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ABSTRACT

Some 352 documents and 166 journal articles published between 1955 and 1970 are cited in this bibliography on rural education and small schools. Part I contains citations and abstracts which have appeared in "Research in Education" from September 1969 through July 1971. Part II includes citations of journal articles from "Current Index to Journals in Education" from the first issue in January 1969 through the July 1971 issue. The citations include a wide variety of resource materials (research and program reports, guides, books, etc.) which examine educational needs, opportunities, and programs in rural and small schools. An index of subject terms facilitates location of documents in a specific subject area. Pricing information and availabilities of documents are provided. This bibliography is the first in a series of planned supplements to ED 033 257. (JH)

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The Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC)—a Federally funded national information system dedicated to the improvement of education through the dissemination of educational resources and research—related materials—aids school administrators, teachers, researchers, information specialists, professional organizations, and students in locating and using educational resources.

As one of nineteen ERIC network centers, each of which focuses on a separate area (or areas) of education, ERIC Clearinghouse on Rural Education and Small Schools is responsible for collecting materials related to rural education and small schools, and American Indian, Mexican American, migrant, and outdoor education for input into the national ERIC system.

One of the main functions of the ERIC system is to process documents other than current journal articles for announcement in <a href="Research in Education">Research in Education</a> (RIE), a monthly publication containing abstracts of completed research and research-related reports in education as input by the various clearinghouses. RIE contains subject, author, and institution indexes, along with document resumes which include the ERIC (ED) accession number, author(s), title, source(s), publishing date, ERIC Document Reproduction Service prices or alternate availability, and the abstract.

In addition to its monthly abstract journal, ERIC compiles <u>Current</u>

<u>Index to Journals in Education (CIJE)</u>, a monthly index which provides

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citations from more than 500 major educational publications: journals, quarterlies, annuals, and yearbooks.

# SOURCE OF MATERIAL

The present bibliography was compiled to provide access to some of the latest research findings and developments in the realm of rural education and small schools. The bibliography is a supplement to Rural Education and Small Schools, A Selected Bibliography (ED 033 257), a previous ERIC/CRESS publication (by Wurster and Heathman) which includes approximately 300 RIE citations with abstracts and a Subject Index for documents entered in the ERIC system on rural education and small schools. The basic bibliography lists citations which appeared in RIE through the September 1969 issue. (It should be noted that the prices in the basic bibliography given for microfiche and hard copy reproductions do not reflect current ERIC Document Reproduction Service pricing; however, prices given in the basic bibliography may be recomputed as per the instructions under "Ordering Information" in the present Foreword.)

A combined RIE and CIJE index is included at the end of this supplement to assist the user in locating citations pertaining to a given subject area within the realm of rural education and small schools. The index terms, descriptors under which the citations were indexed in RIE or CIJE, are from the Thesaurus of Descriptors.

# Research in Education

Part I of the present supplement contains citations and abstracts which have appeared in RIE from September 1969 through July 1971.



When using the <u>RIE</u> section of this bibliography, the reader is encouraged to (1) utilize the Subject Index in identifying relevant materials, (2) examine the resumes to determine appropriateness of materials, and (3) obtain microfiche or hard copy reproductions of documents from ERIC Document Reproduction Service. These reproductions must be ordered as described under "Ordering Information" in the present Foreword.

The reader is reminded that there are numerous complete microfiche collections of ERIC materials throughout the nation which may be used by the public; contact the Information Specialist at ERIC/CRESS for information on locations of these collections.

### Current Index to Journals in Education

Part II of this supplement, CIJE coverage, is a new feature of ERIC/CRESS bibliographies. Part II includes citations from CIJE beginning with the first issue in January of 1969 and continues through the July 1971 issue. Entries listed in the CIJE section of this bibliography are processed in a slightly different manner from RIE citations: (1) an EJ number rather than an ED number precedes each entry; (2) some descriptive terms (identifiers) not found in the ERIC Thesaurus are included with the citations; (3) major and minor descriptors are included, with majors (those retrievable via the index) being preceded by asterisks; and (4) brief annotations take the place of RIE abstracts when it is felt that the article being processed cannot be described adequately by a combination of major and minor descriptors, identifiers, and information in the title. Each journal citation also includes the publication date, article title, personal author(s), abbreviated journal title, and information on the volume, number, and pages.



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CIJE entries in this bibliography are referenced in the Subject
Index by major descriptors and are preceded by the prefix EJ rather
than ED. Since CIJE entries are not available from ERIC Document
Reproduction Service, the reader is encouraged to take advantage of his
local library in locating the journals he wishes to use.

Documents cited in Part I of this bibliography are either available from ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS) or an alternate availability is given with the citation. A RECENT STUDY IN ALASKA RECOMMENDS THE BUILDING OF 6 REGIONAL BOARDING HIGH SCHOOLS IN REMOTE ALASKAN REGIONS BY 1975, WITH 8 ADDITIONAL BOARDING SCHOOLS PLANNED FOR 1980. GOALS DEVELOPED DURING A RECENT CONFERENCE OF AFRICAN STATES FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF EDUCATION IN AFRICA INCLUDE UNIVERSAL PRIMARY EDUCATION IN THIS CENTURY, WITH PROVISIONS FOR AT LEAST 20% OF ALL CHILDREN LEAVING PRIMARY SCHOOLS TO ENROLL IN SECONDARY SCHOOLS. THE TOTAL EMPHASIS WORLDWIDE APPEARS TO BE ON PRE-VOCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION, AND ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION OF EDUCATION, IN ADDITION TO INCREASING PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLING OPPORTUNITIES. TODAY ADULT EDUCATION IS RECOGNIZED AS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT FACTORS IN BRINGING ABOUT SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. HOWEVER. THERE ARE SOME PROBLEMS WHICH SERVE AS IMPEDIMENTS TO ADULT EDUCATION IN THE LESS DEVELOPED ARID REGIONS. THESE PROBLEMS INCLUDE: (1) ENTRUSTING ADULT EDUCATION TO AGENTS WHO MAY NOT HAVE THE NECESSARY QUALIFICATIONS; (2) A SHORTAGE OF SUITABLE TEACHING MATERIALS PREPARED BY COMPETENT AUTHORS AND LACK OF SUITABLE AUDIO VISUAL AIDS: (3) THE NEED FOR REGULAR PROFESSIONAL SUPERVISION AND ON-THE-JOB TRAINING; (4) LACK OF ADEQUATE FUNDS FOR IMPLEMENTING ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMS; AND (5) THE ROLE OF LOCAL TRADITIONS AND CUSTOMS AS A REASON FOR RESISTANCE FROM ADULTS. THE ADVANTAGES AND POTENTIALS OF ADULT EDUCATION IN RURAL AREAS ARE: (1) INCREASING SELF-ASSURANCE OF THE INDIVIDUAL: (2) IMPROVING THE SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT OF ADULTS. WHICH IN TURN HAS POSITIVE EFFECTS ON VARIOUS RELATIONSHIPS; (3) INCREASING AND IMPROVING CROP AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION WHICH CONTRIBUTES TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: (4) INTRODUCING IMPROVED FARMING PRACTICES AND BETTER TECHNIQUES TO ARID REGIONS BY EXTENSION SERVICES. ADULT EDUCATION IS SEEN AS ONE OF THE MOST ECONOMICAL WAYS OF DEVELOPING ARID LANDS. (CM)

THE BASIC POINT TO BE CONSIDERED IN ESTABLISHING A CURRICULUM FOR ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS IN THE ARID AREAS OF THE WORLD IS RELEVANCY. USUALLY, THE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM OF AN AREA REFLECTS THE DOMINANT CULTURE OF THE POLITICAL POWER IN CONTROL. HOWEVER, THE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM OF THE DOMINANT CULTURE MIGHT NOT BE RELEVANT TO THE PEOPLE OF ARID OR RURAL AREAS. THIS SITUATION CAN BE SEEN BY COMPARING THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NOGALES, SONORA, MEXICO AND NOGALES, ARIZONA. ON THE MEXICAN SIDE OF THE BORDER THE SCHOOLS ARE CONTROLLED IN PART FROM MEXICO CITY AND REFLECT A STRONG FRENCH TRADITION OF INTELLECTUAL DEVELOPMENT AND NO PRACTICAL APPLICATION OF KNOWLEDGE. IN NOGALES, ARIZONA, THE SCHOOLS REFLECT MORE LOCAL CONTROL, AND THE CURRICULUM IS MORE FLEXIBLE, PRAGMATIC, AND MEANINGFUL TO THE POPULATION AFFECTED BY IT. TO BE MORE EFFECTIVE, ANY CURRICULUM SHOULD BE DEVELOPED FROM DATA COLLECTED ABOUT THE LEARNER WHICH REFLECT THE FOLLOWING: (1) BIOLOGICAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL FACTORS; (2) SOCIOCULTURAL FACTORS; (3) SUBJECT MATTER CONTENT; (4) PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION; AND (5) LEARNING THEORY. THE ARID AREAS OF THE WORLD, ESPECIALLY THE MIDDLE EAST AND NORTH AFRICA, NEED TO DEVELOP AN EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM THAT IS ATTUNED TO THE NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE IN ORDER TO IMPROVE HUMAN AND INSTITUTIONAL COMPETENCIES REQUIRED TO SOLVE SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC PROBLEMS. SINCE ARID AREAS HAVE SPECIAL CHARACTERISTICS, IT IS NECESSARY TO FIND APPLICABLE SOLUTIONS. FOR EXAMPLE, MANY OF THESE COUNTRIES HAVE MANY VILLAGES THAT ARE ISOLATED FROM URBAN CENTERS. TEACHERS, WHO USUALLY WANT TO WORK AND LIVE IN THE CITIES, HAVE NO DESIRE TO GO TO ISOLATED AREAS. THEREFORE, RADIO COULD BE USED AS AN EFFECTIVE INSTRUMENT, ESPECIALLY FOR ADULT EDUCATION. IN THE FIELD OF INSTITUTIONS, 2-YEAR TECHNICAL INSTITUTES ARE MORE PRACTICAL IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES THAN 4-YEAR SCHOOLS. MORE ENGINEERS ARE NOT NEEDED, BUT RATHER MORE TECHNICIANS TO APPLY THE THEORIES. AGRICULTURE WILL BE THE BASE FOR MANY YEARS TO COME FOR MOST OF THE ARID AREAS. CONSEQUENTLY, AGRICULTURAL AND VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS THAT TEACH PRACTICAL SKILLS ARE GREATLY NEEDED. IT IS NOT ENOUGH TO SIMPLY HAVE THE KNOWLEDGE AVAILABLE, INSTEAD IT IS THE USEFUL APPLICATION OF KNOWLEDGE THAT IS IMPORTANT. (RH)

THIRTY-SIX EDUCATIONALLY DISADVANTAGED. CAUCASIAN PRESCHOOL CHILDREN, 35 MOTHERS, ONE FATHER, AND ONE PARENT SUBSTITUTE ENROLLED IN THE PRAIRE GROVE, ARKANSAS, PROGRAM, WHICH CONSISTED OF ATTENDING SCHOOL 2 HOURS ON SATURDAY MORNINGS. PRELIMINARY TEST DATA INDICATED THE PROGRAM MAY HAVE PRODUCED FAVORABLE CHANGES IN THE PARTICIPATING CHILDREN. THE INFORMATION COLLECTED REVEALED THE FOLLOWING: (1) SECONDARY EDUCATION WAS ASSUMING MORE IMPORTANCE DUE TO THE RISING RATE OF ENROLLMENT IN THE PRIMARY SCHOOLS; (2) SINCE THE DEVELOPING COUNTRIES OF ASIA WERE STILL BASICALLY RURAL, THEY WERE ADAPTING CURRICULUM, WHICH WAS DEVELOPED IN AN URBAN ENVIRONMENT, TO THE NEEDS OF THE COUNTRY; (3) MORE TIME WAS BEING ALLOCATED FOR SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS THAN FOR OTHER SUBJECTS; AND (4) BASIC RESEARCH ON CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT HAD NOT YET BEEN DEVELOPED ON AN ADEQUATE SCALE IN THESE NATIONS. CHARACTERISTICS OF SMALL SCHOOL SITUATIONS, SUCH AS LIMITED FINANCIAL AND FACULTY RESOURCES, PHYSICAL ISOLATION, AND APATHETIC COMMUNITY ATTITUDES TOWARD EDUCATION, CONTRIBUTE TO A SLOW RATE OF ACCEPTANCE OF INNOVATION. SHARING SERVICES AND POOLING FINANCIAL RESOURCES MAY PERMIT SMALL SCHOOLS TO INITIATE MORE INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS. EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT SHOULD FOCUS ON PRODUCING INNOVATIONS DESIGNED ESPECIALLY FOR THE CONDITIONS OF SMALL AND RURAL SCHOOLS.

THE DHIO EXTENSION SERVICE CONDUCTED "IN-DEPTH" SCHOOLS ON DAIRY GENETICS AND REPRODUCTION, BEEF CATTLE, CAPITAL MANAGEMENT, AND FERTILIZER AND LIME AT AREA CENTERS IN WOOSTER, DEFIANCE AND FREMONT, WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE, AND MCCONNELLSVILLE. TWO THIRDS OF THE INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF WERE AREA AGENTS; OTHERS WERE SPECIALISTS, RESIDENT STAFF, RESEARCH PERSONNEL, AND INDUSTRY REPRESENTATIVES. THE MAJOR AUDIENCE WERE FULL TIME COMMERCIAL FARMERS, 90% OF WHOM WERE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES, 1/3 HAVING SOME COLLEGE; 3/4 HAD RECENTLY BEEN INVOLVED IN OTHER EXTENSION ACTIVITIES. MOST HAD HAD CONTACT WITH EXTENSION AGENTS DURING THE THREE PREVIOUS YEARS, 10% HAVING OFFICE OR TELEPHONE CONTACT WITH AREA AGENTS. THE SCHOOL DIRECTED TOWARD FERTILIZER DEALERS DREW BOTH LARGE AND SMALL DEALERS, MOST OF WHOM HAD LEARNED ABOUT THE SCHOOL FROM EXTENSION AGENTS. PARTICIPANTS MADE SIGNIFICANT GAINS IN SUBJECT MATTER KNOWLEDGE AND PLANNED TO TRY NEW IDEAS, PARTICULARLY CASH FLOW ANALYSIS. THE PROGRAMS WERE CONSIDERED A SUCCESS. (SE)

ALSO, THE INCIDENCE OF POVERTY AMONG TEXAS RURAL FAMILIES WAS TWICE AS HIGH AS FOR URBAN TEXAS. THE GROUPS WITH HIGHER PROPORTIONS OF POVERTY IN TEXAS WERE THE AGED, THE NON-WHITES, AND THE SPANISH-SPEAKING. IN ADDITION TO DIFFERENCES BETWEEN THESE GROUPS AND BETWEEN THE RURAL AND URBAN POPULATIONS, THERE WERE MARKED DIFFERENCES IN POVERTY FROM ONE GEOGRAPHIC REGION TO ANOTHER; SUCH VARIATIONS SHOULD LOGICALLY ENTER INTO DECIDING ON HOW TO ALLOCATE RESOURCES IN COMBATING POVERTY. ALTHOUGH PUBLIC EDUCATION IS NOW AVAILABLE TO SOME 80 PERCENT OF ALL CHILDREN, THE SCHOOL COMPLETION RATES IN RURAL, MONOLINGUAL-SPANISH SCHOOLS ARE LESS THAN TEN PERCENT. IN THE SUMMER INSTITUTE OF LINGUISTICS SCHOOLS, THE TEACHER IS ALWAYS BILINGUAL AND OF THE SAME TRIBE OR REGION. TYPICALLY, THE STUDENT FIRST LEARNS TO READ IN HIS NATIVE LANGUAGE WHILE STUDYING SPANISH DRALLY. AFTER LEARNING TO READ SPANISH AS WELL. THE STUDENT TRANSFERS TO THE SECOND GRADE OF A MONOLINGUAL-SPANISH SCHOOL. EVALUATION OF THE EFFICIENCY OF BILINGUAL SCHOOLS DEPENDS ON THE CRITERIA USED (RELIGIOUS, POLITICAL, SOCIAL) AND THE EVALUATORS (MISSIGNARIES, GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS, TEACHERS). OBJECTIVE EVALUATION IS ALSO HAMPERED BY THE LACK OF LOCAL OR NATIONAL STATISTICS. PRELIMINARY FINDINGS BASED ON THE ACHIEVEMENT OF CHILDREN FROM BILINGUAL SCHOOLS TRANSFERRING TO MONOLINGUAL SCHOOLS INDICATES THAT THEY HAVE A HIGHER RATE OF ACHIEVEMENT. RESULTS ARE DISCUSSED IN TERMS OF THESE DBJECTIVES. THE HYPOTHESES AND METHODOLOGY USED IN ASSESSING RESULTS ARE GIVEN ALONG WITH TABLES INCORPORATING THE STATISTICAL DATA. PROBLEMS ARE DEFINED AND A REVIEW OF RELEVANT LITERATURE IS GIVEN. THE APPENDICES INCLUDE COPIES OF QUESTIONNAIRES, EDUCATION AND ATTITUDE SCALES, AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR JUDGING THE RESULTS OF THESE SCALES. (EV)

THE PURPOSES OF SOUTHERN REGIONAL PROJECT S-48 WERE TO STUDY: (1) EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL GOALS OF RURAL TEENAGERS; (2) EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL GOALS THAT PARENTS HOPE THEIR TEENAGERS HAVE FOR THEMSELVES; AND (3) COMPARISON OF ABOVE POINTS. DATA WERE OBTAINED FROM A SAMPLE OF 388 NINTH AND TENTH GRADERS AND THEIR PARENTS SELECTED FROM 10 SCHOOLS IN 3 GEOGRAPHICAL AREAS (EAST. MIDDLE. AND WEST) IN TENNESSEE. THE STUDENTS WERE SELECTED ON THE BASIS OF RURAL RESIDENCE AND RESIDENCE IN THE SAME DWELLING AS BOTH PAR ENTS. THE INTERVIEWING PROCEDURE INVOLVED 3 QUESTIONNAIRES FOR THE SAMPLE. IT WAS FOUND THAT EXPECTED LENGTH OF SCHOOLING WAS SIGNIFICANTLY ASSOCIATED WITH LEVEL OF LIVING (LOL) FOR TENNESSEE BOYS AND GIRLS AND THEIR MOTHERS AND FATHERS. THE FINANCIAL HELP EXPECTED BY BOYS AND THE EXPECTATION OF PARENTS FOR GIVING FINANCIAL HELP TO SONS AND DAUGHTERS FOR SCHOOLING WAS ALSO RELATED TO LOL. HOWEVER, BOYS FROM ALL LEVELS TENDED TO EXPECT MORE FINANCIAL HELP THAN PARENTS EXPECTED TO GIVE (GIRLS ANTICIPATED LESS). MORE YOUTHS IN THE HIGH LOL GROUP EXPECTED TO GRADUATE FROM COLLEGE AND TO CONTINUE PROFESSIONAL STUDY; THEIR PARENTS ENCOURAGED THIS EXPECTATION. THE DATA OF THE STUDY INDICATE THE IMPORATNCE OF LEVEL OF LIVING AS RELATED TO THE EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL PLAN OF RURAL YOUTH IN TENNESSEE. 

A QUESTIONNAIRE WAS ADMINISTERED IN THE SPRING TO 830 RURAL IOWA HIGH SCHOOL MALES TO DETERMINE THE PERCEIVED INFLUENCE DF 4 SELECTED GROUPS ON THEIR EDUCATIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL PLANS. PREVIOUS RESEARCH STUDIES HAVE SHOWN THAT RESIDENCE (FARM-NONFARM) IS AN IMPORTANT FACTOR IN A YOUTH'S VOCATIONAL-EDUCATIONAL DECISION. STATISTICAL COMPARISONS WERE MADE ON THE MEAN RESPONSES OF THE 394 STUDENTS WHO PLANNED TO ATTEND COLLEGE AND THE 436 WHO PLANNED NOT TO ATTEND COLLEGE THE FOLLOWING FALL USING T-TESTS. DATA WERE ANALYZED TO COMPARE THE COLLEGE AND NON-COLLEGE GROUPS ON THE PERCEIVED INFLUENCE EXERTED BY PARENTS, FRIENDS, COUNSELORS, AND OTHER ADULTS. THE RESULTS INDICATE THAT THE COLLEGE BOUND PERCEIVED SIGNIFICANTLY MORE INFLUENCE FROM ALL SOURCES THAN DID THE NON-COLLEGE BOUND IN THEIR EDUCATIONAL PLANS. THE RESEARCH CONCERNED DIFFERENCES WITHIN A BASICALLY RURAL LOW-INCOME POPULATION ON CHANGES FOR SOCIAL MOBILITY. MOBILITY POTENTIAL REFERRED TO DIFFERENTIAL CHANCES FOR MOVING FROM A STATUS OF ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY TO ONE OF SELF-SUFFICIENCY. TWO ASPECTS OF MOBILITY POTENTIAL, INDIVIDUAL AND SITUATIONAL, WERE CONCEPTUALIZED AS INFLUENCING MOVEMENT THROUGH MOBILITY CHANNELS. SOCIDECONOMIC, DEMOGRAPHIC, AND ATTITUDINAL DATA WERE COLLECTED IN STRUCTURED INTERVIEWS WITH 231 FEMALE AFDC (AID FOR DEPENDENT CHILDREN) RECIPIENTS SELECTED FROM WELFARE ROLES IN 2 MISSISSIPPI COUNTIES. THE INCREASED USE OF EXTENSION SPECIALISTS IN THE FIELD, AND THE REALIGNING OF DISTRICT BOUNDARIES, WOULD BE USEFUL. MORE USE SHOULD BE MADE OF THE TIE WITH THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY, PARTICULARLY THROUGH THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS. THIS STUDY OF THE MINIFUNDIA SOCIETY IN THE GUATEMALAN HIGHLANDS WAS INTENDED TO DESCRIBE AND ANALYZE THE SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC COMPLEX WITHIN WHICH THESE MAYAN INDIANS LIVED AND CARRIED ON THEIR SYSTEM OF TRADITIONAL AGRICULTURE. A RANDOM SAMPLE OF 348 FAMILIES WERE INTERVIEWED AND RESULTS WERE REPORTED. ACCORDING TO THE SURVEY THE AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD CONTAINED 5 MEMBERS WHO PROVIDED THE MAIN LABOR FORCE FOR THE FAMILY FARM. ALMOST 95 PERCENT OF THE FARMERS CLAIMED TO OWN ALL OR PART OF THEIR LAND. INCOME FROM FARMING WAS LOW, AND FARMERS SUPPLEMENTED THEIR EARNINGS EITHER BY ENGAGING IN VARIOUS BUSINESS VENTURES OR BY OBTAINING AGRICULTURAL OR INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYMENT. THE SURVEY INDICATED THAT 62 PERCENT DF THE FARMERS INTERVIEWED WERE ILLITERATE, AND 16 PERCENT OF THOSE WHO WERE LITERATE HAD NEVER RECEIVED ANY FORMAL EDUCATION. THIS EVALUATION RATES THE MINNESOTA CSTE PROGRAM IN TERMS OF ITS PERFORMANCE OF FOUR FUNCTIONS: RESEARCH, COORDINATION, EDUCATION, AND DEVELOPMENT. THE PROGRAM WAS JUDGED SUCCESSFUL IN IDENTIFYING THROUGH THE RESEARCH FUNCTION THE OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE TO THE DISADVANTAGED. ON THE BASIS OF THE PRIORITIES ESTABLISHED BY RESEARCH, RESOURCES OF VARIOUS PUBLIC AND PRIVATE AGENCIES WERE COMBINED TO FILL NEEDS FOR TRAINING AND JOB DEVELOPMENT IN THE COORDINATING FUNCTION, WHICH WAS CONSIDERED TO BE OF MAJOR IMPORTANCE.
