

### INTEGRATION IN DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS CICHEREN 1966

#### Introduction

This is the second in a series of annual studies on the status of integration in the Dade County Public Schools being made by the Department of Administrative Research to make awailable to school officials and the public certain factual data which will foster good community relations and aid in providing a program of quality education for all students.

While the 1965 report converse only the pupils and employees in the elementary and secondary schools, this report includes every school, department and program in the school system: pre-school, K-12, adult education, junior college, and all supporting administrative and service departments.

#### Steps Toward Integration

Dade County school system has grown to include some 212,000 boys and girls in the elementary and secondary schools (including pre-school), more than 25,000 students in the adult program, and nearly 20,000 students in the junior college program, and has become a leader among the Nation's school systems.

Dade County has adopted desegregation policies and moved toward integration of student bodies, familties, administration and other employee groups. An Atlanta newspaper has said that "the most significant step Dade County has taken is the amnouncement of a non-discriminatory policy in the



hiring and placement of teachers and other school personnel. The statement of the school board reads in part:

We do not believe we can teach democracy in our schools without demonstrating our belief in democracy in the way the schools are operated.

All employees are hereby notified that they are expected to teach or work with other employees, to teach pupils, and to supervise or be supervised in their work by other employees without regard for the creed or color of any individual.

The announced policy of the board, if implemented, will bring about the first faculty desegregation in Florida, which, in a sense, has already been done by the recent appointment of a white principal to head an all-Negro school.

"Dade County's non-discriminatory employment policy and abandonment of busing to maintain segregation are significant in a larger sense. These actions were voluntary and, as such, were the first volitional desegration steps taken by a Florida school district."

The Board, following up its previously stated position, in regular session, June 5, 1963, approved by unanimous vote the following policy:

Employment of personnel - All employees are expected to teach or work with other employees, to teach pupils, and to supervise or be supervised in their work by other employees without regard for the creed or color of any individual. This is an integrated school system and should be understood as such by all persons connected with it.

All positions are open to all applicants regardless of creed or color and every effort shall be made to secure the best qualified person for every vacancy.

Under the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and subsequent regulations of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, formerly segregated school

Federal financial assistance. Board minutes of February 3, 1965 record that, upon recommendation of the Superintendent, it was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried that the Board agree to comply with the provision of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and that the Chairman be authorized to sign Form HEW-441 which begins with this paragraph:

Dade County Board of Public Instruction . . .

HEREBY AGREES THAT it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to that title, to the end that, in accordance with Title VI of that Act and the Regulation, no person in the United States shall on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the Applicant received Federal financial assistant from the Department; and HEREBY GIVES ASSURANCE THAT it will immediately take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement.

The Civil Rights Act and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare Regulation had little effect on the Dade County school system since the applicable provisions of that Act and the Regulation already had been implemented or were in the process of implementation.

Status of Integration, October 1966

In the following tables the degree of integration is shown for pupils, administrators and instructional personnel, and service personnel in the elementary and secondary schools, the adult education program and Miami-Dade Junior College as well as the racial distribution of employees in the central and district offices and service departments.

Data were reported as "white" and "Negro." Because the primary purpose of this report is to show the extent of racial "mix" between



Negro and non-Negro pupils, and to avoid the possibility of a distorted picture in relation to "others," all non-Negro pupils and employed personnel are shown as "white."

Throughout this report combination schools are classified by predominate grade level, e.g. a school having grades 1-7 is an "elementary school;" a school having grades 6-9 is a "junior high school." Senior high schools and junior-senior high schools are grouped together. The terms integrated (I), Negro (N), and white (W) refer to each student body or each group of employees--never to a school or department as a unit. Employee data include part time as well as full time personnel.

Tables 1-3 are a tabulation of pupils and employed personnel by schools showing the number of Negro and white pupils, instructional personnel (including aides), administrative personnel (principal and assistant principals), secretarial personnel, custodial personnel (custodians and maids) and cafeteria personnel. Table 4 beings together the total count of pupils and employees from Tables 1, 2, and 3, by type of group (integrated, Negro or white) in which they work. It also shows the three grade levels combined by type of group and the countywide total of all pupils and employees at the time of the survey.

Table 4 reveals that 69.1 percent of the white pupils and 41.6 percent of the Negro pupils are members of integrated student bodies; 92.0 percent of the white teachers and 100.0 percent of the Negro teachers are on integrated faculties; 9.4 percent of the white and 47.8 percent of the Negro principals and assistant principals work on an integrated school administrative staff; service personnel in the schools who work with



members of another race in their own employee classification are 9.8 percent of the white and 45.3 percent of the Negro secretarial personnel, 97.2 percent of the white and 70.1 percent of the Negro custodial personnel, 45.9 percent of the white and 43.9 percent of cafeteria personnel.

Table 5 shows the racial distribution of employees in the central administrative offices located in the Lindsey Hopkins building, in the six district offices and in the countywide services housed at various other locations. These are the employees not located in a school. The most significant fact shown by this table is that nearly 10 percent of these employees are Negro and that all of these Negroes work in an integrated group.

Tables 6 and 7 are similar to Tables 1, 2, and 3. Table 6 contains data for the adult education program while Table 7 contains data for Miami-Dade Junior College.

Table 6 shows that all adult students are in integrated "schools."

It should be noted, however, that the entry "countywide programs" represents many groups meeting throughout the county in their own neighborhoods.

Most of these groups within the countywide program are small and some would be all Negro or all white because of their location. This table also shows that all Negro instructional personnel (8.6% of the total teaching staff) are on an integrated faculty.

Table 8 reveals that in October 1966 the student bodies in 17 of 20 senior and junior-senior high schools (85%) were integrated; 28 of 37 junior high schools (75.7%) were integrated; and 74 of 153 elementary

schools (48.4%) were integrated; 119 or 56.7% of all the schools were integrated. A similar comparison of employee groups reveals that all junior and senior high school faculties and 133 elementary faculties (86.9%), or 190 faculties countywide (90.5%) were integrated; that the secretarial staff was integrated in three high schools (15%), six junior high schools (16.2%), and 14 elementary schools (9.1%), or 23 schools countywide (11%); that the custodial staff was integrated in 17 high schools (85%), 32 junior high schools (86.5%), and 115 elementary schools (76.2%), or 164 schools countywide (78.8%); and, that the cafeteria staff was integrated in 13 high schools (65%), 19 junior high schools (63.3%), and 34 elementary schools (29%), or 66 schools countywide of 167 base schools (39.5%).

Table 9 compares the distribution by type of group of the student bodies, faculties, and other employee categories in the schools in October 1966, with the corresponding distribution in October 1965. As more groups in each classification have become integrated, the number of all Negro or all white groups has decreased. The percents shown in Table 9 reflect this change. It is obvious that much change has occured, especially in the composition of the faculties.
