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ABSTRACT

The University of Kentucky Community College System was developed to meet the 3-fold function of providing career-oriented technical programs, pre-baccalaureate education, and adult-continuing education. This descriptive analysis is divided into four sections: Section I on enrollment emphasizes the 17.3% increase in enrollment in the system's 14 community colleges over the past year; Section II on instructional programs provides information including the enrollment, number of credit-hours offered, and number of graduates in the technical and transfer programs; Section III on financial support outlines the financing of the community college system (almost completely supported by appropriations of the state legislature), operation expenditures, and teacher salaries; and Section IV on student characteristics compares students' academic characteristics (indicated by scores on the American College Test) with selected demographic characteristics. 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DEVELOPMENT OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

In 1962 the General Assembly of Kentucky, through the leadership of Governor Bert T. Combs, enacted legislation mandating the formation of a system of community colleges and entrusted the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky with the operation of such a system. At the same time, the legislature recommended five sites for future colleges.

The two factors responsible for the operation of the system being given to the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees were first, the recognition that as the governing board of the state's land grant university, the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees already had responsibility for the planning and operation of state-wide programs and secondly, recognition of the existence of the five extension centers then being operated by the University of Kentucky. Between 1948 and 1962, the University of Kentucky had opened four extension centers at Covington, Cumberland, Fort Knox, and Henderson, and assumed the responsibility of the municipally run Ashland Junior College.

In creating a system of community colleges, the 1962 General Assembly abandoned the extension center philosophy of the program then operated by the University of Kentucky and committed the System to a comprehensive community college program. A three-fold function of career-oriented technical programs, pre-baccalaureate education, and adult-continuing education was called for in the enabling legislation.

In July 1964, the University of Kentucky, guided by the leadership of

its sixth president, Dr. John W. Oswald, provided for both the operation of a University System and a Community College System under the Board of Trustees. The Community College System operates as an autonomous system with the determination and administration of its academic programs being separate from that of the University System. The chief administrative office of the Community College System is a Vice President who is directly responsible to the President of the University.

Also in 1964, new community colleges opened at Elizabethtown and Prestonsburg, bringing the total number of campuses under the new system to seven. Total enrollment that fall was 2,876 students, an increase of 67 percent over the previous year.

The Community College System continued its growth in all respects after 1964. After studies of the need for additional community colleges in 1965 and 1967, recommendations concerning criteria to be used in establishing new community colleges made to the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees were adopted and submitted to the Council on Public Higher Education, the state's coordinating and planning body for public institutions of higher education. Acting on their recommendation, the General Assembly amended the Community College Act to recognize the Lexington Technical Institute, which had been operating on the University campus since August 30, 1965, and to authorize new community colleges at Louisville and Maysville in 1966, one at Hazard in 1967, and the last one in Madisonville in 1968. These latter four units were subsequently established and opened for students in 1968.

In July 1968, Paducah Junior College, a municipally operated college founded in the 1930's, joined the Community College System as Paducah Community College. This brought to fifteen the number of units then operating under the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees.

In January 1970, the General Assembly of Kentucky, recognizing the need for additional higher education opportunities in the Northern Kentucky area, authorized the creation of a new four-year state college, Northern Kentucky State. The facilities of the Northern Community College, operated since 1948 by the University of Kentucky, were as of July 1, 1970, transferred to the administrative control of the newly formed Northern Kentucky State College. This reduced to fourteen the number of units operating under the University of Kentucky Community College System.

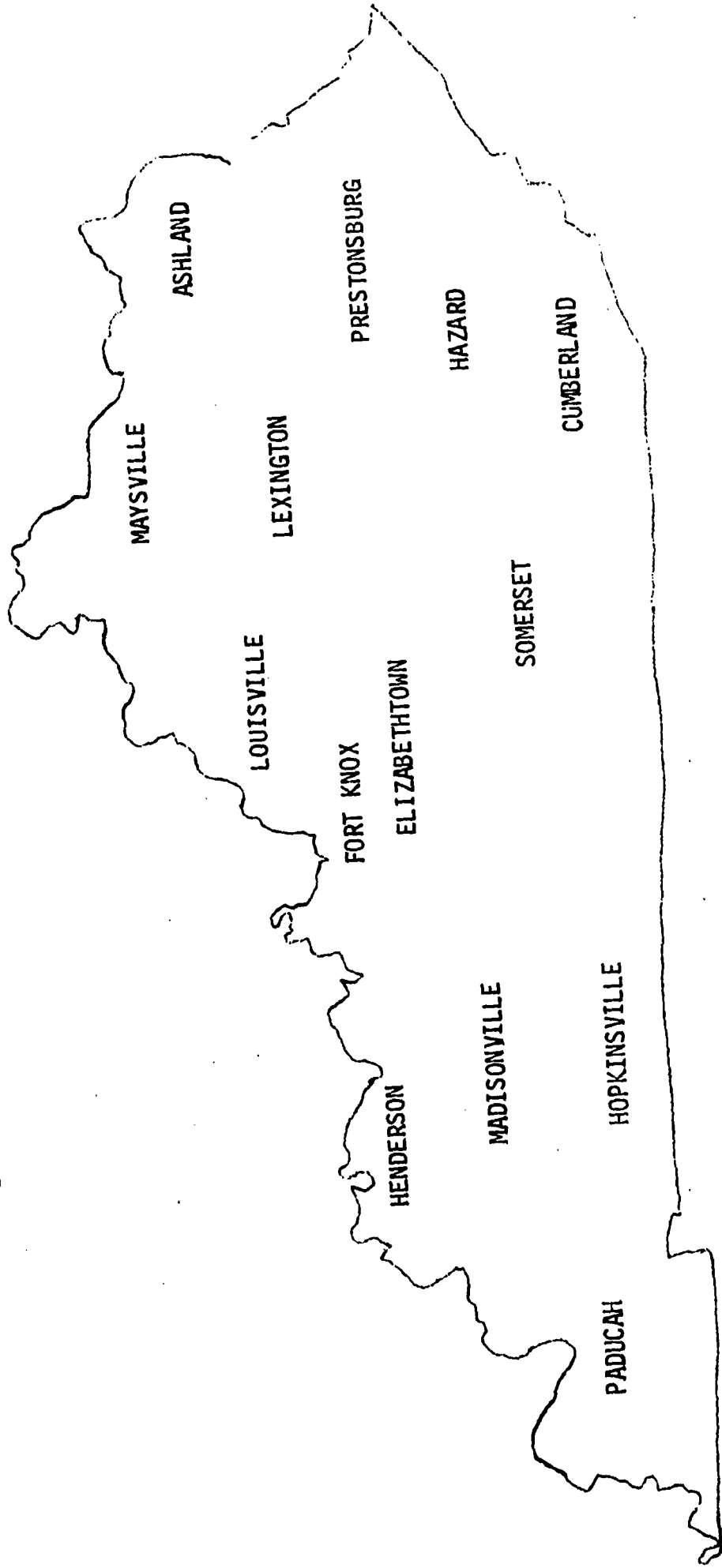
In 1968, the General Assembly authorized the establishment of two additional community colleges at Glasgow and Carrollton; however, funds have not yet been appropriated for their activation.

SECTION I

Enrollment

The number of students enrolled in the University of Kentucky Community College System during the Fall semester of 1971 is presented in Tables 1 through 3 and an enrollment history is presented in Tables 4 and 5.

The total head count credit enrollment of 11,452 students is shown in Table 1 for the fourteen community colleges operating during the Fall of 1971. This enrollment represented a numerical increase of 1,686 and a percentage increase of 17.3 percent. Approximately 74 percent of the increase (1,243 students) occurred at Jefferson Community College in Louisville where a new twelve-story, high-rise classroom building was completed allowing for a substantial increase in enrollment. Of the total enrollment, 8,643 were freshmen (75%) and 2,809 were sophomores. The ratio of freshmen to sophomores remained nearly unchanged from the previous two years and is typical of most community colleges in that the retention rate of sophomores is generally low. Nearly 60 percent of the freshmen and 65 percent of the sophomores were enrolled as full-time students. This represented an increase of 6.0 percent for freshmen and 4.0 percent for sophomores over full-time enrollments in 1970.

The number of men and women enrolled is shown in Table 2. Of the students enrolled, 6,746 (59%) were men and 4,706 were women. Nearly 67 percent of the men were enrolled as full-time students while 66 percent of the women

were enrolled on a full-time basis. This also was an increase from 1970 when 63 percent of the men and 56 percent of the women were enrolled full time.

The number of students enrolled in the Community College System by place of residence is shown in Table 3. In 1971, only 138 were non-residents of Kentucky. This means that 99 percent of those students receiving credit instruction in the Fall semester were Kentucky residents.

Enrollment History

Tables 4 and 5 present a history of enrollment in the University of Kentucky Community College System. Table 5 shows the head count enrollment since 1964 while Table 6 provides similar information as to the full-time equivalent enrollment.

Since 1964 when the System was created, credit enrollment has increased from 2,876 students in seven colleges to 11,452 students in fourteen institutions. In eight years this has meant a numerical increase of 8,576 students and a percentage increase of 298 percent. Nearly 87 percent of this growth has occurred in the eight colleges started after 1964, and the original colleges now account for only 21 percent (2,413 students) of the total enrollment as of Fall 1971. Jefferson Community College in Louisville now accounts for 33 percent of the total enrollment in the System.

Table 5 indicates the full-time equivalent credit enrollment for the period 1964-1971. The FTE computation is based on the total credit hours for which students are enrolled divided by 16 which is the full-time equivalent established by the Kentucky Council on Public Higher Education. The total FTE credit enrollment for the Fall of 1971 was 8,416. This is a numeri-

cal increase of 1,244 over the Fall 1970 enrollment and represents a percentage increase of 17 percent. This represents a tremendous increase over 1970 when the increase for that year was only 246 FTE's (3.0 percent).

Since 1964, the FTE credit enrollment has increased from 1,954 to 8,416 indicating a growth of 331 percent despite the loss of Northern Community College in 1970.

SECTION II

Instructional Programs

The University of Kentucky Community College System is committed to the development of a comprehensive educational program with increased emphasis upon two-year technical programs which prepare for job entry. Information relating to the distribution of enrollment between the transfer and technical programs is provided in Tables 6 through 12. The number of graduates in these programs is detailed in Tables 13 through 15. Table 16 provides information pertaining to the library holdings which support the instructional programs. An analysis of the degrees held by the full-time teaching faculty is found in Table 17.

An analysis of the program, transfer and technical, is shown in Tables 6 through 11. As shown in Table 6, 7,764 (67.8%) of the students are working in the transfer program while 3,688 (32.2%) are enrolled in the technical program preparing for job entry at the end of two years. The number of students enrolled in the technical program represents a significant change from 1970 when nearly 74 percent of the students were enrolled in the transfer program and only 26 percent in the technical. In the two-year period from 1969 until 1971, enrollment in the technical programs has increased from 21 percent of the total to 32.2 percent reflecting the increased emphasis on career education.

Another indication of this increased emphasis is the shift in full-time enrollments. In the transfer program 5,125 (66%) of the students are full-time. This represents a slight percentage change (3% increase) over 1970. However, in the technical program 2,495 (67.7%) of the students are full-time. This is an increase of 12.7 percent over the enrollment in 1970. Table 7 illustrates a comparison of the program enrollments by college from 1970 to 1971.

Of the students working in the transfer programs, 5,140 (66%) are men and 2,624 are women. A comparison of Tables 8 and 9 indicates that on a percentage basis, more men are enrolled in the transfer program than in the technical program. Of the 3,688 students in the technical program, 1,606 (23%) are men while 2,082 (77%) are women. This is a significant decrease in the number of male students in technical programs as 57 percent of the 1970 technical enrollment was male. This can perhaps be accounted for by the fact that the two largest technical programs, nursing and secretarial science, are fields traditionally entered by more women than men.

Table 10 presents the full-time equivalent enrollment by program. The FTE is computed on the number of credit hours taken by students divided by 16 which is the full-time equivalent figure established by the Kentucky Council on Public Higher Education. Of the 8,416 FTE students, 7,108 (84.5%) are in the transfer program while 1,308 (15.5%) are in the technical program. The variance between the 3,688 students enrolled in the technical program (Table 6) and the 1,308 FTE enrollment is attributed to the fact that approximately one half of the course work in the technical program consists of general education courses which are counted the transfer program FTE's. This variance

can also be seen in Table 11 which provides a summary of the number and percent of credit hours offered on which the FTE figure is based in these program areas for each of the fourteen colleges. Eighty-four percent of the credit hour load is in the transfer program. The remaining credit hours (16%) are in the technical classes created especially for the two-year Associate in Applied Science degrees. In addition, there are instances where a course classified as transfer is utilized for technical credit in an Associate in Applied Science program yet the enrollment of the course counts toward the transfer FTE's.

Table 12 indicates the full-time equivalent credit enrollment for the period 1969-1971. An analysis of the figures shows that the FTE enrollment in technical courses has increased from approximately 10 percent of the total enrollment in 1969 to over 15 percent in 1971. During this period of time, the adjusted FTE enrollment in the transfer program courses increased by 944 representing a 15 percent growth while the technical enrollment increased by 546 students representing a percentage increase of 72 percent. These increases in the technical programs again reflect the emphasis placed on these programs through the System as a comprehensive community college program is implemented.

An analysis of those students graduating from the University of Kentucky Community College System is shown in Tables 13 through 15. The three associate degrees are awarded to students who successfully complete with a "C" average, a particular curriculum all of which have a minimum of 64 semester hours. The Associate in Applied Science is awarded in the technical areas. The Certificate of College Studies is awarded to students who have successfully completed sixty semester hours with a "C" average. Table 13 indicates that of the 942 receiving an Associate Degree in May 1971, 619 (65.7%) were in the transfer

area while 323 (34.3%) were in technical programs.

The specific programs in which the Associate in Applied Science Degrees were given are shown in Table 14. Of the more than forty technical programs offered in the Community College System, twenty-three had graduates in May of 1971. Degrees were awarded for the first time to graduates of four programs: Cartographic Technology, Mental Health Technology, Recreation Leadership, and Social Work Technology. Of the 323 technical degrees, 139 (43%) were in Nursing and 59 (18%) in Professional Secretaryship. In terms of the broad curriculum areas, the Allied Health area dominated with 162 (50%) of all the degrees.

A history of the number of degrees and certificates awarded in the University of Kentucky Community College System is presented in Table 15. Between 1968 and 1971, the number of degrees awarded increased by 561 (147%) and the number of certificates increased by 66 (47%). There was a significant decrease in the number of certificates awarded in 1971 from 1970.

Table 16 presents information relating to the number and type of library materials supporting the instructional programs. Approximately 11,540 volumes were added during 1970-71 to bring the total volumes to 208,858. On a System-wide basis, there are 25 volumes per FTE student as of the start of the Fall semester, 1971. The average volumes per FTE at the colleges range from a low of 6 to a high of 85.

An indication of the educational level of the full-time teaching faculty is shown in Table 17. Of the 357 faculty members, the majority (79%) have a Masters Degree while 22 (6%) have a Doctorate and 52 (15%) have a Bachelors or less.

SECTION III

Financial Support

An analysis of information concerning the financial support of the University of Kentucky Community College System is presented in Tables 18 through 22. Nationally, community/junior colleges have three major sources of revenue - local tax support, student fees, and state support - for operational funds. The University of Kentucky Community College System is somewhat unique in that it is almost completely supported by appropriations of the State legislature. While two of the colleges do have the benefit of local tax support, this income has been committed for site acquisition in the case of Ashland Community College and for program enrichment at Paducah Community College. Only at Paducah do the funds actually provide operational funds. The student fees of \$150.00 per semester for a full-time state resident have been pledged to retire an eighteen million dollar bond issue which is currently being used for construction projects throughout the System. Since these two sources of potential operating revenue are not provided for general educational purposes, the state appropriation becomes the sole major source of financial support for operating purposes.

The actual operating expenditures by major category for each community college for 1970-71 is shown in Table 18 and the percentage analysis by category is shown in Table 19. During 1970-71, \$6,409,630 was expended in general

educational funds for an FTE student enrollment of 8,416. This is an average expenditure of \$762.00 per FTE student. The addition of auxiliary services and capital construction funds brought the total expended to \$7,191,381.

A percentage analysis of the expenditures for general education purposes is shown in Table 19. The percentage expenditure for instruction ranges from a low of 51.5% at Maysville to a high of 79.0% at the Lexington Technical Institute.

Information on the budgeted operating expenditures for 1971-72 is shown in Tables 20 and 21. For 1971-72, a total of \$6,890,202 is budgeted for general educational operational support. It should be noted that neither the Commonwealth of Kentucky nor the University of Kentucky has a stated policy of a fixed dollar support per FTE student. The budget is based on certain other programmed formula for educational support. Including the funds budgeted for capital outlay and auxiliary services, the total budgeted anticipated expenditures for community college programs is over \$7,742,000 for 1971-72.

Two aspects of the Community College System general education expenditures are omitted from these tables; The first is the override administrative costs for the Community College System within the University of Kentucky Lexington Campus budget. Certain administrative functions, particularly in the business area, are handled for the System through the Lexington Campus. Cost estimates of this have been listed at \$900,000 per year. In addition, debt service for the recent construction program for the community colleges is carried as a separate budget item. For 1970-71 the debt service was \$1,172,000 and is budgeted at \$1,309,400 for 1971-72. Taking these indirect costs into consideration would raise the average FTE expenditures to \$1,008.00 for 1970-71.

Information concerning the average faculty salaries for each community college is shown in Table 22. The Community College System has only this year implemented a four level rank system and at the present time there are no faculty holding the rank of professor. The average salaries do not include fringe benefits and are for a ten-month contract.

SECTION IV

Student Characteristics

An indication of the academic characteristics of entering freshmen in the University of Kentucky Community College System is represented by the scores on the American College Test. The American College Test is required of all entering students who have graduated from high school and are under 21 years of age. Thus, not all entering students are included in the test results but the scores are representative of the vast majority of entering students. The ACT Test is a national achievement test which yields standard scores in the areas of English, mathematics, social sciences, natural science, and a composite score. It is used by all the public institutions of higher education in the state as a counseling and placement device.

The mean standard scores for each of the four tests and the composite score for all entering students in the Fall 1971 is shown by college in Table 23. A total of 3,504 students were included in the results. The mean composite ACT score varies from a high of 18.6 at Ashland Community College to a low of 14.4 at Southeast Community College. The mean composite of 17.4 for the System as a whole is lower than the mean composite of 19.3 for the eight public senior institutions of higher education in the state. The differences between male and female students is shown in Table 24 and Table 25.

The mean composite score is higher for men than women. A comparison of the mean scores for community college students since 1967 can be seen in Table 26. The mean scores for community college students actually declined from 1970 to 1971 indicating that the community colleges are probably reaching students who would not normally enroll in a college or university.

Information concerning the estimated family income is found in Table 27. Five percent of the students reported less than \$3,000 annual income, while nine percent reported an annual income between \$3,000 and \$4,999. This fourteen percent have incomes of \$5,000 or below. This compares to five percent for the University of Kentucky's Lexington campus and nine percent for the eight public senior institutions of higher education in the state.

The ethnic background of the students enrolled in the Community College System is found in Table 28. The overwhelming majority of the students are Caucasian (93%) with the next largest ethnic group being Afro-American (7%).
