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ABSTRACT

U.S. Office of Education programs in foreign language, area studies, and world affairs are furthered through the National Defense Foreign Language Fellowship (NDFL) program described in this booklet. The 1971-72 program and awards are discussed in terms of: (1) fiscal constraints, (2) program administration, (3) graduate fellowships, (4) languages approved for graduate fellowships in modern foreign languages by world area, and (5) award quotas at American institutions for graduate fellowships in modern foreign languages. Information concerning graduate fellowships covers eligibility requirements, preferred qualifications, additional requirements for federal employees, financial provisions, conditions for study outside the United States, and application procedures. 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INTRODUCTION

U.S. Office of Education programs in foreign language, area studies, and world affairs are an important part of the national effort to meet the critical needs of American education, Government, and business for experts in these fields and to promote throughout the United States better knowledge of other countries and cultures.

The National Defense Foreign Language Fellowship (NDFL) program, authorized by the National Defense Education Act, Title VI, provides opportunities for training in foreign languages and area studies in selected programs of U.S. institutions of higher education.

In 1959, the first year of the program, 171 graduate fellowships were awarded for the study of six non-Western languages in which the national need for specialists was considered most critical. During the last 5 years, approximately 1,800 graduate fellowships have been awarded annually for the study of over 90 modern foreign languages and related area subjects and fields. The total number of graduate fellowships awarded to date is approximately 14,500.

In recent years fellowship opportunities have been made available for selected undergraduates and faculty members as well as graduate students. The faculty development program was initiated in 1962 to help accelerate the development of international studies on campuses previously lacking such programs. To date, a total of 215 faculty members have received fellowships under the auspices of the NDFL program.

In 1963, to provide students in foreign language and area studies with increased opportunities to complete basic language study before beginning graduate work, the program began to include awards to undergraduates for training in intensive summer language programs. Since that time, 2,694 college students have received NDFL undergraduate fellowships to study 35 selected foreign languages in intensive summer language programs.

FISCAL CONSTRAINTS for 1971-72

In view of present budget constraints and program priorities, in 1971-72 the NDFL program will be limited to approximately 750 graduate fellowships for study during the academic year.

ADMINISTRATION

The Institute of International Studies (IIS) in the Office of Education is responsible for the general administration of the NDFL program. Each year IIS invites graduate institutions offering foreign language and area study programs to apply for fellowship allotments. With the assistance of a panel of specialists from the academic community, the Institute then allocates fellowships on a competitive basis to highly regarded institutional programs which lead to advanced degrees and which combine language and area study relating to a specific region of the world. Institutions receiving quotas of awards are responsible for publicizing their respective programs, nominating candidates for awards, and administering grant funds allocated to them.¹ The Division of Foreign Studies of the Institute of International Studies makes a technical review of the individual nominations and approves those which meet eligibility criteria.

GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS

Graduate fellowships will be awarded for modern foreign language and area study during the 1971-72 academic year in selected programs of U.S. universities.² Since the NDFL program is designed to train specialists in the less widely studied foreign languages and world areas which are important to the national interest, no awards are available under this program for French, German, Italian, or Iberian Spanish. Awards involving Spanish are available only for Latin American studies.

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible for an NDFL graduate fellowship, a candidate must:

1. Be a citizen of the United States or have such immigration status and personal plans as to indicate that he or she is in the United States for other than a temporary purpose and will make a continuing contribution to the manpower resources of this country.
2. Subscribe to the loyalty provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

3. Be preparing for employment as:

- a. A teacher at an institution of higher education in the United States of certain critical languages or of subjects in which proficiency in the language(s) is necessary or highly desirable.

(Note: A student preparing to teach in elementary or secondary schools or to teach English as a second or foreign language is not eligible under this program.)

OR

- b. An employee in a governmental or private (nonprofit and nonsectarian) professional or technical activity which contributes significantly to the conduct of U.S. cultural, economic, educational, political, or scientific relations with other peoples, and for which proficiency in the program-supported language is desirable.

4. Have earned a baccalaureate or comparable degree before the fellowship begins.
5. Be accepted for advanced training³ in a foreign language and related studies by a graduate school program with a quota of NDFL fellowships.

³ For the purposes of this program "advanced training" is defined as study while the student is enrolled at the graduate level.

6. Present a study plan which indicates that:

- a. The student intends to pursue suitable training in an approved foreign language, ordinarily through established courses.

(Note: A doctoral candidate working on a dissertation or a student who has already mastered the language may, in place of formal language study, satisfy this provision through use of the language in research or course work.)

- b. The study program will be interdisciplinary or multidisciplinary including such fields as anthropology, economics, geography, history, linguistics, literature, philosophy, political science, sociology, or other professional studies.

7. Agree to pursue full-time study in accordance with his university's requirements during the entire award period. A student may, however, accept limited paid employment in teaching or research related to his field of study, provided that such employment is approved by his university and that it:

- a. Is located either at the student's university or at an accredited institution of higher education within commuting distance of his university.
- b. Requires no more than one-quarter of the student's time.
- c. Does not prolong the time normally required to complete the program of study.

8. Receive no more than a cumulative total of 48 months of fellowship support (including the time period of the NDFL grant applied for) under the various programs of the Institute of International Studies. Such support may be entirely under the NDFL programs or may include up to 1 year of study abroad under a section 102(b)(6) Fulbright-Hays award.

Preferred Qualifications

An eligible applicant will be given preference in consideration for an award if he:

1. Is working toward an advanced degree.
2. Has already studied the language for which he seeks a fellowship.

(Note: A student having considerable knowledge of a related foreign language or of linguistics may be awarded a fellowship to begin the study of certain less well-known languages not commonly taught in the United States.)

If the language is either Russian or Latin American Spanish, the following specific qualifications are desirable:

- a. An applicant for a fellowship in Russian should normally have had at least 2 years of college instruction, or achieved the equivalent proficiency, in that language.

b. An applicant for a fellowship in Latin American Spanish should have a major in Latin American linguistics or in area studies related to Spanish-speaking Latin American countries and should have had at least 2 years of college instruction, or achieved the equivalent proficiency, in that language.

3. Is not a native speaker of the language for which he seeks an award.

Additional Requirements for Federal Employees

To be considered for a fellowship under this program, a Federal Government employee who does not plan to resign his position must meet the following special requirements:

1. Be on annual leave or leave without pay during the fellowship period.

(During the fellowship period he may not receive any other Federal educational benefit or Federal compensation for services except annual leave pay or assistance under chapter 34 or 35 of Title 38 [Veterans' Benefits] of the United States Code.)

2. Obtain a letter from the head or other authorized representative of his agency certifying that the desired language is not available through his agency and submit the letter to an institution with an NDFL fellowship quota in the language he desires to study. The institution can then consider his application on the same basis as any other application under this program.

Financial Provisions

Graduate fellowship awards include the following:

1. Tuition: Cost of tuition and all required fees.
2. Basic Stipend: Stipend rates vary according to the level of graduate study as follows:
 - a. \$2,000 (first post-baccalaureate year)
 - b. \$2,200 (years between the first and terminal year)
 - c. \$2,400 (terminal year)
3. Dependents' Allowance: For each dependent an allowance of \$500 for each academic year.

(Note: No travel allowance for a fellow or his dependents may be included in a 1971-72 NDFL grant.)

During the award period, a fellow may receive a loan (including a National Defense Student Loan), an additional non-Federal Government fellowship, or additional financial aid from his institution, a foundation, or any other non-Federal source. He may not, however, receive any other Federal educational benefits except assistance under chapter 34 or 35 of Title 38 (Veterans' Benefits) of the United States Code.

Conditions for Study Outside the United States

If approved in advance by the Institute of International Studies, NDFL graduate fellowships may be utilized outside the United States under either of the following conditions:

1. The student has completed all course work for the Ph.D. and, in order to complete dissertation research, must have access to materials not available in the United States. An outline of the proposed dissertation and tentative itinerary should be included with the application for an award.⁴
2. The student would pursue intensive foreign language study at the advanced level at an American institution's established overseas program which has been approved by the Institute of International Studies. In 1971-72, approved programs for overseas study are the interuniversity programs in Japanese in Tokyo and in Chinese in Taipei.

(Note: NDFL grants used abroad contain essentially the same provisions as those in the United States. They do not include allowances for international transportation or local travel in the overseas area nor do they provide for tuition exceeding that for regular full-time enrollment on the home campus.)

⁴ If a student is given approval to utilize his award abroad and his research or study will be conducted in a country where U.S.-owned excess foreign currency is available for educational purposes, all in-country allowances will be paid in local currencies only. In 1971-72, countries where this ruling applies are: Guinea, India, Morocco, Pakistan, Poland, Tunisia, the United Arab Republic, and Yugoslavia.

Application Procedures

A student must apply directly to a graduate institution which has a quota of NDFL fellowships -- *not* to the Office of Education. He should contact the institution for information concerning application forms, deadlines, and related matters. If the student would like to have more than one institution consider his application for a fellowship, he should apply separately to each institution.

Renewal of a fellowship depends on evidence of the continued high quality of the fellow's work, the merit of his proposal for further study, and the availability of funds. In applying for a renewal, a fellow must follow the procedures for new applications. The decision on renewals, as on initial grants, is the responsibility of the institution and not the Office of Education.
