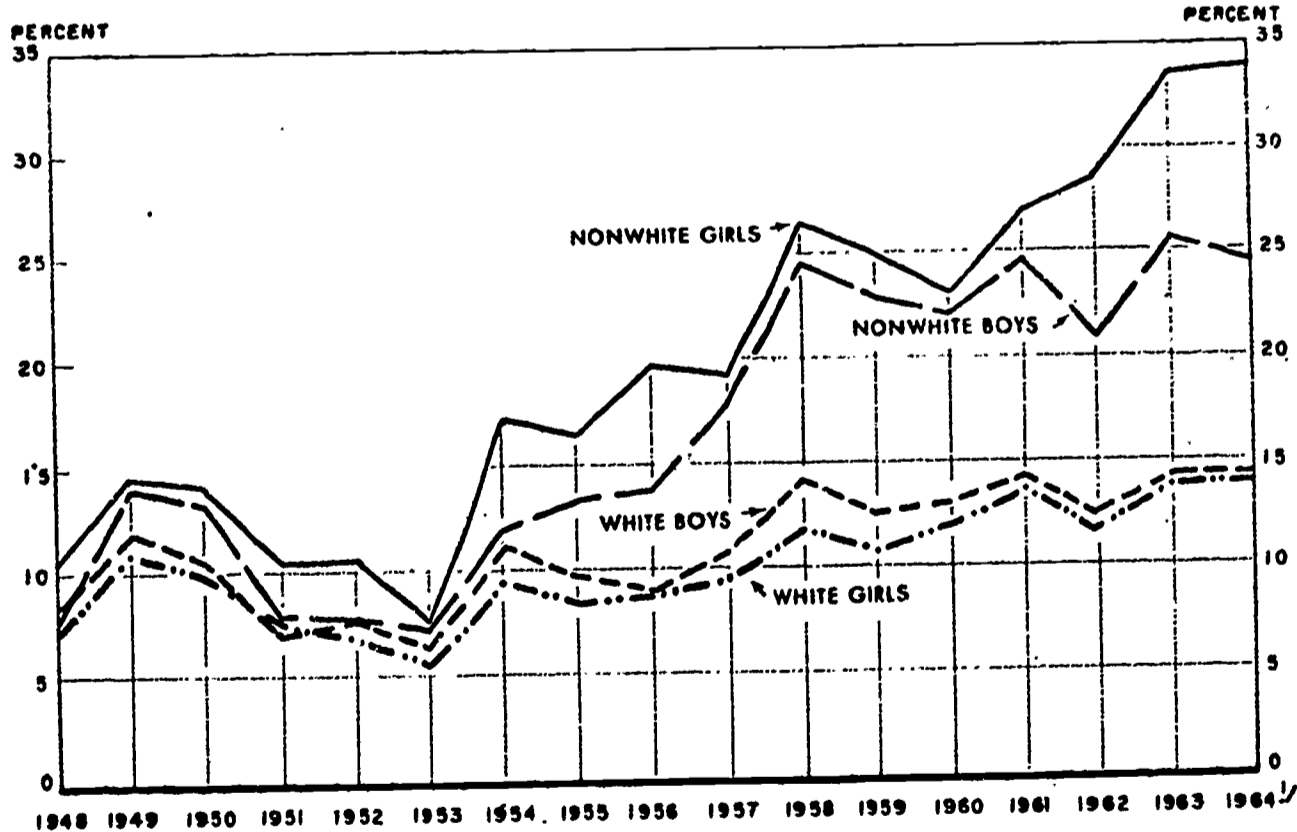

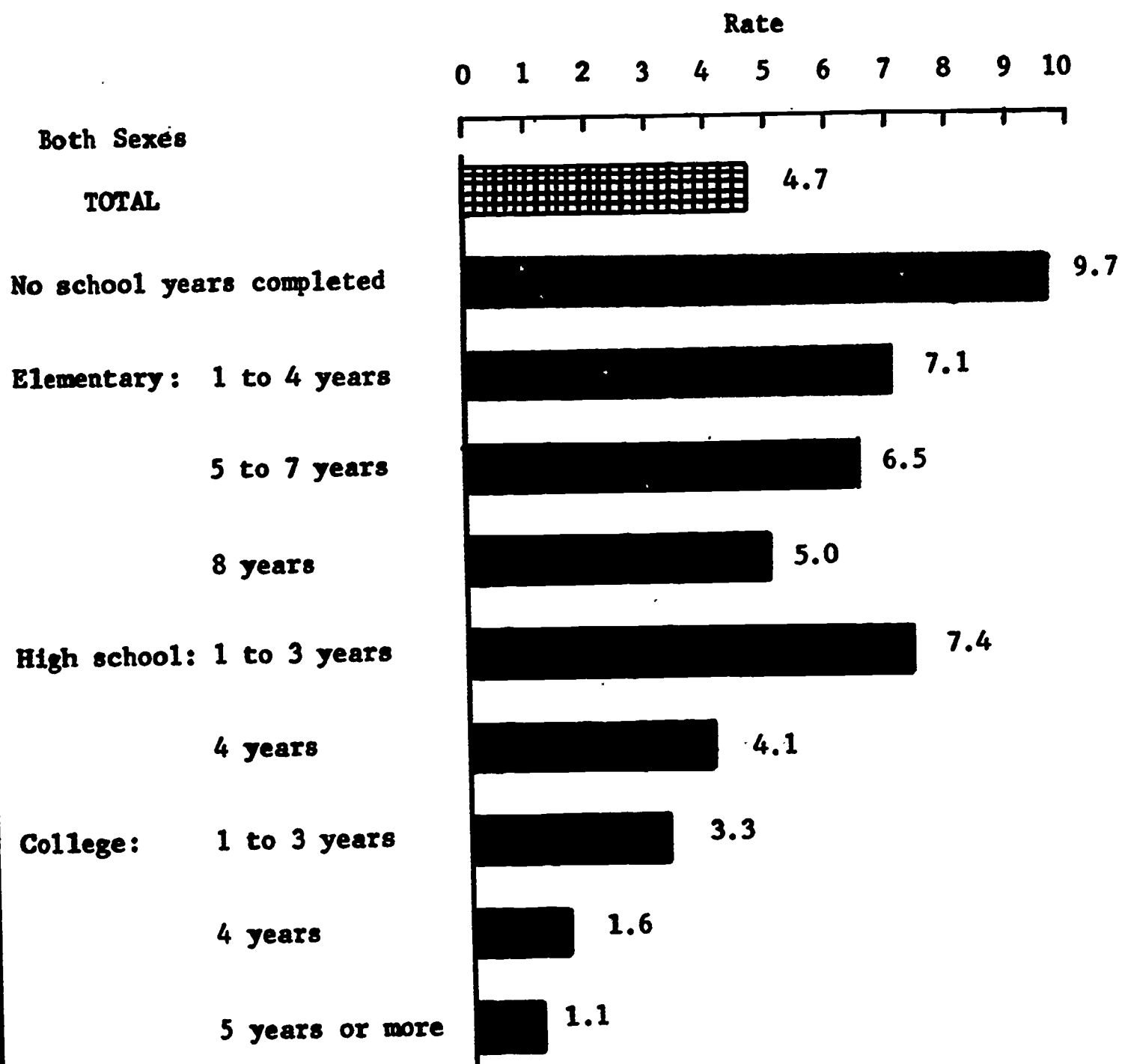

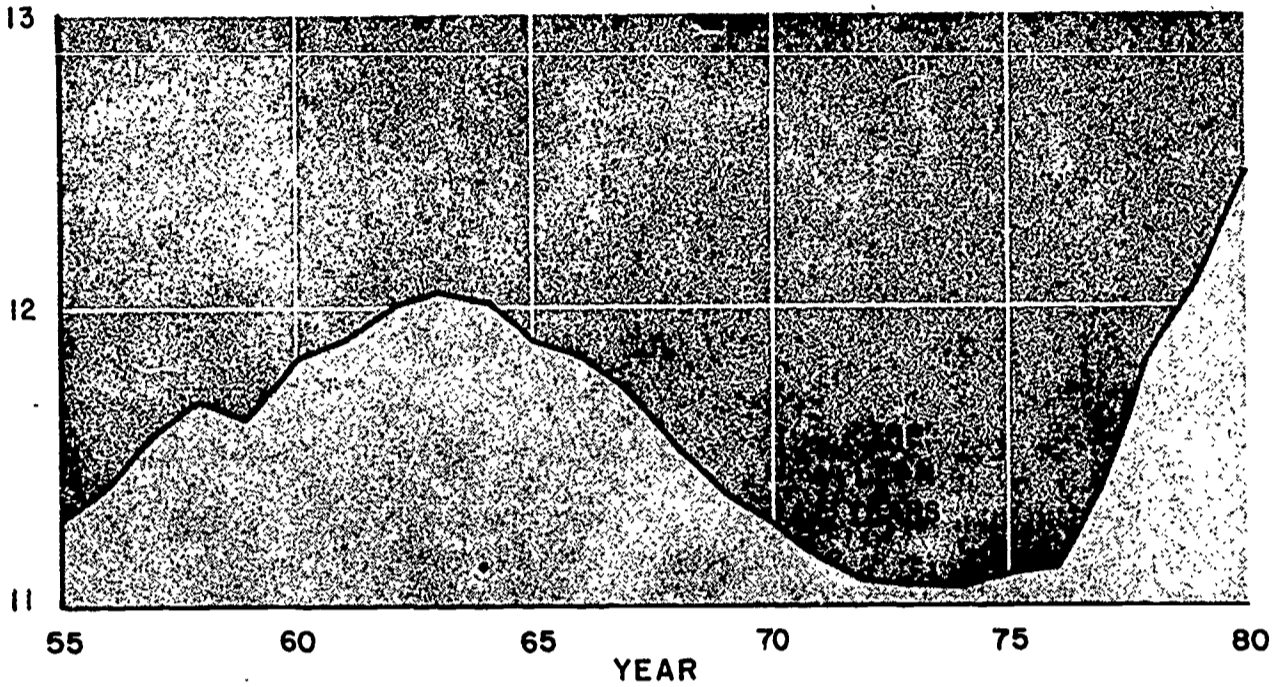
