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ABSTRACT

About 25.6 million persons were below the low-income level in 1971, according to the results of the Current Population Survey conducted in March, 1972, by the Bureau of the Census. The sex of the family head continues to be an important factor in the poverty status of families. Families with a female head in 1971 accounted for only 12 percent of all families, but 40 percent of the low-income families. White families headed by a female accounted for about one-third of all white families in the low-income category; the corresponding figure for Negroes was about three-fifths. Although the total number of low-income families did not change over the past year, the proportion headed by a woman increased from 37 percent in 1970 to 40 percent in 1971 with a corresponding decrease in the percent of low-income families which were headed by a man. In 1971, one-tenth of all white persons were in the low-income category as compared to about one-third for Negroes. There are significant differences in the age composition of the white and Negro low-income groups. In 1971, children under 18 years accounted for about 36 percent of all white persons below the low-income level as compared to 52 percent of all low-income Negroes. In contrast, aged family heads (65 years and over) and aged unrelated individuals comprised about 17 percent of all low-income whites, but only about seven percent of the low-income Negroes. CHARACTERISTICS OF THE LOW-INCOME POPULATION: 1971

(Advance data from March 1972 Current Population Survey)

About 25.6 million persons were below the low-income level in 1971, according to the results of the Current Population Survey conducted in March 1972 by the Bureau of the Census. This figure is not significantly different from the 1970 figure of 25.4 million due to sampling variability. There was also no statistically significant change in the number of white and Negro low-income persons.

In 1971, the low-income or poverty threshold-the income level which separates "poor" from "nonpoor"--was \$4,137 for a nonfarm family of four; it was \$3,968 in 1970, and \$2,973 in 1959. These thresholds are updated every year to reflect the changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The CPI increased by about 4.3 percent between 1970 and 1971, but incomes rose sufficiently so that the number of persons in the low-income category remained unchanged.

Since 1959, the first year for which data on the low-income population are available, there has been a sizeable reduction in the number and percent of persons below the low-income level--from 22 percent of the population in 1959 to about 12

percent in 1971. In 1971, one-tenth of all white persons were in the low-income category as compared to about one-third for Negroes.

The sex of the family head continues to be an important factor in the poverty status of families. Families with a female head in 1971 accounted for only 12 percent of all families, but 40 percent of the low-income families. White families headed by a female accounted for about one-third of all white families in the low-income category; the corresponding figure for Negroes was about threefifths. Although the total number of low-income families did not change over the past year, the proportion headed by a woman increased from 37 percent in 1970 to 40 percent in 1971 with a corresponding decrease in the percent of low-income. families which were headed by a man. In 1959, families with a female head accounted for only about 23 percent of all low-income families. Since 1959, the number of low-income families with a female head has increased by one tenth, whereas families headed by a male decreased by one half,

There are significant differences in the age composition of the white and Negro low-income groups. In 1971, children under 18 years accounted for about 36 percent of all white persons below the low-income level as compared to 52 percent of all low-income Negroes. In contrast, aged family heads (65 years and over) and aged unrelated individuals comprised about 17 percent of all low-income whites, but only about 7 percent of the low-income Negroes.

Although about 68 percent of the Nation's families lived in the metropolitan areas in 1971,56 percent of the low-income families lived in these

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Families and unrelated individuals are classified as being above or below the low-income level, using the poverty index adopted by a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969. This index centers around the Department of Agriculture's Economy Food Plan and reflects the different consumption requirements of families based on their size and composition, sex and age of the family head, and farm-nonfarm residence. areas. About 50 percent of low-income white families living in metropolitan areas were central city residents as compared to 80 percent of low-income Negro families.

The median income deficit for low-income families was about \$1,100 in 1971. For white families, the deficit was about \$1,050 as compared to \$1,250 for Negro families, a somewhat smaller difference than in the preceding year. The difference in the median deficit between white and Negro families is accounted for in part by the smaller average size of white families below the low-income level--3,6 persons for whites and 4.4 for Negroes.

On the average, 1971 incomes of low-income families headed by men were closer to being raised above the poverty line than those of families headed by women. About 29 percent of the low-income families headed by a man had incomes within \$500 of moving out of the low-income category as compared to only about 18 percent for those families headed by a woman.

This report excludes inmates of institutions and unrelated individuals under 14 years. It includes only those members of the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post. More detailed data on the low-income population will appear in a report in this series to be issued later this year.

The estimates for 1971 are based on data obtained in the March 1972 Current Population Survey (Cl'S) of the Bureau of the Census, Approximately 47,000 households were eligible for interview. Of this number, 1,700 occupied units, on the average, were visited, but interviews were not obtained because the occupants were not found at home after repeated calls or were unavailable for some other reason. Since the estimates in this report are based on a sample, they are subject to sampling variability. Moreover, as in all field surveys of income, the figures are subject to errors of response and nonreporting. All statements of comparison made in the text of this report, however, are statistically significant. This means that the chances are at least 19 in 20 that a difference identified in the text indicates a true difference in the population rather than the chance variations arising from the use of samples.

Comparability of Estimates from the March 1972 CPS with Estimates for Previous Years

The data for 1971 collected in the March 1972 Current Population Survey (CPS) are, in some instances, not entirely comparable to figures for earlier years because of revisions in the Current Population Survey. Starting in January 1972, 1970 census-based population controls, metropolitan residence definition, and other materials were introduced into the sample and estimation procedures. The major item affecting comparability at the overall national level is the introduction of population controls based on the 1970 census. Figures for previous years are tied in with 1960 census-based population controls. In a number of instances, data from the March 1971 CPS were revised to take account of 1970 census-based population controls, thus providing some measure of the impact of the change (see tables 1 and 2). Basically, these changes should have no substantial impact on summary measures, such as medians and means, and on proportional measures, such as percent distributions and lowincome or poverty rates. However, the changes may have more impact on the population levels in different subgroupings such as the total number of persons or families either overall, within some particular income interval, or below the lowincome level,

The figures shown in this report for metropolitan areas (SMSA's) are based on the SMSA's as defined on the basis of the 1970 census; those published in earlier years referred to SMSA's as defined on the basis of the 1960 census. There are significant differences in the population classified as metropolitan from each of these definitions. For the 1970 definition of SMSA's, see U.S. Census of Population: 1970, Number of Inhabitants, PC(1)-AI, United States Summary.

Another change in the Current Population Survey which affects occupational data only, is the inclusion of a supplemental question, "What were your most important activities or duties?," which provided additional information for classifying persons by occupation. In general, the major impact of this supplemental question was to reclassify some persons from the "managers" classification into other types of occupations (primarily into the major occupation group of "craftsmen")
