ABSTRACT

Section I of this directory is on the Federal Government educational information sources serving the public. These include the Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC), regional educational laboratories, research and development centers, and miscellaneous other sources. In addition to these listings, selected sources which deal with educationally related topics such as civil rights, mental health, community relations, manpower, and housing have been included in this section. The second section, the semi-private and private sectors, is comprised of 65 selected listings based on a questionnaire sent to 160 organizations, and deals with service agencies, research and development agencies, professional organizations, libraries, and foundations. Section III, the bibliography section, consists of journals and newsletters, and runs to an extensive listing of both. Those publications which the staff at the ERIC Information Retrieval Center on the Disadvantaged considers most useful in dealing with the education of the disadvantaged have been starred in this listing. Introduction

The compilation of this directory of information sources was undertaken in order to make available some of the sources of knowledge identified by members of the staff of the ERIC Information Retrieval Center on the Disadvantaged (ERIC/IRCD) as they have gone about the task of collecting information and documents. The directory was designed to be of use to a wide variety of people involved in the education of the disadvantaged. Some entries may be of interest to teachers, others to researchers, still others to community workers. The overriding criterion, however, in the selection of all entries was the prospective usefulness of the sources to some segment of the varied audience which this publication will reach.

Section I, The Federal Government, includes the basic network of federal educational information sources serving the public. In addition to these listings, selected sources which deal with educationally related topics such as civil rights, community relations, manpower, mental health, and housing have been included in this section.

The second section, The Semi-Private and Private Sectors, was compiled by sending a questionnaire to 160 organizations. This initial mailing list was formed from three sources: 1) the card file of institutional sources of the documents in the ERIC/IRCD collection; 2) the file of active acquisitions letters by which information and documents are solicited for ERIC/IRCD; and 3) various directories such as Educator's World. Of the 160 questionnaires, 78 responses were received in time for consideration for inclusion in this publication. A total of 65 listings were finally selected for this section.

The bibliography section consists of journals and newsletters. This extensive listing includes publications of interest to several different audiences. Some guidance has been offered by starring those publications which the ERIC/IRCD staff considers the most useful in dealing with the education of the disadvantaged.

A directory of this nature can never be considered "complete." New sources are constantly emerging and the ERIC/IRCD staff is engaged in an ongoing effort to seek them out. The aid of those using this directory is sought for this endeavor. Responses to this publication and suggestions for future publications of this nature will be greatly appreciated.

Sources of Information:

I. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

A. ERIC

ERIC (Educational Resources Information Center) is a national information system designed and supported by the U.S. Office of Education. Its purpose is to provide ready access to results of exemplary programs, research and development efforts, and related information in the field of education. The ERIC system consists of decentralized information centers, each of which is responsible for identifying, collecting, indexing and abstracting documents for a particular educational area. These centers are listed below.

The indexes and abstracts which each Center prepares are published in two monthly journals, Research in Education (RIE) which contains the listing of documents other than journal articles and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE). RIE is available by subscription from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402 for \$21.00 per year. CIJE is published for the ERIC system by the CCM Information Corporation, P.O. Box 689, FDR Station, New York, New York 10022 and costs \$39.00 per year.

Most of the documents listed in <u>RIE</u> are available from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service, P.O. Drawer O, Bethesda, Maryland 20014, in both microfiche (4x6 inch sheets of film which require special readers) and hard copy (paper copy).

<u>CIJE</u> listings are not available through the ERIC system. The journals may be found in many libraries or may be obtained from the various publishers.

Most ERIC Centers also have some reference services and produce information analysis products within their educational areas. Please consult the individual listings below for more information.


C. RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT CENTERS

They are, however, sources of research information in the form of occasional papers, working papers, annual reports, and newsletters which are prepared by the Centers.
