To obtain a profile of the Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN), questionnaires were mailed in April 1968 to the entire membership of the National Federation of Licensed Practical Nurses, totalling 31,318. As of July 1968 there were 10,454 replies of which the first 5,993 or 57.7 percent were analyzed. Some findings were: (1) 10.6 percent of the respondents were in their 20's and 77.4 percent were 40 or more, (2) 61.5 percent were married, (3) The average yearly income was approximately \$4,000, (4) 91.3 percent had attended high school and of these 71.2 percent had graduated, (5) 74.3 percent had attended a school of practical nursing and of these 93.8 percent had graduated, (6) 95.4 percent were employed and of these 79.4 percent were employed full time, (7) 65 percent were employed on hospital staffs, 24.2 percent in private duty, 12.6 percent in nursing homes, 5.7 percent in physician's offices, and (8) 87.7 percent desired training in two or three different subjects. ## The Key Person in the Future of Nursing

On April 23, 1968, a comprehensive questionnaire was mailed to the entire membership of the National Federation of Licensed Practical Nurses, totalling 31,318. As of July 31, 1968, there were 10,454 (33.38%) replies.

The following is an analysis of the first 5,993 replies received from April 30 to May 10, 1968, which is 57.7% of all replies received. We stopped our tabulation of replies at this point, because we found from repeated checkings, that we had reached the point where additional tabulation would not change the pattern. We had obtained the true profile of the LPN in the nursing profession.

There are certain logical conclusions that can be drawn from the tabulated data. The first relates to the age of the LPNs actively engaged in nursing. Seventy seven and four-tenths percent (77.4%) are 40 years of age or older. Other studies show that LPNs remain on the job longer than any other member of the nursing team. It would seem to be logical to assume, therefore, that if maturity and length of service mean anything in nursing, this study indicates that LPNs as a group have tested judgement, stability, dependability and proficiency in the discharge of their duties.

Another conclusion which one can draw from the study is that all LPNs perform a wide variety of nursing functions and are accepted by physicians, registered nurses and hospital officials as experienced and fully qualified peers on the paramedical team.

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\*\*Any reference to the title LPN in this study is equivalent to the legal title LVN in California and Texas.

While it is evident from the information received about the academic background of LPNs, that relatively few "went to college," it is noteworthy that 91.3% of the 5,993 respondents attended high school and that 71.2% of them graduated. It is also noteworthy that, of the 91.3% who attended high school, 80.9% attended a school of practical nursing from which 93.3% graduated.

Evidence of the alert, progressive and genuine interest that LPNs have in their profession is their desire for further study and training in special areas of nursing. Eighty seven and seven-tenths percent (87.7%) desire more training in two or three different subjects. Obviously LPNs are true professionals in their dedication, their attitudes and proficiency.

We can conclude that this professional attitude and the great variety of nursing functions which the LPN performs every day are evidence of the confidence that her associates place in her judgement and capability. The LPN is unquestionably a huge resource of competent manpower with which to meet the future health needs of the nation.

Answers to the above question indicate that out of the total of 5993 analyzed questionnaires, 1494 (24.9%) are, from time to time on "private duty", and that 73.4% of them, when on "private duty", do supervise the selection and preparation of their patient's food.
