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ABSTRACT

This course is designed to acquaint the student with the preparation needed, job opportunities, salaries, and fringe benefits of health-related occupations. The course helps the student to become aware of the various career opportunities in this field. The course requires no special skills or previous knowledge. The 45-hour course utilizes a booklet consisting of six blocks of instruction which are divided into several units each. Classroom instruction includes guest speakers and field trips to a variety of health agencies and lectures. Student involvement is stressed through the use of audiovisual materials, student-conducted studies, interviews with various health personnel, and oral reports on many job opportunities. (Author/WS)

PREFACE

The purpose of this course outline is to acquaint the student with the preparation needed, job opportunities, salaries and fringe benefits for health-related occupations.

The increasingly complex and changing nature of occupations in our modern society makes it almost a must that young people on the threshold of planning for a career be fully aware not only of the many career opportunities open to them but of the working conditions, opportunities, and prospects of these occupations.

This course is being prepared for quinmester use and is 45 hours in length. There are no special skills and/or knowledge required for enrollment. This outline consists of six blocks of instruction which are subdivided into several units each.

The student is first given an orientation of the overall class requirements and his responsibilities. Next, the specialized administrative occupations in the areas of hospitals, health department and voluntary health agencies, as well as administrative service occupations common to the many fields of employment, are concred. In different career opportunities in professional nursing and its areas of specialities tion, the block entitled "Nursing and Related Services" covers not only practical nursing, but also the varied supporting occupations associated with nursing in the provision of all-around patient care. Along with dentistry and its professional specialities, the section, dentistry and Allied Services, covers various supporting occupations. Each of those offers a distinctive kind of career opportunity in the dental field. Career opportunities in health-related scientific research identify familiar and nonfamiliar health specialities, not only in biology, but also in chemistry and physics. In addition to these health services,



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they include some supporting occupations needed in research 1 borntories. Doctors of medicine and osteopathy and their specialities are covered under the topic "Medical Professions." A post-test is included in the Appendix.

Classroom instruction will include guest speakers and field trips to a variety of health agencies and lectures. Student involvement will be stressed through the use of the audiovisual materials, student conducted studies, interviews with various health personnel, and oral reports on many job opportunities.

This outline was developed through the cooperative efforts of the instructional and supervisory personnel, the Quinmester Advisory Committee and the Vocational Teacher Education Service, and has been approved by the Dade County Vocational Curriculum Committee.

Duties

a. Registered Nurse

Administers medicine and treatments prescribed by the doctor; observes, evaluates and records symptoms, reactions, and progress; assists in education and reliabilitation of patient and instructs auxiliary personnel or students, etc.

b. License Practical Nurse

Assists in caring for medical and surgical patients, convalescents, handicapped people, and others who are physically or mentally ill. Under the direction of a doctor or registered nurse, she provides nursing care which requires technical knowledge but not the professional training of a R.N.

- 5. a. Doctors of Medicine Diagnose diseases and treat people who are ill or in poor health, concerned with preventive medicine and with the rehabilitation of people who are injured or ill; at least three years of college education before admission to medical school. To qualify for a license, a candidate must graduate from an approved medical school, pass a licensing examination and serve a year of hospital internship. To become a specialist they must spend 2-4 years (depending on speciality) in advanced hospital training as a resident.
 - b. Doctors of Osteopathy Diagnose, prescribe remedies, and treat diseases of the human body, paying particular attention to impairments in the muscular-skeletal system. They emphasize manual manipulative therapy. Three years of pre-osteopathic college work is the minimum requirement from entry to schools of osteopathy, 4 years preferred. Four years of professional study for the degree of Doctor of Osteopathy. Specialist 3 years of additional training followed by 2 years of supervised practice in the speciality.
