INTRODUCTION

The ERIC System

The Educational Resources Information Center is a national information system of the Office of Education dedicated to the progress of education through the dissemination of educational research results, research-related materials, and other resource information that can be used in developing more effective educational programs. Through a network of nineteen specialized centers, or clearinghouses, each of which is responsible for a particular educational area, the information is monitored, acquired, evaluated, abstracted, indexed, and listed in ERIC reference products. These reference publications thus provide access to reports of innovative programs and the most significant efforts in educational research, both current and historical.

The major reference publication is Research in Education, a monthly bibliography containing in each issue approximately 1000 abstracts of documents and current research projects. Copies of most of the documents announced in Research in Education may be purchased at nominal cost from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS), National Cash Register Company, 4936 Fairmont Avenue, Bethesda, Maryland 20014. (Further information on the ERIC system may be found in How to Use ERIC, available from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402 - catalog no. FS 5.212:12037-B, price 25 cents.)

In addition to these bibliographic activities, each clearinghouse engages in "information analysis" activities, including the preparation of bibliographies, research reviews, interpretive studies and similar publications designed to list, organize, review and synthesize the literature of educational research.

ERIC Products

ERIC Products is an annual bibliography of those publications of the ERIC Clearinghouses reflecting information analysis activities. It includes all substantial bibliographies, review papers, and state-of-the-art publications identified as ERIC publications; it does not include routine brochures, accession lists and short notes published in clearinghouse newsletters. This second issue of ERIC Products lists 240 publications of Fiscal Year 1969—July 1968 through June 1969*.

Entries in the bibliography are arranged alphabetically by the name of the clearinghouse; within each clearinghouse, entries without identified personal authors are listed before those with authors. For each entry, the following items of information, as appropriate and in the form supplied by the individual clearinghouses, have been given:

- 2. Title
- 3. Series name and number
- 4. Journal reference
- 5. Date of publication, if not already included in a journal reference
- 6. Number of pages

They are organized by instructional level, and within these sections reports dealing specifically with reading and language arts are listed separately. There is also a section of guidelines for program development and general discussions of individual instruction.

This review paper on school decentralization points out that it has been consistently demonstrated that participation in the decision making process results in positive changes in both the affective and instrumental behavior of participants. Studies show that parent involvement in the schools enhances children's development and academic achievement.
