ABSTRACT

This annotated bibliography represents a compilation of nonformal education programs. Included are Agency for International Development (AID) reports and documents and other materials covering the work of international agencies and various other organizations and individuals. The materials are classified under four main headings. They are: (1) Definition and Scope, (2) Function, (3) Delivery Systems, and (4) Target Areas. The purpose of the bibliography is to assist the AID technician in the task of developing peoples capacities by pinpointing and concentrating on their most urgent social and economic problems. It is felt that this can be accomplished outside the realm of formal education by utilizing nonformal education. Nonformal education encompasses learning and development of skills (1) in the home, (2) in youth or adult activities; (3) in military training; (4) in social and political organizations; (5) on the job in private industry; and (6) in special government, foreign aid, or United Nations training projects. Nonformal education is thought to be increasingly important in developing nations where school costs are prohibitive, and there is an urgent need for adult education to teach family planning, better farming techniques, and training in new skills. INTRODUCTION

While AID reports and documents are important elements in this bibliography, other materials covering the work of international agencies and various other organizations and individuals are included. This bibliography reflects a large measure of the experience which has been accumulated on programs now being called "non-formal education." AID is grateful for the assistance rendered by the many offices, bureaus and departments of the Federal and state governments, universities, and private agencies in connection with the development of this bibliography.

The Meaning of Non-Formal Education

AID is giving top priority in the field of manpower and educational planning to non-formal education. Skills and knowledge are derived in part through formal education in primary and secondary schooling and higher education institutions. However, outside of this formal learning structure lies what may be called non-formal education: learning and development of skills in the home and in youth or adult activities; in military training and in social and political organizations, on the job in private industry; and in special government, foreign aid or United Nations training projects.

Indeed, after man learns to read and write, and if possible finish his formal schooling, a great deal if not most of his improvement of skills and knowledge comes from the radio, newspapers, television, and from many other delivery systems. This is particularly true in the developing nations where in the majority of cases, costs for schools are increasing faster than enrollments and faster than national income.

Added to the problem of costs of school construction and teacher training, there is the urgent need for adult education to teach family planning, better farming techniques to feed rapidly expanding populations, and to train mature hands in new skills for everything from light industry to civic administration and homemaking. A very large proportion of children now being born will have little or no formal education at all. Their main chance for learning will be through some kind of non-formal education. In the past decade, most external assistance has been channeled into formal education, while non-formal education and training have been largely neglected. It would appear now that greater attention to non-formal education might be much more productive.

Developing the capacities of people is a life-time process, but by pin-pointing and concentrating on their most urgent social and economic problems, their development should proceed at a faster pace. This bibliography has been prepared to assist the technician in this

important task. Because the term non-formal may apply to every kind of instruction outside the formal education framework, it has been difficult to define and de-limit the field. It was decided that the most practical and useful guidance to the research might be to organize the bibliographic listings under the main heads of Definition and Scope, Function, Delivery Systems, and Target Areas. Items dealing with non-formal teaching in the United States and other industrialized nations have been included if it was thought to be applicable in newly developing countries.

GUIDES TO USE OF THIS BIBLIOGRAPHY

1. The first point of reference should be the Table of Contents to see if the subject of particular interest is shown. Additional information about the topics covered in individual publications is provided by the annotations.
2. For a preliminary statement on AID's definition of non-formal education, see AIDTO Circulars NES A-2283, 10/15/70; Latin America, A-2318, 10/20/70; Africa, A-2382, 10/28/70; and East Asia, A-2525, 11/14/70.
3. For a detailed inventory of what one nation is doing in the field of non-formal education, see the UNESCO report Planning Non-Formal Education in Tanzania by Jane King. This is an early attempt to define the field; it describes how Tanzania is making substantial progress by employing practical programs for the productive use of educational resources outside the formal school system.
4. The documents listed in the Definition and Scope Section at the beginning of this bibliography are regarded as being particularly important in providing orientation on non-formal education.

Orders should list the author, title, publisher or sponsoring agency, and most important of all, the order number.

The cost of paper copies of documents of more than 300 pages may be obtained by writing NTIS. There is an extra service charge of \$3.00 per document for reports which are more than two years old.

Discusses scattered sponsorship and administration, major "shadow" systems of education, the needs of the developing nations for non-institutional education, and the common needs of all nations.

He indicates that in most developing countries non-formal education's role in generating skills, influencing attitudes, and moulding values is of equal if not greater importance than formal schooling.
