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Abstract

The directory contains a listing (made in October, 1968) of teachers of the deaf, teachers in training, teacher educators, and training centers. A directory of services lists religious workers with the deaf, American organizations, adult education programs, international programs, agencies of the United Nations, summer camps, social and rehabilitation services, rehabilitation and professional personnel, psychiatrists and social workers, centers and services for the deaf-blind, community services, and training programs supported by rehabilitation centers. Private and government sponsored research, publications on deafness, necrology, and state department programs are discussed. A directory of schools, classes, and clinics for the deaf in the U.S. and Canada is included along with information from the U.S. Office of Education on instructional materials centers and media services. 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THE CONFERENCE OF EXECUTIVES OF AMERICAN SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF, originally the Conference of Superintendents and Principals of American Schools for the Deaf, was founded in 1868 and subsequently incorporated under the laws of the State of Maryland in 1958. The Conference is an organization of the executive heads of schools for the deaf in the United States and Canada, and has for its object "to promote the management and operation of schools for the deaf along the broadest and most effective lines and to further and promote the general welfare of the deaf."

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THE AMERICAN INSTRUCTORS OF THE DEAF, founded in 1850 and incorporated by act of Congress in 1897, is an organization of educators of the deaf in the United States and Canada with the great object of promotion of the education of the deaf on the broadest, most advanced, and practical lines," and for that purpose "to secure the harmonious union in the organization, of all persons actually engaged in educating the deaf in America."

The American Annals of the Deaf

The AMERICAN ANNALS OF THE DEAF was founded in 1847 at the American School for the Deaf in Hartford, Connecticut, by the members of the faculty of that school, which is the first free public school for the deaf in America. Although the journal received the approval of the administrative school authorities, the periodical was first entirely sponsored by the members of the faculty. After two years the ANNALS was discontinued for some months but was revived by the members of the American Instructors of the Deaf in their first meeting in New York, N. Y., in 1850.

In June, 1861, the publication ceased because of the War Between the States, inasmuch as the membership was made up of northerners and southerners in almost equal proportion. In September, 1868, the AMERICAN ANNALS OF THE DEAF resumed publication with the editorial office on Kendall Green, in Washington, D. C., where it has since remained.

The AMERICAN ANNALS OF THE DEAF is the official organ of the Conference of Executives of American Schools for the Deaf, which was organized in 1868, and of the American Instructors of the Deaf, founded in 1850. According to the Library of Congress it is the oldest educational publication in the United States still in existence. It is also the oldest journal on the education of the deaf in the world.

The ANNALS is published five times a year, being issued in January, March, and May, September and November. The subscription price is \$6.00 a year, payable in advance. If five or more copies of the ANNALS are sent to one address, the subscription price is \$5.00 a year. The Directory number sells for \$4.00. Back issues are available. Indexes for 1847-1875, 1876-1885, 1886-1895, 1896-1905, are available at \$5.00 each. Indexes for 1906-1915, 1916-1925, 1926-1935, 1936-1945, 1946-1955, were issued as regular numbers of the ANNALS and may be purchased for \$4.00 each. From 1956 indexes are included in the regular November numbers at single copy price. A TEACHER OF THE DEAF

One of the most rewarding areas in specialized education is that of teaching the deaf. Although this area is in the general field of education, it is closely allied with the fields of medicine, psychology, speech, language disorders, electronics, rehabilitation, audiology, public health, and social work. The work is of such a specialized nature that additional training is necessary.

The need for teachers in this particular area of special education is acute. A scarcity of qualified personnel exists throughout the United States and Canada. Positions are available in public and private residential schools, day schools, and in day classes.

Trained teachers of the deaf are also needed in many speech and hearing clinics located in colleges and universities, schools for the deaf, private centers, hospitals, and in medical schools.

Scholarships are available for teacher trainees in the majority of the training centers. Interested applicants should write to the directors of the teacher training centers for details and refer to information on scholarships at the various centers in this brochure.

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The Junior National Association of the Deaf is an organization of, for, and by deaf youth, with chapters in schools for the deaf throughout the United States.

Basically its objectives are to provide the young deaf people training in citizenship, an opportunity to contribute to community growth and development, and a medium for self-directed utilization of their potential. The ultimate goal is to safeguard and promote independent living and self-determinism of all deaf people of America.

The functions of the Junior NAD are not to be confused with those of the parent organization, the National Association of the Deaf. The NAD supports the Junior NAD but has no control over it. The Junior NAD belongs to the schools and is national only in the sharing of ideas between the respective chapters. Each school sets up its own program according to the immediate and particular needs of its students with respect to their total growth.

At the time of its ratification in Dallas in 1960 there were eight charter members. Now in its ninth year, the Junior National Association of the Deaf has added forty new chapters to its membership. The first Convention of the Junior NAD was held in Washington, D. C., at Gallaudet College, May 8-12, 1968. Two regional workshops took place during the 1969-70 academic year, one at the Indiana School for the Deaf in Indianapolis, November 14-16, 1968 and another at the Texas School for the Deaf in Austin, April 24-26, 1969. The first Junior NAD Leadership Development Camp is being scheduled for July 27-August 23, 1969 in Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania.

HOUSING FOR SENIOR DEAF CITIZENS

Construction on a 13-story complex began in February, 1967, in Los Angeles, California for housing of senior deaf citizens.

The Pilgrim Tower Complex for Senior Deaf Citizens is a non-profit project sponsored by the Pilgrim Lutheran Church for the Deaf in Los Angeles. The 100% federal loan for construction was made under the Senior Citizens Housing Loan Program.

The structure will have 112 housekeeping units for rent and is located at 12th Street and Vermont Avenue in Los Angeles. Special Staff and accommodations are expected to be provided for deaf persons with ultimate development of an out-patient building for indigent deaf at the rear of the property.

The World Federation of the Deaf was established by a decision of the World Congress of the Deaf (Rome, 19-23 Sept. 1951) to unite all national organizations of the deaf into one single international association. The head office is in Rome, Italy.

The basic aim of the Federation's work is the social rehabilitation of the deaf. The Federation pursues the following ends:

(a) To collect data concerning the education, the legal and social position, the organization of assistance and the vocational rehabilitation of the deaf in all countries and to inform its members of the scientific and practical results achieved;

(b) To promote in the various countries the unification of associations, federations and national societies which represent the deaf and hard of hearing, or to favour their establishment where they do not yet exist;

(c) To obtain information, reports and studies on social legislations concerning the deaf.

(d) To organize international meetings for the purpose of studying and various problems indicated in paragraph (a);

(e) To arrange for participation at meetings of interest to the deaf and to cooperate with other international organizations which deal with the problems of disabled;

(f) To defend the rights of the deaf and to promote their social rehabilitation;

(g) To promote the international exchange of specially trained people in the assistance and education of the deaf;

(h) To promote the inclusion of the problems concerning the deaf among those which are to be dealt with by international bodies in collaboration with the United Nations Organization, its bodies and its specialized agencies;

(i) To ensure the publication of documents which may interest the members of the W.F.D.

The World Federation of the Deaf pursues its aims either directly or through its agencies and foundations. It may issue publications, establish agencies, either at its head office or in other countries, in agreement with the national associations of those countries.

UNITED NATIONS

The United Nations and its specialized agencies, as inter-governmental organizations, give assistance to governments at their request. The assistance thus provided is not necessarily limited to governmental organizations in the country concerned but may be directed by the government to a non-governmental organization or institution. Government requests for assistance are transmitted to the United Nations or the specialized agencies by the Resident Representative of the United Nations Development Programme in the country concerned.

The programs for the rehabilitation of disabled persons set up by the United Nations and its specialized agencies include the following forms of assistance to governments:

1. Granting of fellowships.
2. Provision of advisory services.
3. Preparation of research studies.
4. Publication of monographs.
5. Organization of seminars, courses, conferences, and study groups.
6. Assistance to establishment of national rehabilitation programmes, to training of personnel and to procurement of equipment.

Through its Rehabilitation Unit for the Disabled, the United Nations deals mainly with the following aspects of rehabilitation of disabled persons:

1. Planning
2. Administrative
3. Legislative
4. Prosthetics
5. Psychological
6. Social

The International Labour Organization covers all the vocational aspects of the rehabilitation programme including all matters relating to:

1. Administrative, financial and legal aspects of vocational rehabilitation
2. Identification and registration of disabled persons
3. Reconditioning, assessment and pre-vocational training
4. Vocational guidance and counselling
5. Vocational training and retraining
6. Placement and follow-up
7. Sheltered employment including programmes for the homebound
8. Special measures to ensure employment
9. Vocational rehabilitation and industrial rehabilitation centres

The role of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) covers the field of "special education" for the disabled. Its technical competence extends to programmes for the education of the blind, the deaf, the crippled, and the mentally handicapped. In 1960, an International Conference on Public Education convened jointly by UNESCO and the International Bureau of Education, adopted a recommendation concerning the organization of special education for mentally handicapped children.

The World Health Organization (WHO) aims at promoting and protecting the health of all people in general and, as regards rehabilitation, to preventing, wherever possible, those diseases and injuries which are likely to lead to permanent disabilities requiring rehabilitative measures.

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) provides assistance to national schemes for training personnel for the rehabilitation of physically handicapped children.

Aid is limited to training and demonstration centres primarily serving children. UNICEF normally provides material assistance (e.g. equipment and transport).

UNICEF co-ordinates its plans with the interested United Nations technical agencies and only assists projects which have the technical approval of the relevant United Nations agencies

The Project Centers Branch of the Division of Educational Services administers the program authorized under Public Law 90-247, Part C, which amends Title VI of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act to establish a limited number of model Centers for deaf-blind children.

It is the intent of Congress under this Act that the Center programs be ". . . designed to develop and bring to bear upon such children, beginning as early as feasible in life, those specialized, intensive professional and allied services, methods, and aids that are found to be most effective to enable them to achieve their full potential for communication with and adjustment to the world around them, for useful and meaningful participation in society, and for self-fulfillment."

The Center Concept

The primary objective of an Area Center for deaf-blind children is to develop and make available comprehensive and effective services for all deaf-blind children in the geographic area to be served by the Center. Because of the breadth of services needed by deaf-blind children of all ages, and because of the scattered geographic distribution of these children who will need to be served by these Centers, it is essential that a number of agencies, both public and private, join together in developing a comprehensive Center. All agencies involved in such cooperative work of the Center will be considered Participating Agencies.

The Coordinator of the Center will be located in a designated Coordinating Agency which may also be a Participating Agency, and will be responsible for planning with those agencies involved in the Center program to do the following: provide all deaf-blind children in the Center area with essential services available by the proper utilization of existing resources, develop new services where needed, and improve and expand existing services where appropriate.

It will be the responsibility of the Coordinator to see that those services required by the Act, (described below) are provided by the Center through its Participating Agencies.

Scope of Services

The Centers will provide the following basic services to deaf-blind children, as required by the Act: comprehensive diagnostic and evaluative services; education, adjustment and orientation programs utilizing all the professional and allied services required; and, effective consultative services for parents, teachers, and others who play a direct role in the lives of deaf-blind children to enable them to understand the special

problems of such children and to assist in the process of education, adjustment, and orientation.

Additional activities authorized by the Act, but not required, include: research, development or demonstration of new or improved techniques to be used in educating deaf-blind children, in-service training of professional and allied personnel who are working or intend to work with deaf-blind children, and dissemination of materials and information about practices found effective in working with deaf-blind children.

ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION ACT (ESEA)**

Eight Centers for Deaf-Blind Children have been funded by the United States Office of Education under Title VI-C of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Three of these Centers are now developmental in nature and will plan during their first year to develop specific programs to meet the needs of deaf-blind children in their area. The remaining five are operational and will provide those comprehensive services described above. The eight Centers will serve 40 states during Fiscal Year 1969 and plans are underway to provide services and develop programs in the remaining states.

DEAFNESS RESEARCH FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES 1969 RESEARCH GRANTS

Grants totaling \$197,345 for the 1969 project year have been awarded by DRF to 25 scientists conducting 26 research investigations into the causes of deafness, according to John H. Nichols, Jr., DRF's new President. Many of the awards were made possible by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation. In the 11 years since its establishment DRF has been responsible for having directed more than \$2,500,000 to ear research and related objectives.

The 1969 grants will continue to further ear research investigations over a one-year period in laboratories and medical centers in 15 states throughout the country, including: California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas and Washington. For the first time DRF also made a grant outside the United States. It went to the University of Toronto, Canada.

DRF's Scientific Review Committee and Grants Approval Board renewed grants to 18 researchers, at the same time making awards to seven scientists for first-year investigations on entirely new projects. The types of studies can be loosely classified by title under the following categories:

Histopathology of Temporal Bones

ADMINISTRATION

Children with Impaired Hearing — Administration of Special Education in Small School Systems. By Alice Streng, Chairman, Department of Exceptional Education, University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Published by The Council for Exceptional Children, Washington, D.C. 1960. 72 pp.

This bulletin is aimed at general school administrators of small school systems who are going to establish and administer special education programs within their regular system. Presented are chapters on hearing and hearing loss, identification of hearing impaired children, the educational program, administration, and the program practices of several selected communities. Four appendices deal with standards, programs and organizations for and of the deaf.

AUDIOLOGY

Ears: Educational Amplification Response Study, 1968. Ears Monograph No. 1. Prepared by Barry L. Griffing and Gordon M. Hayes, Consultants in Education of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, California State Department of Education. Project Director, Donald F. Krebs, San Diego Speech and Hearing Center, 8001 Frost Street, San Diego, California 92123. Published by the San Diego Speech and Hearing Center, San Diego, California. 1968. 218 pp.

The Study analyses many of the various electronic auditory training systems for classroom use that are presently on the market. The authors have attempted to keep their reporting on all the instruments as uniform as possible. In the quality assurance field and acoustical evaluation fields they have held primarily to the minimum NASA and HAIC standards.

About Your Hearing. By G. A. Briggs with James Moir as sub-editor. Published by Rank Wharfedale Limited, Yorkshire, England. (Handled in the United States by Herman Publishing Service, 25 Huntington Avenue, Boston, Mass.) 1967. 132 pp. Cloth, \$4.95; paper, \$3.50.

This book is a general treatise on the subject of sound and hearing. Age and noise effects, reproduced sound, aides to hearing, special treatments for the deaf, etc., are all explored. Sound reproduction techniques are analyzed and explained, with special attention given to Rank-Wharfedale equipment. The book is heavily illustrated.

Ascertainment of Children with Hearing Defects. By The Working Party appointed by the Secretary of State for Scotland. Published by the Scottish Education Department, Her Majesty's Stationery Office, Edinburgh, Scotland. 1967. 52 pp. 4s. 6d.

This report stresses early diagnosis and training for children who have hearing defects. Methods of testing are presented for very young children as well as older children. There is a chapter on various information and tips followed by a concluding chapter for the report. There is an Appendix.

EDUCATION

Competencies Needed by Teachers of Hearing Impaired Children: Deaf, Hard of Hearing. By the American Organization for Education of the Hearing Impaired. Published by A. G. Bell Association for the Deaf, Washington, D. C. 1968. 28 pp. appendix. \$1.50 postage paid.

This publication contains reprints of selected portions of two bulletins published by the U. S. Office of Education regarding the qualifications of teachers of hearing impaired children. Present concern for quality education is related to the quality of future teachers in this specialized area. Part I deals with the deaf and Part II deals with the hard of hearing.

Guide for the Teacher of the Deaf and the Hard of Hearing. Common Language Problems Explained and Illustrated in the Fitzgerald Key. By Adoracion A. Alvarez. Printed at the North Dakota School for the Deaf, Devils Lake, North Dakota. 1968. 94 pp.

The first part of this guide is especially prepared for the teacher of the young deaf child. It consists of classroom discipline, speechreading, speech, and beginning language. The second part of the material is designed to help teachers solve problems regarding the use of the Fitzgerald Key. The most common questions regarding the correct way of writing sentences in the Key are illustrated and explained. The various uses of prepositional phrases, adverbial phrases, adjective phrases, the use of verbals, and words and phrases that usually create confusion are outlined and illustrated to assist the teachers in order to save time.

The Role of the Resource Consultant in Special Education. By Kenneth Blessing, Editor. Published by The Council for Exceptional Children, Washington, D. C. 1968. 127 pp. Cloth, \$4.95; paper, \$3.50.

This monograph has been developed under the auspices of the Council for Exceptional Children in order to delineate the major tasks of supervisors and resource consultants in special education. Papers on the role of resource consultants and visually handicapped, hearing impaired, emotionally disturbed, mentally handicapped, etc., children are presented.

Special Education for Handicapped Children. First Annual Report, National Advisory Committee on Handicapped Children, January 31, 1968. Published by the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C. 1968. 44 pp.

The report of the National Advisory Council is a review of current organization and programs for handicapped children carried out under Title VI of Public Law 89-10. The committee developed recommendations in four areas of special needs; (a) the handicapped child in the inner city, (b) the handicapped child in rural settings, (c) children with special learning disabilities, (d) preschool programs for handicapped children.

Special Education Programs Within the United States. Edited by Morris Val Jones, Ph.D. Published by Charles C. Thomas, Springfield, Illinois. July, 1968. 427 pp. \$14.00.

Case studies of twenty-two special education programs presently being carried out in the United States are presented. The papers are about evenly divided on diagnostic centers and speech schools, programs for communication disorders, and city, county and state programs in special-education. The founding, philosophies, organization and procedures of the organizations are presented so that those about to engage in special education have an opportunity to study other programs that are already functioning.

Final Report of the National Research Conference on Day Programs for Hearing Impaired Children. By Ann Mulholland and George W. Fellen-dorf, Investigators. Published by the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Bureau of Research, Washington, D. C. and the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf, Washington, D. C. 1968. 168 pp.

This is a clear concise report of the Conference which had as its objectives: (1) Examination of the policies and practices of the various states in regard to the organization and administration of day programs for the hearing impaired in local school systems; (2) Description of the administrative and organizational needs of the programs; (3) Recommendations concerning how such needs could be met; (4) Identification of areas of needed research; and (5) Publication and dissemination of a report which might serve as a guideline for states in developing programs for the hearing impaired. The

participants represented a wide area and varying levels of experience in work with the hearing impaired, and the conferees represented the various disciplines of those actively engaged in working with the hearing impaired. A copy of the program is included as well as a summary of the Conference.

A Proposed Plan for the Improvement of the Education of the Deaf and Severely Hard of Hearing in California. Second Draft of the Combined North and South Subtopic Committee Reports. Prepared for the Bureau for Physically Exceptional Children, Division of Special Schools and Services. By Gordon M. Hayes and Barry L. Griffing, Consultants in Education of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. Published by California State Department of Education, Sacramento, California. 1967. 39 pp.

The study proposes to identify the essential ingredients of a uniform program which would improve the education of the deaf and severely hard of hearing in California. Minimum essentials for preschool, elementary, junior high and high school programs for the hearing impaired are examined. Vocational training, participation in regular classes and evaluation of pupil progress for the deaf and hard of hearing are reviewed, as are admission, transfer and dismissal policies, and the problems of multiple handicapped deaf or hard of hearing children.

A Guide to the Education of the Deaf in the Public Schools of California. By Gordon M. Hayes and Barry L. Griffing. Published by the California State Department of Education, Sacramento. 1967. 70 pp.

The bulletin is designed to assist in the development and strengthening of instructional programs for deaf children. Chapters dealing with the physiology of hearing, causes of deafness, preparation of teachers for the deaf, classes and classrooms and curriculum for the deaf, testing and placement, and finally a chapter on public services for the deaf are presented. Appendices and a bibliography are also supplied.

The Margaret S. Sterck School for Hearing Impaired. (Delaware's State School for the Deaf). Project Director, J. Rudy, Principal, Margaret S. Sterck School. Funded by E.S.E.A., Title I 89-313. Published by The Margaret S. Sterck School, Chestnut Hill Road and Cherokee Drive, Newark, Delaware. 1968. 124 pp.

This report represents Phase I of the Educational Programming, Staffing and Curriculum Development Study for the Margaret S. Sterck School for the Hearing Impaired. Its purpose is to summarize the progress of the Sterck School Title I 1968 summer project. This is an excellent source of information on programs for various age groups and materials suitable for use in such programs. There is a good report on music and its place in the education of the deaf.

National Technical Institute for the Deaf, Note Taker. Produced by the Rochester Institute of Technology in cooperation with the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Washington, D. C. n.d.

This notetaker is specially designed so that a hearing student can take notes for a deaf person in a regular classroom or seminar, freeing the deaf student to constantly watch the instructor. No carbon is required and the special paper is ruled and punched for easy insertion into a regular class notebook. Simple instructions and special tips for facilitating its use are included on the spiral bound cover of the book.

The World of Silence: A New Venture in Philosophy. By Christopher Browne Garnett, Jr., Ph.D., Professor of Philosophy, Gallaudet College, Washington, D. C. Published by Greenwich Book Publishers, Inc., New York. 1968. 169 pp. \$3.50.

From his experience of teaching philosophy to deaf students at Gallaudet College, the author develops a theory of languages as different linear, bi-linear and non-linear abstraction systems, two of which are the vocal heard and the signalled seen. Theories of the mind-hand relationship are developed through the ideas of Holt, Prall, Brown, and Mead, as well as Plato, Leibniz, and Fite. The question of whether words are sounds is explored and the ideas of Ogden and Richards are related to the manual languages of the deaf.

The Exchange of Letters Between Samuel Heinicke and Abbé Charles Michel De L'Epee. By Christopher B. Garnett, Jr., Ph.D., Professor of Philosophy, Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C. Published by the Vantage Press, New York. 1968. 67 pp. \$2.75.

This volume contains the letters written by Samuel Heinicke, founder and head of the oralist school for the deaf at Leipzig, and the Frenchman Abbé Charles Michel de l'Epee, founder and head of the manualist school for the deaf in Paris. The letters are essentially a debate between the two eighteenth-century teachers of the deaf concerning their respective methods of instruction. Dr. Garnett provides insights on the nature of language and communication for all people — not just the deaf alone. The conclusion of the book includes the "Decisions" by the Editor of the Vienna *Realzeitung* and the Rector and Fellows of the Academy of Zurich.

LANGUAGE

Language and Personality in Deaf Children. By M. M. Lewis. Published by the National Foundation for Educational Research in England and Wales, Occasional Publication Series No. 20, The Mere, Upton Park, Slough, Bucks and at 79 Wimpole Street, London, W1M 8 EA. 1968. 239 pp. 50s.

The author says that children with impaired hearing tend, of course, to be retarded also in their linguistic development. The object of the investigation was to ascertain whether linguistic retardation manifested itself in any specific features of the vocabulary which are concerned with the orotic characteristics of human beings, and whether there are indications of relationships between linguistic retardation and orotic immaturity.

Helping Young Children Develop Language Skills. By Merle B. Karnes. Published by The Council for Exceptional Children, Washington, D. C. 1968. 136 pp. \$2.75.

The activities included in this book were designed by teachers to improve the language skills of culturally disadvantaged preschool children. The communication processes considered are derived from the clinical model of the Illinois Test of Psycholinguistic Abilities (ITPA). The activities in this book, therefore, reflect a language model comprised of five major processes; understanding, association, integration, encoding, and memory. The purpose of the book is to familiarize teachers with specific types of activities which can further the development of certain psycholinguistic abilities. The manual is not a curriculum; rather, it suggests prototypes through which curricular content may be presented.

MANUAL COMMUNICATION

Phoneme Communication of the Deaf. By Jaakko Pesonen. Published by The Finnish Academy of Science and Letters, Snellmanink, 9-11, Helsinki, Finland. 1968. 208 pp.

The author clearly states that the purpose of his study is to try to explore some aspects of verbal communication which he regards as basic in the speech education of the deaf. His study is divided into two parts which deal with "Phoneme Communication of the Deaf" and "Elementary Oral Education of the Deaf." Each part deals with specific areas which are clearly stated and dealt with. Tables, diagrams and pictures are used to graphically depict and clarify topics being discussed.

Sign Language. By Harry Jones. Published by The English University Press Ltd., St. Paul's House, Warwick Lane, London, E. C. 4, England. 1968. 180 pp. 10/6.

Mr. Jones has an interesting introduction to this hardback handbook of signs used by the deaf in England. He points out the variation in signs with regard to the locality and his historical review of the different systems of fingerspelling deserves the careful attention of even the most casual reader. Fingerspelling and signs is a much older system of communication than is

commonly known and is not limited to the deaf. The explanatory entry regarding the use of the Continental one-handed alphabet in the United States is clearly presented. The clear-cut illustrations make the written explanation of the sign easier to understand and manipulate. The practice lessons after each group of signs are designed to reinforce the formation, use, and reading of signs in every day communication with the deaf. It is a teach-yourself book and American readers will find it very much like *Talk With the Deaf* by David O. Watson, Winneconne, Wisconsin.

The Education of Deaf Children: The Possible Place of Finger Spelling and Signing. Report of the Committee appointed by the Secretary of State for Education and Science in October, 1964. Published by Her Majesty's Stationery Office, London. (Sales Section, British Information Services, 845 Third Avenue, New York, New York 10022). 1968. 131 pp. \$2.50 (includes mailing).

An interesting report on the composition and work of the Committee with regard to the possible place of finger spelling and signing in the education of those with impaired hearing who are now being taught by different methods. Detailed reports of case studies are presented for the different methods of instruction.

Of special interest is this statement by the Committee: "We had the privilege of being addressed by Dr. Powrie Vaux Doctor, Editor of *American Annals of the Deaf*, on the methods of communication used at Gallaudet College, by Professor Stephen Quigley, Professor of Special Education in the Institute of Research on Exceptional Children at the University of Illinois, on the progress of the research under his direction into the use of finger spelling in teaching young deaf children, and by Professor Hans Furth of the Catholic University of America on his work on language and the development of thinking."

The ABC's of Sign Language. Edited by Josef I. Sanders, Consultant in Speech Pathology, Oklahoma State Department of Health; Illustrated by James C. Harrall; Foreword by Powrie Vaux Doctor, Editor *American Annals of the Deaf*. Published by Manca Press, Inc., Tulsa, Oklahoma. 1968. 306 pp. \$8.75.

This new manual of signs is unique in that it presents only one sign per page. The result is a clear, well illustrated, carefully explained dictionary of signs that will be useful to both the experienced signer and the novice. The book has special merit in that the illustrations are so clear that even persons with reading difficulty will be able to understand and use correctly most of the signs described.

MEDIA

Catalog of Captioned Films for the Deaf. By Anita A. Carpenter, Project Officer. Published by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C. 1969. 36 pp.

This catalog of captioned classroom instructional films and training films for the deaf or those working with the deaf is based primarily on information stored in the data bank of NICEM — National Information Center for Educational Media, University of Southern California. The listing does not cover recreational or general interest films. Recreational films are covered in a separate catalog.

1968 Summary Report: Implications for the Use of Television in Schools for the Deaf. By William D. Jackson, Director, Southern Regional Media Center for the Deaf, University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tennessee. Published by the Southern Regional Media Center for the Deaf, University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tennessee. 1968. 40 pp. Appendix.

As the title indicates, this seminar was designed to answer questions about the implications of the use of television for teaching the deaf. The seminar provides material on three basic questions: 1. Programs—where to get programs and what are the sources of financial support and know-how; 2. How can programs be planned and prepared; 3. What equipment and technology are needed.

Symposium on Research and Utilization of Educational Media for Teaching the Deaf; "The Educational Media Complex". By Robert E. Stepp, Project Director, Midwest Regional Media Center for the Deaf. Published by The Nebraska Center for Continuing Education, Lincoln, Nebraska. 1961. 246 pp.

This is a report of the National Conference sponsored by the Department of Educational Administration, University of Nebraska and Captioned Films for the Deaf, Bureau of Education for Handicapped Children, U. S. Office of Education, Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The conference was held at Lincoln, Nebraska, April 10-12, 1967. Included in the report are papers representing various phases and uses of instructional media in the education of the deaf as well as the facilities and personnel needed to carry out suggested programs. It is explained that the Library as an educational media center and a communication medium helps to establish proper cognition of the scope of the changing concepts in the education of the deaf. There is a summary of the symposium and a copy of the program in addition to a roster of those attending the conference.

Physical Facilities for Schools for the Deaf. Symposium on Research and Utilization of Educational Media for Teaching the Deaf. Published by the National Conference sponsored by The Department of Educational Administration, Teacher's College, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebraska, and the Midwest Regional Media Center for the Deaf. n.d. 145 pp. (Reprinted from the *American Annals of the Deaf*, November, 1968. 118, No. 5, 1001-1146.)

Architecture, acoustics, lighting, and classroom design are the chief topics of this symposium. Architectural projects and designs for buildings and classrooms are prominently featured. Examples of a multi-media course and the facilities necessary for its use are provided. John Gough presents a paper on captioned films, and summaries, the program of the Conference, and a roster of participants can be found at the end of the volume.

MENTAL HEALTH

Differential Diagnosis of Speech and Hearing Problems of Mental Retardates. Edited by Edgar F. Waldon, M.S., Ph.D. Published by The Catholic University of America Press, Washington, D. C. 1968. 264 pp.

The book is a compilation of reports given at the Workshop on Differential Diagnosis of Speech and Hearing Problems of Mental Retardates held from June 13 through June 24, 1966 at Catholic University, Washington, D. C. Papers on diagnosis, testing, psychological problems and testing, hearing, and speech and language problems of mentally retarded individuals are presented.

PROCEEDINGS

Accent on Unity-Horizons on Deafness—Social, Communication, Economic. Proceedings of National Forum I, Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf, Washington, D. C. Edited by Harriet Green Kopp, Ph.D. Published by the Council of Organizations Serving the Deaf, 4201 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., Washington, D. C. 1968. 95 pp. \$2.00.

The proceedings of National Forum I are published here. Papers on the Council concept, the simultaneous and oral methods, adult deaf with speech and lipreading problems, telephone use by the deaf, the theater, and economic horizons of the deaf are presented. Summaries of the proceedings are also supplied.

Education of the Deaf: The Challenge and the Charge. A Report on the National Conference on Education of the Deaf, Colorado Springs, Colorado, April 12-15, 1967. Published by the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, John W. Gardner, Secretary. Sold by The Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 157 pp. \$.75.

In addition to the Keynote Addresses, the report contains a summary of the discussions and the recommendations of the participants. These included educators, medical and psychological specialists, audiologists, rehabilitation counselors and others with expert knowledge of the deaf. There is a chart on the organization of the conference and a list of the participants at the end of the report as well as a *Conference Summary and Impressions*.

Highlights from the Centennial Teachers Institute, Maryland School for the Deaf, March 7, 8, 1968. Published by the Maryland School for the Deaf, Frederick, Maryland. 1968. 15 pp.

The papers of Dr. Helmer R. Myklebust, Ed.D., on *Learning and Educational Failure in Deaf Children: Psychoneurological Considerations*, and Mr. Ben E. Hoffmeyer on *Diagnosis of the Education of the Deaf* are reprinted.

Proceedings of the Midwestern Deaf Youth Leadership Demonstration. Indiana School for the Deaf, November 14, 15, 16, 1968. Published by The Junior National Association of the Deaf at the Indiana School for the Deaf, Indianapolis, Indiana. 1968. 88 pp.

An account of the 1968 Deaf Youth Leadership Demonstration is presented. Booth displays, workshops, formal and informal meetings, and parties are reported on. Speeches on organizations serving the deaf, on Gallaudet College, the National Technical Institute for the Deaf, The Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf, and other groups and organizations were presented in such a way as to make these organizations relevant to deaf youth. Much of the spirit of the conference is conveyed in the publication of these proceedings.

Proceedings of the Tenth Triennial Conference of the Australian Association of Teachers of the Deaf, Inc. Published by The Australian Association of Teachers of the Deaf, Inc., Sydney, Australia. 1968. 191 pp. \$3.00. (Write to: Miss Jean Walter, President, The Australian Association of Teachers of the Deaf, Inc., N.S.W. School for Deaf Children, North Rocks Road, North Rocks, N.S.W., Australia 2151.)

The proceedings is especially interesting because of the various reports of the states and the special groups working with the deaf in different situations and in different parts of Australia and the world. Of special interest was this item from the N.S.W. report: "Amongst general developments, these may be of interest:—(1) Overseas trips of varying duration, by Bro. McGrath, Mr. Parr . . . and the visit here of Dr. Powrie V. Doctor of Gallaudet College. These trips have helped to keep our members abreast of current world thinking in our field in Asia, America, United Kingdom and Europe." Among the papers submitted was one on Cued Speech by R. Orin Cornett, Gallaudet College. The reports are appealing to those working with the deaf because of the common problems and possible solutions to some of the basic needs of those with whom they work, regardless of location.

PSYCHOLOGY AND PSYCHIATRY

Psychologists to Deaf Children: A Developing Perspective. By William N. Craig and Herbert W. Barkuloo, Editors. Supported by a grant from the School of Education, The University of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. 1968. 144 pp.

This publication reflects the thinking of the psychologists to deaf children who met for the first time in Pittsburgh to discuss and define the role of a psychologist in relating to a deaf child. Papers dealing with the psychology of deafness, the role of the psychologist, academic measurement techniques, prediction of academic achievement of deaf children, and counseling and vocational problems are presented.

Psychiatry and the Deaf. Edited by John D. Rainer, M.D., and Kenneth Z. Altshuler, M.D. Published by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington, D. C. 1968. 160 pp.

A Detailed report of the Workshop for Psychiatrists on Extending Mental Health Services to the Deaf, sponsored by the New York State Psychiatric Institute and the New York University Center for Research and Training in Deafness Rehabilitation.

REHABILITATION

Governor's Council on Vocational Rehabilitation — Final Report, Ohio Comprehensive Statewide Planning for Vocational Rehabilitation Services. By Robert L. Davis, Project Director; David H. Tait, Associate Director, Research; Marilyn A. Quigley, Executive Assistant. Supported by a grant from the Rehabilitation Services Administration, Social and Rehabilitation Service, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington, D. C. 1968. 450 pp.

As indicated in the title this is a comprehensive report on rehabilitation services for the handicapped in Ohio. There is a special section on "Rehabilitation of the Deaf" which includes information on education, vocational training and placement, rehabilitation services, mental health centers, community social service agencies, and a special section of "Further Recommendations".

Summary of Information on Projects and Activities in the Field of Rehabilitation of the Disabled During 1967. Tenth Issue. Published by the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs, New York. 1968. 105 pp.

Seventy-five nations report on the services they provide for handicapped persons. The type of service varies from nation to nation, but there is a prevalence of services for the blind. Specific services relating to deafness include Hong Kong, pp. 26-27; Saudi Arabia, p. 59; World Federation of the Deaf, pp. 85-86; United Nations Relief and Works Agency, p. 100; American Foundation for the Overseas Blind (deaf-blind), p. 101. There is a list of international organizations with addresses, a country index, and an index of major projects.

Workshops on Deafness and Vocational Rehabilitation for Assemblies of God Workers. Published by the Home Missions Department, General Council of the Assemblies of God, Springfield, Missouri. 1968. 127 pp.

This Assemblies of God workshop had three broad objectives: (1) to orient Assemblies of God workers for the deaf to the vocational rehabilitation program, (2) to develop patterns of working relations between state vocational rehabilitation workers and Assemblies of God workers, (3) to extend knowledge about and appreciation of the competencies and needs of deaf people to Assemblies of God workers for the deaf. Among the papers presented to meet these objectives were *The Vocational Rehabilitation Process*, *Psychiatric Services for the Deaf*, *Vocational Rehabilitation Services for the Deaf*, *Adult Education for the Deaf*, and others. Summaries, an evaluation of the program, a participants roster, and the program can be found at the back of the volume.

RESEARCH

Exceptional Children Research Review. Edited by G. Orville Johnson, Ed.D., and Harriett D. Blank, Ph.D. Published by The Council for Exceptional Children, Washington, D. C. 1968. 336 pp. Cloth \$6.75; paper \$4.75.

The present volume intends to cover the research that has been done on exceptional children since the publication of Samuel A. Kirk's and Bluma B. Weiner's original *Behavioral Research on Exceptional Children* published five years ago. Research relating to speech and hearing problems are edited by William N. Craig, and James O. Smith and Thomas C. Lovitt. Information on over 200 articles and publications in these two fields is presented.

Workshops for the Handicapped, An Annotated Bibliography — No. 3. Compiled by Dorothy C. Perkins, Ed.D. Published by the Rehabilitation Counseling Program, California State College at Los Angeles, Los Angeles, California. 1966. 47 pp.

The present volume is the third in a series of annotated bibliographies compiled at California State College at Los Angeles, and covers the literature for the year 1966. One hundred twenty-six publications are reviewed and two articles on sheltered workshops and training workshop administrators are presented.

Information Sources in Hearing, Speech, Communication Disorders; Part I, Publications/Developmental Edition. By Lois F. Lunin, Executive Editor; Jean T. Boulware, Editor and Compiler; Barbara Reeves, Production Editor. Published by Information Center for Hearing, Speech, and Disorders of Human Communication, The Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions, Baltimore, Maryland. 1968.

A limited number of copies of this developmental edition were made; however, the vast amount of information contained in this publication should be coveted by those professionals engaged in research on human hearing, language, and speech disorders. Each entry has a code number to facilitate the use of the information which is clearly explained in the Introduction. The scope of information is revealed by the list of sections: Reviews; Special Serials; Journals; Index and Abstract Publications; Bibliographies; Dictionaries; Glossaries; Handbooks; Guides; Directories; Films; Other Media Lists. There is a Table of Contents for each section which further facilitates using this book.

Final Report—Development of a System for Collecting Data on Hearing Impaired School Children. By Augustine Gentile, Gallaudet College. Published by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Bureau of Education for the Handicapped, Division of Research, Washington, D. C. 1968. 201 pp.

Presented here is a description of activities pursued over a period of two years directed toward the development of a method of collecting and disseminating comprehensive national statistics on the characteristics of hearing impaired children. The study led to a recommendation that a permanent office be established for the collection of such data. Detailed statistical information for about 4,800 students enrolled in schools and classes in several Eastern states is also presented. A national survey of all 50 states was conducted, and tables containing information on hearing screening programs, standards used, legal questions, etc., are given in the appendices. The number and type of educational programs of the states are also listed.

A Follow-up Study of Graduates of the School for the Deaf. Studies of Children with Physical Handicaps, No. 7. By Joseph Justman and Sue Moskowitz. Published by the Board of Education of the City of New York, Bureau of Educational Research, Publication No. 42. 1967. 80 pp.

The study was designed to gather as much information as was feasible about graduates of the New York City School for the Deaf in the following categories; family background, school history, occupations, hearing and speech, leisure time, and social relationships. Six hundred forty-six questionnaires were returned out of a total sample of 1,421.

Interaction of Deaf and Hearing in Baltimore City, Maryland. By Paul Hanly Furfey and Thomas J. Harte. Published by The Bureau of Social Research, Department of Sociology, The Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C. 1968. 188 pp.

This is a comprehensive report on the deaf in Baltimore based on survey research and case study information. Comparisons of deaf individuals trained in the oral method with others trained in the simultaneous method are made. Information on the general characteristics, education, communication problems, marital status, parent-child adjustment, crime, etc., of the Baltimore deaf are given. Appendices and the questionnaires are printed.

SPEECHREADING

Speechreading Through Sports (College Football). By Albert E. Grzebien, M.A., Asst. Prof. of Speech, University of Rhode Island. Published by The Volta Bureau, Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf, Washington, D. C. 1968. 58 pp. \$1.70 (postpaid).

The material presented in this book is designed to afford the speechreading teacher subject matter of interest to students of junior and senior high school age. The subject matter is college football, with the lessons sequentially arranged from the more visible to the less obvious changes in the production of speech.

The Story of Lip-Reading: Its Genesis and Development. By Fred DeLand, Superintendent of The Volta Bureau, 1914-1922. Revised and completed by Harriet Andrews Montague. Published by The Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf, Inc., The Volta Bureau, Washington, D. C. Copyrighted 1931, re-issued 1968. 232 pp. \$6.50 postage paid.

The authors present a history of lip-reading from its origins before 1500 to the present. Prominent methods of lip-reading and prominent personalities in its history are explained.

Talking Magic, Book I. By Erleen Marquardt. Published by The Interstate Printers & Publishers, Inc., Danville, Illinois. 1965. 152 pp.

Talking Magic is a book designed to help teachers, therapists, and clinicians teach children with defective speech to speak better. The work is based on the thesis that, "Since oral communication involves a continuity of thought expressed with a continuity of words, each of which contains a sequence of sounds, it seems appropriate to present the consonant sounds in a way that would also give them a definite continuity." This book attempts to accomplish this purpose with a protagonist around whom the sounds revolve. All twenty-five consonant sounds are presented first, then in later chapters each sound is taken up individually.

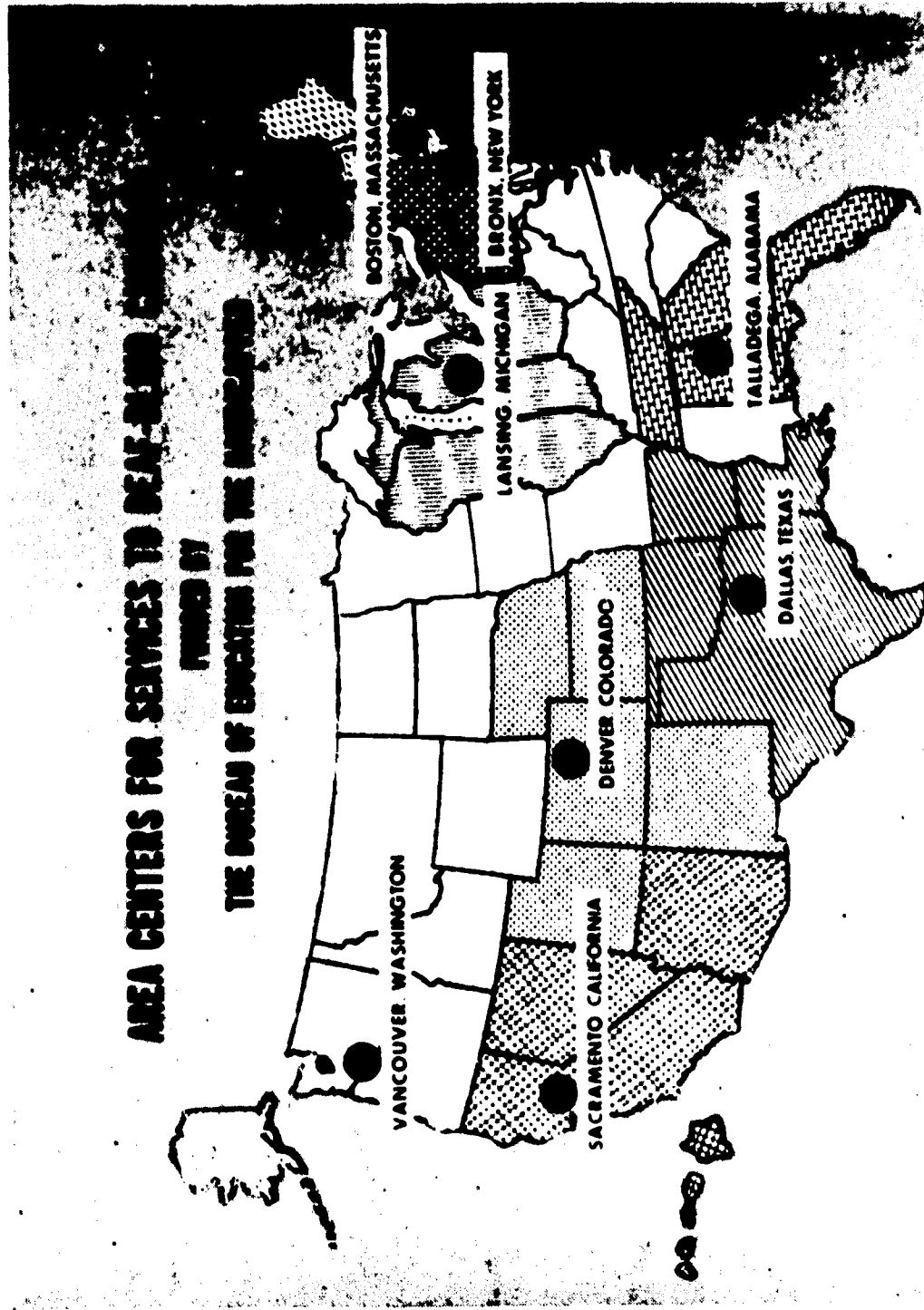

MEDIA SERVICES AND CAPTIONED FILMS

JAMES J. KUNDERT, EDUCATION SPECIALIST

Media Services and Captioned Films is a Federal program that provides for deaf persons a free-loan service of captioned recreational and educational films. Instructional media provided under this program are available for the deaf and to those professionally engaged in work with them. Included under this authorization are research, training, production, and distribution activities in the area of instructional media to promote the educational advancement of the handicapped. This program is administered by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Bureau of Education for the Handicapped, Division of Educational Services, Washington, D.C. 20202.

Scope of Services

The program provides recreational films such as Hollywood feature pictures as well as educational films with English subtitles and other educational media. All types of filmed materials are available to groups of three or more deaf persons but may be made available to single individuals in cases of severe hardship. Educational films and various types of training materials may be made available to groups of deaf persons, parents of deaf children, schools and classes for the deaf, religious organizations serving the deaf, employers and potential employers of deaf persons, vocational rehabilitation facilities, teacher training centers, and medical facilities serving the deaf. Applications from other types of groups will be considered. Extent of services and materials available to a given applicant group will depend on the needs expressed by the group at the time of applying. Certification is made to groups rather than to individuals. Extenuating circumstances will be considered for making exception to this policy. All materials are provided on free loan. Motion pictures must be returned within a specified period of time, but educational materials of other kinds are usually provided on indeterminate loan. The only cost expected to be borne by borrowers of program materials is payment of postage charges at the time materials are returned.

How To Obtain Service

Program materials and services are available only to groups or individuals previously certified as eligible under the terms of regulations under which the program functions. Application for certification should be made to *Captioned Films Educational Media Distribution Center, 5034 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20016.*

NOTE WELL: Due to commercial restrictions on certain types of films, captioned motion picture loans continue to be restricted primarily to deaf persons and those who work with the deaf.
