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ABSTRACT

Some 30 works in English or Pussian are listed in this annotated bibliography compiled for teachers of Russian in Canadian schools. Entries are classified as basic or supplementary materials and include: (1) dictionaries, (2) atlases, (3) phonological and grammatical references, (4) integrated and textbook courses, and (5) miscellaneous works. Bibliographical data concerning the works include a list of Canadian distributors and purchase prices. (RL)

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The teacher initiating a Russian language course at the public or high school level is faced with a considerable problem in selecting the teaching and reference materials he will need. Hundreds of publications related to the teaching of Russian have appeared in the last two decades in the United States, Britain, and the USSR. Western textbooks vary greatly in the linguistic authenticity, or even correctness, of the Russian used. Soviet publications are sometimes inappropriate to the methods used in Canada or to the level of the teacher's knowledge. The purpose of this bibliography is to assist teachers in acquiring essential reference works and in selecting suitable learning materials from the many good programs, courses, and supplementary materials now readily available.

No attempt has been made to include all the items that might be useful to teachers. As new materials become available, this preliminary bibliography will be revised. Reference works are listed under two headings: essential and supplementary. It is suggested that all the essential ones should be on the classroom reference shelf. The supplementary references may only be required when classes reach advanced levels and may, in some cases, presuppose that the teacher reads Russian fluently. A fairly wide selection of courses and other learning materials is presented, as the teacher will want to use materials from various sources, even if he decides to base his Russian course on one particular integrated program. Readers have not been included, as the survey of available books has not yet been completed. An annotated bibliography of readers will be published in the near future.

Every item listed in this bibliography may be examined in the Reference Library of the Modern Language Center at The Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. Facilities for listening to tapes and for viewing filmstrips are available. The Russian collection also includes many items not listed in this bibliography which will be of interest to Russian teachers. The staff of the center will be pleased to assist in the selection of materials.

Information concerning Canadian distributors and prices is provided, where possible, in parentheses after the publication data. If there is no Canadian agent, only the price is given. The addresses of all the distributors are listed at the end of the bibliography.

(Troyka, \$2.00) A prescriptive dictionary-handbook that gives the pronunciations and stresses considered to conform to the norms of literary pronunciation for 52,000 words. Unacceptable pronunciations that commonly occur are also indicated.
- Folomkina, S., and Weiser, H. <u>The Learner's English-Russian Dictionary.</u> Cambridge, Mass.: M.I.T. <u>Press, 1963. (General Publishing, \$7.50)</u> A compact, scholarly dictionary (600 pages) prepared primarily from Soviet sources and containing essential lexical and grammatical information, examples of usage, and excellent appendixes dealing with Russian phonology and grammar.

A handbook of Russian surnames giving commonly occurring stresses.

A standard Soviet dictionary containing more words than the EnglishRussian dictionary listed above (70,000 words) but designed for Russian, rather than English, speakers.

An up-to-date political atlas with supplementary topographical, economic, and demographic maps.

A translation of an authorative Soviet manual explaining and illustrating the interrelation of stress and pronunciation.

An explanation and illustration of the basic intonation patterns of Russian with an accompanying record.*

A complete grammar in tabular form including details of irregularities in declensions and conjugations.

A reference manual dealing with grammatical, semantic, and syntactic difficulties involved in translating from English to Russian.

A practical course for intermediate students at the senior high school or university level, consisting of dialogues and readings followed by some grammatical explanation and exercises.

Stilman, L. Russian Verbs of Motion. New York: Columbia University Press, 1951. (Copp Clark, \$1.50)
An explanatory manual with exercises.
