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ABSTRACT

Information for a survey of courses in Afro-American studies offered in New York State's colleges and universities was obtained from institutions containing 98% of the state's full-time enrollment. Nearly half of the institutions offered either graduate or undergraduate courses in Afro-American studies. Four-year institutions more often offered courses than 2 year ones. The majority of courses were at the undergraduate level. In 1968-69 almost all of the courses were degree-credit. Many of the institutions, especially the 2 year ones, planned to initiate or expand their course offerings in Afro-American studies. Enrollment in these studies represented 5% of the total full-time undergraduate enrollment of the institutions at which these courses were given. Graduate enrollment represents 4.5% of the total full-time enrollment at these institutions. Courses in Afro-American studies and enrollment in these courses was closely related to the institution's proximity to large metropolitan areas. In 1968-69 approximately 27.2% of the instructors in the courses were non-white. Most were new at their institution and most had had some special training. (AF)

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## INTRODUCTION

In May of 1969, at the request of the Office of Higher and Professional Education, a survey of Afro-American studies in New York State's colleges and universities was undertaken by the Information Center on Education. This report presents the results of that survey which included both actual course offerings in 1968-69 and those planned for the 1969-70 academic year. In addition to statistical information, a catalog of institutions which offer courses in Afro-American studies is also presented.

In general, the response to the questionnaire was excellent. The Office of Institutional Research of the State University of New York submitted reports for all units of SUNY. Reports were received from 54 percent (7 of 13) of City University's four-year colleges. Of the 134 private colleges and universities in New York State, 124 schools (containing 83 percent of the private full-time enrollment in the State) replied to the questionnaire.

Of the colleges that did not return a completed questionnaire, the larger ones were contacted by telephone to obtain general information usable in at least part of the report. Therefore, information contained in tables 1, 2 and 3 is based on responses from New York State colleges which contain 98 percent of the State's full-time enrollment; data contained in tables 4 through 7 are based on responses from colleges which contain 88 percent of the State's full-time enrollment.

In general, then, the data presented here represent an accurate description of the status of Afro-American studies courses in the colleges and universities of New York State.

## SUMMARY\*

Institutions Offering Courses

Tables 1 and 2 present data (for 1968-69 and 1969-70) relative to the number and percent of institutions which offer courses in Afro-American studies at the undergraduate and graduate levels, respectively. Table 3 presents the same information as an unduplicated count of institutions for both levels combined.

With reference to table 3, nearly half (105) of the institutions of higher education in New York State offered either graduate or undergraduate courses in Afro-American studies in the 1968-69 school year; these institutions contained 67.2 percent of the total 1968-69 full-time enrollment in New York State. In the 1969-70 school year the number and percent of institutions offering such courses will increase and as a consequence, the percent of the 1969-70 total State enrollment contained in institutions offering such courses will no doubt similarly increase.

Four-year and two-year institutions differed slightly in terms of the percent of institutions offering Afro-American study courses. In 1968-69, approximately 55 percent of the four-year colleges offered courses in Afro-American studies; these colleges represented 71 percent of total full-time enrollment for four-year colleges. Of all two-year colleges, 34.4 percent reported that they offered Afro-American study courses, and these represented 51.4 percent of the total full-time enrollment in two-year colleges.

As shown in tables 1 and 2 the majority of courses offered in Afro-American studies were offered on the undergraduate level. In 1968-69, undergraduate courses were offered by 46.6 percent of all colleges in the State,

both four-year and two-year, while graduate courses were offered by 19.6 percent of New York State colleges having graduate programs.

Although all types of colleges in New York State (four-year or two-year, public or private) will show an increase in the number and percent offering courses in Afro-American studies in 1969-70, the type showing the most notable increase will be two-year public (community) colleges.

### Degree-Credit Courses

The number of courses offered in Afro-American studies, as well as the number and percent that are degree-credit courses, are shown in tables 4, 5 and 6. Table 4 presents such information for the undergraduate level, table 5 for the graduate level and table 6 for undergraduate and graduate combined. Data are presented for 1968-69 and 1969-70.

Very nearly all courses offered in Afro-American studies were degree-credit courses in 1968-69. All graduate courses offered for 1968-69 and planned for 1969-70 were or will be degree-credit; similarly, 97.3 percent of undergraduate courses for 1968-69 and 98.8 percent for 1969-70 were or will be offered for degree-credit.

In conjunction with the projected increase in the total number of institutions that will be offering Afro-American study courses in 1969-70, there is a corresponding projected increase in the total number of courses that will be offered. In 1968-69, there were 395 courses offered in Afro-American studies (of which 338 were undergraduate) and, in 1969-70, it is anticipated that at least 518 courses will be offered of which 452 will be undergraduate.

It should also be noted that New York University offered an entire degree program in Afro-American studies on the undergraduate level and that



several other large universities offered degree-credit courses in Afro-American studies in a number of their academic disciplines.\*

### Enrollment

Table 7 presents 1968-69 enrollment for courses in Afro-American studies by level and type of institution. Enrollment data are shown for the most recent semester in which the course was offered.

Enrollment in undergraduate Afro-American studies courses represented 5.0 percent of the total full-time undergraduate enrollment in institutions offering such courses. Graduate enrollment in Afro-American study courses represented 4.5 percent of total full-time graduate enrollment in institutions offering courses.

In 1968-69, there were 10,235 students enrolled in Afro-American study courses in four-year colleges as compared to 2,759 enrolled at the two-year or junior college level. Undergraduate enrollment in Afro-American study courses accounted for 93.3 percent of the total enrollment in such courses.

The majority of the enrollment in Afro-American study courses was in large universities with diverse academic programs. A number of smaller colleges did offer Afro-American study courses, but the number of students per course was considerably lower in the smaller colleges than in the larger universities. The average enrollment in Afro-American study courses across the State was 33. This average was based on the total enrollment in Afro-American study courses divided by the total number of courses offered.

The total number of Afro-American study courses offered and the total enrollment in these courses was highly related to the college's proximity to large metropolitan centers. For example, a large portion of the Afro-American study courses offered were in schools located in or near New York City. All degree-credit courses were offered in or near large metropolitan areas.

#### Instructors in Afro-American Studies

Data on instructors for courses in Afro-American studies are contained in tables 8 (1968-69) and 9 (1969-70). The percentages reported in table 9 are based on information about the instructors for approximately 75 percent of the Afro-American study courses that will be offered by colleges in 1969-70. At the time data were collected, the reporting colleges had not yet identified the instructors for about 25 percent of the courses they planned to offer.

Ethnic Origin: In 1969-70, a slightly larger percentage of the instructors for Afro-American study courses will be nonwhite as compared to 1968-69 (29.5 percent nonwhite in 1969-70; 27.2 percent in 1968-69). Most of the change will occur in the category "negro", which accounted for 23.6 percent of the instructors in 1968-69 and will account for 26.4 percent in 1969-70. Almost all types of institutions will have a larger proportion of nonwhite instructors in Afro-American studies courses in 1969-70, but the largest increases will occur in private four-year and public two-year institutions.

Degree Status: Instructors in Afro-American studies in 1969-70 will, in general, have a slightly higher degree status than in 1968-69. The percentage of instructors holding doctoral degrees will increase from 55.9 percent (1968-69) to 58.5 percent (1969-70), with corresponding decreases in the lower degree categories of bachelors and masters degrees. On the whole, public institutions reported a greater increase in the proportion of Afro-American instructors with doctorates than did private institutions.

Years Experience at Institution: A substantial majority of Afro-American instructors were new, or relatively new, at their institution in 1968-69. A large proportion (72.5 percent) had been at their institution 5 years or less in 1968-69; more than one-third (33.8 percent) were in their first year at the institution. Data for 1969-70 indicate that the characteristic "newness" of Afro-American study instructors will continue and increase slightly. More than three-quarters (75.8 percent) of the instructors will have been at their institutions 5 years or less in 1969-70, and the proportion in their first year at their institution will increase to 35.7 percent.

Training\*: Well over half (62.1 percent) of the Afro-American study instructors in 1968-69 had special training for teaching such courses. In 1969-70, the proportion of Afro-American study instructors having special training will increase to 68.7 percent.

Analysis of individual institutional responses to the survey (not shown in the tables) indicated that instructors who had special training for teaching Afro-American study courses tended to be those with fewer years of experience at their institution. There was a much higher incidence of special training among instructors who had been at their institutions five years or less than among those who had been employed at their institution for six years or more.
