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ABSTRACT

The third annual statistical report on programs funded under Title I of the 1965 Elementary and Secondary Education Act, summarizes in facts and figures activities during fiscal year 1968. This statistical report, based on accounts by State school superintendents across the nation, describes the ethnic and racial characteristics of the participating children and presents data on dropouts and on students who continued their education. It describes in detail the staff involved in Title I programs--the regular teachers, the parents, the student volunteers--and the types of training they received. Expenditures are also reported with breakdowns according to instructional and service activities. Of a sample of 462 local education agencies, 458 responded to a questionnaire designed by the Office of Education. The data were then interpreted and refined to provide national estimates. The survey instrument from which these statistics are drawn was organized in three parts: (1) general information; (2) regular school term; activities taking place from fall to spring; and, (3) summer school program--activities taking place in the summer of 1968 only. The data is presented in tabular form, with detailed accompanying test, technical notes, and a transcript of the questionnaire. (Author/JM)

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Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 states: "No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." Therefore, the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, title I program, like every program or activity receiving financial assistance from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, must be operated in compliance with this law.

FOREWORD

Fiscal year 1968 was the third year in which title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act provided supplementary services to educationally disadvantaged children in our Nation's schools.

This statistical report, based on accounts by State school superintendents across the Nation, describes the ethnic and racial characteristics of the participating children and presents data on dropouts and on students who continued their education. It details the staff involved in title I programs--the regular teachers, the parents, the student volunteers--and the types of training they received. Expenditures are also reported with breakdowns according to instructional and service activities.

The statistics reflect a sample of 462 local educational agencies specifically selected to represent the national totals for fiscal year 1968.

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INTRODUCTION

In recognition of the special educational needs of children of low-income families and the impact that concentrations of low-income families have on the ability of local educational agencies to support adequate educational programs, the Congress hereby declares it to be the policy of the United States to provide financial assistance . . . to local educational agencies serving areas with concentrations of children from low-income families to expand and improve their educational programs by various means . . . which contribute particularly to meeting the special educational needs of educationally deprived children.

--Elementary and Secondary Education

This, the third annual statistical report of title I ESEA, presents in facts and figures the program as it operated during fiscal year 1968. It reports on the children and staff, the program activities, and the money spent.

Four hundred and fifty-eight of a sample of 462 local educational agencies responded to a questionnaire designed by the Office of Education. The data were then interpreted and refined to provide national estimates. They are presented here as the official figures for title I during fiscal year 1968. They represent the entire United States--the 50 States and the District of Columbia.

The survey instrument from which these statistics are drawn was organized in three parts:

- Part I: General information
- Part II: Regular school term (activities taking place fall to spring)
- Part III: Summer school program (activities taking place 1968 summer only) See Appendix.

Analysis of Part I shows that there were over 48 million school age children residing in this country in fiscal year 1968. The following tabulation shows their educational status. Of this number, nearly 47 million were in schools within the geographic boundaries of the school district.

Nearly 41.5 million children were in public schools; about 5.3 million were in nonpublic schools; and the remainder were in institutions for neglected and delinquent children. There are

more than 940,000 dropouts in the United States, and over 600,000 children enrolled in schools in districts other than their place of residence.

The following tabulation shows that of the 95,000 schools in the sample for fiscal year 1968 nearly 59,000 had title I participants. Nearly 64 percent of the title I schools were public elementary schools.

CHILDREN

Children Participating

About 8 million children participated in regular school programs funded by title I during fiscal year 1968. In fiscal year 1967, about 9 million children were served, but this figure includes those who attended summer school activities.

Interest continued to focus on the elementary grades during fiscal year 1968. Enrollment in grades 1 to 6 accounted for more than half (58 percent) of the total enrollment in title I classes. Participation reached its peak in grades 2 and 3, each of which served nearly 798,000 children.

It should be noted that more than 341,000, or over 4 percent of those participating, were enrolled in nonpublic schools. (See table 1.)

Location of Activities of Participating Children

Title I activities for public school children were conducted primarily on public school grounds during both the regular school term and the summer programs. Likewise, nonpublic school children participated in programs conducted on their school grounds during the regular school term. But, during the summer, the nonpublic school children usually went to the public schools to participate in title I activities. (See table 2.)

Institutionalized Neglected and Delinquent Children

Approximately 35,000 neglected and delinquent children residing in public and private institutions participated in title I activities during the regular school term in fiscal year 1968. They attended classes in local educational agencies which were financed by title I, P.L. 89-10. More than 13,000 neglected children were enrolled in grades 7 to 12. (See table 3.)

Handicapped Children

In the local educational agencies, programs under title I, P.L. 89-10, as amended, served approximately 125,000 handicapped children. Table 4 presents data by major handicap.

Mentally retarded children and speech impaired children participating in activities specifically designed for, or adapted to, their special needs accounted for more than three-fourths of the handicapped children.

Table 4 does not, however, reflect the total number of handicapped children who were provided services. Handicapped children who did not need special arrangements or adaptations were counted along with the regular children.

Ethnic and Racial Characteristics of Participating Children

Title I programs served about 4.3 million white and 2.8 million Negro children during the regular school term of fiscal year 1968. In summer programs the number participating was approximately equal.

While 80 percent of the total number of school age children in this country are white, white children comprise only 55 percent of the title I participants. Negro children, on the other hand, account for only 15 percent of our total school population, but make up 35 percent of the title I participation. (See table 5.)

FUNDS

The amount of money actually spent for title I activities by the local educational agencies during fiscal year 1968 totaled \$1.057 billion. Of this amount more than 59 percent

was expended for instructional activities and 19 percent for services. Twenty-one percent was spent as follows: inservice education, 2 percent; construction, 4 percent; equipment, 4 percent; and administration costs, operation and maintenance of plant, and fixed charges, 11 percent. Less than 1 percent was spent for services to parents of participating children. About 175,000 parents received counseling and other services--122,000 during the regular school term; 53,000 during summer programs--to bridge the gap between parent and child, school and family. (See table 6.)

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES - REGULAR SCHOOL TERM

Program participation in fiscal year 1968 followed closely the pattern of previous years. During the regular school term, the largest number of children was enrolled in English-reading with over 44 percent of all pupils involved in this activity. Other popular instructional activities were math, art, music, cultural enrichment, and health-physical education-recreation in which approximately 14 to 24 percent of the children was actively engaged.

The most popular service activities provided by title I were library services, which reached almost 3 million children; health services (medical and dental), which served 2 million; and food services, for 1 million youngsters. Since there are coordinating links between the areas of nutrition, health

services, and learning, comprehensive programs that focus on these needs play a responsible role in aiding disadvantaged children.

Generally speaking, expenditures are closely related to the number participating in the various activities. Therefore, the amount expended for instructional and service activities varied in much the same proportion as the number of children participating in those activities. Expenditures for instructional activities totaled more than \$494 million of which \$241 million was used for English-reading and \$41 million for art, music, and cultural enrichment. Service activities totaled \$173 million, including \$38 million for library services, \$26 million for food services, and \$19 million for health services.

The average amount spent per child depended upon the activity. The greatest cost was \$145 for special activities for the handicapped, followed closely by prekindergarten and kindergarten programs, \$134.

Other average expenditures per child were \$68 for English-reading; \$51 for vocational education; \$23 for mathematics; \$9 for art, music, and cultural enrichment.

The per capita cost for service activities varied similarly-- from a high of \$46 per child for special activities for

handicapped to a low of \$5 for transportation. (See tables 7 and 8 for data on which per capita computations were made.)

STAFF, INSERVICE TRAINING, AND VOLUNTEERS

Staff

In the regular school term of fiscal year 1968, about 198,000 staff positions were funded under title I. A comparison with fiscal year 1967 data shows that the percentage of staff in the various positions remained relatively stable. There was a slight decrease in the percentage of teachers and other professionals employed and a correspondingly slight increase in nonprofessional help.

For both years, the emphasis was largely on teachers. In fiscal year 1968, more than 76,600 teachers were employed with title I funds. Data show that teacher and library aides added nearly 63,600 to the staff of local educational agencies; they accounted for 32 percent of all staff positions.

The use of teacher aides has played a major role in implementing the program with nearly 58,000 teacher aides employed during the regular school term. (See table 9.)

Inservice Training

Almost \$9 million was expended for inservice training of nearly 77,000 title I staff members in the regular school term of fiscal year 1968. These programs prepared teachers for instructing the educationally disadvantaged and were considered to be one of the more important contributions of the title I program. Teacher aides are jointly trained with the teachers they will most likely work with. (See table 10.)

Volunteers

One of the broader aims of title I has been to involve the community and parents in the activities of the school to create better understanding and rapport. Its success in 1968 is clearly seen when this year's statistics are compared with those of a year earlier. In fiscal year 1967, about 81,000 ^{1/} volunteers were reported for the 50 States and the District of Columbia; in fiscal year 1968 during the regular school term only, a high of 111,000 volunteers--an increase of 37 percent--was reported. SUMMER PROGRAMS

Children Participating

Over 2.5 million children participated in title I summer school programs with about two-thirds of that number in grades 1 through 6. Enrollment increased about 600,000 over that of the previous year.^{2/} This increase indicates an effort to provide educational activities and programs over the entire year. (See table 12.)

Funds

The amount expended for title I summer programs in 1968 totaled \$173.7 million as shown in expenditures for title I activities, table 6, p. 17. Of this amount, over \$132.3 million was spent for instructional activities and \$31.7 million for service activities. The remaining amount went for staff inservice education, for services to parents of participating children, and for summer 1967 programs.

Program Activities

Among the instructional activities for summer programs, English-reading programs received the largest concentration of funds--approximately \$52 million (31.4 percent). About \$18 million (10.8 percent) was spent on mathematics programs; more than \$15 million (9.5 percent) on art, music, and

cultural enrichment, collectively; and nearly \$12 million (7.2 percent) for instructional activities for prekindergarten and kindergarten.

Of the \$32 million spent in summer programs for service activities, over \$6 million (3.8 percent) went for food services. Library services accounted for \$5 million (2.9 percent); guidance and counseling, \$2 million (1.5 percent); and health services (dental and medical), \$2 million (1.5 percent). (See tables 13 and 14.)

Staff

More than 207,000 summer staff positions were paid from title I funds. Of this total, there were over 121,000 teachers, 18,000 other professionals, nearly 36,000 teacher aides, and almost 32,000 other nonprofessionals. Forty percent of the staff positions were teachers at the elementary level; nearly 13 percent were secondary teachers. (See table 15.)

OTHER DATA

In addition to data related to the program activities, information was collected from the local educational agencies on dropouts and the number of pupils who continued their education after graduation.

Dropouts

Nearly all of the LEA's reported dropout data for fiscal year 1967 and 1968, as requested on the statistical form. A comparison of these two sets of data indicates a decrease in the dropout rate for almost all grades from 7 through 12.

The largest decrease was in schools in which more than one-third of the pupils participated in title I programs. The dropout rate showed particular improvement in the critical 9th and 10th grades. Generally, it decreased more in schools having title I services than in other schools. (See table 16.)

Continuing Education

Similarly, the data on continuing education indicate that a higher percentage of graduates from title I schools continued their education in 1967-68 than in the previous year. In schools with more than one-third title I participants, the continuing education rate is now up to 44 percent. (See table 17.)

APPENDIX

TECHNICAL NOTES

The estimates presented in this report are based on data obtained from a sample of the 10,980 public local educational agencies (LEA's), with enrollment of 300 or more students, in the United States and the District of Columbia who participated in the title I programs during fiscal year 1968.

The sample design provided for a one-stage stratified random sample. The population of the participating LEA's was grouped by enrollment size: (I) LEA's with enrollments of 40,000 or more students, (II) those with enrollments of 9,000 to 39,999 students, (III) those with enrollments of 3,000 to 8,999 students, and (IV) those with enrollments of 300 to 2,999 students.

The largest LEA's, which constituted the first stratum, were selected in the sample with certainty. In each of the remaining three strata a sample of LEA's was selected in a systematic manner after a random start. The number of LEA's in the population and in the sample and the sampling ratio used in each stratum is shown in table I.

The questionnaires were mailed in July 1968 to the chief State school officer in each State who, in turn, forwarded them to the superintendents of the LEA's that were in the sample.

As shown in table II, the response rate was excellent.

In order to account for LEA's that did not respond or had returned nonusable forms, the assumption was made that they had the same program characteristics as the responding LEA's in their respective stratum. The weights assigned to the responding LEA's were increased accordingly. Because of the high response rate, it is doubtful that this procedure is a source of any serious bias.

The estimation procedure, used to develop the statistics in this report, consisted of inflating the sample data by a factor that was the inverse of the probability by which the LEA was selected to fall in the sample. This weight was then adjusted to account for the nonrespondents and the nonusable forms.

The estimate of \$1.077 billion obtained in this report for the total title I allocation for the 50 States and the District of Columbia in fiscal year 1968 is within 0.8 percent of the \$1.068 billion shown in the Committee Print, Elementary and Secondary Education Act Amendments of 1967 with Background Materials and Tables, prepared for the Subcommittee on Education of the Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, United States Senate, March 1968.

The population of LEA's from which the sample used in this report was drawn does not include the approximately 880 LEA's that did not participate in the title I program during fiscal year 1968 nor the 8,393 LEA's with less than 300 pupils. Accordingly, the estimates for other statistics appearing in this report are not directly comparable with the figures shown in other reports which are based on data from samples of all participating LEA's. It was possible, however, to make adequate adjustments and reasonable assumptions so that the populations are comparable.

For example, the total enrollment in full-time public elementary and secondary day schools in the United States in the fall of 1967 was 43,886,805 (Fall 1967, Statistics of Public Elementary and Secondary Day Schools, OE-20007-67). If the population is adjusted so that it would be comparable to the population used in this report, the enrollment figure is reduced to approximately 41,086,000. The estimated enrollment shown in this report is 41,454,000.

The number of public schools in the United States in the fall of 1967 was 93,581 (Statistics of Local Public School Systems, 1967, OE-20112-67). Adjusting again for comparable coverage, this figure is reduced to approximately 78,500. The estimated number of schools shown in this report is 79,347.

The estimated distribution of the total population, ages 6 through 18 in the United States by race, as of July 1, 1967, was: white, 85.0 percent; Negro, 13.9 percent; and other nonwhite, 1.2 percent (Current Population Reports, Series P-25, No. 385). The estimated distribution of school age children shown in this report is: white, 84.0 percent; Negro, 14.7 percent; and other nonwhite, 1.3 percent.

Since the estimates in this report are based on a sample, they may differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete count of all LEA's in the population had been taken using the same questionnaire, instruction, and procedures. As in any survey, the results are subject to errors of response and reporting as well as sampling variability.

Sampling error is one component of the total error of a survey. The major types of nonsampling errors in this report are errors due to biases in the responses and errors introduced in the coding and other processing of the questionnaires. For estimates of totals representing relatively small proportions of the population, the major component of the total survey error tends to be the sampling error. As the

estimated totals approach the level of the total population, the sampling error decreases in relation to the size of the estimate. This is not necessarily true of the nonsampling errors that tend to assume a relatively larger role in the total survey error.

The reliability of the estimates made from sample data can be measured by the standard error which is used to determine confidence limits around a sample estimate. The standard error is primarily a measure of the variations that occur by chance because a sample rather than the whole of the population is surveyed. The chances are 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census figure by less than the standard error. The chances are about 95 out of 100 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error. The standard error also partially measures the effect of response errors but it does not measure, as such, any systematic biases in the data.

The figures represented in table III are approximations to the standard errors of various estimates shown in this report. In order to derive standard errors that would be applicable to a wide variety of items and could be prepared at a moderate cost, a number of approximations were required. As a result, the table of standard errors provides an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard errors rather than the precise standard error for any specific item.

Illustration: Table 1, page 15 of this report shows that 7,946,413 children had participated in title I programs during the regular school term. Interpolation in table III shows the standard error on 7,946,413 to be approximately 367,800. The chances are 68 out of 100 that a complete census would have differed from the sample estimate by less than 367,800. The chances are 95 out of 100 that the difference would have been less than 735,600.

INSTRUCTIONS

This year the statistical report has been organized into three parts:

Part I: General Information

Information about the applicant LEA and the certification of the approving State education agency.

Part II: Regular School Term Program

Information on only the activities taking place during the regular school term (fall to spring). Do not include information on the summer program or participants.

Part III: Summer School Program

Information on only the activities of the 1968 summer. If FY 1968 funds were used in the summer of 1967, they are to be reported only in Items L5, L6, and L7 (in-service education costs). DO NOT GIVE ANY DETAILED INFORMATION ON PROGRAM ACTIVITIES OF THE 1967 SUMMER.

Part I: GENERAL INFORMATION

Item A: Identification of local educational agency.

Item B: To be completed by the State official who will review this report for accuracy and consistency.

Item C: Average Per Pupil Expenditure from Non-Federal Funds, Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1967 (School Year 1966-67). The amount should be the same as that entered in Item 1B of the 1968 Application Form.

Item D: Schools in Agency's District. Schools in agency's district are those schools physically located within the geographical boundaries of your agency's school district. Participating schools are schools whose membership includes pupils participating in Title I programs. Schools which are both elementary schools and secondary schools should be included in each category and counted as two in the total even though it is only one school plant or building.

Item E: School-Age Children Residing in Agency's District. (As of Fall, 1967) For all children who reside in your school district and who are of ages appropriate for enrollment in your schools (not beyond grade 12 and not over age 20), enter the number of children in membership (or, in Line 3, not in membership) in the specified types of schools.

Item F: Ethnic or Racial Characteristics of Resident Children. Enter an unduplicated count (or estimate, if actual count is not available) of children by racial or ethnic characteristics as indicated. Be sure the total is the same as the total in Item E4.

Negro: Persons considered in school or community to be of African or Negroid origin

American Indian: Persons considered in school or community to be of American Indian origin

Oriental: Persons considered in school or community to be of Chinese, Japanese, or other Oriental origin

Puerto Rican: Persons considered in school or community to be of Puerto Rican origin

Mexican American: Persons considered in the school or community to be of Mexican origin

Other: Persons of any specific ethnic or racial group not included above

White: All other persons

Items G, H, and I: Self-explanatory.

Item J: Expenditures for FY 68 Program. The purpose of this part of the statistical report is to estimate expenditures of FY 1968 Title I funds. Therefore, no expenditure of local, State, or other Federal funds should be included. Do not include expenditures of Title I funds from either FY 67 or FY 69.

1. Total Expenditures for Program Activities of Regular School Term. Enter the total amount of Title I funds expended during the regular school term (same as Item N4 in Part II), not including any of the construction, equipment, or administrative costs accounted for in Lines 3 through 6 below.

2. Total Expenditures for Program Activities of Summer School Program. Enter the total amount of FY 1968 Title I funds expended in the summers of 1967 and 1968 (same as Item L6 in Part III).
- 3, 4, and 5. Enter the totals for the regular school term and the summer school program. Account numbers refer to those used in the Title I application.
6. Administration Costs, Operation of Plant, Maintenance of Plant and Fixed Charges (Account Numbers 100, 600, 700, and 800). This year these expenses will not be distributed among the program activities. Include here--and only here--all administration, operation of plant, maintenance of plant and fixed charges included in Title I FY 68 expenditures for both the regular school term and the summer school program.
7. Grand Total of Expenditures for Entire FY 68 Program. This figure is the total amount of FY 1968 Title I funds which were spent on your local program. This figure may not exceed your total allocation (Item G) plus any funds received from another district under a cooperative program (Item H) or minus any funds sent to another district under a cooperative program (Item I).

Item K: Number of Dropouts from Title I Schools Compared with Other Schools in District. A dropout is a pupil who leaves a school, for any reason except death, before graduation or completion of a program of studies and without transferring to another school. The term "dropout" is used most often to designate an elementary or secondary school pupil who has been in membership during the regular school term and who withdraws from membership before graduating from secondary school (grade 12) or before completing an equivalent program of studies. Such an individual is considered a dropout whether his dropping out occurs before or after he has passed the compulsory school attendance age and, where applicable, whether or not he has completed a minimum required amount of school work.

Item L: Number of Twelfth Grade Graduates Continuing Education Beyond High School. A student is considered to be continuing his education if he enters one of the following on either a full-time or part-time basis: post-graduate high school studies; junior college; college or university; vocational school, commercial or technical institute; or nursing school.

Part II: REGULAR SCHOOL TERM PROGRAM

Item A: Project Participants-Regular School Term. Include all children who participated in your local Title I program. Be sure to include the children from institutions for neglected and delinquent who participated in the local educational agency program. (A separate report will be filed for institutionalized children participating in Title I activities conducted in schools located within the institutions). The children

from institutions should be entered in the "Public Schools" column or the "Private Schools" column, according to the administration of the schools they attend. Also, be sure to include the handicapped children in Item A even though they are later to be reported in Item D.

- Item B: Number of Children Included in Item A from Institutions. Of the total in Item A give the number who resided in institutions but still participated in the Title I program in local schools outside the institution. Classify them as "Public" or "Private" by the nature of the administration of the institution in which they resided.
- Item C: Estimated Number of Dropouts Included in Item A. Estimate the number of children who were dropouts just prior to the initiation of the 1967-68 school year Title I program.

Include only the children participating in activities specifically designed for or adapted to the special needs of handicapped children. Do not include handicapped children whose participation in Title I activities did not necessitate special arrangements or adaptations. For example, a crippled child in a reading class would not usually require the special equipment and instruction needed by a visually handicapped child in a reading class.
- Item E: Estimated Number of Resident Children, By Race, Who Participated. Enter an unduplicated count (or estimate, if actual count is not available) of children by racial or ethnic characteristics as indicated. Be sure the total is the same as the total in Item A. Refer to instructions for Item F, Part I.
- Item F: Location of Activities. This count will necessarily be duplicated if the same children have participated on both public and private premises. However, each total in Line 3 must not be less than the appropriate column total in Item A.
- Item G: Staff and Salary Paid From Title I Funds. Total Number of Staff Positions - Enter the number of individual positions for staff members who received salary payments from Title I funds for service performed in this program. Do not include staff positions in Title I projects for which salary payments were made solely from local or State funds. The total number of positions (Line 22) may exceed the number of people working on the project if one or more of the staff has more than one position.

This chart is an account of staff positions not of staff members. Do not convert the numbers to full-time equivalency. Enter the number of paid staff positions for your Title I program, regardless of the number of people hired to fill them. For example, a full-time art teacher position may have been filled by two half-time people but should be counted as only one position. If the position was only intended to be a half-time position and one (or more) people worked in this half-time position, it would still be counted as one (not 1/2 or .5) position. Item H: Number of Title I Staff Members Receiving Inservice Education Funded By Title I. Enter the number of staff members by Title I activity assignment and the average number of training hours per person in each activity assignment.

Item I: Number of Volunteers. Enter the number of unpaid volunteers who worked for the Title I program.

Items J through M: Instructional and Service Activities. DO NOT DISTRIBUTE EXPENDITURES FOR EQUIPMENT, ADMINISTRATION, OR CONSTRUCTION AMONG THE PROGRAM ACTIVITIES. The only place this information (Account Numbers 100, 600, 700, 800, 1210, 1220, and 1230) will be collected is in Part I, Item J, where it is combined with the same expenditures for the summer school program.

Items J and K: Instructional Activities. Enter the number of participants (including children who came from institutions) by grade and by the type of school in which they are enrolled. Notice that the number of pre-kindergarten and kindergarten children is to be entered only on Line 18 in the "Total Participants" column. The last column of Item J is to separately identify all the children included in the total who resided in institutions for the neglected or delinquent and who participated in the regular program at the public or private schools (outside of the institution) in which they are enrolled.

Items L and M: Service Activities. This table has a separate column for pre-kindergarten and kindergarten participants. Otherwise, the instructions would be the same as for Items J and K.

In "Guidance and Counseling" (Line 4) enter only the number of children given this service (and only the cost for the children's service). Guidance and counseling for parents, as well as all other parental services, should be accounted for in Item N3.

Item N: Expenditures for Program Activities of Regular School Term.

1. Self-explanatory.
2. Staff Inservice Education Cost. Enter the expenditure of Title I funds for programs to train the staff recorded in Item H.

3. Services to Parents of Participating Children. Enter the number of parents served and the cost of only those services funded by Title I.
4. Total Expenditures for Program Activities of the Regular School Term. (Same as Total in Part I, Item I, Line 1 on Page 2)

Part III: SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM

FY 1968 Title I funds can be legally spent over a fourteen month period: July 1, 1967 to August 31, 1968. This period includes most of two summers, a situation which presents obvious problems for a report labelled "Summer School Program, FY 1968." Accordingly, we have decided to ask for only two items of information on activities which took place in the summer of 1967: 1) Item L5, which will serve to reconcile the budget figure; and 2) Item L7, inservice education costs. ALL OTHER ITEMS (A THROUGH L4) ARE TO INCLUDE DATA ONLY ON PROGRAM ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED DURING THE SUMMER OF 1968.

Item A: Project Participants. Include all children who participated in your local Title I program. Participants should be grouped in the public school column or the private school column on the basis of the control of the school in which they are in membership during the regular school term. Be sure to include in Item A the children from institutions for neglected and delinquent and handicapped children who participated in the local educational agency program. The children from institutions should be entered in the "Public Schools" column or the "Private Schools" column, according to the administration of the schools they regularly attend. Item D: Location of Activities. This count will necessarily be duplicated if the same children have participated on both public and private premises. However, each total in Line 3 must not be less than the appropriate column total in Item A. Public school children are those who are included in public school membership during the regular school term. Private school children are those who are included in private school membership during the regular school term.

Item E: Staff and Salary. (Paid from Title I Funds) READ CAREFULLY THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR ITEM G IN PART II BEFORE COMPLETING THIS ITEM.

Item F: Number of Title I Staff Members Receiving Inservice Education Funded by Title I. Enter the number of staff members by Title I activity assignment and the average number of training hours per person in each activity assignment.

Item G: Number of Volunteers. Enter the number of unpaid volunteers who worked for the Title I program.

Items H, I, J, and K: Instructional and Service Activities. FOR SUMMER OF 1968 ONLY. READ CAREFULLY THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR ITEMS J, K, L, AND M IN PART II BEFORE COMPLETING THIS ITEM.

Item L: Expenditures for Program Activities of Summer Program.

- 1 through 4. See instructions for Item N in Part II.
5. Expenditures of FY 1968 Funds During the Summer of 1967. If your agency spent FY 1968 funds in the summer of 1967, enter the total amount expended. Enter administration, construction, and equipment costs for the summer of 1967 only in Item J in Part I. Do not include them in the total for this item (L5).
6. Total of FY 68 Funds Expended for Summer 1967 and 1968 Programs. Enter this total as Item J, Line 2 on Page 2.
7. Amount of the Expenditure of FY 68 Funds in the Summer of 1967 (Line 5) Used for Inservice Education. This expenditure item is a subtotal of Item L5 and should not be added to the other expenditures on this page in order to arrive at the total in Item L6.

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
