

#### ABSTRACT

To identify current program characteristics, the Boards of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) in New York State sent a questionnaire to the administrators of 57 BOCES programs. The questionnaire sought basic enrollment data pertaining to occupational education programs in agriculture, distribution, health, home economics (gainful), office, technical, and trade and industry. Data from 43 returned questionnaires revealed that secondary enrollment ranged from 23 to 1,275 students and that courses offered ranged from one to seven occupational fields, with two programs training students only in one field and three programs offering courses in all seven. The enrollment of 23 adult programs ranged from 8 to 357 students, with from one to four courses being offered. In addition to enrollment, selected characteristics were identified regarding component and noncomponent school districts and courses offered at the secondary level. The questionnaire is appended. #### FOREWORD

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The establishment of Boards of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) has mushroomed within the past several years and an accurate evaluation of the situation or comprehensive picture of the status of such boards has been neglected. This publication attempts to update the material presented by the New York State School Boards Association, Inc., in their 1961 publication SHARED SERVICES BOARDS, and present under one cover what the shared services boards of the State look like, what they are doing, and how they have developed through 1969. The reader should note that the BOCES support many areas of education; the primary focus is on the area of occupational education.

The State Education Department recognizes the need for information pertaining to the BOCES as they existed in 1969. The State has become increasingly cognizant of the vital role that vocational education, one of the possible shared services, plays in meeting the needs of youth and adults, thereby, contributing to the most efficient use of the State's major resource--manpower. Some high schools are meeting some of the vocational-technical education demands in particular areas. However, the majority of high schools are unable to meet the demands of the ever-changing, multifaceted technology fields this age demands. The sheer numbers of different possible vocational programs is overwhelming. The multitudinous courses demanded, the long term needs vs. short term demands, variability within a single program, the inordinate cost vs. extent of usage of equipment, and the burden of expensive payrolls for qualified trained personnel places an extensive financial drain on the resources of the local education-The Education Department for over 18 years has espoused the



need for shared services.

The publication, Education for Occupations, Grass Roots Thoughts and Beliefs in New York State (2) stated: "A very definite need for the expansion of occupational education exists in New York State."

This study further attested to the need for increased shared services by the following findings:

- 1. Nationwide and State trends indicate a continuing need for development of higher skill and technological knowledge competencies among the work force.
- 2. Statements by employers and unions in the area studies certify that persons with vocational-technical skills needed in the work force are in short supply.
- 3. The multiple area studies confirm that many present school programs are inadequate in providing needed salable skills.
- 4. Opinions by professional educators indicate that the educational system should be expanded to include, to a greater extent, occupationally related knowledge, skills training, and education while in high school.
- 5. There are indications of strong student interest in taking vocational-technical programs related to employment goals and the needs of industry.
- 6. There is substantial agreement on the part of parents with their children's choice of courses and occupations, with definite expression of parents' interest in occupational courses.

A sizable increase in occupational education is called for in the years ahead. With this expansion it is vital that a concept of flexibility in programs be taken into consideration. In this way, provision will be made for the wide range of abilities and needs of students and trainees at the present time and allow for future needs, determined by the ever-changing job picture.

The past 5 years have seen a revolution and tremendous growth in the area of shared services. In 1959-60, 10 county vocational education



and extension boards (VEEB) were in existence (several were inactive), and 29 boards of cooperative educational services reported offering one or more vocational courses. Several BOCES were listed or approved by the State (3) but never materialized as functioning operations. The phasing out of the VEEB programs and the establishment of the BOCES programs have accelerated (Nassau VEEB was the only one in existence during 1968 and its since 1965. services were in the process of change.) A total of 23 BOCES programs (13 new) were approved for operation in 1965, 36 for 1966, 52 for 1967, and 57 for 1968. Since the passage of the Vocational Education Act of 1963 the rapid advancement of the shared services programs has been marked by growing pains, as displayed by the number of changes and innovations, which are characteristic of any rapid advancement. The purpose of this report is to answer the need for an accurate "still picture" of a rapidly expanding service. It should serve as a benchmark, or be viewed as a coordinated report of data gathered from multiple sources in reference to the history and the current progress of New York State Boards of Cooperative Educational Services.

Another purpose of this report is to increase the availability and to facilitate the use of BOCES information from the varied sources by the educator and the layman.

This publication, through a series of tables, will indicate the status of area occupational education shared programs in New York State during the 1968-69 school year. The tables identify selected characteristics of the programs regarding component and noncomponent districts, secondary and adult enrollment, and courses offered at the secondary level.



#### II. DEFINITION OF TERMS

The following definitions will be used in the text of this report.

Occupational field -- any one of seven clusters of recognized occupations,

i.e., agriculture, distribution, health, home economics, office, technical,

trade and industry.

Occupational education -- a program of instruction, services, or activities related to preparation for gainful employment in an occupational field where employment opportunities are available or anticipated.

Occupational education area -- a school district or combination of districts with sufficient resources to provide a complete and comprehensive program of occupational education.

Area occupational education program -- a program of vocational education, primarily but not exclusively at the secondary level, provided within the limits of an occupational education area.

Component -- a school district that is an official member of a Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

Noncomponent -- a school district that is not a member of a Board of Cooperative Educational Services but may cooperate with such a board and may contract to buy needed services from them.



#### III, HISTORY

New York State assumed a leadership role in implementing the concept of occupational education and shared vocational services. The greatest growth has taken place since 1963. Vocational education and related services were, and are, greatly dependent on the financial assistance of the Federal Government.

The utilization of the country's talent and efforts to meet manpower needs are the principal stimulants to an increased program.

New York State

Historical sketch--

1909 - General Assembly of New York established a system of State-aided local public schools engaged in the study of agriculture, mechanical arts, and homemaking. Administered by the State Board of Education and the local school boards.

#### Federal Legislation

- 1862 Morrill Act signed by President Lincoln provided land to endow, support, and maintain colleges to provide both a liberal and practical education. (Agriculture and mechanics)
- 1901 Federal aid to industrial institutes with state charters,
- 1909 Davis Bill for vocational education led to the establishment of the Commission on National Education to determine needs, kinds, conditions of existing facilities, numbers and types of teacher training institutions. This comprehensive review led to the 1917 Smith-Hughes Act, Public Law 347, 64th Congress, signed into law February 23 by President Wilson provided;
  - 1. the establishment of the Federal Board for Vocational Education;
  - 2. Federal aid to states for the promotion of vocational education

in agriculture, trade and industrial education, and home economics.

1910 - National Society for the promotion of Industrial Education.

1927 - County Vocational Education and Extension Boards were allowed to be established by the Board of Supervisors or under sections 1101-06, Education Laws of New York State, for the purpose of giving instruction in Vocational Agriculture, Home Economics, and other special subjects approved by the Commissioner of Education (VEEB).

- 1929 George-Reed Act, Public Law 702, 70th Congress, approved February 5, provided Federal aid for 5 years to states for the advancement of agriculture and home economics.
- 1934 George-Ellzey Act, Public Law 245, 73rd Congress, extended the act of 1929 for 3 years and added provisions for home economics and trade and technical education.
- 1937 George-Dean Act, P.L. 673, 74th Congress, became effective July 1, 1937. Increased funds on a continuing basis and included distributive education. Allotments were made according to the state population base.

President Roosevelt signed this act into law very reluctantly. He established the Advisory Committee on Vocational Education. Floyd Reeves, named as chairman, and the 24 members of his committee were charged to prepare studies on the various aspects of education.

1948 - Intermediate District Law, Section 1958 of the Education Law, allowed the establishment of the Boards of `Joperative Educational Services (BOCES) "...to serve as an interim step, leading to the establishment of intermediate districts."

1964 - January 23, Senator Brydges introduced Print. 1814, Intro. 1779, Article 40 of the Education Law, which proposed the repeal of the present section and provided for the formation of intermediate school districts and the establishment of BOCES pending formation of such districts. Provisions for intermediate school districts were

#### Federal Legislation

The committee suggested (1) the need for law revisions to allow greater flexibility, and (2) no increase in Federal funds to vocational education until an increase was made in the area of general education.

- 1946 George-Barden Act, P.L. 586,
  79th Congress, amended the GeorgeDean Act. It was more flexible with
  regard to administration, although
  guidance, teacher training, and
  salary funds were used for these
  purposes. Restricted the use of
  funds tor equipment to not more than
  10 percent of the cost effective
  June 30, 1951.
- 1958 National Defense Education act, P.L. 85-864, 85th Congress, supported for 4 years the training of technicians in occupations necessary to national defense and security only.
- 1961 Area Redevelopment Act, P.L. 87-27, 87th Congress, supplied funds to states each year until 1965. Authorized the use of monies for vocational education for unemployed and underemployed persons in areas designated as redevelopment areas by the Secretary of Commerce.
- 1962 Manpower Development and Training Act, P.L. 87-415, 87th Congress, authorized a total of \$419 million for the following 3 years.
- 1963 Vocational Education Act, P.L. 88-210, 88th Congress, provided:
  - extension of present programs and development of new programs;
  - 2. encouragement of research and
     experimentation;
  - 3. funds for work-study programs;
  - 4. for amendment of the Smith-Hughes, George-Barden, and the NDEA Acts;



considered obsolete and the new article preserved provisions for shared educational services.

Section 1950, Establishment of BOCES. Section 1951, Establishment of technology education. This repeal was never passed into law.

The New York State Education Department, in cooperation with local school districts and other agencies, attempted to define these needs through a series of multicounty studies. (3)

In April a memorandum filed with Assembly Bill, Intro. 4334, Print Number 6063 was entitled: "An Act to Amend the Education Law in Relation to the Construction of Area Vocational Education School Facilities (ACCES)." This bill proposed to amend the law to authorize BOCES to finance construction of noncity school district facilities through the Dormitory Authority, without approval of voters of the school district. The proposed legislation was disapproved by Nelson A. Rockefeller with the consent of his advisors.

- 1967 Chapter 795 of the Laws of 1967, signed by Governor Rockefeller provided:
  - BOCES, upon authorization by the qualified voters, to purchase or acquire buildings and sites in which to operate.
  - 2. the change of allocation of administrative expenses from the component districts from a valuation basis to a weighted average daily attendance of the pupils residing in such districts, and continues the contractual arrangements made by BOCES and local boards.

#### Federal Legislation

- 5. that after 1965, funds would be on a matched dollar basis.
- 6. one-third of each state's annual allotment prior to July 1, 1968, and 25 percent thereafter, must be used for youth who have left school, and/or for the construction of area schools.

The State plan must provide for cooperative arrangement with State public employment offices for occupational information regarding placement opportunities. This law provided funds (on a 50-50 matching basis with states) for the renovation and/or construction of area occupational facilities to meet local community needs for vocational training of both youth and adults.



- 3. authorization of BOCES to enter into contracts with other educational agencies in relation to educational programs.
- 4. the BOCES formula for State aid is revised in the following manner:
  - a. the local contribution is revised.
  - b. basis for State aid for professional personnel is raised from \$6,000 per annum to \$8,500.
  - c. cost of school facilities are no longer subject to the 10 percent limitation of total expenditures in the BOCES formula.
  - d. any State aid apportionment shall not be less than the apportionment applicable to BOCES budget 1967-68 school year. A Proportionate reduction is possible when BOCES expenditures for a district is less than those in the 1966-67 school year.
  - e. special State aid is deducted from BOCES expenses before calculating new State aid to the board.
  - 5. the Public Authorities Law is amended to authorize the Dormitory Authority to construct facilities for BOCES.

The legislation also spelled out in detail many procedural and operational provisions, including budgeting and allocation of expenses; submission of propositions for acquisitions of sites and building; financing by the Dormitory Authority; leasing of existing facilities; tax exemption; and contracts. This law included all of the sections which were defeated in the ACCES proposal but omitted the proportionate voting contained in that bill. The existing authority of the boards was continued. (4)



#### Federal Legislation

1968 - Title I of the Vocational Education Amendment of 1968 is designed to assist the education commissioner in breaking down the barriers between the academic, general, and vocational curriculums, so that no young person will be denied the opportunity to prepare himself for an occupation best suited to the utilization of his individual talents. This legislation introduces a great deal more flexibility into the law, and is a consolidation of the previous legislation.

Part A - creates a National Advisory Council on Vocational Education

- 1. Establishment of a State Advisory Council in every state
- 2. \$355 million for fiscal year 1969

Part B - State must provide a detailed annual program specifying how the allocations are being utilized. The state must provide a long-range plan and progress reports as to its status each year.

Part E - Authorizes funds for planning, constructing, and operating vocational education schools and dorms.

Part G specifically authorizes in millions:

\$20 for 1969

\$35 for 1970

\$50 for 1971

\$75 for 1972

in assistance to states to expand cooperative vocational education programs by providing financial assistance for personnel to coordinate such programs and to provide instruction related to work experience.



#### IV. PURPOSES OF BOARDS OF COOPERATIVE EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Section 1958 of the Education Law provides for the establishment of boards of cooperative educational services pending the creation of intermediate districts. There were several main purposes for the establishment of cooperative boards. Experience has modified some original purposes and added others. The main purpose of the boards of cooperative educational services are:

- 1. To appoint a district superintendent of schools.
- 2. To operate the supervisory district educational program and to prepare a budget to finance that program.
- 3. To make available on request cooperative part-time educational services to school districts too small to employ full-time teachers in a certain educational area.
- 4. To make available on request, under certain conditions, cooperative part-time educational services supplemental to local staff to provide adequate staffing and services.
- 5. To coordinate and administer surveys and research projects to determine the need for cooperative services and the manner of improvement of educational opportunities in supervisory districts.
- 6. To introduce new cooperative service to meet the needs determined from surveys and studies.
- 7. To develop and operate area programs in vocational and technical education.



- 8. To assist in the development, coordination, and operation of area programs for the physically handicapped and mentally retarded.
- 9. To provide means of communication between and among teachers, administrators, and boards of education to the end that educational practices be improved.
- 10. To provide administrative and supervisory service on an area-wide basis as a responsibility of the supervisory district program to improve the quality of education in the schools of the supervisory district.



- V. GENERAL CRITERIA FOR THE OPERATION OF BOARDS OF COOPERATIVE EDUCATIONAL SERVICES
  - 1. Service must be on a truly shared basis. A service rendered to a single district alone will not be considered shared. Service must be provided to two or more districts to be considered a shared service. Services shared between boards of cooperative educational services must originate with one board and be made available to the other boards.
  - 2. Applications for service to be established in place of services presently rendered or a sound basis by individual districts will not be approved.
  - 3. Applications for services that could or should be rendered with effectiveness by individual local districts will not be approved.
  - 4. Services provided must meet recognized standards to justify expenditure of State dollar.
  - 5. Arrangements which provide a single district with more than 3/5 of a full-time position will not be approved. A district may not expect to use most of a person's time in token sharing with one or two other districts.
  - 6. Where shared services are proposed for school districts which are outlined for reorganization, evidence must be presented to indicate that such services will not retard reorganization. Where it appears evident that shared services are retarding reorganization, it may be necessary to limit or discontinue shared services to schools so affected.
  - 7. Approval of a shared service application is for 1 year only. The Assistant Commissioners will review annually the services offered and will determine which may be continued and which should be terminated.
  - 8. Boards of cooperative educational services may provide cooperative services for which no State aid is claimed. Applications for such services must be approved by the Commissioner of Education before the board can offer such shared services without State aid.



- 9. Sparsity of population, distance, and other pertinent factors will be given due consideration with respect to criteria for specific services.
- 10. Physical facilities essential to the effective rendering of a service must be available and must meet Department standards.
- 11. Combinations of classroom teaching or special service areas which reasonably may be considered full-time local position will not be approved on a cooperative basis, e.g., agriculture-industrial arts, nurse teacher-attendance teacher, industrial arts-driver education.
- 12. Teachers and other professional employees of boards of cooperative educational services shall be subject to the same certification requirements as though they were employed by local school boards (districts).
- 13. A person may not be an employee of the cooperative board providing service to a school district and at the same time be an employee of the local school district in a similar or different instructional area.



#### VI. 1967-68 BOCES DATA

A questionnaire (Appendix A) was developed by the Bureau of Occupational Education Research in an effort to survey present BOCES programs.

The questionnaires were mailed in February 1967\* to the administrator of
each Board of Cooperative Educational Services listed in Table I. Fiftyseven questionnaires were mailed; 43 were completed and returned. Five
BOCES directors reported no active programs this year (1967-68\*\*), two
reported cooperation with city school districts, and seven did not reply.

Tables II and III show tabulation of data. Course titles were obtained from Area Occupational Education Programs, 1967-68, prepared by the Division of Occupational Education Supervision, and enrollments on the returned questionnaires were compared with those reported in the pamphlet. When inconsistencies occurred, information extracted from the questionnaires was used.

Flexibility has been made possible through the organizational structure of the area school concept. It is conceivable that a district which is a component in one program may purchase services from another program through cross contractual arrangements made between the two BOCES involved. For example, the Catskill district is a component of the Greene County Board of Cooperative Educational Services, but maintains a contractual (noncomponent) relationship with Columbia County. This flexibility makes available to students in adjacent districts specific courses of study which may not be economically feasible within the local educational system.

Table II gives enrollment by occupational field for each program responding to the questionnaire. An examination of the table reveals that considerable variation in student enrollment occurs from program to program, with a range of from 23 to 1,275 students. Specific area programs offer courses in from one to seven occupational fields, with two programs training students in only one field and three programs offering courses in all seven.
