A GUIDE TO RESOURCES FOR UNDERGRADUATE ACADEMIC REFORM

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This guide is a bibliography and listing of many of the resources available for the study of undergraduate learning, curriculum, and instruction. It is designed for the students, faculty, and administrators who are planning undergraduate programs. A section entitled "Processes of Change in Education" has been included, dealing with special problems encountered in putting a plan into effect.

Not included is a listing of the extensive literature on student development and the college environment. For such references, Feldman and Newcomb's book (Sec. 3) is a thoroughgoing source.

The bibliographical portions of the guide emphasize material published after 1967. References to earlier works may be found in the bibliographical guides listed in the first section.

Some limited annotations are included to help the user identify promising resources quickly.

Members of the Council will receive two copies of this *Special Report* so that presidents may, if they wish, pass one or both along to others who may now be working in the areas covered. This *Special Report* may be quoted and reproduced without restriction.

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Readers interested in Special Topics should also review the entries in the three preceding general sections for relevant material.

10. DISCIPLINARY LITERATURE

This guide does not include the extensive, diverse, and specialized literature pertaining to curricular programs and materials in the various disciplines. Persons in need of suc1 materials, however, can investigate several sources.

Disciplinary associations (e.g., the American Political Science Association, the Modern Language Association) often have committees concerned with undergraduate curriculum or instruction, although in the social sciences and humanities such committees generally have very limited or no full-time staff and confine their activities to responding to specific written inquiries and referring requests to further sources. In the natural sciences, seven college science commissions provide extensive sources of information on their disciplines, including information on curricular arrangements, course content, and teaching methods. They are listed at the end of this section.

An overview of the current state of the social and behavioral sciences is provided by the report of the Behavioral and Social Sciences Survey Committee of the National Academy of Sciences and the Social Science Research Council (see *Hilgard*, 1969, Sec. 3). Attention is called to the ten report series conducted under the same sponsorship, and listed in this book, on the particular pocial and behavioral sciences. This series is now in the process of being published by Prentice-Hall, Inc., Englewood Cliffs, N.J. 07632. A similar study has been conducted and published for the physical sciences (see *The Physical Sciences*, Sec. 3).

For teaching in the disciplines, an initial source is Morris's book (Sec. 4), which also contains supplementary bibliographies for disciplines not covered in essay form.

The Information Resource Center of the American Association of Junior Colleges (Sec. 12) can provide information on programs in technical and paraprofessional areas.

A number of professional organizations also publish journals for their fields (e.g., Journal of Biological Education, College English). The best means of surveying such journal literature is through the Current Index to Journals in Education (Sec. 1), published by ERIC.

Other ERIC literature which should be searched includes Research in Education and the Higher Education General Bibliography series of the Clearinghouse on Higher Education. All ERIC literature has subject indexes (Sec. 3). In addition, there are ERIC clearinghouses in the areas of linguistics, science education, teacher education, teaching of English, and teaching of foreign languages. A new ERIC clearinghouse in the social and behavioral sciences is in the process of being established.
