ABSTRACT

North Carolina senior colleges and universities awarded 6.3% more degrees in 1971-72 than in the previous year. Data provided by the 47 public and private senior institutions show that 26,214 degrees were awarded in 1971-72 compared to 24,669 in 1970-71. The increase occurred at all levels--bachelor's, first professional, master's, and doctor's. This document presents a breakdown of the degrees awarded by institution and type of degree and by field of study, type of degree and sex of recipient. (Author/HS)

## DEGREES CONFERRED BY NORTH CAROLINA SENIOR COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES, 1971-72

North Carolina senior colleges and universities awarded 6.3 percent more degrees in 1971-72 than in the previous year. Data provided by the 47 public and private senior institutions and compiled by The University of North Carolina show that 26,214 degrees were awarded in 1971-72 compared to 24,669 in 1970-71. The increase occurred at all levels---bachelor's, first professional, master's, and doctor's. The number and percent change at each level for 1971-72 as well as for 1970-71 and 1969-70 are as follows:

Types of Degrees. Earned degrees conferred by the public and private senior institutions are classified under four general types: 1) bachelor's, 2) first professional, 3) master's, and 4) doctor's. Medical degrees (M.D. and D.D.S.) are included in the "first professional" type. For definitions of the various types, see page 5.

Public Senior Institutions. The 16 public senior institutions granted 17,519 degrees in the 12-month period ending June 30, 1972. This total is a 7.2 percent increase over the 16,254 degrees conferred during the year ending June 30, 1971.

Of the 17,519 degrees conferred by the public senior institutions during 1972, 13,167 were bachelor's, 353 first professional, 3,479 master's, and 520 doctor's. The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill led the public institutions in percentage of total degrees granted by each type. The Chapel Hill institution conferred 21.4 percent of the total bachelor's, 90.7 percent of the total first professional, 38.1 percent of the total master's, and 60.6 percent of the total doctor's degrees.

Fields of study in which the largest number of degrees were awarded at the bachelor's level were education and the social sciences. The number in education was 3,369.5 and in social sciences 2,492. At the first professional degree level, 228 of the degrees awarded were in law and 125 in health professions. At the master's level, 1,444 were in education and 311 in health professions. At the doctor's level, 93 were in biological sciences, 85.5 in social sciences, 70 in education, and 51 in physical sciences.

More degrees were granted to men than women. Men received 55.4 percent of the degrees at the bachelor's level; 94.6 percent at the first professional level; 56.0 percent at the master's level; and 83.8 percent at the doctor's level.

In certain fields of study, however, women earned more degrees than men. These fields were education, fine and applied arts, foreign languages, the health professions, home economics, letters, library science, and psychology, at the bachelor's level; fine and applied arts, foreign languages, home economics, letters, library science, and public affairs and services at the master's level; and foreign languages and home economics at the doctor's level. In no major fields of study at the first professional level did women earn more degrees than men.

Private Senior Institutions. A total of 8,695 degrees were conferred by 31 private senior institutions (including Bible colleges) during the year ending June 30, 1972, an increase of 3.3 percent over the 8,415 granted during the previous year. The 1971-72 total comprised 7,597 bachelor's, 442 first professional, 413 master's, and 243 doctor's degrees. Duke University led the private institutions in degrees granted. Duke conferred 15.0 percent of the bachelor's degrees, 66.5 percent of the first professional, 81.8 percent of the master's, and 97.5 percent of the doctor's degrees.

The areas of study in which the largest number of total bachelor's degrees were conferred by the private senior sector were social sciences (1,970) and education (1,501.5). The largest number of total professional degrees were conferred in law (217), health professions (157), and theology (68). The largest number of total master's degrees were in education (122), social sciences (88), and health professions (46). The largest number of total doctor's degrees were in social sciences (59) and biological sciences (46).

The pattern in the sex of degree recipients for the private institutions closely corresponded to that of the public institutions.

Private institutions conferred no degrees in several fields of study, for example, area studies and library science. Private institutions conferred more degrees than public in theology and interdisciplinary studies at the bachelor's level; in health professions and theology at the first professional level; and in theology at the master's level.

A detailed report on degrees conferred by North Carolina institutions, containing current and past statistics, is scheduled for publication in The University of North Carolina's forthcoming Statistical Abstract of Higher Education in North Carolina, 1972-73.

## WHAT ARE DEGREES?

Since 1642 academic degrees have been conferred by American colleges and universities. In North Carolina, as elsewhere, the number and variety of academic degrees have grown concurrently with the diversification of higher educational opportunities. Throughout the collegiate world degrees continue to serve as the chief formal recognition of the successful completion of specific programs of study. Degrees conferred by North Carolina's colleges and universities are one measure of the contributions of these institutions to the state and to the nation. Commonly accepted definitions of degrees are as follows:

### Associate Degree

Although data on associate degrees granted are not included in this report, the following definition is included as general information. The associate degree is awarded upon completion of at least two but less than four years of work beyond high school. Usually the degrees of associate in arts and associate in science are based on work that is wholly or chiefly creditable towards a bachelor's degree. Usually the degree of associate in applied science is based on work in one of the occupational-technical fields and represents preparation for immediate employment.

### Bachelor's Degree

A degree granted upon completion of an educational program requiring at least four but not more than five years of academic work in the liberal arts, sciences, and professional fields.

### First Professional Degree

A degree which signifies the completion of the academic requirements for a selected profession, which is based on an educational program requiring at least two academic years of previous college work for entrance and which requires a total of at least six academic years of college work for completion. Examples of first professional degrees are the bachelor of laws (LL.B.), doctor of dental surgery (D.D.S.), and doctor of medicine (M.D.) degrees.

### Master's Degree

A degree customarily granted upon successful completion of one academic year of work (sometimes two) in the liberal arts and sciences beyond the bachelor's degree.

### Doctor's Degree

The highest academic degree in a given discipline or profession, based generally on 1) three or more years of graduate work, 2) satisfaction of a foreign language requirement, and 3) completion of a special study resulting in a dissertation approved by a committee of the faculty. Examples of doctor's degrees are the doctor of education (Ed.D.), doctor of public administration (D.P.A.), doctor of public health (D.P.H.), and doctor of philosophy (Ph.D.).
