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ABSTRACT

A sympathetic family story of how seven year old Victoria sets out to buy a Christmas present for each of her five sisters only to fall and lose all her money in the snow. With the help of a cub scout and an unusual wooden doll, the family has a happy Christmas.

Bishop, Claire Huchet, The Five Chinese Brothers, Coward, 1938, \$2.50

Five brothers all work together to save life of one brother in this humorous tale.

Brown, Marcia, The Little Carousel, Scribner, 1946, \$3.25.

Anthony lives in a lively Italian tenement district in a large city. He is sometimes lonely, since his mother works and his father is away in the Navy. Watching the gay street Carousel, Tony wishes that he had a nickel for a ride.

Burton, Elsa, Katy and the Big Snow, Houghton, 1943, \$3.25

Everyone works together in a blizzard, but it takes willing leadership, and Katy the tractor had that.

Chonz, Selina, A Bell for Ursli, Walck, 1953, \$3.75

Everyone in the family and everyone in the village work together when spring festival time comes.

Davis, Alice, Timothy Turtle, Wiser, 1940, \$2.50

It takes all of his animal friends thinking and working together to help Timothy turn right side up again.

A rug maker gives his business to his three sons. One makes the patterns, one mixes the dyes, one works the loom. When a prize is offered for the most beautiful rug they quarrel. Everyone has his place and his work in the community if he can only find it as did this dog in an Australian Village.
- Kravetz, Nathan, A Horse of Another Color, Little, 1962, \$2.95
Neither Miss Allen nor the principal nor the counselor nor the doctor can find anything wrong with Henry Baxter. He just loves to draw horses, yellow horses, blue horses. After the art exhibit, Professor Giller comes to tell Henry his blue horse was chosen the favorite picture by people who attended.
- McLemore, Dale, and M. Vere DeVault, Sociology, Austin, Texas: The Steck Co., 1962
This book will arouse children's curiosity and furnish many clues as to how to satisfy curiosity concerning groups to which they belong and will belong as adults. Good for fourth grade up.

Two small elephants realize the importance of group life when they face a day and a night away from the herd.

The night workers all belong to the community which supplies food, protection, and transportation to each small child.
- Stolz, Mary, Belling the Tiger, Harper, 1961, \$2.75
Asa and Rambo, the smallest mice learn the value of active participation in mouse society when they find that they have been chosen by the steering committee to bell the cat. After some slight confusion, they succeed in belling a tiger, not a cat, and together they frighten an elephant. When these adventures help them become fearless, they return home to undermine the tyrannical hold their leader has over his mouse constituency.

Because this little cat thinks he is different, he leads a lonely life. After a visit to the zoo, he is a cat, and everyone is happy to have him act like the other kittens.

Zolotow, Charlotte, The Night When Mother Was Away, Lothrop, 1958.

A little girl misses her mother. Her father understands how she feels and lets her stay up late and experience the mystery and loveliness of a summer night.

Anglund, Joan Walsh, Love Is A Special Way of Feeling, Harcourt, 1960, \$1.75

An allegorical tale, a little black cat overcomes her timidity at her first party.

Tiny becomes an integral part of the first-grade class when he proves that physical size does not determine the size of one's heart.

The spontaneous friendship and cooperation of two small boys who live in the same neighborhood provide the story theme. Only thru the pictures is it apparent that the boys belong to different racial groups.

A picture story that relates all the ways a small bunny decides he can run away from his mother. In each case, she tenderly tells him how she would follow and find him.

A new Chinese-American boy loses the lump in his throat when he is introduced to the class by an understanding teacher and greeted by the redheaded boy in front of him as "Hi ya, Joe!".

Estes, Eleanor, The Hundred Dresses, New York: Harcourt, Brace and World, Inc., 1944.
The story of a poor Polish girls imaginary dresses and the ridicule of her classmates.

Flack, Marjorie, The Story About Ping, Viking, 1933, \$1.75
When adventurous Ping avoids the spank given the last duck to board the houseboat at night, he has adventures with cormorant fishing birds and a Chinese family on another boat, but nothing is so welcome as the call of the man on the wise-eyed boat that is home.

Jackson, Jesse, Call Me Charley, New York: Harper & Row, Pub.1945
The story of how a white town's first Negro student wins acceptance. Recommended for Grades 5 and up.

Lewiton, Mina, Candita Choice, New York: Harper & Row, Pub. 1959
A novel about a young Jewish girl and her life on the Lower East Side of New York. Recommended for grades 4-7.

Priolo, Pauline, Piccolina and the Easter Bells, Little, 1962 \$3.00
This very little girl longs for someone to lift her high as the bell rings and say, "Grow child! grow!" Pictures and text convey the sights and sounds and customs of Sicily.

Reyher, Becky, My Mother Is The Most Beautiful Woman In the World, Rothrop, 1945, \$2.50
A Russian folk tale is about a little girl who describes her Mother as "the most beautiful woman in the world." To the children, "beautiful" means "much loved."

Wise, William, Cowboy Surprise, Putnam, 1961, \$2.00
Mike and Sally endure much teasing from the children because they must wear glasses. Things change for them Wild Bill, a famous cowboy performer, comes to town and with a gallant understanding gesture turns their glasses into a status symbol.

Yashima, Taro, Crow Boy, Viking, 1955, \$3.00
This warm & sensitive story centers on the problems of a frightened, introverted country boy who is ridiculed by his classmates. A new teacher finds his special talents and brings

An Old Woman moves from one place to another in search of the one place that will be just right for her and her cow and donkey and two cats - and the last place looks remarkably like the first!

Written to reassure children of the value of their home life.

Big Horton, the elephant, tries to protect the settlement of small whos which he discovers.

Sutherland, Efua, Playtime in Africa, Atheneum, 1962. \$3.00
Both younger and middle-grade children will be interested in the clear photographs which bleed the page and in the spritely descriptive text showing what the children of Ghana do for amusement.

On a visit to his country cousin, a little city boy is disturbed by night noises and sleeps late in the morning. On each succeeding day he wakes earlier until at last he becomes used to country hours.

Bemelman's, Ludwig, Madeline, Viking, 1939, \$3.50

A girl in a school in Paris asserts her individuality and gains attention.

Brenner, Barbara, Barto Takes the Subway, Knopf, 1961, \$2.95

Barto Garcia moves to New York City from a farm in Puerto Rico, the city seems only busy, noisy, and crowded. Then he has his first exciting ride on a subway and Barto begins to change his mind about the city.

Burton, Virginia Lee, The Little House, Houghton, 1942, \$3.25

An unhappy little house, built in the country, finds itself, after many years, surrounded by skyscrapers and subways until at last it is in the heart of the city. In the end the house is moved far out in the country again, where it may enjoy the flowers, leaves, and snowflakes. The story shows changes in a neighborhood and tells what happens as cities grow larger and swallow up more and more fields and orchards.

The boys call Nils a sissy when he wears his grandmother's Present,

DeRegniers, The Giant Story, Harper, 1953, \$2.92

A story about a boy who thinks that he is also a Giant. His mother accepts both the giant and the small sleepy boy who comes home at night.

Duncan, Lois, Littlest One in the Family, Dodd, 1960

Robert dislikes his role of being the littlest one in the family and decides that "the only way to be grown-up is to do grown-up things. The family reacts in a tolerant, kindly fashion to Roberts' attempts at adulthood. The arrival of a helpless new baby shows Robert how very grown-up he really is.

Duvoisin, Rober, Petunia, Knopf, 1950, \$1.99

Petunia, the goose, finds a book and, proud of her new wisdom, is free with her advice. Not until all the barnyard is in a turmoil does Petunia learn that wisdom must be in the mind and in the heart.

A

Evers, Aif, Abner's Cabin, Watts, 1957, \$2.95

This picture book presents the history of a house which includes its transformation from a log cabin to a frame dwelling to a Victorian mansion to a grocery store. Just as the house is about to be torn down to make way for a new highway, someone recalls its earlier tradition. The log cabin is restored and becomes part of the town's museum.

Fiedler, Jean, Big Brother Danny, Holiday, 1953

Danny misses his parents' attention when the new baby sister arrives and resents her until one day when he is left in charge of her.

Felt, Sue, Hello - Goodbye, Doubleday, 1960, \$2.50

Two little girls and their family have moved so often that it seems they are saying "Good-bye" to friends as soon as they say "Hello". They miss their old friends, but new friends always turn up.

Hendrich, Paula, Trudy's First Day at Camp, Lothrop, 1959, \$2.75

A picture-story book that describes a typical first day at camp.

Gag, Wanda, Gone is Gone, Coward, 1935, \$1.75

An old folk tale of the peasant who exchanged work with his wife for one day only!

Gates, Doris, Becky and the Bandit, Ginn, 1955

Irresponsible Becky finds it hard to try to behave like a girl in the exciting surroundings of their gold claim in early California. She longs to be at sea with her brother. Her adventure with a bandit, an episode with a thieving hired man, and the return of her brother help her to realize that being a girl has special advantages, also.

Godden, Rumer, Fairy Doll, Viking, 1956, \$2.50

Small, unhappy Elizabeth is the youngest of four children. Instead of being capable and clever like the others, she is short, fat, clumsy and sometimes naughty. Greatgrandmother gives Elizabeth a fairy doll to help her. Magical things happen, and when the doll goes out of her life, Elizabeth makes the discovery.

Ipcar, Dahlov, The Wonderful Egg, Doubleday, 1958, \$2.50

The phenomenal changes in the physical world from the time of the dinosaurs to the present are vividly suggested by the beautiful illustrations in this book. An egg is found in a nest, and a number of dinosaurs that may hatch from it are paraded past the reader. But the egg contains "a baby bird; the first baby bird in the whole world."

Kuskin, Karla, Which Horse is William?, Harper, 1959, \$2.50

William might be a horse or a lamb, a mouse, or a rabbit, but he retains his own individuality and is always William to his Mother.

Lifton, Betty Jean, Joji and the Fog, Morrow, 1959, \$2.78

A terrible fog settles in the farmers bathtub and threatens to ruin all the Japanese farmer's rice plants. Jpji, the scarecrow, is in misery as he sees the crops his is supposed to protect droop, until he thins of a way to become a scarefog. The story depicts Japanes rural life.

Marino, Dorothy, Where are the Mothers, Lippincott, 1959, \$3.00

An easy-to-read picture book attempts to parallel the week-day and week-end activities of boys and girls with those of their mothers.

McCloskey, Robert, Make Way for Ducklings, Viking, 1941, \$3.50

A mother duck and a father duck fine a home for their children and help them grow up. As they encounter many problems in their changing world, friendly people help in solving them.

A

Miles, Miska, Kickapoo, Little, 1961, \$2.75

Kickapoo is as smart a mule as any in the state of Kansas. His owner, Howdie, decides he simply has to enter the Pony Express Race and that Kickapoo will have to be sold because whoever heard of a mule entered in a Pony Express Race? Kickapoo, however, has some ideas of his own about all this.

Pope, Ise, The First Doll in the World, Lothrop, 1961, \$2.75

A young cave drwller's search for someone to play with gives a glimpse of prehistoric life. The cave girl's life is physically quite differnt from that of today's children, but her desire to be a little mother is universal.

Petersen, Melba F., Beya's Train Ride, Friendship, 1961, \$1.98

Beya lives in a small African Village. The old as well as the new is shown when Beya moves to the city in the big shiny monster, the train.

Politi, Leo, Butterflies Come, Scribner, 1957, \$3.25

Interjected in this story, an account of the annual return of the monarch butterflies to the Monterey Peninsula, is the idea that human beings have come and gone whereas the butterflies have persisted in their mysterious pilgrimage to this same place. A boy explains to his sister the Indian ceremonies of long ago that heralded the arrival of the monarchs.

Politi, Leo, Song of the Swallows, Scribner, 1949, \$3.25

Juan, a little boy, and Juan, the gardener and bell ringer at Mission San Juan Capistrano, are close friends. From the old man, the Spanish boy learns to garden and to love the swallows that return yearly to the old Mission. Through love and patience, Juan learns that he too can have some swallows returning to him.

Schkin, Miriam, Laurie's New Brother, Abelard, 1961, \$2.75

A wise mother helps Laurie accept and adjust to the changes in her life that a new baby in the family makes. Instead of wanting to be a baby again herself, Laurie becomes glad that she is a big girl and looks forward to the day when John will be big enough to do things with her.

Slobodkin, Louis, Magic Michael, Macmillan, 1944, \$3.00

Michael, the little brother in the family, gains attention by assuming the role of all sorts of animals and things. His family scarcely gets used to one role when he tries out a new one. The arrival of a new bicycle on his birthday convinces him that being just plain Michael may be fun for a while.

Stolz, Mary, Pigeon Flight, Harper, 1962, \$2.50

Pigeon is at heart a city bird. His arrogant manner changes when he and Mrs. Pigeon fly up to bleak New England on winter. From this locale, his perspective of the New York park is rosy even if he can't be "top bird" on the head of General Sherman.

Swift, Hildegard, The Little Red Lighthouse and the Great Gray Bridge, Harcourt, 1942, \$3.25

The lighthouse is certain that it is obsolete when the George Washington Bridge is built next and towering above it. The author conveys the feeling that the bridge is mechanical and impersonal in contrast to the lighthouse. The lighthouse learns that it still has its own special responsibility and that little things have an important place in the world.

Ungerer, Tomi, Rufus, Harper, 1961, \$2.95

Rufus, a bat, realizes how dreary the night world with its smothered colors is when he flies past a technicolor drive-in movie. He paints himself only to be shot by some frightened people. After a long convalescence at the home of the kindly Dr. Tarturo, the rare-butterfly collector, Rufus decides that he really belongs to the night.

Weil, Lisl, Mimi, Houghton, 1961, \$3.00

Mimi wants to be a policeman but is afraid girls are not adequate for this important job. One day she distinguishes herself in a Marseilles restaurant - in a feminine way.

Zelotow, Charlotte, Big Brother, Harper, 1960, \$1.95

A little girl finally learns to handle a teasing big brother. This problem of sibling relationships is portrayed naturally and humorously in both text and illustration.

Joslin, Sesyle, Senor Baby Elephant, The Pirate, Harcourt, 1962, \$2.50

Senor Baby Elephant searches for treasure in a Latin country. He seeks advice from his mother on appropriate Spanish phrases and customs so that he will not commit a breach of local pirate Protocol.

Matsuno, Masako, Taro and the Tofu, World, 1962, \$3.00

A Japanese boy overcomes the temptation to spend extra change mistakenly given him by the old tofu seller. He feels a new sense of responsibility as he makes the long, cold journey to return the money. And he does not need the satisfaction of feeling his parents of his good deed.

Stover, JoAnn, If Everybody Did, McKay, 1960, \$3.50

Sketches of the hilarious consequences if everybody were to do what all of us do sometimes - slam the door, track in mud, eat all the jam - offer merriment in place of a moral.

Turner, Mina, Town Meeting Means Me, Houghton, 1951, \$2.40

This book describes the town meeting and the officers elected to various local offices. The responsibilities of each official and the relationships between them and citizens as a whole are clearly outlined.

A little boy and his mother encounter the sights and sounds of the city. Picture book.

Grifalconi, Ann, City Rhythms, Indianapolis, Indiana

An illustrated book of a Negro boy's discovery of the charms and rhythms of city life. Recommended for ages 4-8.

Howell, Virginia, Who Like the Dark, Lothrop, 1945, \$2.50

All the night-time noises are described in this comforting picture book.

Krauss, Ruth, The Carrot Seed, Harper, 1950, \$2.75

In the face of much derision from others a little boy determinedly plants a carrot seed. His faithful care is rewarded by a sprouting carrot. Living as a free people demands the courage of one's convictions.

Lippincott, Striped Ice Cream, Phila., J. B. Lippincott Co., 1968

Keats, Ezra Jack, The Snowy Day, New York: Viking Press, Inc., 1962
An illustrated story for very young children of a Negro boys day in the snow.

\$2.75

Hendrika, a fine Dutch cow is unhappy until the great day when she falls into the canal and floats down to the city. Here she sees all the exciting city things that Pieter the horse had told her about - the bicycles, the staircased roof tops, and the cheese market.

Ah Jim and his family live in crowded quarters for San Francisco's Chinatown. His mother tells him that he may have a pet provided it will eat in a rice bowl. His search for just the right sized pet makes an exciting story enlivened by many engaging pictures of San Francisco.

Krasilovsky, Phyllis, Bennys' Flag, World, 1960, \$2.50

Based upon the Alaska Flag Contest of 1926, this story tells how an Indian orphan boy chooses for his flag design the blue of the forget-me-not, the North Star for position and the Big Dipper for strength.

Pine, Tillie, The Eskimos Knew, Whittlesey, 1962, \$2.75

A book of simple science experiments that relates modern man's efforts to cope with his environment to methods used by the Eskimos to solve the same problems. A little Quaker girl longs to own the bright-colored clothes and beribboned bonnet which Cecily, her friend next door, wears. The value of her Quaker bonnet is proved when a fugitive slave recognized it and asks her for help. The story of Hannah is a delightful picture of the happy simple life of a family of Friends living in Philadelphia just before the Civil War.

Evans, Eva Knox, People are Important, New York: Capitol Pub. Co. 1951

Hayes Florence, Skid, Boston: Houghton Mifflin Co., 1948

A novel about the problems and eventual acceptance of a Negro boy from Georgia by his classmates in his new, all-white Connecticut school. Recommended for ages 9-12.

MacDonald, Golden The Little Island, Doubleday, 1946, \$2.75
Children often think of themselves as little islands, self-contained and with no responsibilities toward others. This book explains that the little island really is a part of the big world, too.
