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ABSTRACT

This inventory-directory provides information on the formal cooperative arrangements of colleges and universities in the State University of New York system. Each entry gives the title of arrangement, names the coordinator or contact person, the beginning date, the participating institutions, and describes the purposes of the arrangement or program. The listing is based on a survey conducted during the winter of 1971 of all cooperative arrangements operating or pending as of January 1971. Only those arrangements which involve cooperation with other institutions of higher education, whether public or private, and which result in a sharing and extension of the academic resources of the institutions involved are included. An analysis of the kinds of institutions represented shows that 199 involved State University institutions only, while 329 involved 1 or more private colleges, out-of-state public or private colleges, or senior colleges of the city University of New York. Nineteen types of cooperative arrangements were identified. (JS)

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## INTRODUCTION

This report is an inventory-directory of the formal cooperative arrangements involving the institutions under the program of the State University of New York. It is based on a survey conducted during the winter of 1971 of all cooperative arrangements either active or pending as of January 1971. The listings in this directory are a portion of the data collected in that survey. Only those arrangements which involve cooperation with other institutions of higher education, either public or private, and which result in a sharing and extension of the academic resources of the colleges involved are included in this report.

Certain cooperative arrangements which meet the above criteria are well known and centrally recorded elsewhere and therefore have been left out of the listings. These include the Study Abroad Programs, University of the Air, Independent Study (Correspondence Courses), Clinical Affiliation Programs and other long-standing arrangements which take advantage of the inherent cooperative relationship between institutions belonging to the multi-institution

State University of New York.

The arrangements included in this report are listed by campus within types of institutions. Descriptions of the arrangements appear as they were reported and questions concerning them should be addressed to the coordinator or contact person listed for that arrangement. Only those cooperative arrangements which a college reported and which are within the scope of this report are listed under the name of the college. No attempt has been made to write in an arrangement for a college that was reported by another college as being shared with the former.

Because of the variety and innovative nature of many of these cooperative efforts, there has been no regular reporting or Central Staff record of them in the past. While the inherent flexibility and non-standardization of these arrangements is necessary to their function, it also is responsible for their elusive nature when there is a need to locate and describe them. Consequently, the listings in this report represent the best efforts of the campus respondents and the Central Staff Office of Institutional Research, and it is understood that some coopera-

tive arrangements may have escaped our attention. Judging by the response to the survey, the listings we do have are very representative of the kinds of cooperative arrangements which do exist. It is hoped that this report can assist the future planning and conducting of similar programs.

An analysis of the kinds of institutions involved in the reported arrangements reveals that while 199 were with only State University institutions, 329 involved one or more private colleges, out-of-state public or private colleges, or senior colleges of the City University of New York. Of these 329, 141 involved only private or out-of-state institutions. It would seem that the bases of these arrangements are common interests and problems which prompt the colleges to seek appropriate partners regardless of the "sector" to which they may belong.

Another aspect of the breadth of these arrangements is the various kinds of cooperation that exist. The table on the

following page lists the numbers of each type of arrangement found in this report.

The benefits of these cooperative arrangements are shared by students, faculty, and administrators. The variety and scope of the cooperation indicates that these informal and formal arrangements greatly enhance the educational effectiveness of the colleges involved.

We are grateful to all the campus personnel who participated in the data gathering for this report. We would appreciate your comments regarding this survey and report as indicators of the wider scope of the State University's programs.
