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ABSTRACT

This publication, a pilot study intended to serve as a benchmark for a future series, should prove useful to those who are working toward the improvement of State department of education personnel salaries, as well as to those interested in the development of some uniformity in position title and function for future surveys. A questionnaire sent to all State departments of education was divided into eight major sections: (1) professional and administrative employees for executive administration; (2-7) professional, administrative, and technical employees for administration and special services; for finance, business, and plant; for instructional administration-services and instructional services; for employee personnel services; and for pupil personnel programs and services; and (8) clerical employees. Tables give State-by-State listings; and summary tables contain salary distributions, means, medians, quartiles, and ranges of salaries paid for the major functions within each major area of activity.

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FOREWORD

THIS STUDY OF SALARIES paid professional, administrative, technical, and clerical employees of the state departments of education is a pilot study, for until now no comparable information has been available. For those interested in such a series of data, this Report should provide a benchmark.

Because it was almost impossible to develop a questionnaire that would exactly encompass the organizational structures of all 50 state departments of education, a functional approach was used to obtain the greatest comparability of data. Even so, it sometimes was necessary for the NEA Research Division staff to make arbitrary decisions about the incorporation of information into the Report. Readers should keep these limitations in mind.

It is hoped that this Report will also be useful in improving the salaries of state department of education personnel and in developing some uniformity in position title and function for future surveys.

The NEA Research Division wishes to express to the Council of Chief State School Officers its appreciation for advice, counsel, and cooperation in developing the questionnaire and during preparation of the Report.

INTRODUCTION

FOR THE FISCAL YEAR, roughly covering the school year 1969-70, there were approximately 32,900 persons employed by the departments of education in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Canal Zone, and Puerto Rico. Of these, approximately 15,430, or 46.9 percent, were in professional, administrative, or technical positions; 14,145, or 43.0 percent, were in clerical positions; and the remaining 3,325, or 10.1 percent, were in positions otherwise classified.

The total payroll for all state departments of education for 1969-70 was approximately \$270,993,227, of which \$112,191,196, or 41.1 percent, came from federal funds. Grants from federal sources ranged from a low of 15.0 percent reported by one state department to as much as 80.0 percent of the total payroll of another state department. Five departments reported that 70 percent or more of their payroll was derived from federal sources, and 14 reported that at least 60 percent came from federal funds.

The mean salary for all professional and administrative employees included in the study was \$12,162 in 1969-70. The mean for chief state school officers was \$24,625, ranging from a low of \$13,750 to a high of \$45,000.

The estimates above were made in connection with a survey made by the NEA Research Division in cooperation with the Council of Chief State School Officers to obtain comprehensive data on the salaries of professional, administrative, technical, and clerical employees of state departments of education. The questionnaire was designed to incorporate most of the major functions found in the various organizational structures of the state departments of education. It was based on functions, not position titles, because of the widespread variation in the use of titles from state to state.

The U.S. Office of Education Handbook IV was used to establish definitions of functions, and the employees classified as professional or administrative were defined in the study to include those staff members assigned to perform activities regarded as professional in the field of education by the laws and regulations governing certification in the state or by other professional educational requirements recognized by the state; and those staff members whose assignments relate more closely to a particular field of professional or technical specialization than education.

Salary information was requested for five major groups of clerical employees: secretaries and stenographers, typists and clerk-typists, accounting and payroll clerks, other clerks or clerical assistants, data-processing machine operators, and others engaged in data processing. No further detail in classification was possible because of the widespread variation in definitions among clerical positions.

Scope of Study

Usable information was received from 44 states, the Canal Zone, and Puerto Rico. Salary information for chief state school officers was obtained for nonrespondent state departments from another source.

This study includes salary information for 10,988, or 71.2 percent, of the estimated 15,430 professional, administrative, or technical employees employed in 1969-70 by all state departments of education. Salary information for 10,244, or 72.4 percent, of the total estimated 14,145 clerical employees was also received. The summary data shown in Tables A through I are based on information received from reporting states. While no attempt was made to project these summaries on a national scale, the response was sufficiently adequate and representative to justify the use of these data as national estimates. As indicated above, however, national projections were made for the total number of employees and the total payroll for all state departments.

State-by-state listings of reported salary information appear in Tables 1 through 6 for six of the seven major position groupings used in the questionnaire. No state listing was made for clerical positions which are summarized in Table I.

Occasionally arbitrary decisions were necessary in order to fit reported information into the general pattern of the study.

Summary Tables

The questionnaire which was sent to all state departments was divided into eight major sections. A summary table was made for each section. These summary Tables B through I contain salary distributions, means, medians, quartiles, and ranges of salaries paid for the major functions within each major area of activity. Table A summarizes means, medians, and the range of

salaries paid employees in each of the eight major areas of activity throughout the various state departments of education.

Section I of the questionnaire concerned professional and administrative employees for executive administration. For this group a total of 688 executive officers were reported: 52 chief state school officers,^{1/} 48 deputy chief state school officers, 205 associate or assistant chiefs, 66 administrative assistants, and 297 directors of major divisions. The total payroll for this group was \$12,988,805, with a mean salary of \$19,444. The mean salary for the chief state school officers was \$24,625, with a range of \$13,750 for the lowest salary to a high of \$45,000. These data are shown in Table B.

Of the 297 directors of major divisions reported, 34 were in charge of vocational technical, or adult education programs; 28 were in charge of pupil personnel programs and services; and 26 headed divisions for curriculum and instructional services. The mean salary for the 297 directors was \$17,250, ranging from a low of \$9,152 to a high of \$27,605.

Part II of the questionnaire concerned salaries paid professional employees for administration and special services. Table C summarizes data for the 12 major functions incorporated into this section. A total of 1,165 employees are included in this group which had a mean salary of \$12,783, ranging from \$5,040 to \$25,311. Of the 1,165 employees, 238, or 20.4 percent, were engaged in the administration of federal aids and/or grants, with a mean salary of \$12,969.

A total of 217, or 18.6 percent of the 1,165 employees in this group, were engaged in research and/or statistics with a mean salary of \$12,569.

Salaries for professional and administrative employees for finance, business, and plant were grouped in Part III of the questionnaire, and the summary data are shown in Table D. A total of 976 employees were reported for this group which was divided into seven functional divisions with a mean salary of \$11,224. This is the lowest mean salary for any of the seven major groups of professional, administrative, and technical employees included in the survey. A total of 210, or 21.5 percent, of the 976 employees, were employed in data processing with a mean salary of \$10,738. A mean salary of \$13,373 was found for the 129 employees involved in school plant planning and construction.

By far the largest group of employees was found to be in the area of instructional administration and services which was shown in Part IV of the questionnaire and summarized in Table E.

A total of 6,035, or almost 55 percent, of the total nonclerical personnel reported, were employed in the 19 major functions included under the heading of instructional administration and services. The mean salary for this group was \$11,260. Of this group, 3,209, or 53.2 percent, were working in the area of vocational rehabilitation and/or veterans' training, most of which is federally funded. The mean salary for the latter group was \$10,382.

Library services accounted for 732 of the 6,035 positions, and the next largest group, 243, were in the area of elementary and/or secondary education.

Only 508 employees were reported in positions involving instructional services for subject-matter areas. These were included in Part V of the questionnaire, and the data are summarized in Table F. For the 508 positions a mean salary of \$13,332 was obtained with a range of salaries from \$8,040 to \$21,760. Of the nine functions included in this group, the largest number, 81, was reported in the area of physical and health education, with 64 in science and 63 in social studies.

A total of 243 professional or administrative employees were reported for staff personnel services. Salary data for this group were requested in Part VI of the questionnaire and are summarized in Table G under four functional groups. The mean salary for this group was \$12,486. Of the 243 positions, 120, or 49.4 percent, were in the area of teacher certification and professional standards.

A total of 1,403 positions were reported for pupil personnel programs and services in Section VII of the survey and summarized in Table H in 13 functional classifications. The mean salary for this group was \$12,231, ranging from \$5,000 to \$28,356. Of the 1,403 employees, 312, or 22.2 percent, were involved with programs for handicapped children; 224, or 16.0 percent, were working with school lunch programs, 189, or 13.5 percent, were engaged in programs for guidance and testing, and 107, or 7.6 percent, were working on programs for exceptional children.

Section VIII of the questionnaire requested salary data for six major groupings of clerical employees. This information is summarized in Table I. The mean salary for all clerical employees reported was \$5,270. That for accounting and payroll clerks was \$6,080, and for secretaries and stenographers, the mean was \$5,295. The mean salary paid to data-processing employees (other than machine operators) was \$6,486. Information on a state-by-state basis was not tabulated for clerical employees.

Tables 1 through 6 give state-by-state listings from which summary Tables A through K were derived. Table E is a summary of Table 4, Parts A and B.
