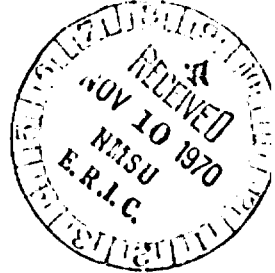
ABSTRACT

The "War on Poverty" has focused on the economic, educational, and social disadvantage of great segments of our population. Prominent among the disadvantaged is the North American Indian, living in the mainstream of the dominant culture and in the more isolated setting of the government reservation. One of the basic difficulties faced in efforts to improve the lot of the Indian in today's society is that of communication between the Indian and the non-Indian. Government and private agencies concerned with such matters are turning to the academic community in terms of funded research, curriculum development, and teacher development. To respond more meaningfully to these requests, the scholar must be aware of the investigations of his colleagues, past and present. This bibliography, containing approximately 600 items published between 1810 and 1967, is an attempt to provide a comprehensive listing of resource materials for the people studying the speech and spoken language of the North American Indian. The "War on Poverty" of recent years has focused increasingly on the economic, educational, and social disadvantage of great segments of our population. Prominent among these is the North American Indian, living both in the mainstream of the dominant culture and in the more isolated setting of the government reservation.

It is accepted generally that one of the basic difficulties faced in efforts to improve the lot of the Indian in today's society is that of communication between the Indian and the non-Indian. A vast array of barriers. . .cultural and language differences, mistrust, geographic isolation, prejudice, and lack of mutual respect, to name just a few...have stood, and to a great degree still stand, in the way of strengthening these communication ties.

Both government and private agencies concerned with such matters are turning to the academic community for assistance in terms of funded research, curriculum development, and teacher preparation. In order to respond meaningfully to these requests, the scholar must be aware of the investigations and findings of his colleagues, past and present. Only then may he assess and evaluate the significance of his own contributions. This bibliography is an attempt to provide a comprehensive listing of resource materials for those studying the speech and spoken language of the North American Indian. As no bibliography is ever complete, the writer is hopeful that omissions or additions will be brought to his attention for inclusion in future revisions.
