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Abstract

This second annual report by the Florida State Department of Education provides brief project descriptions of innovative programs for curricular change in schools. The listing is compiled on the basis of answers to a questionnaire. Part I of the listing is arranged by subject, with a breakdown by elementary, junior high, and senior high school, and further arrangement by county. The listing in Part II uses a similar breakdown but is grouped as follows: county-wide programs, guidance programs, in-service and aide programs, media related programs, organization, preschool programs, special education programs, and varied programs. 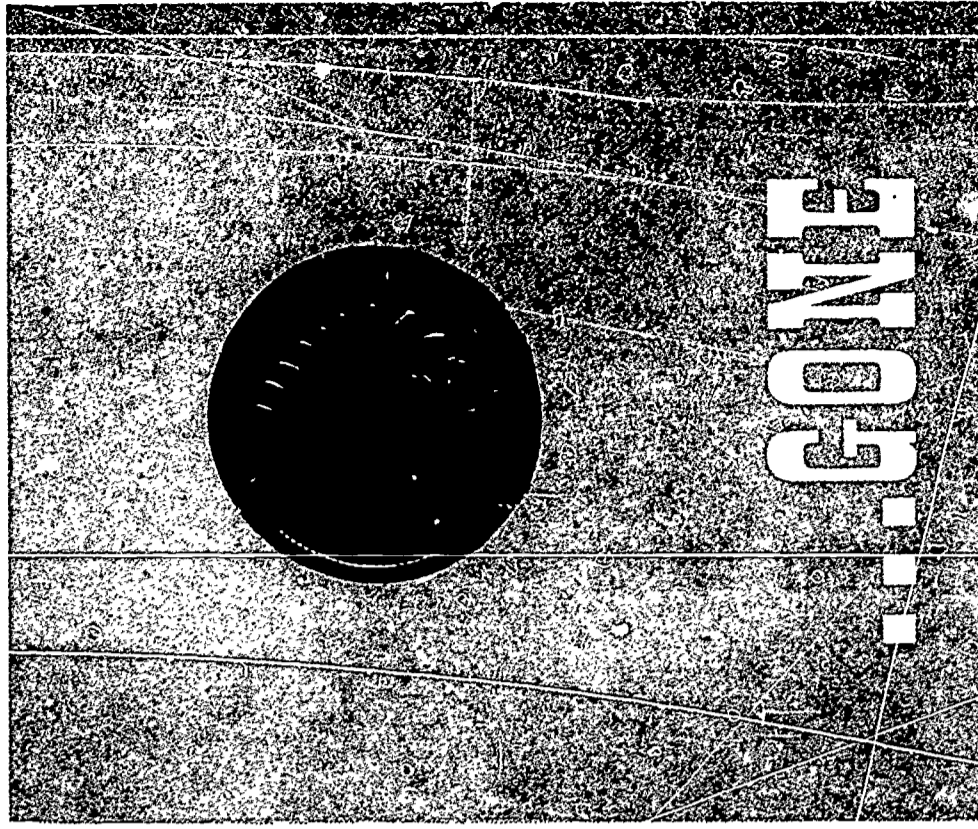

Florida schools, reflecting the educational leadership in our nation, have moved with increasing effectiveness into innovative and experimental programs and practices which enlarge and improve their instructional and administrative efforts. Disseminating information on these innovations and experiments encourages their broader application and it is with this aim that the State Department of Education publishes a second annual report, *Strategies for Curriculum Change*.

Evaluation is a vital successor to innovation and all members of the Florida school system have the responsibility of careful and systematic evaluation of their innovative programs. Such evaluation will identify those ideas which have proved meritorious and recommend the phasing out of programs which seem unsuccessful.

The State Department of Education offers this report as an aid to the accomplishment of quality education for every boy and girl in Florida schools.
