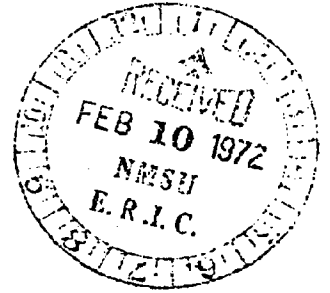

ABSTRACT

Approximately 150 newsletters, newspapers, and other periodicals are cited in this bibliography of current sources of information about or directed toward North American Indians. One-sentence descriptions of content, ordering information, and frequency of publication are provided. The majority of the periodicals cited emphasize current events of interest to American Indians or American Indian literature by native contributors. (JH)

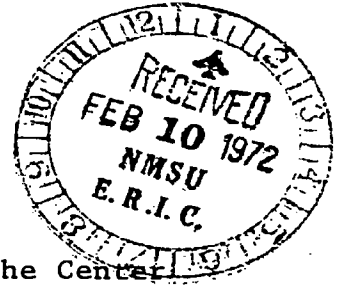

When Indian Voices ceased publication in Winter 1968, the Center for the Study of Man offered, as a service to Indian people, to handle its correspondence in an orderly and useful way. The accompanying list of currently published periodicals by, for and about American Indians should be regarded as a continuation of one of the services which Indian Voices offered to its readers. Many of you will recall that Indian Voices was one of the first Indian publications to list other Indian publications, and as a result it built up a number of exchange publications. After looking at these exchange publications we decided that publishing a list of them and disseminating it widely would be a useful service for Indian people.

The enclosed list actually goes well beyond what had been published by Indian Voices. Most, but not all, of the information is based on actual perusal of each listed source. Any quotation about a particular source is taken from the source itself.

In compiling this list we have tried to follow the following format:

1. Publication is listed in capital letters
2. Sponsoring organization is listed
3. Address of publication is listed
4. Frequency of publication is noted
5. Subscription rate (per/year) is noted
6. A brief description of the publication is included

It would not have been possible to produce this document without the cooperation of more than one hundred publishers and editors of the periodicals which we have listed. They generously provided us with copies of their excellent publications, and we are indebted to them. We are aware that some of our data may now be out of date, since we have worked on this list for a period of over two years and some publications turn out to be short-lived. In any case we ask for your corrections, completions and additions so that we might be able, in a year's time, to compile a second, more accurate, and extensive version. In corresponding about your publication please include the sponsoring organization's name for the benefit of potential subscribers.

This work was made possible through the efforts of a number of people. Ms. Carol Van Antwerp Holliday Blew began the list and was succeeded by Ms. Bess Carlton Keller who provided the bulk of the entries. Mss. Carol Ballentine and Marianna Kouskouras were responsible for the final completion of the work. Ms. Jennifer Burdick provided guidance and administrative support for the project.
