Abstract

This study attempted to determine what media most effectively communicated to teenagers, how the media habits of Florida teenagers compared with those in other states, and how the media habits of journalism students compared with those not in journalism. A total of 430 students from Florida high schools and 457 from high schools in other states completed a four-page questionnaire on the amount of time they spent reading newspapers, magazines, and high school newspapers; attending plays, concerts, or exhibits; watching television or movies; and listening to the radio. Also surveyed was what magazines and books they preferred. Tentative conclusions from the study were (1) teenagers prefer electronic to printed media; (2) no significant difference exists between Florida teenagers' media habits and those of teenagers in other states; (3) negligible differences exist between the media habits of journalism and non-journalism students; and (4) English and journalism classes are not teaching teenagers to be discriminating and discerning users of mass media. (The bulk of this report consists of tables showing the results of the questionnaire.) (LH)

TEENAGERS MEDIA HABITS

A Quill and Scroll Study

1. Purpose of Study

The purpose of this inquiry by Quill and Scroll Studies is to:

- Determine teenagers' media habits;
- 2) Compare media of Florida teenagers with those of non-Florida teenagers;
- 3) Compare media habits of teenagers in journalism classes with those not in journalism classes.

Obviously this is not the first study of this kind--or the last. Since it is limited in scope, it cannot provide the basis for sweeping generalizations. At the same time it may justify tentative conclusions.

2. Methods

With the cooperation of six high school teachers in Florida and six not in Florida, 4-page questions with answer sheets were circulated among teenagers in the spring semester of 1968 in:

- 1) Junior English
- 2) Senior English
- 3) Beginning Journalism
- 4) Advanced Journalism
- 5) English with a Strong Emphasis on Journalism

It is not assumed that courses of a given name or given level necessarily have the same purposes, content, materials, or emphasis in different schools. The answer sheets were returned to the director of Quill and Scroll Studies who arranged for compilation, tabulation and interpretation of that part of the data related to the topic of discussion.

3. Scope of Studies

A total of 887 high school students participated, 430 of them in Florida, 457 in other states. Of the total, 37 per cent were

boys; 63 per cent, girls; 72 per cent were 16 or 17 years old.

Florida high schools participating were:

Boone High School, Orlando Edgewater High School, Orlando Florida High School, Tallahassee

Wolfson High School, Jacksonville Southwest High School, Miami Plant High School, Plant City

Other high schools were:

Evanston Township High School, Evanston, Illinois Northside High School, Fort Wayne, Indiana Northside High School, Fort Smith, Arkansas Southside High School, Fort Wayne, Indiana Broad Ripple High School, Indianapolis, Indiana Piedmont High School, Piedmont, South Carolina

4. Newspaper Reading

On an average school day 75 per cent of the teenagers devote 15 minutes or more to reading the newspaper, but 25 per cent give less than 15 minutes or no time at all to newspaper reading, according to Table 1. There is only a 4 per cent difference in the number of Floridians and the non-Floridians who give less than 15 minutes or no time at all to this activity. Advanced journalism students give more time to newspaper reading than beginning journalism and English students, but there is little difference between beginning journalism and English students.

James R. Hickey and James E. Brinton in <u>Media Habits and Attitudes Toward Media of Colorado High School Students</u> (1967) reported 43 per cent gave 15 minutes or less to newspaper reading and only 12 per cent to 30 minutes or more.

5. Magazine Reading

On an average school day 70 per cent of the teenagers report that they look at a magazine, 36 per cent spending more than half an hour. Non-Floridians give a little more attention to magazines than do Floridians. Journalism students are more likely to devote 30 minutes or more to magazine reading than non-journalism students (Table 2).



6. Radio Listening

Almost two out of three teenagers listen to radio an hour or more on an average school day according to Table 3. Non-Floridians tend to spend a little more time than do Floridians in radio listening. Journalism students are more likely to devote 30 minutes or more a day to radio listening than English students. In the Colorado study noted under newspaper reading 63 per cent of the teenagers found more than an hour a day in which to listen to radio.

7. Television Viewing

Three out of four teenagers view television more than half an hour a day and more than half of them set aside an hour or more, according to Table 4. Non-Floridians are more likely to give that much time to viewing than Floridians. Journalism students give more time to television viewing than English students. In the Colorado study 80 per cent of the teenagers viewed television half an hour or more, 29 per cent from one to two hours and 29 per cent more than two hours.

Almost two out of three teenagers listen to radio an hour or more on a typical school day. In the Colorado study the percentage was 63. Almost one-fifth attend a movie once a week.

On an average school day 75 per cent of the teenagers devote 15 minutes or more to reading the newspaper, but 25 per cent gave less than that time or no time at all. The Colorado study reported that 43 per cent gave less than 15 minutes a day to newspaper reading. The average for adults is 32 minutes.

On an average school day 70 per cent of the teenagers report that they look at a magazine; 36 per cent spend more than half an hour.

8. Book Reading

Slightly more than one-third of the teenagers devote 60 minutes or more a day to reading a book not connected with classroom assignments, according to Table 5. Floridians are a little ahead of non-Floridians in this activity. Beginning journalism and senior English classes report that 37 per cent of the students spend an hour or more on book reading not related to instruction, but junior English and advanced journalism students appear to read less.



9. Movie Attendance

Almost one-fifth of the teenagers attend a motion picture once a week on the average, according to Table 6. Floridian teenagers attend movies more often than non-Floridians. English students are more likely to attend movies than journalism students.

Motion picture attendance at drive-ins is slightly higher than at theatres, according to Table 7. Because of the climate, Floridians are much more likely to go to drive-ins.

10. Fine Arts

Rarely do more than one or two students of ten attend plays - other than school plays; concerts other than school concerts; musical comedies, operettas, or opera; or exhibits of painting, sculpture, and other art forms, according to Tables 8-11. Not all of the communities are devoid of local opportunities.

11. High School Newspaper or Magazine

Almost nine out of ten teenagers always or usually read the high school newspaper or magazine, according to Table 12. Non-Floridians give stronger support than Floridians to these school publications. Journalism students are much more likely to read the high school newspaper always than are English students.

12. Preferred Magazine Reading

Since nearly two-thirds of the participants in this study were girls, it is not surprising that girls' or women's magazines are most popular, as Table 13 indicates. More often than not the non-Floridian teenagers devote time to these magazines.

More than one-half seldom if ever read newsmagazines, National Geographic or Holiday. More than nine out of ten appear not to be exposed to Harper's or The Atlantic (see Tables 14-21).

13. Preferred Book Reading

Teenagers appear to prefer non-classroom in this order: romantic fiction, mystery fiction, biography, poetry, science fiction, technology and science, according to Table 22-28. To be sure, "other" books are listed in a catch-all statement, but they presumably cover everything else.



14. Conclusions

These tentative conclusions may be suggested:

- 1) Teenagers prefer electronic media to printed media.
- 2) There appears to be no significant difference between Floridian and non-Floridian teenagers.
- 3) There appear to be almost negligible differences between journalism students and non-journalism students.
- 4) There appears to be no systematic and sustained attempt to help the teenagers become discerning and discriminating users of mass media in either English or journalism instruction. Perhaps the former stress discernment and discrimination as they relate to literature. Perhaps the latter are preoccupied with journalistic techniques and publication production.
