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ABSTRACT

This report presents social and economic statistics for the population of the United States below the low-income level in 1971, based on the March 1972 Current Population Survey. Included are data on selected characteristics of the population below the low-income level in 1971, such as geographic distribution, race and ethnic origin, family status, size of family, education, employment status, work experience, occupation, income (including type and source), and income deficit. Several historical tables detailing a picture of the changing composition of the population below and above the low-income level since 1959, the first year for which low-income data are available, are also presented. A description of the population below the low-income level in 1971 and some analysis of changes in the composition of this population over the past year and since 1959 are included. Families and unrelated individuals are classified as being above or below the low-income level, using the poverty index adopted by a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969. This index centers around the Department of Agriculture's Economy Food Plan and reflects the different consumption requirements of families based on family size, sex, and age of the family head, the number of children, and farm-nonfarm residence. 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Characteristics of the Low-Income Population 1971

This report presents social and economic statistics for the population of the United States below the low-income level in 1971, based on the March 1972 Current Population Survey (CPS). A description of the population below the low-income level in 1971 and some analysis of changes in the composition of this population over the past year and since 1959 are included.

Families and unrelated individuals are classified as being above or below the low-income level, using the poverty index adopted by a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969. This index centers around the Department of Agriculture's Economy Food Plan and reflects the different consumption requirements of families based on family size, sex and age of the family head, the number of children, and farm-nonfarm residence. In order to keep the poverty index constant over time, the thresholds are updated annually based on changes in the Consumer Price Index. The lowincome threshold for a nonfarm family of four was \$4,137 in 1971, \$3,968 in 1970, and \$2,973 in 1959. See page 17 for a detailed explanation of the lowincome definition. In the text of this report, the terms "low-income" and "poverty" are used interchangeably.

Changing Composition of the Low-Income Population: 1959 to 1971

In 1971, there were 25.6 million persons below the low-income level (Table A). Since 1959, there has been a sizable reduction in the number and percent of persons below the low-income level--from about 22 percent of the population in 1959 to 12 percent in 1971. As the number of low-income persons has declined over the past thirteen years, the composition of the low-income

population has changed considerably. Although the number of poor did not change significantly between 1970 and 1971, there were shifts in the number of persons in certain subgroupings, thus changing the composition of the low-income population over the past year.

Since 1959, the number of poor persons has decreased by about 35 percent with the rate of decline being faster for whites than for Negroes. The number of white persons below the low-income level has decreased by about 38 percent between 1959 and 1971 as compared to a 29 percent

decrease for low-income Negroes. Whites continued to make up over two-thirds of all poor persons, but Negroes remained overrepresented in the poverty ranks. In 1971, Negroes represented 11 percent of all persons in the United States but accounted for 29 percent of the low-income population. The poverty rates for both whites and Negroes have declined substantially since 1959, when over one-half of all Negroes and close to one-fifth of all white persons were poor. By 1971, about one-third of all Negroes were below the low-income level, compared to one-tenth of all whites.

In 1971, about 2.4 million, or 26 percent, of the persons who identified themselves as being of Spanish origin were below the low-income level. Persons of Spanish origin represented about 9 percent of the low-income population, but only 4 percent of the persons above the low-income level. Since 1970, the first year for which low-income data by ethnic origin were available, the number and percent of Spanish who were poor has not changed significantly.

Since 1959, and between 1970 and 1971, there have been significant changes in the proportion of the low-income population who were aged. Between 1959 and 1970, the proportion of the poor who were 65 years old and over increased from 14 percent to 19 percent (Table B). During the past year, however, the number of aged poor has decreased by 520,000, or about 11 percent, thus reducing their representation among the poverty ranks to 17 percent. This decline appears to be related mainly to the fact that Social Security payments increased by about one-fourth between December 1969 and March 1971.3 Reversing the perspective somewhat, in 1959 about one out of every three elderly persons was below the lowincome level. By 1970, this ratio had fallen to one in four, and between 1970 and 1971 it declined to almost one in five (22 percent). The significant decline in the aged poor between 1970 and 1971 was hidden somewhat in the total low-income population because there is some evidence that the number of persons 14 to 44 years old increased by about 6 percent during the same period.

In 1971, there were 5.3 million families with incomes below the low-income level, comprising about 10 percent of all families in the United States (Table C). The comparable figures in

1959 were 8.3 million, or about 18 percent. The sex and age of the family head are important factors in the poverty status of families. Between 1959 and 1971 the number of low-incomefamilies headed by a man docreased by about 50 percent, with the rate of decrease being greater for families of Negro and other races (56 percent) than for white families (48 percent). Over the same period of time, however, the number of poor families headed by a white woman did not change significantly, and the number of low-income families headed by a woman of Negro and other

races increased by about one-third. As the number of low-income families headed by men decreased over the past thirteen years, the proportion headed by women has increased sharply (23 percent in 1959, 37 percent in 1970, and 40 percent in 1971). In 1971, about 2 out of 5 low-income families were headed by a woman, while about 1 out of every 12 of the families above the low-income level were headed by a woman. The poverty rate for families with a female head was 34 percent in 1971, as compared to only 7 percent for families with a male head.

While the total number of low-income families has declined by about 3.0 million since 1959, the rate of decline varies by the age of the family head. Low-income family heads 65 years cld and over decreased by about 36 percent between 1959 and 1970 and by 11 percent between 1970 and 1971. In contrast, young family heads (under 35 years)

decreased by about 26 percent between 1959 and 1970, and since 1970, they have increased by about 200,000, or 12 percent. These young family heads now represent approximately 35 percent of all poor family heads, as compared to 32 percent in 1970 and 27 percent in 1959. In 1971, male family heads under 35 years accounted for about 28 percent of all low-income male heads. The corresponding figure for low-income female heads was 46 percent. Conversely, 26 percent of male heads and 11 percent of female heads below the low-income level were 65 years old and over. Among male family heads, the poverty rate was highest for the aged (13 percent); for female family heads, the poverty rate was highest for the young (55 percent).

Employment status. Between 1959 and 1971, there was a decline in the proportion of male family heads below the low-income level who

were in the labor force (from 69 percent to 60 percent), while the proportion for female family heads has remained almost constant (about one-third). Although the number of the poor female heads in the labor force has remained unchanged since 1959, their unemployment rate has doubled-from about 11 percent in 1959 to 20 percent in 1971. For male family heads, the percent unemployed was about 11 percent in both 1959 and 1971.

Geographic distribution. Low-income families were more equally distributed between the metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas of the United States than were families above the low-income level. In 1971, about 56 percent of the low-income families as compared to 70 percent of the nonpoor families lived in the metropolitan areas defined as of the 1970 census (Table 3). In 1959, about 42 percent of the families below the low-income level as compared to 68 percent of the families above the low-income level lived in metropolitan areas defined as of the 1960 census.

The residence distribution of poor families varies greatly by race and sex of the family head. The vast majority (71 percent) of low-income families with female heads lived in metropolitan areas in 1971, while over one-half (54 percent) of the poor families headed by men lived outside metropolitan areas. About two-thirds of the low-income Negro families and one-half of the low-income white families resided in metropolitan areas. Poor white families living in metropolitan areas were equally distributed between the central cities and suburban rings while the ratio of central city to suburban residents for low-income Negro families was 4 to 1 in 1971.

In 1959, about one-half of the low-income families lived in the South. Since that time, the proportion of the poor living in the North and West has been increasing, so that by 1971, 56 percent lived in the North and West. In 1971, about 67 percent of the low-income families in the North and West lived in metropolitan areas, while in the South, about 43 percent lived in such areas (Table 8).

Composition of the Low-Income Population in 1971

Children. About 16 percent of all children under 14 years old were in families with incomes below the low-income level in 1971. Children accounted for about one-third of the 25.6 million persons below the low-income level as compared to only about one-fourth of the persons above the low-income level. Approximately 47 percent of the poor children were in families headed by a woman (Table D). In contrast, only about 6

percent of the nonpoor children were living in such families. About six out of ten children in families headed by women were in families below the low-income level, while the poverty rate for children in male headed families was only one out of ten. About 61 percent of poor Negro children lived in families headed by a woman. The comparable figure for white children was 39 percent. In 1971, about two out of every three children in families headed by a Negro woman were below the low-income level.

The aged. Of all persons 65 years old and over, about 4.3 million, or 22 percent, were below the low-income level in 1971. Elderly persons accounted for 17 percent of the poverty population but only 9 percent of the population above the low-income level. Aged persons living in families were less likely to be poor than those who lived alone or with nonrelatives and depended on their own incomes. About 42 percent of the aged unrelated individuals had incomes below the low-income level in 1971, whereas about 12 percent of the elderly in families were poor (Table E). Unrelated individuals (persons living alone or with nonrelatives) accounted for 60 percent of the aged poor but 22 percent of the nonpoor aged

persons. In 1971, one out of every ten poor persons were aged unrelated individuals and of these, 83 percent were women. In 1971, about two-tenths of the aged whites as compared to four-tenths of elderly Negroes were below the low-income level.

About 20 percent of the aged men below the low-income level in 1971 worked at some time during the year as compared to 38 percent of the elderly males above the low-income level. For women, the comparable figures were about 7

percent and 17 percent, respectively. A greater proportion of the aged poor than the nonpoor reported illness or disability as their reason, for not working (25 percent for the poor and 11 percent for the nonpoor).

Work force. The poverty population, as well as the total population, can be subdivided into several groups with regard to the work force. Children primarily depend on the earning capacity of their parents or other adults; and the great majority of the aged depend on income set aside when they were working. In 1971, these persons accounted for one-half of the low-income population as compared to one-third of the population above the low-income level. The remaining portion of the population are of working age (14 to 64 years old).

In 1971, there were 12.9 million low-income persons between 14 and 64 years old. These persons can be divided into those who worked and those who did not work. About one-half of the low-income persons of working age did not work during 1971 as contrasted to only 27 percent of the persons above the low-income level (Table F). Of both the poor and nonpoor who did not work, the great majority were either keeping house or were students. About 43 percent of the low-income persons 14 to 64 years old who did not work were women with family responsibilities and another 28 percent were in school. For persons above the low-income level, the comparable proportions were 55 percent and 32 percent, respectively. Illness or disability accounted for 19 percent of the low-income nonworkers but only 7 percent of the nonworkers above the low-income level. Over one-third of the nonworkers who were ill or disabled were below the low-income level in 1971. Of the lowincome persons who did not work, a greater proportion of whites than Negroes were women keeping house; Negroes were more likely to be in school. Low-income persons who did not work for reasons other than school, illness, or family responsibilities represented only about 5 percent of all poor persons of working age.

The proportion of the persons between 14 to 64 years old who did work in 1971 varied by their family status. Three-fourths of poor male family heads, regardless of race, worked in 1971 and one-half of these worked all year at a fultime job. Of the women who headed low-income families, about 41 percent worked at some time in 1971. Of those who worked, about 18 percent worked year-round-full time. Negro wives in poor families were more likely to have worked than comparable white wives (45 percent for Negroes and 34 percent for whites). Of the low-income unrelated individuals of working age, about 54 percent were workers.

Educational attainment. In 1971, about one-half of the poor persons over 21 years old had completed less than 1 year of high school, and 69 percent did not finish high school (Table G). The comparable figures for persons above the low-income level were about 20 percent and 36 percent, respectively. Persons with one year on more of college represented about one-tenth of those below the low-income level, but about one-fourth of those above the low-income level in 1971. About 12 percent of the low-income white

adults had some college education as compared to about 4 percent of comparable Negroes. For the nonpoor white and Negro adults, the figures were 27 percent and 16 percent, respectively.

The percent below the low-income level tended to vary inversely with years of school completed. For example, about 41 percent of the persons with no schooling were below the low-income level in 1971, while only about 5 percent of those with at least one year of college were poor.

Family size and composition. The average size of family was about the same for low-income families headed by either a man (3.9 persons) or woman (3.7 persons) in 1971 (Table H). The average size of family for those above the low-income level was smaller than that for comparable families below the low-income level for families with either a male or female head. For low-income white families the average size was 3.6 persons as compared to 4.4 for Negroes.

In 1971, families composed of only two persons accounted for about 35 percent of all families, regardless of their low-income status. However, about 43 percent of the two-person families below the low-income level were headed by an aged person, compared to 30 percent of such families above the low-income level. A larger proportion of low-income families headed by men than those headed by women had two persons. Similarly, a larger proportion of white than Negro

families below the low-income level were composed of two persons. About 39 percent of low-income families headed by men and 31 percent of those headed by women were of this size. For whites, 40 percent of the families below the low-income level had only two persons, as compared with 25 percent of low-income Negro families. White families made up about 79 percent of low-income families of this size.

About 13 percent of all poor families had seven or more persons as compared to 5 percent of nonpoor families. Large families comprised about one-tenth of low-income white families but two-tenths of Negro families below the low-income level. The poverty rates for large families were 19 percent for those headed by men and about 67 percent for those headed by women. In contrast, the corresponding poverty rates for two-person families were 8 percent and 25 percent, respectively.

Type of income⁴. About two-thirds of the families below the low-income level in 1971 had some income from earnings (Table I). However, earnings accounted for only about one-half of the aggregate income of poor families. In contrast, about 93 percent of families above the low-income level had income from earnings, accounting for about 89 percent of their total aggregate income.

While about two-thirds of all families, both above and below the low-income level, reported that they received some income other than earnings, there were significant differences in the type of other income received. The largest categories of other income for low-income families were Social Security payments and public assistance. Social Security income was received by about 27 percent of all poor families. About one-third of all families below the low-income level received income from public assistance. These sources, combined, comprised about 41 percent of the aggregate income of low-income families. About one-half of all families receiving public assistance income had total incomes below the low-income level in 1971. The largest single source of other income for families above the low-income level was dividends, interest, and rental income. About 45 percent of the families above, but only 12 percent of those below the low-income level received income of this type.

In 1971, low-income families with a malehead received about 62 percent of their income from earnings, compared to about 28 percent for poor families headed by a woman. The largest single source of other income for low-income families headed by men was Social Security benefits. For poor families headed by women, public assistance income made up not only the majority (66 percent) of their total income other than earnings, but about 48 percent of their total aggregate income.

income deficit. The low-income definition used in this report is based on total money income reported for the calendar year. The income deficit, the difference between the low-income threshold and the amount of income received by low-income families and unrelated individuals, is thus the amount which would be required to raise their incomes above the poverty line (Table J).

The mean income deficit for all low-income families was \$1,450 in 1971 (Table K). The average deficit for families headed by a woman (\$1,610) was about \$270 greater than that for families headed by a man (\$1,340). About 14 percent of the low-income families with a male head

and 9 percent of those with a female head required less than \$250 additional income to raise their total income in 1971 above the low-income level (Table 38). About 27 percent of all lowincome families had a deficit of \$2,000 or more. About 32 percent of the poor families headed by women had deficits of \$2,000 or more as compared to only 24 percent for families with a male head.

Because the income cutoffs used to define lowincome families vary by size of family and sex of the family head, such factors must be taken into consideration when comparing the average deficits of families by race of head. In 1971, the mean income deficit for Negro families was \$130 greater than that of white families (\$1,540 and \$1,410, respectively). Analysis of the average deficit for families by the number of children reveals that the gap between income and poverty level for white families having only one child is greater than that for comparable Negro families. For families with 2 to 5 children, there is no significant difference in the average deficit of white and Negro families. For families with more than

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five children, there is some evidence that the average deficit for Negroes was greater thanthat for comparable white families. These large families represent 13 percent of all Negro families below the low-income level but only 5 percent of low-income white families. Also, families headed by a woman accounted for over one-half of the Negro families as opposed to one-third of white families. Because large families and families with a female head are a greater proportion of Negro than white families, the average deficit for Negro families overall will reflect this and be larger than the average deficit for white families.

For unrelated individuals, the average deficit in 1971 was about \$870. About one-fifth of these persons required less than \$250 to raise their income above the low-income level. There is some evidence that the average deficit for Negro persons living alone or with nonrelatives (\$920) was larger than that for comparable whites (\$830).

A method of analysis which recognizes the effect of differences in size of family entails computing income deficits for Negro and white families as a percent of their low-income threshold (Table K, column 6). By comparing the percent of additional income necessary for each family type to reach its own lcw-income level, the disparities resulting from differences in family size are removed. In 1971, the average incomes of low-income white families were further away from their poverty line than were the incomes of Negro families. The average deficit of low-income white families was about 39 percent of their low-income level as compared to 36 percent for Negro families.

The characteristics of persons and families residing in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas have been analyzed in Current Population Reports, Series P-23, No. 27, "Trends in Social and Economic Conditions in Metropolitan Areas," P-23, No. 33, "Trends in Social and Economic Conditions in Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Areas," and P-23, No. 37, "Social and Economic Characteristics of the Population in Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Areas: 1970 and 1960."

Decennial census. Low-income data collected in the 1970 Census of Population appear in a number of published reports. Selected characteristics of low-income persons, families, and unrelated individuals, for the United States, each of the States, counties, standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, and urban places are presented in 1970 Census of Population, Vcl. I, Characteristics of the Population, chapter C, "General Social and Economic Characteristics." Statistics on low-income status in 1969 of persons, families, and unrelated individuals by detailed characteristics, including cross-classifications by race, age, weeks worked, education,

type of family, etc., are presented in 1970 Census of Population, Vol. I, Characteristics of the Population, chapter D, "Detailed Characteristics," for some or all of the following areas: United States, each of the States and standard metropolitan statistical areas of 250,000 inhabitants or more. Further information is contained in Data Access Description No. 29, Collection, Evaluation, and Processing Series CEP-7, "Low-Income Data from the 1970 Census".

Statistics on income in 1969 collected in the Current Population Survey of March 1970 differ from data for that year from the decennial census despite the fact that the same basic concept was used in both instances. In the first place, the survey data exclude the institutional population and most members of the Armed Forces; iving on post. These two groups were included in the census. Secondly, collège students are generally enumerated at their own homes in the Current Propulation Survey and classified as family members but were enumerated at their college residence in the census, usually as secondary individuals. Thirdly, the small group of Current Population Survey enumerators was more experienced and had more intensive training and supervision than the large number of temporary census enumerators and may have more often obtained more accurate answers from respondents. Furthermore, approximately 60 percent of the households were self enumerated in the 1970 census. Moreover, income data in the Current Population Surveyare based on responses to separate questions on eight types of income, as well as responses to additional yes-no circles within 3 of these questions, whereas in the census only six questions were used.

In general, the number of persons and families below the low-income level reported in the Census is higher than that reported in the Current Population Survey. The number of poor persons in the 1970 census was 27.1 million compared to 24.1 million derived from the March 1970 Current Population Survey. The comparable figures for low-income families were 5.5 million and 5.0 million, respectively.

For a more detailed discussion of the overall income differences between the 1970 census and the Current Population Survey, see "Preliminary Evaluation of 1969 Money Income Data Collected in the 1970 Census of Population and Housing" by Mitsuo Ono, American Statistical Association Proceedings of the Social Statistics Section, 1972.

Definitions and Explanations

Population coverage. This report excludes inmates of institutions and unrelated individuals under 14 years old. It includes only those approximately 1.2 million members of the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post.

Farm-nonfarm residence. The farm population refers to rural residents living on farms. The method of determining farm-nonfarm residence in the present survey is the same as that used in the 1960 and 1970 censuses and in the Current Population Surveys since 1960, but differs from that used in earlier surveys and censuses. According to the current definitions, the farm population consists of all persons living in rural territory on places of less than 10 acres yielding agricultural products which sold for \$250 or more in the previous year, or on places of 10 acres or more yielding agricultural products which sold for \$50 or more in the previous year. Rural persons in institutions, motels, and tourist camps, and those living on rented places where no land is used for farming are not classified as farm population.

The nonfarm population, as the term is used here, comprises persons living in urban areas and rural persons not on farms.

Although the method of determining farmnonfarm residence has not changed since March 1971, the underlying sampling methods and estimation procedures have changed. For a discussion of changes see Employment and Earnings, Vol. 18, No. 8, February 1972, pp. 6-9, published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Metropolitan-nonmetropolitan residence. The population residing in standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA's) constitutes the metropolitan population. Except in New England, an SMSA is a county or group of contiguous counties which contains at least one city of 50,000 inhabitants or more, or "twin cities" with a combined population of at least 50,000. In addition to the county or counties containing such a city or cities, contiguous counties are included in an SMSA if, according to certain criteria, they are essentially metropolitan in character and are socially and economically integrated with the central city. In New England, SMSA's consist of towns and cities, rather than counties.

The 1971 and the revised 1969 figures shown in this report for standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA's) are based on the SMSA's as defined on the basis of the 1970 census; those shown for earlier years refer to SMSA's defined on the basis of the 1960 census. As a result of



these changes, the proportion of low-income families in 1969 living in metropolitan areas increased from about 49 percent to 52 percent. The comparable figures for families above the low-income level were 66 percent and 70 percent, respectively.

Central cities. The population inside SMSA's is further classified as "inside central cities" and "outside central cities." With a few exceptions, central cities are determined according to the following criteria:

1. The largest city in an SMSA is always a central city.

2. One or two additional cities may be secondary central cities on the basis and in the order of the following criteria:

a. The additional city or cities have at

least 250,000 inhabitants.
b. The additional city or cities have a population of one-third or more of that of the largest city and a minimum population of 25,000.

Geographic regions. The four major regions of the United States for which data are presented in this report represent groups of States, as follows:

Northeast: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont.

North Central: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin.

South: Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Scuth Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia.

West: Arizona, Colorado, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, and Hawaii.

North and West: Northeast, North Central, and West regions combined.

Income. For each person 14 years old and over in the sample, questions were asked on the amount of money income received in the preceding calendar year from each of the following sources: (1) Money wages or salary; (2) net income from nonfarm self-employment; (3) net income from

farm self-employment; (4) Social Security; (5) dividends, interest (on savings or bonds), income from estates or trusts or net rental income; (6) public assistance or welfare payments; (7) unemployment and workman's compensation, government employee pensions, or veterans' payments; (8) private pensions, annuities, alimony, regular contributions from persons not living in this household, net royalties, and other periodic

The amounts received represent income before deductions for personal taxes, Social Security, bonds, etc. When an indefinite amount was reported by the respondent, a specific value was assigned during processing wherever possible. If the indefinite amount was reported in terms of a range, the midpoint of the range was assigned, e.g., \$10,000 to \$15,000 was coded as \$12,500. Open-ended amounts were converted to designated specific amounts, e.g., over \$10,000 was coded as \$15,000.

It should be noted that although the income statistics refer to receipts during the preceding year the characteristics of the person, such as age, labor force status, etc., and the composition of families refer to the time of the survey. The income of the family does not include amounts received by persons who were members of the family during all or part of the income year if these persons no longer resided with the family at the time of enumeration. On the other hand, family income includes amounts reported by related persons who did not reside with the family during the income year but who were members of the family at the time of enumeration.

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Data on consumer income collected by the Bureau of the Census cover money income (exclusive of certain money receipts such as capital gains) prior to deductions for taxes. The fact that many farm families receive part of their income in the form of rent-free housing and goods produced and consumed on the farm, rather than in money, should be taken into consideration in comparing the income of farm and nonfarm residents. It should be noted that nonmoney incomes are also received by some nonfarm residents. They often take the form of business expense accounts, use of business transportation and facilities, full or partial compensation by business for medical and educational expenses, etc. In analyzing size distributions of income, it should be recognized that capital gains tend to be concentrated among higher income units.

Money wages or salary is total money earnings received for work performed as an employee during the income year. It includes wages, salary, Armed Forces pay, commissions, tips, piece-rate payments, and cash bonuses earned, before deductions were made for taxes, bonds, pensions, union dues, etc.

Net income from nonfarm self-employment is net money income (gross receipts minus expenses) from one's own business, professional enterprise, or partnership. Gross receipts include the value of all goods sold and services rendered. Expenses include costs of goods purchased, rent, heat, light, power, depreciation charges, wages and salaries paid, business taxes (not personal income taxes), etc. The value of salable merchandise consumed by the proprietors of retail stores is not included as part of net income.

Net income from farm self-employment is net money income (gross receipts minus operating expenses) from the operation of a farm by a person on his own account, as an owner, renter, or sharecropper. Gross receipts include the value of all products sold, government crop loans, money received from the rental of farm equipment to others, and incidental receipts from the sale of wood, sand, gravel, etc. Operating expenses include cost of feed, fertilizer, seed, and other farming supplies, cash wages paid to farmhands, depreciation charges, cash rent, interest onfarm mortgages, farm building repairs, farm taxes (not State and Federal income taxes), etc. The value of fuel, food, or other farm products used for family living is not included as part of net income. In general, inventory changes were not considered in determining net income; however, replies based on income tax returns or other official records do reflect inventory changes.

Social Security includes Social Security pensions and survivors' benefits, and permanent disability insurance payments made by the Social Security Administration prior to deductions for medical insurance and railroad retirement insurance checks. from the U.S. Government. "Medicare" reimbursements are not included.

Dividends, interest (on savings or bonds), income from estates or trusts, net rental income or net royalties include dividends from stock-

holdings or membership in associations, interest on savings or bonds, periodic receipts from estates or trust funds, net income from rental of a house, store, or other property to others, and receipts from boarders or lodgers, and net royalties.

Public assistance or welfare payments include public assistance payments such as old-age assistance, aid to families with dependent children, and aid to the blind or totally disabled. Separate payments received for hospital or other medical care (vendor payments) are excluded from this item.

Unemployment compensation, government employee pensions, or veterans' payments include: (1) Unemployment compensation received government unemployment insurance agencies or private companies during periods of unemployment and any strike benefits received from union funds; (2) government employee pensions received from retirement pensions paid by Federal, State, county, or other governmental agencies to former employees (including members of the Armed Forces) or their survivors; (3) money paid periodically by the Veterans' Administration to disabled members of the Armed Forces or to survivors of deceased veterans, subsistence allowances paid to veterans for education and on-the job training, as well as so-called "refunds" paid to ex-servicemen as GI insurance premiums; also includes (4) workmen's compensation received periodically from public or private insurance companies for injuries incurred at work. The cost of this insurance must have been paid by the employer and not by the person.

Private pensions, annuities, alimony, regular contributions from persons not living in the household, and other periodic income include the following types of income: (1) Private pensions or retirement benefits paid to a retired person or his survivors by a former employer or by a union, either directly or through an insurance company; (2) periodic receipts from annuities or insurance; (3) alimony and child support; (4) contributions received periodically from persons not living in the household; and (5) other periodic income such as military family allotments, net gambling winnings, and other kinds of periodic income other than earnings.

Receipts not counted as income. Receipts from the following sources were not included as income: (1) Money received from the sale of property, such as stocks, bonds, a house, or a car (unless the person was engaged in the business of selling such property, in which case the net proceeds would be counted as income from self-employment); (2) withdrawals of bank deposits; (3) money borrowed; (4) tax refunds; (5) gifts; and (6) lump sum inheritances or insurance payments.

All sources of income may be combined into two major types:

Total money earnings--the algebraic sum of money wages or salary and net income from farm and nonfarm self-employment; and

Income other than earnings--the algebraic sum of all sources of money income except wages and salaries and income from self-employment.

Total money income. The algebraic sum of money wages and salaries, net income from self-employment, and income other than earnings represents total money income. The total income of a family is the algebraic sum of the amounts received by all income recipients in the family.

The income tables for families and unrelated individuals include in the lowest income group (under \$1,000) those that were classified as having no income in the income year and those reporting a loss in net income from farm and nonfarm self-employment or in rental income. Many of these were living on income "in kind," savings, or gifts; or were newly constituted families, unrelated individuals who had recently left families, or families in which the sole breadwinner had recently died or had left the household. However, many of the families and unrelated individuals who reported no income probably had some money income which was not recorded in the survey.

Median income. The median income is the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having incomes above the median, and the other having incomes below the median.

Mean income. The mean income is the amount obtained by dividing the total income of a group by the number of families or unrelated individuals (as appropriate) in that group.

Income per family member. The income per family member is the average amount of income available to every man, woman, and child in a family. Income per family member is derived by dividing the total family income of a group by the number of family members in the same group.

Comparability of Current Population Survey income data with other data from Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) personal income series. The income data presented in this report are not directly comparable with estimates of aggregate personal income prepared by the Bureau of Economic Analysis (formerly the Office of Business Economics) of the Department of Commerce. The lack of correspondence stems from the following differences in definition and coverage:

Income definition. The personal income series includes, among other items, the following types of nonmoney income which are not included in the census definition: Wages received in kind, the value of food and fuel produced and consumed on farms, the net rental value of owner-occupied homes, the property income received by mutual life insurance companies, and the value of the services of banks and other financial intermediaries rendered to persons without the assessment of specific charges. These items of income in kind account for about 4 percent of total personal income. The Census Bureau definition of income, on the other hand, includes such items as regular contributions for support received from persons who do not reside in the same living quarters, income received from roomers and boarders residing in households, and employee contributions for social insurance which are not included in the personal income series. These items, however, represent a much smaller income total than the nonmoney items included in personal income.

Source of data. The personal income series is estimated largely on the basis of data derived from business and governmental sources. These sources include the industrial and population censuses, employers' wage reports under the Social Security programs, and records of disbursements to individuals by governmental agencies. The income data presented in the census reports, on the other hand, are based directly on field surveys of households. As discussed in the section "Source and reliability of the estimates," income data obtained in household interviews are subject to various types of reporting errors which tend to produce an understatement of income. It is estimated that the

Income surveys conducted by the Bureau of the Census during the past few years have obtained about 88 percent of the comparable aggregate total money income, 97 percent of the comparable aggregate money wage or salary income, 81 percent of the comparable aggregate money Social Security income and 71 percent of the comparable aggregate money public assistance income included in the personal income series prepared by the BEA. Comparable estimates are not available for the low-income population.

Low-Income (Poverty) Definition. Low-income statistics presented in this report are based on a definition developed by the Social Security Administration in 1964 and revised by a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969.

Statistics presented in Census Bureau reports prior to publication of Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 68, "Poverty in the United States, 1959 to 1968," were based on the poverty index developed by the Social Security Administration (SSA) in 1964. This index provided a range of income cutoffs adjusted by such factors as family size, sex of the family head, number of children under 18 years old, and farm-nonfarm residence. At the core of this definition of poverty was a nutritionally adequate food plan ("economy" plan) designed by the Department of Agriculture for "emergency or temporary use when funds are low." The SSA poverty cutoffs also took into account differences in the cost of living between farm and nonfarm families. Annual revisions of these cutoffs were based on price changes of the items in the economy food budget.

As a result of deliberations of a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969, the following two modifications to the original SSA definition of poverty were recommended: (1) that the SSA thresholds for nonfarm families be retained for the base year 1963, but that annual adjustments in the levels be based onchanges in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rather than on changes in the cost of food included in the economy food plan; and (2) that the farm thresholds be raised from 70 to 85 percent of the corresponding nonfarm levels. The combined impact of these two modifications resulted in an increase of 360,000 poor families and 1.6 million poor persons in 1967. The reasons for making these changes are outlined below.

Change in cost of living adjustment. Annual revisions of the SSA poverty thresholds were based only on the average per capita cost of the foods in the economy food budget. This method of updating these cutoffs did not fully reflect increases in the overall cost of living during the 1960's. The pace at which the general cost of living

advanced in recent years was not uniformly matched by increases in the price of goods in the economy food plan. Thus, general price changes since 1959 were not paralleled by comparable changes in the poverty thresholds.

The differences between changes in the cost of the economy food budget and the overall cost of living led to the adoption of the CPI as the basis for annual revisions in the income cutoffs. Although the CPI is not designed to measure the changing market conditions faced solely by lowincome families, it does reflect the fact that prices of food and nonfood commodities do not always advance at the same rate. Employing the CPI to adjust the low-income thresholds annually has another advantage over the earlier adjustment technique. Although the economy food plan is repriced annually, the data are not published regularly but are available only on request. The CPI, on the other hand, is regularly published and is a generally accepted measure of changes in the "cost of living." Table L shows the changes in the CPI between 1959 and 1971 and the corresponding average thresholds for a nonfarm family of four.

Change in the farm-nonfarm relationship. Under the old definition, the poverty thresholds for farm families were adjusted for the average value of food consumed by these families which they had grown themselves. Based on a 1961 study of household consumption which indicated that the value of food produced by farm families for home use amounted to about 30 percent of their total food budget, the poverty cutoffs for farm families were established at 70 percent of the nonfarm levels.

Up to the present time, no entirely satisfactory means of determining the income



required for equivalent levels of living for farm and nonfarm families has been provided by studies on this subject. Further research is needed to analyze the differences in the costs between farm and nonfarm families. Although it is not yet possible to quantify exactly all the factors contributing to cost of living differences between farm and nonfarm families, research already completed suggests that the differences are not as great as provided for by the 70 percent differential. After weighing the available evidence, the Review Committee agreed that narrowing the farm-nonfarm differential to 85 percent more nearly reflects the overall cost of living differences between farm and nonfarm families than the previously used differential.

Alternate levels. Because the low-income level currently in use by the Federal Government does not meet all the needs of the analysts of the data, two variations of the poverty definition were introduced at the same time that modifications were made to the SSA poverty index--one is set at 75 percent of the official government standard and the other at 125 percent of this standard. The alternate cutoffs are obtained by multiplying the income cutoffs at the low-income level by 0.75 and 1.25. Thus, the income cutoffs for a nonfarm family of four at 75 percent and 125 percent of the low-income level are \$3,103 and \$5,171, respectively. Table 2 of this report presents selected data on persons below 125 percent of the low-income level. Also, all the data presented in detailed tables 7, 18, 19, 21, 23-29, and 38, of this report have been tabulated for these additional levels and are available upon request for the years 1959 through 1971. Requests for these unpublished data, giving a specific description of the figures desired, may

be made in writing to the Chief, Population Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

Weighted average thresholds at the lowincome level. The low-income cutoffs used by the Bureau of the Census to determine the low-income status of families and unrelated individuals consist of a set of 124 thresholds arranged in a fourdimensional matrix consisting of family size (from one person, i.e., unrelated individuals, to seven or more person families) cross-classified by presence and number of family members under 18 years old (from no children present to six or more children present), sex of head, and farmnonfarm residence. Unrelated individuals and two-person families are further differentiated by age of head (under 65 years and 65 years and over). The total family income of each family in the sample is tested against the appropriate dollar threshold to determine the lov-income status of that family. If the family's total income is less than its corresponding cutoff, the family is classified as below the low-income level. The average thresholds shown in table M were weighted by the presence and number of children. For example, for a given size of family, sex of head, and residence category, the weighted average threshold for that group is obtained by multiplying the threshold for each presence and number of children category within the given family size by the number of families in that category. These products are then aggregated across the entire range of presence and number of children categories, and the total aggregate is divided by the total number of families in the group to yield the weighted average threshold at the low-income level for that size family.

Because family composition varies by farmnonfarm residence, the weighted average thresholds at the low-income level for farm families, as shown in table M, will not be exactly 85 percent of the nonfarm levels. Moreover, since family composition does not remain constant from year to year, the weighted average thresholds for 1971 will not reflect, identically, the change in the CPI between 1971 and earlier years.

Since the basic thresholds used to determine the low-income status of families and unrelated individuals are applied to all families and unrelated individuals, the weighted low-income thresholds are derived using all families and unrelated individuals rather than just those families and unrelated individuals classified as below the low-income level. To obtain the weighted low-income thresholds for families and unrelated individuals below 75 percent and below 125 percent of the low-income level, the weighted thresholds shown in table M may be multiplied directly by 0.75 and 1.25, respectively.

Income deficit. Income deficit is the difference between the total income of families and unrelated individuals below the low-income level, and their respective income thresholds. In computing the income deficit, families reporting a net income loss are assigned zero dollars and for such cases the deficit is equal to the low-income threshold. This measure provides an estimate of the amount which would be required to raise the incomes of all low-income families andunrelated individuals to their respective low-income thresholds. The income deficit is thus a measure of the degree of impoverishment of a family or unrelated individual. However, caution must be exercised in comparing the average deficit of families of different racial groups. Since the low-income thresholds used in this report are based on family size and composition, apparent differences in the average income deficits of racial groups may, to some extent, be a function of the differences in these characteristics. It must also be remembered that the thresholds in this report vary according to the sex of the family head. Thus, differences in the average deficit between families with a male or female head may be in part attributable to both differences in thresholds and to differences in family size and composition.

Median income deficit. The median income deficit is the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having an income deficit above the median and the other having an income deficit below the median.

Mean income deficit. The mean income deficit is the amount obtained by dividing the total income deficit of a group below the low-income level by the number of families or unrelated individuals (as appropriate) in that group.

Deficit per family member. The deficit per family member is the average amount of money necessary to raise every man, woman, and child in a family out of poverty. The deficit per family member is derived by dividing the total family income deficit of a group by the number of family members in the same group.

Family. The term "family," as used in this report, refers to a group of two or more persons related by blood, inarriage, or adoption and residing together; all such persons are considered as members of the same family. Thus, if the son of the head of the household and the son's wife are in the household, they are treated as part of the head's family. On the other hand, a lodger and his wife not related to the head of the household or an unrelated servant and his wife are considered as additional families, and not a part of the household head's family.

Head of family. One person in each family was designated as the head. The head of a family is usually the person regarded as the head by members of the family. Women are not classified as heads if their husbands are resident members of the family at the time of the survey. Married couples related to the head of a family are included in the head's family and are not classified as separate families.

Subfamily. A subfamily is a married couple with or without children, or one parent with one or more own single children under 18 years old, living in a household and related to, but not including, the head of the household or his wife. The most common example of a sub-family is a young married couple sharing the home of the husband's or wife's parents. Members of a subfamily are also members of a primary family. The numbers of subfamilies, therefore, is not included in the number of families.

Marital status. The marital status classification refers to the status at the time of enumeration. "Separated" is regarded as a subdivision of the category "married" and includes persons with legal separations, those living apart with intentions of obtaining a divorce, and other persons permanently or temporarily separated because of marital discord.

Size of family. The term "size of family" refers to the number of persons who are living together and are related to each other by blood, marriage, or adoption.

Unrelated individual. The term "unrelated individuals," as used in this report, refers to persons 14 years old and over (other than inmates of institutions) who are not living with any relatives. An unrelated individual may constitute a one-person household by himself, or he may be



part of a household including one or more other families or unrelated individuals, or he may reside in group quarters such as a rooming house. Thus, a widow living by herself or with one or more other persons not related to her, a lodger not related to the head of the household or to anyone else in the household, and a servant living in an employer's household with no relatives are examples of unrelated individuals.

Own children and related children. "Own" children in a family are sons and daughters, including stepchildren and adopted children, of the family head. "Related" children in a family include own children and all other children in the household who are related to the family head by blood, marriage, or adoption.

Number of earners. This number includes all persons in the family with \$1 or more in wages and galaries, or \$1 or more or a loss in net income from farm or nonfarm self-employment.

Age. The age classification is based on the age of the person at his last birthday.

Race. The population is divided into three groups on the basis of race: white, Negro, and "other races." The last category includes Indians, Japanese, Chinese, and any other race except white and Negro. "Other races" are usually shown in combination with the Negro population.

Origin or descent. Data on ethnic origin or descent were derived from responses to the question, "What is (this person's) origin or descent?" No attempt was made to define the terms but a flashcard was shown or a list was read, illustrative of types of ethnic origin. Some respondents having a diverse ethnic background or having several generations of residence in the United States may have reported the ethnic association they felt most strongly. For more detail, see Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 238, "Selected Characteristics of Persons and Families of Mexican, Puerto Rican, and Other Spanish Origin: March 1972."

Years of school completed. Data on years of school completed in this report were derived from the combination of answers to questions concerning the highest grade of school attended by the person and whether or not that grade was finished. The questions on educational attainment apply only to progress in "regular" schools. Such schools include graded public, private, and parochial elementary and high schools (both junior and senior high), colleges, universities, and professional schools, whether day schools or night schools. Thus, regular schooling is that which may advance a person toward an elementary

school certificate or a high school diploma, or a college, university, or professional school degree. Schooling in other than regular schools was counted only if the credits obtained were regarded as transferable to a school in the regular school system.

The median years of school completed is defined as the value which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having completed more schooling and one having completed less schooling than the median. These medians are expressed in terms of a continuous series of numbers representing years of school completed. For example, a median of 9.0 represents the completion of the first year of high school and a median of 13.0 means completion of the first year of college.

Labor force and employment status. The definitions of labor force and employment status in this report relate to family heads and unrelated individuals 14 years old and over.

Employed. Employed persons comprise (1) all civilians who, during the specified week, did any work at all as paid employees or in their own business or profession, or on their own farm, or who worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers on a farm or in a business operated by a member of the family, and (2) all those who were not working but who had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, or labor-management dispute, or because they were taking time off for personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs. Excluded from the employed group are persons whose only activity consisted of work around the house (such as own home housework, painting or repairing own home, etc.) or volunteer work for religious, charitable, and similar organizations.

<u>Unemployed</u>. Unemployed persons are those civilians who, during the survey week, had no employment but were available for work and (1) had engaged in any specific jobseeking activity within the past 4 weeks, such as registering at a public or private employment office, meeting with prospective employers, checking with friends or relatives, placing or answering advertisements, writing letters of application, or being on a union or professional register; (2) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off; or (3) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Labor force. Persons are classified as in the labor force if they were employed as civilians, unemployed, or in the Armed Forces during the survey week. The "civilian labor force" is comprised of all civilians classified as employed or unemployed.



Not in the labor force. All civilians 14 years old and over who are not classified as employed or unemployed are defined as "not in the labor force." This group who are neither employed nor seeking work includes persons engaged only in own home housework, attending school, or unable to work because of long-term physical or mental illness; persons who are retired or too old towork; seasonal workers for whom the survey week fell in an off season; and the voluntarily idle. Persons doing only unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are also classified as not in the labor force.

Occupation of longest job. Persons are classified according to the civilian job held longest during the year. Persons who held two jobs or more were reported in the job at which they worked the greatest number of weeks.

The occupation and industry groupings included in this report were based on the classification system used in the 1970 census, as were the data included in the report on the low-income population in 1970, Series P-60, No. 81, although the group titles may be worded somewhat differently. The earlier low-income reports utilized the 1960 census classification systems. Adetailed comparison of the 1970 classification systems to those used during the 1960's may be found in the Bureau of the Census Technical Paper 26, 1970 Occupation and Industry Classification Systems in Terms of Their 1960 Occupation and Industry Elements. Additional information may be obtained from a paper "Changes Between 1960 and 1970 Census of Population" by Stanley Greene and John Priebe presented at the August 1972 American Statistical meetings held in Montreal, Canada. Also see "Revisions in Occupational Classifications for 1971" by John E. Bregger in Employment and Earnings, Volume 17, No. 8, page 5, published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, United States Department of Labor.

In addition to the change in occupational titles between the March 1972 and the March 1971 surveys which did not affect the comparability of the data, a supplemental question, "What were your most important activities or duties?" was added which provided additional information for classifying persons by occupation. In general, the major impact of this supplemental question was to reclassify some persons from the "managers" classification into other types of occupations (primarily into the major occupation group of "craftsmen").

Work experience. A person with work experience is one who, during the preceding calendar year, did any civilian work for pay or profit or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business at any time during the year, on a part-time or full-time basis.

Weeks worked in the income year. Persons are classified according to the number of different weeks during the preceding calendar year in which they did any civilian work for pay or profit (including paid vacations and sick leave) or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business.

Part-time or full-time jobs. A person is classified as having worked at part-time jobs during the preceding calendar year if he worked at civilian jobs which provided less than 35 hours of work per week in a majority of the weeks in which he worked during the year. He is classified as having worked at full-time jobs if he worked 35 hours or more per week during a majority of the weeks in which he worked.

Year-round full-time worker. A year-round full-time worker is one who worked primarily at full-time civilian jobs (35 hours or more per week) for 50 weeks or more during the preceding calendar year.

Nonworker. A nonworker is one who did not do any civilian work in the calendar year preceding the survey.

Main reason for working part year. For persons who worked 1 to 49 weeks during the year, the main reason for working part year is based on the response to the question "What were you doing most of the remaining weeks?."

Main reason for not working. For persons who reported that they did not work at a civilian job for pay or profit or on a family-operated farm or business during the year, the main reason for not working is derived from the response to the question "What were you doing most of last year?"

Rounding. Percentages are rounded to the nearest tenth of a percent; therefore, the percentages in a distribution do not always add to exactly 100.0 percent. The totals, however, are always shown as 100.0. Moreover, individual figures are rounded to the nearest thousand without being adjusted to group totals, which are independently rounded; percentages are based on the unrounded

Base figures. An estimate of the size of the base (number of persons and families, etc.) of each percent is shown in most of the tables of this report. The 1971 and revised 1970 and 1969 base figures shown in this report were prepared by inflating weighted sample results to agree with independent estimates of the population based on statistics updated from the 1970 census. The base figures for the years 1961 to 1969 were inflated to estimates derived from the 1960 census. The data for the years prior to 1961 were based on the 1950 census.

The major effects resulting from the introduction of population controls and estimation procedures based on the 1970 census were to raise the number of families from 51.2 million to 51.6 million in the March 1970 CPS and to lower the number of related children under 18 from 69.8 to 68.7 million. However, the number of poor families and the number of related children below the low-income level remained about the same--5 million and about 9.5 million, respectively (Table 1).

Comparability of Estimates From March 1972 CPS With Estimates for Previous Years

The data for 1971 collected in the March 1972 Current Population Survey (CPS) are, in some instances, not entirely comparable to figures for earlier years because of revisions in the Current Population Survey. Starting in January 1972, 1970 census-based population controls, metropolitan residence definitions, and other materials were introduced into the sample and estimation procedures. The major item affecting comparability at the overall national level is the introduction of population controls based on the 1970 census. Figures for previous years are tied in with 1960 census-based population controls. In a number of instances, data from the March 1970 and 1971 CPS's were revised to take account of 1970 census-based population controls, thus providing some measure of the impact of the change (see tables 1 to 6). Basically, these changes should have no substantial impact on summary measures, such as medians and means, and on proportional measures, such as percent distributions and low-income or poverty rates. However, the changes may have more impact on the population levels in different subgroupings such as the total number of persons or families either overall, within some particular income interval, or below the low-income level.

A detailed description of changes appears in the Bureau of Labor Statistics report, "Employment and Earnings," Vol. 18, No. 8, February 1972.

The figures shown in this report for metropolitan areas (SMSA's) are based on the SMSA's as defined on the basis of the 1970 census; those published in earlier years referred to SMSA's as defined on the basis of the 1960 census. There are significant differences in the population classified as metropolitan from each of these definitions. For the 1970 definition of SMSA's, see U.S. Census of Population: 1970, NUMBER OF INHABITANTS, PC(1)-A1, United States Summary.

Another change in the Current Population Survey which affects occupational data only, is the

inclusion of a supplemental question, "What were your most important activities or duties?," which provided additional information for classifying persons by occupation. In general, the impact of this supplemental question was to reclassify some persons from the "managers" classification into other types of occupations (primarily into the major occupation group of "craftsmen").

Nonresponses and Allocations

In the March 1972 CPS, no information was recorded for approximately 4 percent of the 47,000 households because no interview could be obtained during the week in which the enumeration was conducted. In order to account for these households, the weights assigned to other sample households of similar characteristics residing in the same sample areas were increased accordingly. In addition, complete income information was not reported for about 14 percent of all families and 10 percent of unrelated individuals 14 years old or over. Overall, about 10 percent of all persons 14 years old and over in households that were interviewed did not report complete income information.

For more detailed information on the characteristics of nonrespondents, see "Characteristics of Income Nonrespondents in the Current Population Survey," by Emmett Spiers, John Coder, and Mitsuo Ono, American Statistical Association Proceedings of the Social Statistics Section 1971.

In order that the maximum amount of information can be utilized, missing income items are imputed or allocated by values which are obtained from active respondents with similar economic and demographic characteristics. Beginning with the March 1962 survey, when a respondent did not answer one or more of the income items, all of his income data were imputed.

Beginning with the March 1966 survey, however, in the event a respondent did not answer one or more of the income questions, the missing income data for this person were imputed for only those income items which were not answered. Each of the earnings items was handled individually, whereas income items other than earnings were handled as a group. Characteristics used in this imputation are age, family status, race, residence, weeks worked, and major occupation group. The income amount assigned to a nonrespondent is that observed for another person with similar demographic and economic characteristics who did respond and who has been selected systematically in the order in which individual records are processed.

In the tabulation of income from surveys prior to 1962, the distributions by income levels had been based only on those cases which reported complete income information. The assumption implicit in this method was that persons who do not provide income information have the same income distribution as those who do provide such information. Using income data for 1958, a comparison was made of the income distributions obtained before and after the assignment of income to nonrespondents on the basis of known demographic and economic characteristics. This comparison indicated that the procedure for making individual assignments of income to nonrespondents resulted in slightly higher estimates of the proportion of families and individuals in the upper income classes than those obtained from the distributions based solely on those reporting on income. (See Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 33, tables F and G.)

Beginning with the 1967 CPS, the Bureau of the Census introduced improved income edit and allocation procedures. The main feature of the new procedures is a more refined method for imputing missing income data which expands the use of information already known about that person. Among the major improvements made affecting the income data are the following: (1) an expanded set of social and economic characteristics within which the imputations are made; in addition to age, race, occupation, and weeks worked, the new procedures include sex and type of family member as major variables within which the missing income items are imputed; (2) the elimination of inconsistent reporting which resulted in having workers with no earnings and earners with no weeks worked; and (3) the new imputation procedure assigns missing earnings entries first and then utilizes the earnings information to assign missing sources of income other than earnings.

However, because of coding errors in the processing of the 1968 CPS data, in that year alone it was not possible to apply all the aforementioned improvements to the editing and allocation procedures. Since these errors produced an underestimate of income, they had the effect of overstating the number of poor.

In addition, it was discovered that the computer procedures for editing certain incorrect income codes caused an upward bias in the income data for some respondents and therefore would tend to produce an underestimate of the number of poor. It is estimated that the net impact of these errors had the effect of overestimating the number of poor families by about 120 thousand. Due to these errors affecting the income data for 1967, data for that year are not strictly comparable with those shown for 1966, and 1968 to 1971.

Comparison of 1966 poverty data according to original and revised editing and allocation procedures. In order to evaluate the impact of the new procedures, the poverty data from the March 1967 CPS were rerun, thus providing a bridge for the 1966 income year showing the results of both the earlier and the new procedures. Both series of data are shown in table 1. The general impact of the new allocation procedure was to shift the income distribution slightly upward, thus decreasing by 416,000 the number of poor families. A more detailed description of the new computer editing and allocation procedures may be found in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 59, "Income in 1967 of Families in the United States," pages 17 to 19.

Modifications in collecting income data in the March-April 1969 CPS. Several modifications were introduced in the collection of income data in the March and April CPS supplements. These include (1) extension of the interview period of the six rotation groups for which income questions were asked in March and the use of followup forms in these six groups to accommodate household respondents who needed more time to obtain the required income information (it is estimated that some members of approximately 4,400 households, or 9 percent of the total relevant households, made use of these followup forma); (2) modification of the design and content of the questionnaire to allow for more detailed questioning of certain income items; thus, boxes for gross receipts, business expense, and net income have been added to the self-employment income questions to help the interviewer and respondent determine net income, and "yes-no" circles were added to the questions on income other than earnings in order to ascertain whether the respondent received or did not receive income; (3) field office editing procedures were extended to a 100 percent income edit of the CPS schedules; (4) training instructions were strengthened by including more detailed explanations and more examples; and (5) the interview group training session was shifted from February to March.

Modifications in collecting income data in the March 1970 Current Population Survey. The Bureau introduced modifications in the collection of income data for the March 1970 CPS supplement. These were: (1) An advance letter informing households about the collection of income data was mailed to all households except those in the first and fifth months. The latter households received special letters which explained the need for collecting both CPS and census data; (2) information on work experience and income was collected simultaneously for the full sample (in previous years, work experience information was collected

separately from income data); (3) the interview period was extended one week for three-fourths of the sample (using followup calls and separate questionnaires). In addition, modified procedures which were incorporated in the March 1969 CPS supplement were also implemented in the March 1970 CPS. Overall, data indicate that the use of these procedures has resulted in some improvement in the collection of income data. The family income nonresponse rate has not only dropped by 5 percentage points (from 19 to 14 percent) but also it appears that the proportion of aggregate income amounts collected in the March 1970 CPS relative to benchmark totals has increased slightly in the March 1970 CPS supplement as compared with the proportion collected in the March 1969 CPS supplement.

Modifications in collecting income data in the March 1971 Current Population Survey. The Bureau continued to use the improved procedures which were incorporated in the March 1970 CPS. Procedural changes that were instituted in the March 1971 CPS, among others, were:

- (1) The interview period was extended one week for <u>all</u> households in the sample (using follow-up calls and separate questionnaires). In the previous year's survey, the interview period was extended for only three-fourths of the sample.
- (2) Income from net royalties was included in the question covering estates, trusts, or dividends, interest on savings accounts or bonds, and net rental income. In previous surveys, income from net royalties was included in the question covering private pensions, annuities, alimony, regular contributions from persons not living in this household, and anything else.
- (3) An additional regional office followup was made by telephone to obtain income amounts for all follow-up cases containing one or more persons who were not interviewed during the original follow-up period, except for refusal.

Overall, the family income nonresponse rate in March 1972 was 13.7 percent as compared to 14.6 percent in March 1971. The proportion of aggregate income amounts collected in the March 1972 CPS relative to benchmark totals was about the same as for the March 1971 CPS.

Although nonresponse rates for families by low-income status are not available, it is known

that families in the lower income intervals tend to have lower nonresponse rates than those in the middle and upper income intervals. This is due in part to the fact that lower income families have less complicated financial arrangements than those in other income groups. For a more detailed discussion of this topic see paper by Mitsuo Ono and Herman P. Miller, "Income Nonresponses in the Current Population Survey," published in <u>Proceedings of the Social Statistics Section</u>, American Statistical Association, 1969.

Other Limitations of the Data

It is known that income data are usually underreported in household surveys, such as the Current
Population Survey (CPS), when compared with
aggregate benchmark estimates derived from
administrative records. A number of articles
on this general problem can be found in An
Appraisal of the 1950 Census Income Data, Volume
23 of Studies in Income and Wealth, National
Bureau of Economic Research, 1958, Another
publication covering this same topic is The Distribution of Personal Income, A Study of Statistics
on the Size Distribution of Personal Income in
the United States, prepared by T. Paul Schultz
for use of the Subcommittee on Economic Statistics
of the Joint Economic Committee, Congress of the
United States, 1964.

As noted previously, overall aggregate money income compiled in the CPS was about 88 percent of benchmark estimates in 1971. The proportion of aggregate income compiled in the CPS ranged from a low of 43 percent for property income to a high of 97 percent for wage and salary income. The proportion picked up for Social Security and railroad retirement payments was 81 percent while the comparable rate for public assistance was 71 percent. These rates were 95 and 66 percent for nonfarm and farm self-employment income, respectively. Benchmark estimates are compiled from data provided by the Bureau of Economic Analysis, Social Security Administration, Veterans' Administration, etc. For more details regarding the procedures to develop benchmark data, see the following: (1) "Appraisal of Basic Data Available for Constructing Income Size Distributions" by Selma F. Goldsmith, published in Studies in Income and Wealth, Volume 13, National Bureau of Economic Research, 1951, (2) "The OBE Size Distribution Series: Methods and Tentative Results for 1964," by Edward C. Although every effort is made to reduce the errors of underreporting, nonreporting or misreporting of income data in the Current Population Survey, they still occur because of various reasons. Some of these are (1) overlooking income received, especially small amounts of income types not regularly received, e.g., contributions from nonhousehold members, (2) reluctance to reveal certain types of income, e.g., public assistance, (3) rounding estimates, (4) misunderstanding the question, (5) lack of information, especially covering family members not present at the time of interview, (6) interviewers' errors, (7) processing errors, etc. For more details on this topic of income underreporting in censuses and surveys, see (1) "Current Developments on Collecting Income Data in the Current Population Survey" by Mitsuo Ono, American Statistical Association Proceedings of the Social Statistics Section: 1971, (2) "An Analysis of the Effect of Income Rounding in the Current Population Survey", by Joseph J. Source and Reliability of the Estimates

Source of data. The estimates for 1970 and 1971 are based on data obtained in March 1971 and March 1972, respectively, in the Current Population Survey (CPS) of the Bureau of the Census. In March 1972 the Current Population Survey sample was spread over 449 areas comprising 863 counties and independent cities with coverage in each of the 50 States and the Distict of Columbia. As of July 1971, approximately 47,000 occupied households were eligible for interview each month. Of this number 2,000 occupied units, on the average, were visited but interviews were not obtained because the occupants were not found at home after repeated calls or were unavailable for someother reason. In addition to the 47,000, there were also about 8,000 sample units in an average month which were visited but were found to be vacant or otherwise not to be interviewed. From January 1967 through June 1971 approximately 50,000 occupied housing units were eligible for interview each month. For data collected in years prior to 1967, the sample was spread over fewer areas with fewer interviewed households. Prior to the March 1966 survey, income data were collected from only 75 percent of the households included in the CPS. See <u>Current Population Reports</u>, series P-23, No. 22, "Concepts and Methods used in Manpower Statistics from the Current Population Survey," June 1967, pp. 7-10, for more information about the sample design.

The estimating procedure used for the 1970-1972 data involved the inflation of the weighted sample results to independent estimates of the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States by age, race, and sex. These independent estimates were based on statistics from the 1970 Census of Population; statistics of births, deaths, immigration and emigration; and statistics on the strength of the Armed Forces. To these totals were added the population in the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post. (Report No. 81 in this series showed somewhat different figures for 1970 since the data in that report were inflated to independent estimates of the population based on 1960 census data.) For data collected in the Current Population Surveys in the years 1960-69, the independent estimates used were based on statistics from the 1960 Census of Population.

To show comparable poverty data for 1969 and 1959 by detailed type of residence, it was necessary to use data from the 1960 census for 1959 estimates rather than from the 1960 CPS. In table 3, 1959 data based on 1960 census data are identified as such; other tables for 1959 are based on 1960 CPS data. The type of residence classification used in the 1960 CPS was based on data from the 1950 census. Therefore, to achieve comparability with March 1970 CPS data, special tabulations of poverty data from the 53,000 households in the 1-in-1000 sample of 1960 census data were prepared. The 1971 and 1959 revised data by residence are based on the 1970 census residence definition.

Reliability of the estimates. Since the estimates in this report are based on a sample, they differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census, using the same schedules, instructions, and enumerators. Particular care should be exercised in the interpretation of figures based on a relatively small number of cases as well as small differences between figures. As in any survey work, the results are subject to errors of response and nonreporting as well as being subject to sampling variability.

In most cases, the schedule entries for income are based on memory rather than on records, and, in the majority of cases, on the memory or knowledge of one person, usually the wife of the family head. The memory factor in data derived from field surveys of income produces underestimates because the tendency is to forget minor or irregular sources of income. These errors of reporting are due to misrepresentation or to misunderstanding as to the scope of the income concept.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability, that is, of the variations that occur by chance because a sample ratherthan the whole of the population is surveyed. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially measures the effect of response and enumeration errors but does not measure any systematic biases in the data. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census figure by less than the standard error. The chances are about 95 out of 100 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

All statements of comparison appearing in the text are significant at a 1.6 standard error level or better. Most are significant at a level of more than 2.0 standard errors. Thus, for most differences cited in the text, the estimated difference is greater than twice the standard error of the difference. Statements of comparison qualified in some way (e.g., by use of the phrase "some evidence") have a level of significance between 1.6 and 2.0 standard errors.

The figures presented in tables N, O, P, Q, R, and S are approximations to the standard errors of various estimates shown in this report. In order to derive standard errors that would be applicable to a wide variety of items and could be prepared at a moderate cost, a number of approximations were required. As a result, the tables of standard errors provided are an indication of the order of magnitude rather than the precise standard error for any specific item.

Tables N and P contain the standard errors of estimates of the number of persons for the years 1966-1971. Tables O and Q contain the standard errors of estimates of the number of families for

the years 1966-1971. Tables O and Qalso should be used for items which can typically appear only once in a given family, e.g., "Number of male heads of families."

The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which the percentage is based. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding absolute estimates of the numerator of the percentage, particularly if the percent is 50 percent or more.

Table R shows the standard errors of estimated percentages of persons for the years 1965-1971. Table S shows the standard error of estimated percentages of families for the years 1966-1971. The guidelines used to decide whether tables N, O, P, or Q are appropriate for a particular item should also be used for deciding between the use of tables R and S.

Standard errors for CPS data for 1959-1965 can be approximated by multiplying the appropriate 1971 table entry by 1.4. Standard errors for the 1960 1-in-1000 sample data can be approximated by multiplying the appropriate 1971 table entry by .6. Standard errors for CPS data for 1971 which involve ethnicity can be approximated by multiplying the appropriate 1971 table entry by 1.1.

It should be noted that the data obtained from CPS and from the decennial censuses are not totally comparable due, in large part, to differences in interviewer experience and in the training of interviewers, and account for an additional component of error which is not reflected in the standard error tables.

Illustration of the use of tables of standard error. Table H of this report shows that there were 3,203,000 families with a male head below the low-income level. Table O shows the standard error on an estimate of this size to be approximately 53,000. The chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimate would have shown a figure differing from a complete census figure by less than 53,000. The chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimate would have shown a figure differing from a complete census figure by less than 106,000 (twice the standard error).

Of these 3,203,000 families, 1,246,000 or 38.9 percent were two-person families. Table S shows the standard error of 38.9 percent on a base of 3,203,000 to be approximately 0.9 percent. Consequently, chances are 68 out of 100 that the 38.9 percent would be within 0.9 percentage points of a complete census figure, and chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimate would be within 1.8 percentage points of a complete census figure, i.e., this 95 percent confidence interval would be from 37.1 to 40.7 percent.

<u>Differences</u>. For a difference between two sample estimates, the standard error is approximately equal to the square root of the sum of the squares of the standard errors of each estimate considered separately. This formula will represent the actual standard error quite accurately for the difference between two estimates of the same characteristic in two different areas, or for the difference between separate and uncorrelated characteristics in the same area. If, however, there is a high positive correlation between the two characteristics, the formula will overstate the true standard error.

Illustration of the computation of the standard error of a difference. Table C of the report shows that in 1959 there were 6,404,000 families with a male head below the low-income level. Thus, the apparent change in the number of low-income male headed families between 1959 and 1971 is 3,201,000. The standard error of 3,203,000 low-income male headed families in 1971 is 53,000, as shown above. Table O shows the standard error on an estimate of 6,404,000 to be approximately 101,000 (72 x 1.4 factor for 1959-65 data). The standard error of the estimated change of 3,201,000 is about

114,000 = $\sqrt{(101,000)^2 + (53,000)^2}$. This means the chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimated difference based on the samples would differ from the change derived using complete census figures by less than 114,000. The 68 percent confidence interval around the 3,201,000 change is from 3,087,000 to 3,315,000, i.e., 3,201,000 114,000. A conclusion that the average estimate of the change derived from all possible samples lies within a range computed in this way would be correct for roughly 68 percent of all possible samples. The 95 percent confidence interval is 2,973,000 to 3,429,000 and thus we can conclude with 95 percent confidence that the number of male headed low-income families in 1971 is actually less than those low-income families with a male head in 1959.

Computation of the standard error of a mean. To get a rough estimate of the standard error of a mean, the following formula can be used:

R is a constant which depends on the sample size, the sample design, and the estimation procedure. In this report, $\widehat{R} = f_i R$ where R = 1443 and f_i (i=1,2) is a correction factor which attempts to compensate for the underestimate of variance obtained from the above formula.
