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ABSTRACT

This report offers figures on modern foreign language enrollments in four-year colleges and universities for fall 1961 and compares them with those of fall 1960. Most of this information is presented in tables, the majority of which detail enrollment figures and percent of change by state and institution. Individual institution enrollment for French, German, Italian, Russian, Spanish, and other modern foreign languages is included. Other tables illustrate comparative enrollments in other languages, language enrollments in extension divisions, and total national enrollments in modern languages by states with percent of change. An introductory section discusses the tables and the data. (RL)

HIGHLIGHTS

1. There were more than 600,000 enrollments in modern foreign languages in 1,226 four-year colleges and universities in the United States in Fall 1961, distributed among French (38.0 per cent), Spanish (28.6 per cent), German (24.0 per cent), Russian (5.1 per cent), Italian (1.9 per cent), and other modern foreign languages (2.4 per cent).
2. Modern foreign language enrollments continued to increase at almost twice the rate of institutional enrollments (13.2 per cent versus 7.7 per cent).
3. Graduate enrollments in modern foreign languages have gone above 6 per cent of the total graduate institutional enrollment for the first time, after having been below 5 per cent in both 1958 and 1959. The 1961 increase in graduate language enrollments over 1960 (27.5 per cent) is an encouraging statistic, but additional efforts are necessary to maintain a high rate of increase yearly, if the national need for professionally trained teachers of modern foreign languages is to be met.
4. The spectacular gains in Russian enrollments in 1959 (56.5 per cent over 1958) have been maintained with constant increases for two years (over 10 per cent in both 1960 and 1961), and may thus be considered to have become a permanent part of the national language picture.
5. Italian enrollments, which had increased less than 5 per cent over the previous year in both 1959 and 1960, made an impressive gain of 12.0 per cent in 1961, to become fourth among languages in rate of growth, ahead of both German and Russian.
6. Enrollments in 70 other languages, many of which are critically needed, such as Arabic, Chinese, Czech, Hindi, Swahili, and Tamil, were reported in 37 states and the District of Columbia, and, as in 1960, they accounted for 2.4 per cent of the total modern foreign language enrollment in 1961. However, the rate of growth in these enrollments dropped from 26.3 per cent (1959 to 1960) to 19.8 per cent (1960 to 1961). Only 15 languages had more than 100 enrollments, and most of the remaining 55 languages in this category had well below 100.

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FOREWORD

Since September 1959, the Modern Language Association, under contract to the United States Office of Education, has collected and tabulated modern foreign language enrollments in four-year colleges and universities covering four consecutive years, Fall 1958 through Fall 1961. This report, "Modern Foreign Language Enrollments in Four-Year Colleges and Universities, Fall 1961," is the third in the series; the first included the years 1958 and 1959; the second, 1960.

During this four-year interval, or one college "generation," the per cent of increase for all degree-credit enrollments has risen from 3.8 (1958 to 1959), to 6.4 (1959 to 1960), to 7.7 (1960 to 1961), but the corresponding per cents of increase in modern foreign language enrollments have been consistently much higher: 13.7, 12.0, and 13.2.

The per cents of increase in enrollments for each language over the four-year period are as follows:

MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGE ENROLLMENTS IN FOUR-YEAR COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES, FALL 1961

I. NATIONAL DATA

In Fall 1961, 1,226 institutions of higher learning reported well over a half million (634,940) enrollments in modern foreign languages. The 1,184 institutions of higher learning surveyed in the previous year¹ reported an enrollment of 630,626 in modern foreign languages in Fall 1961. This figure represents an increase of 13.2 per cent over 1960, which is more than one per cent higher than the 12 per cent increase of 1960 over 1959.

The total institutional student enrollment in the 1,184 institutions previously surveyed was 3,026,618 in Fall 1961; 2,809,533 was the Fall 1960 enrollment in the same institutions. The overall college population thus increased by 217,085, or 7.7 per cent, as compared with an increase of 6.4 per cent in 1960. Comparison of this per cent (7.7) with the 13.2 per cent rise in modern foreign language enrollments shows that the increase in language enrollments continues to be nearly twice the increase in total college population.

The per cent of students out of the total school population taking modern foreign languages cannot be exactly determined because some students, taking courses in more than one language or more than one course in the same language, are counted more than once in language enrollment figures. With this caution, it is possible to compare institutional enrollments (which represent persons) with modern foreign language enrollments (which do not represent persons). In 1961 the latter were 20.8 per cent of the total institutional enrollment; in 1960, the per cent of modern foreign language enrollments was 19.8; in 1959 it was 18.9; and in 1958, 17.3. Since 1959, the proportion has risen steadily at the rate of about one per cent each year.

The enrollment figures include undergraduate, graduate, and "special and unclassified." The increase in undergraduate enrollments in modern foreign languages from 1960 to 1961 was 67,171 or 12.8 per cent, up from an 11.7 per cent increase in 1960 from 1959. Graduate enrollments increased 5,060, or 27.5 per cent, a startling improvement over the 17.2 per cent increase of the previous year. The increase in "special and unclassified" enrollments was down to 1,212, or 9.6 per cent, as compared with a 21.7 per cent increase in 1960; rapid fluctuations in "special and unclassified" enrollments are not uncommon.

Previous surveys have noted that graduate language enrollments were increasing more rapidly than undergraduate enrollments, and the results of the present survey confirm this trend. A further corroboration of this increase in modern foreign language graduate enrollments can be seen by a comparison of them with institutional enrollments. While the per cent of graduate institutional enrollments (out of total institutional enrollments) fluctuated from 12.1 per cent in 1958, up to 12.5 per cent in 1959, down to 11.9 per cent in 1960, and back to 12.5 per cent in 1961, the per cent of graduate enrollments in modern foreign languages (out of total enrollments in languages) rose slowly, but

constantly, from 3.1 in 1958 and 3.2 in 1959, to 3.3 in 1960; then to 3.7 in 1961. Of the total graduate population in 1958, only 4.5 per cent were enrolled in modern foreign languages; in 1959, 4.9 per cent were enrolled in graduate courses; in 1960, 5.5 per cent; and in 1961, 6.2 per cent. There is still a gap between the total college population doing graduate work (12.5 per cent) and graduate enrollments in modern foreign languages (6.2 per cent), but the gap is getting smaller each year, and it is encouraging to note that in 1961 more than 6.0 per cent of the total graduate enrollments were in modern foreign languages.

The following chart summarizes the national totals and per cents for the levels of enrollments for Fall 1960 and Fall 1961:

II. BREAKDOWN BY LANGUAGES

The modern foreign languages surveyed are French, German, Italian, Russian, Spanish, and a number of others, including such "critically needed" languages as Arabic, Chinese, Czech, Japanese, Hindi, Kpelle, Polish, Portuguese, Tamil, Thai, Tibetan, Urdu, and Vietnamese.

The state-by-state distribution shows that in 1961 French, German, and Spanish were taught in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Russian was taught in all states except Arkansas. Italian was taught in all except six states (Alaska, Arkansas, Idaho, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming). No enrollments in other languages were reported by thirteen states: Arkansas, Delaware, Idaho, Maine, Mississippi, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, South Carolina, Vermont, Virginia, and Wyoming.

In 1961, as in 1960, there was an increase in enrollments in each of the five languages surveyed as well as in the group of "other" languages. National enrollments in each language in 1960 and in 1961, and the numerical increase in enrollments in each language from 1959 to 1960 and from 1960 to 1961 are summed up in Chart B. The increase from 1960 to 1961 is illustrated in Graph A. Per cents in columns 4 and 6 of Chart B show the rate of increase of 1960 and of 1961 enrollments over the preceding year. Per cents in columns 7 and 8 show the share each language had, in each year, of that year's total language enrollment; per cents in columns 9 and 10 show the proportionate growth of each language out of the total modern foreign language growth from 1959 to 1960 and from 1960 to 1961.

The most significant facts emerging from this national survey are the following: All five of the most commonly taught modern foreign languages showed a greater rate of growth in 1961 than in 1960. The rate of growth of the other languages was not so great in 1961 (14.2² per cent over 1960 enrollments) as it was in 1960 (26.3 per cent over 1959 enrollments). The "critically needed" languages, French, and Spanish all had a greater rate of growth in both years than the total modern foreign language rate of growth (12.0 per cent in 1960, and 13.2 per cent in 1961). All languages showed a rate of growth of more than 10 per cent in 1961 (both German and Italian had grown less than 10.0 per cent in 1960). Italian, which had had a rate of growth of less than 5.0 per cent in both 1959 and in 1960, gained a surprising 12.0 per cent in 1961 and had the fourth largest rate of growth, ahead of both German and Russian. Russian, which dropped from a 56.5 per cent increase in 1959 to a 10.7 per cent increase in 1960, gained slightly in 1961 to 10.9 per cent increase, but nevertheless fell from its standing as fourth largest growing language in 1960 to sixth in 1961. German, which increased its growth rate from 9.1 per cent in 1960 to 11.7 per cent in 1961, held fifth place in both years.

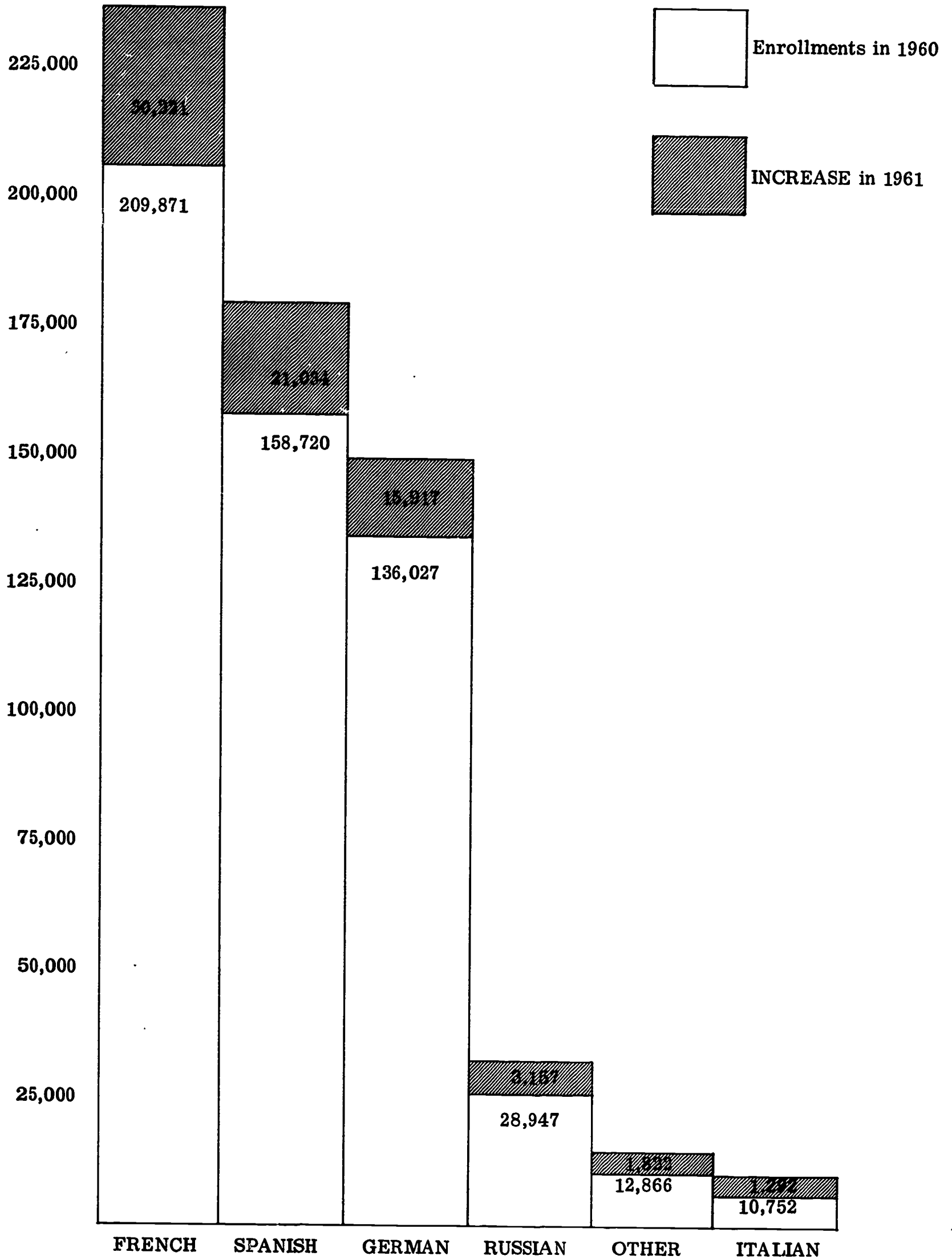
For both 1960 and 1961 the largest enrollments were in French, Spanish, and German, in that order, followed by Russian and Italian.

Very little fluctuation from 1960 to 1961 can be noted in the per cents which the enrollment in each language represented of the total modern foreign language enrollment. The per cents of French and of Spanish were slightly higher in 1961 than they had been in 1960, the per cents of German, of Italian, and of Russian were slightly lower, and the per cent of "other" languages was exactly the same.

The per cents of increase in each language of the total modern foreign language increase are less stable, and perhaps more indicative of the relative interest being shown in each language in colleges and universities. In both years, both the largest enrollments and the highest numerical increases were in French, but whereas in 1960 French contributed 42.4 per cent of the total increase in modern foreign language enrollments, its contribution to the total increase fell to 41.1 in 1961. The contribution of Spanish to the total modern foreign language increase was 0.1 per cent less in 1961 than it had been in 1960, and that of Russian was 0.4 per cent less. Italian and German were the only languages of which the contribution to the total increase in 1961 was greater than it had been in 1960. German's contribution rose from 19.1 per cent to 21.7 per cent. Italian's share of the total increase more than doubled in 1961, rising to 1.7 per cent from 0.8 per cent in 1960.

Although the other modern foreign languages as a group accounted for the same per cent (2.4) of the total modern foreign language enrollment in both years, not only did their rate of growth drop, as noted above, but also the increase in "other" language enrollments, which had comprised 4.2 per cent of the total increase in 1960, were only 2.5 per cent of the total increase in 1961.

III. COVERAGE

Questionnaires were sent to the 1,496 institutions for which names and addresses were supplied by the U.S. Office of Education. After 4 mailings and telephone calls to late respondents 100 per cent returns were received, of which 1,226 (or 82 per cent) taught modern foreign languages in Fall 1961. No modern foreign languages were taught in 270 institutions (18 per cent), mostly technical and specialized.

The present report gives Fall 1961 modern foreign language enrollments in 1,226 colleges and universities in 50 states and the District of Columbia. Each college is listed individually in TABLE VII and the state total data for all institutions surveyed (specified as Totals B in TABLE VII) are given in statistical TABLES IV AND VI.

Since 1,184 institutions³ were covered in a similar report for Fall 1960, state totals for these previously surveyed institutions (specified as Totals A) are separated in TABLE VII from the state totals which include all institutions surveyed in 1961. The statistical TABLES I, II, III, AND V use Totals A as a basis for comparison with 1960 data.⁴

IV. STATISTICAL TABLES

TABLE I summarizes the total student enrollments and enrollments in modern foreign languages in the previously surveyed 1,184 colleges and universities of all states and the District of Columbia in Fall 1960 and in Fall 1961. Additionally, the per cents of increase from 1959 to 1960 and from 1960 to 1961 are given for each state in each category.

The per cent of increase in modern foreign language enrollments was larger in 1961 than the per cent of increase in institutional enrollments in all states but five (Delaware, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nevada, and Virginia). Thirty-four states and the District of Columbia showed a larger per cent of increase in modern foreign language enrollments in 1961 than in 1960, one state (Tennessee) showed the same per cent of increase for both years, and 15 states showed a smaller per cent of increase in 1961 than in 1960 (Alabama, Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Idaho, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Washington). This showing is in marked contrast to the overall picture in 1960 when only 20 states showed a larger increase than in 1959, while 30 states and the District of Columbia showed a decrease from 1959.

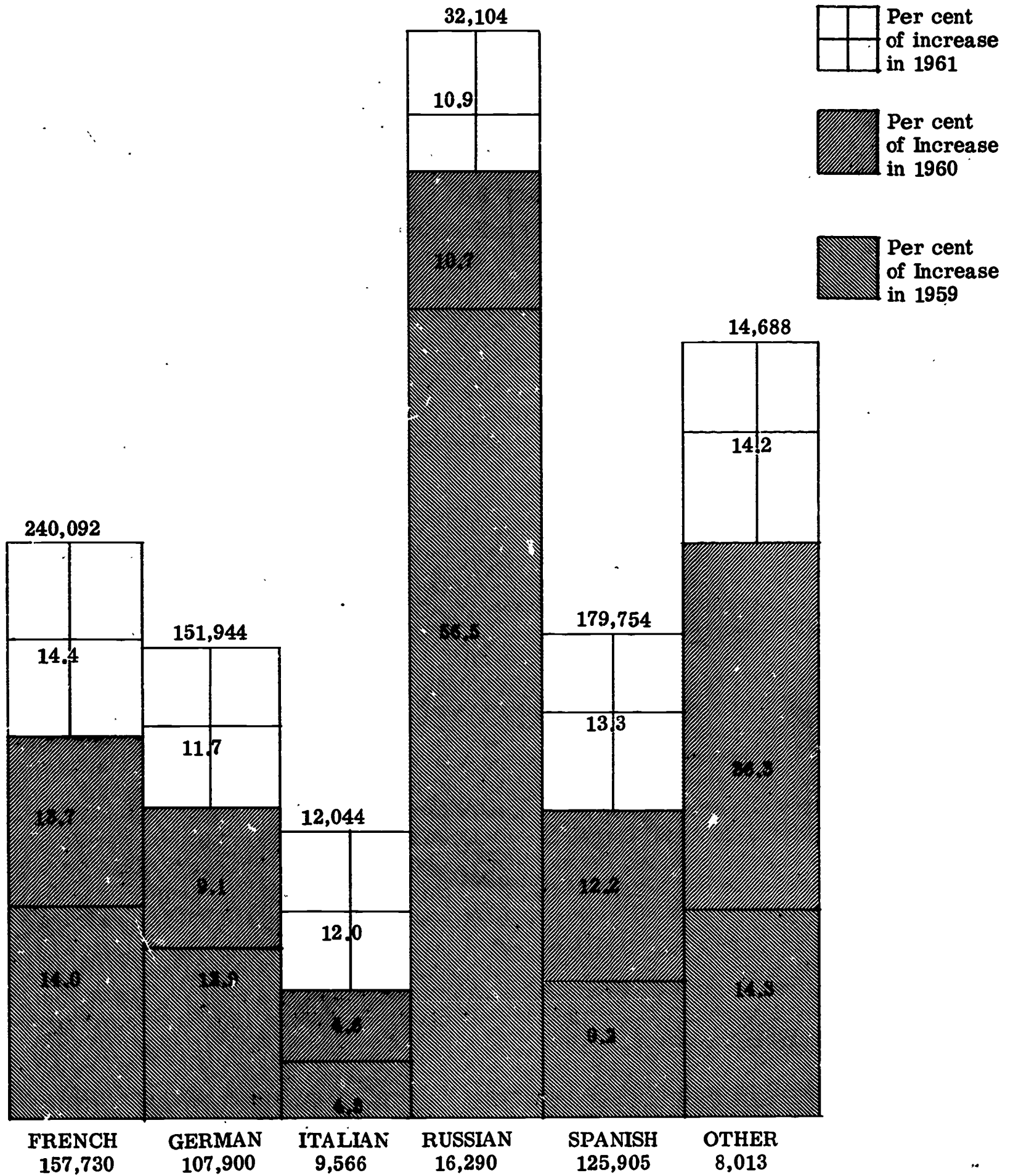
TABLE II gives a state-by-state summary of the numbers and per cents of change in enrollment in each language from 1959 to 1960 and from 1960 to 1961 over enrollments in the same language in the previous year.

Data on Rate of Growth in Each Language, Fall 1961 (see Graph B). French enrollment increased by more than 20 per cent over 1960 enrollments in 14 states (Hawaii,

Nevada, Arizona, South Dakota, Montana, Utah, New Mexico, Florida, Alaska, Kansas, Louisiana, North Dakota, Wyoming, and Mississippi).⁵ No state reported a decrease.

The rate of growth in German was an increase of more than 20 per cent in 14 states (Wyoming, Arkansas, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, North Carolina, Hawaii, Colorado, Nevada, Delaware, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Iowa, and Maryland). Only the District of Columbia reported a decrease.

An increase of more than 20 per cent in rate of growth of enrollments in Italian was reported by 16 states (Alabama, Tennessee, Utah, Maine, Oregon, Colorado, Florida, Arizona, Iowa, Texas, Minnesota, West Virginia, Montana, Mississippi, New Jersey, and California). A decrease in the rate of growth of Italian occurred in 15 states (Ohio, Illinois, Oklahoma, Massachusetts, Georgia, Louisiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Nevada, New Hampshire, Virginia, Missouri, Hawaii, North Carolina, and Delaware)⁶. No change in enrollment occurred in Vermont and Washington, and no enrollment was reported for 6 states (Alaska, Arkansas, Idaho, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming).

Russian enrollment was reported in 1961 in every state but Arkansas. An increase of at least 20 per cent in the rate of growth of Russian enrollments was reported by 12 states (Alaska, Tennessee, South Carolina, Colorado, Ohio, Wyoming, Florida, North Carolina, Indiana, New Jersey, Illinois, and Oklahoma). A decrease was reported by 13 states (Missouri, Nebraska, Georgia, Iowa, Louisiana, Delaware, Hawaii, Massachusetts, North Dakota, New Mexico, West Virginia, Virginia, and Idaho).

Though Russian enrollments are now increasing at a lower rate than the other four languages, its 10.9 per cent increase over 1960 is slightly higher than the increase of 1960 over 1959 (10.7). The exciting gains in Russian enrollment in 1959 (56.5 per cent over 1958), which became stabilized in 1960, give promise in 1961 of becoming a permanent feature of college language study in the United States.

With the addition of Spanish to the modern foreign language curriculum at the University of Alaska in 1961, it is now taught in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Only 3 states (Massachusetts, Delaware, and Maine) reported a decrease in the rate of growth of Spanish enrollments, while 20 states reported an increase of more than 20 per cent (Arkansas, Wyoming, Rhode Island, Arizona, Kansas, Idaho, Nevada, Iowa, South Carolina, Nebraska, Kentucky, New Hampshire, Oregon, Mississippi, Utah, New Jersey, Montana, New Mexico, Connecticut, and Hawaii).

Enrollments in "Other" languages were reported for 3 states (Alaska, Georgia, and Rhode Island) which reported no such enrollments in 1960. In 16 states increase of at least 20 per cent in the rate of growth of these languages was reported (Florida, Tennessee, Utah, South Dakota, Indiana, Kentucky, Texas, Oregon, West Virginia, Colorado, North Dakota, Nebraska, Hawaii, California, Massachusetts, and Washington). A decrease in the rate of growth of these languages was reported by 10 states (Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, Maryland, Missouri, Iowa, Oklahoma, and Minnesota), while 4 states which had some enrollments in these languages in 1960 reported none in 1961 (Delaware, Montana, New Mexico, and South Carolina). No change occurred in the rate of growth of these enrollments in Alabama, and 9 states reported no such enrollments either year (Arkansas, Idaho, Maine, Mississippi, Nevada, New Hampshire, Vermont, Virginia, and Wyoming).

TABLE III presents a state-by-state summary to show what per cent of the total increase in modern foreign language enrollments was contributed by increased (or decreased) enrollments in each language, 1959 to 1960 and 1960 to 1961. A summation of the national per cents from TABLE III is given in Chart B (Columns 9 and 10), Section II of this report.

TABLE IV gives a state-by-state summary of the per cent of enrollments in each language out of the total modern foreign language enrollments for all institutions in 1961. All figures of enrollments on this table are the same as Totals B throughout TABLE VII.

A comparison listing of per cents of enrollment in each language based on national Total A (for 1,184 institutions) and of per cents based on national Total B (for 1,226 institutions) is given below:

Only in German and Spanish do the per cents based on national Total A vary from those based on national Total B, and only by .1 per cent in each language.

TABLE V presents a state by state summary of the data given for each of the 1,184 institutions recorded in TABLE VII (Totals A) and the breakdown of institutional, total modern foreign language, and individual language enrollments into undergraduate, graduate, and "special and unclassified" enrollments. The national totals for 1960 and 1961, and the increase in enrollments from 1960 to 1961, are given in Chart C below. These figures show that French, Spanish, and German, in that order, had the highest increase in enrollments at each level of study. One of the most encouraging increases appearing on Chart C is that of 862 for graduate enrollments in "other" languages. This number is more than double the increase in 1960 (415) in the same category.

TABLE VI, which presents data similar to those in TABLE V, is based on the totals for all institutions surveyed in 1961 (Totals B in TABLE VII). Although the data reported by the 42 additional institutions result in numerical changes, they do not differ sufficiently from the comparative totals (Totals A) to affect the picture of the growth of modern foreign languages as it emerges from TABLES I, II, III, and V.

V. OTHER LANGUAGES

Enrollments in other languages in Fall 1961 reported by colleges previously surveyed totaled 14,688, as compared with 12,866 for the same institutional group in Fall 1960, an increase of 14.2 per cent.⁷ If enrollments reported by institutions surveyed for the first time in 1961 are added, the enrollments in Fall 1961 were even higher, 15,176. Of the hundred or so neglected languages now considered to be critically needed, enrollments were reported in 70 for Fall 1961.

About a third of the totals for "other" languages each year have been enrollments in modern Hebrew, concentrated in a few schools in which Hebrew is either a required or predominant part of the curriculum. This means that the figures to be distributed among the many other critically needed languages are actually fewer than the totals may suggest. Nearly half the languages are taught at only one or two institutions and to individuals or to extremely small classes of students.

Chinese had by far the largest enrollment of the remaining critically needed languages in 1961 (2,200), and was followed by only two other languages with enrollments of more than 1,000: Japanese (1,976) and Portuguese (1,307). Norwegian, Arabic, Polish, and Swedish each had 1961 enrollments of more than 500, and Modern Greek, Czech, Korean, Hindi, Serbo-Croatian, Dutch, and Turkish each had more than 100 enrollments. Most of the other languages show 1961 enrollment figures well below 100.

Five languages, for which enrollments were reported in 1960, had no enrollments reported in 1961 (Indonesian Bahasa, Lettish, Malay, Tagalog, and Twi). Sixteen languages, which may have been offered, but not taught, in 1960, were reported as having enrollments in Fall 1961: Bambara, Creole (African), Egyptian, Eskimo, Gafat, Geez, Gurage, Harari, Ibo, Ilocano, Kpelle, Kurdish, Mayan, Nepah, Nepali, and Tigrinya. A preponderance of African languages may be noted among the new additions to curricula.

The following table of numbers and per cents of increase in critically needed language enrollments shows that the 14,688 enrollments in 1961 were 1,822 more than enrollments in 1960, an increase of 14.2 per cent.⁸ The largest increase was in graduate enrollments, which went from 2,049 in 1960 to 2,911 in 1961. The 1961 increase of 862 in graduate enrollments is undoubtedly a reflection of the interest shown by the NDEA in these languages.

VI. DATA ON PUERTO RICO

Four institutions of higher learning in Puerto Rico were also surveyed: Catholic University of Puerto Rico, Ponce, Interamerican University of Puerto Rico, San Germán, University of Puerto Rico, Río Piedras, and College of the Sacred Heart, Santurce. The information received from them in the past three years is summed up in the chart below. (No information was available from Puerto Rico at the time of publication of the 1960 survey.) Neither Spanish, which is not a foreign language in Puerto Rico, nor English, which is taught as a foreign language, has been included.

The overall picture indicates that both institutional and modern foreign language enrollments have increased since 1959, with French accounting for the largest segment of enrollment in each year. German and Russian steadily increased each year. Italian steadily decreased each year. The "other" language taught was Portuguese, in which the Fall 1961 enrollment was more than three times larger than that of 1959.

VII. CORRECTED AND VARIANT DATA FOR FALL 1960

Corrected data for Fall 1960 are published in this report for the states of Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Utah, and Washington. The correction in Massachusetts was due to a duplication of modern foreign language enrollment figures for Radcliffe College in the report for Harvard University; in Pennsylvania, to the erroneous addition of 1,000 to the institutional enrollment of State Teachers College at California, Pa.; in Utah, to a duplication of 1,700 in the institutional enrollment of the University of Utah; and in Washington, to the erroneous addition of 1,000 to the French enrollment of the University of Washington. These errors came to our attention only after the 1960 report had been published. The corrected 1960 figures for each state concerned and for the USA totals are published here.

The only one of the above deletions which seriously affects the per cent of change in total enrollments is Central State College in Oklahoma (with its enrollment of over 4,000) which caused an apparent decrease in the total college population of Oklahoma.

Other variant data which do not affect the national totals are the deletion of Flora Macdonald College from the North Carolina listings and the substitution of St. Andrews Presbyterian College, into which Flora Macdonald was incorporated, and the change in the name and address of Washington Missionary College, which formerly was listed in the District of Columbia, but which is now listed as Columbia Union College in Maryland. This change caused an apparent decrease in the total college population of the District of Columbia.

VIII. COMPARABILITY OF DATA FOR FALL 1960 AND FOR FALL 1961

All figures for Fall 1960 enrollments published here are taken from the totals for all institutions surveyed (TABLE VI of the published Fall 1960 report), except for corrections noted above.

All figures and per cents of increase or decrease from Fall 1959 to Fall 1960 are based on the 1,039 institutions for which comparable data were available in both years for publication in the Fall 1960 report. In the present report, such figures and per cents were used in TABLE I, columns 3 and 7; TABLE II, columns 1,2; 5,6; 9,10; 13,14; 17,18; and 21,22; and the odd-numbered columns of TABLE III.

All figures and per cents of increase or decrease from Fall 1960 to Fall 1961 are based on the 1,184 institutions for which comparable data were available in both years.

In all cases, the numbers and per cents of increase or decrease published here were computed on the basis of comparable figures for a comparable number of institutions for the years concerned.

IX. SURVEY TABLES

TABLE VII covers all institutions of higher learning surveyed and records, by state and by institution, the Fall 1961 enrollments, the enrollments in modern foreign languages, and the enrollments reported for each of the five most commonly taught languages and for the languages grouped under "Other MFL." In each state where the distinction is applicable, the institutions surveyed in the report for 1960 are listed first and the data are summed up in Totals A; institutions reported for the first time are listed next; the data for them are added to Totals A, and state totals for all institutions surveyed are listed under Totals B.

TABLE VIII lists all the institutions which reported enrollments in modern foreign languages in extension courses. The figures given in TABLE VIII are not included in TABLES I-VII or in the Addendum.
