ABSTRACT

The Maryland Hospital Education and Research Foundation (MHERF) is a private, non-profit organization whose objectives are: (1) to coordinate, improve and standardize continuing education and training programs for health personnel in Maryland; (2) to coordinate, accelerate and extend existing health career information activities in the state and to institute new methods for reaching and counseling the available labor market; (3) to seek to assure manpower development and work force stability in Maryland by encouraging more effective utilization of human resources; and (4) to seek adequate funds to stimulate and support innovative research and education directed toward accomplishing the Foundation's goal. This guide provides basic information on professional and technical health-related educational programs in Maryland and is intended to be a convenient reference for guidance counselors and prospective health workers. The guide lists and describes the educational programs offered and presents information on available scholarship and loan programs. (Author/HS)

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Health Career Descriptions

The following section includes brief descriptions of those health careers for which we list educational and training programs.

In those cases where they are available, we list the D.O.T. number given the particular career by the Dictionary of Occupational Titles (U.S. Department of Labor, 1971.)

ALCOHOLISM COUNSELOR works in the rehabilitation of alcoholics and may be a former alcoholic who is interested in assisting others with this problem.

ANIMAL CARE TECHNICIAN cares for laboratory animals used for experiments, biological tests, and research by preparing food according to specification, cleaning cages, pens, and surrounding areas, preparing blood samples, and observing and recording general behavior and specific reactions of animals to experimental treatment. (D.O.T. 356.874)

AUDIOLOGIST specializes in diagnostic, habilitative, and rehabilitative services, and research related to hearing. (D.O.T. 079.108)

BIO-MEDICAL EQUIPMENT TECHNICIAN is responsible for the maintenance, calibration, and adjustment of all electronic equipment used in hospitals.

CERTIFIED LABORATORY ASSISTANT works under direct supervision of the Medical Technologist and Pathologist in blood-banking, bacteriology, hematology and other routine clinical laboratory testing. The Assistant collects blood specimens and body fluids for preparation of slides, takes basal metabolism tests, electrocardiograms, and does other similar tasks. (D.O.T. 078.381)

COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SPECIALIST is prepared to work in a variety of health related specialties in ambulatory care facilities, ranging from alcoholism to comprehensive health care. Tasks may include those of the Senior Mental Health Technician as well as coordination and supervision under direction of the unit administrator.

CYTOPREPARATORY TECHNICIAN prepares slides using specialized stains, filtrations, mounting procedures, etc., for use by cytotechnologists and physicians.

CYTOTECHNOLOGIST works under supervision of the Pathologist as a specialist on the medical laboratory technology team. The cytotechnologist is trained in laboratory procedures and techniques in the use of slide samplings preparatory to diagnosing early signs of diseases such as cancer. (D.O.T. 078.381)

DENTAL ASSISTANT is trained to directly assist a dentist in technical and chair-side duties permitted by the Dental Practice Act of the State and commensurate with his or her education. These duties may include patient dental education, removing sutures, applying sodium fluoride treatment, preparing and mixing materials, sterilizing instruments, exposing and developing X-rays, assisting in surgical procedures, constructing dental models, waxing and casting dental restorations, office billing, typing, record keeping and receptionist responsibilities. (D.O.T. 079.378)

DENTAL HYGIENIST works under supervision of the dentist in performing prophylaxis (or "cleaning"), applying fluorides to prevent dental decay, helping in early detection of disease, taking X-rays of teeth and instructing the patient on proper oral health. (D.O.T. 078.368)

DENTAL TECHNOLOGIST serves in dental laboratories, hospital and dental school laboratories, and clinics. Manipulative skills are required as well as

an understanding of the theory and principles which are involved. As prescribed or ordered by a dentist, the technician can assume responsibility for constructing casts or bridges and other prostheses.

***FOOD SERVICE WORKER**

One who performs a variety of tasks required for the general operation of a food service system. Duties include non-technical food preparation routines, portioning and assembling foods, assisting with food service or other related jobs as directed by a supervisor.

* Terminology interchangeable depending on institution.

DIETARY TECHNICIAN works under the general direction of the food service director. Supervises or instructs employees engaged in food service. Responsibilities may include menu formulation, purchasing of food, supplies and equipment, employee scheduling, on job training and general food service administration.

DIETITIAN works in hospitals, nursing homes, extended care facilities, school food service systems, colleges and universities, hotels and restaurants and numerous other commercial and industrial organizations.

Dietitian, Administration — directs or assists in the direction of a total food service operation; is an organizer and planner who must remain current in new and better methods of quantity food service; is a specialist in coordinating the various aspects of dietetics into an efficient food service system.

Dietitian, Therapeutic — is skilled in advising individuals concerning nutritional requirements as related to optimum health, or concerning nutritional stresses resulting from certain disease conditions. (D.O.T. 077.128)

ELECTROENCEPHALOGRAPH TECHNICIAN measures, by means of an electroencephalograph (EEG) impulse frequencies and differences in electrical potential between various areas of the brain to obtain data for use in diagnosis of brain disorders. (D.O.T. 078.368)

**ENVIRONMENTAL TECHNOLOGY
WATER POLLUTION:**

POLLUTION ABATEMENT TECHNOLOGIST may work as an assistant to a scientist, engineer or administrator to solve problems of man's environment; for example, in water pollution the technologist will be concerned primarily with water sampling and testing, or in charge of operation of a water plant. In working with solid waste, the technologist may be involved with landfill and incinerator operations. The Pollution Abatement Technologist may be employed by operating agencies, regulatory agencies or industry. With an A.A. Degree, the technologist may continue study toward an engineering degree.

SANITARY TECHNOLOGIST works as an assistant to the sanitary engineer. The person taking this program is usually employed by an Engineer or an engineering firm, or may be involved in the evaluation of a sewage plant.

SOLID WASTE MANAGER may assist in working on incinerator operation or sanitary landfill operation.

LAND POLLUTION:

FAMILY HEALTH ADVOCATE works under the direction of a Health Care Supervisor in Health Centers and in homes of patients stressing the preventive and health maintenance aspects of care as well as the therapeutic.

FOOD SERVICE SUPERVISOR supervises and instructs employees within a food service system in maintaining and improving food preparation and service, as well as maintaining high standards of sanitation, dietary housekeeping and safety. (D.O.T. 319.138)

HEALTH AIDE works under professional supervision, giving personal care to the patient who is ill or disabled. Duties may include assisting with meals, bathing, some household chores and generally helping the patient who is just home from the hospital, recovering, or those who are too old to manage without regular or part-time help.

HEALTH EDUCATOR works as a resource person with general and professional community groups, hospitals, health agencies, clinics and industries; is able to give technical and general assistance in health planning and programming; may also be called upon for teaching in the health field.

HISTOPATHOLOGY TECHNOLOGIST cuts, stains, mounts, and studies specimens of human tissues to provide data on functioning of tissues and organs, causes and/or progress of disease. (D.O.T. 078.381)

HOSPITAL ADMINISTRATION involves the direction and coordination of all activities of the hospital in carrying out its objectives in the provision of health care, furtherance of education and research, and participation in community health programs. The administrator is responsible for the operation of the hospital, for the application and implementation of established policies, and for liaison among the governing authority, the medical staff, and the departments of the hospital. (D.O.T. 187.118)

HOSPITAL AIDE works under professional supervision and responsibilities may vary from hospital to hospital. Duties may include services to the patient such as answering the patient's calls, helping with meals, adjusting the bed, straightening the room, and other tasks that are important to the patient's care.

HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT/SUPERVISION involves the supervision and coordination of activities of personnel in various specialized departments of a hospital. Such personnel work under the direction of a department head and/or a member of the hospital's administrative team. A person in this category has training in a particular health care field and also specialized training in management skills.

HOSPITAL PLANT ENGINEERING ASSISTANT assists the director of plant operations in directing programs to maintain buildings, grounds, and

equipment and in procuring and generating all utilities and their distribution systems; and assists in coordinating these activities with the other departments to insure safe and efficient operation. (Based on D.O.T. 187.168, Director, Plant Operations)

INHALATION THERAPIST works as prescribed by a physician in providing the human body with an adequate supply of oxygen and in removing excessive carbon dioxide. This is done by proper application of oxygen and other therapeutic gases, using various types of equipment. Inhalation Therapists are also involved in lung function and blood gas testing. (D.O.T. 079.368)

INHALATION THERAPY TECHNICIAN works as one of the support personnel under the supervision of the Inhalation Therapist.

MEDICAL ASSISTANT is a person, preferably a woman, trained to assist the licensed physician in his office. The duties include preparing patients for the physician's examination, cleaning and sterilizing gloves, instruments, and other supplies, preparing the examining room, assisting in the collection of specimens, performing simple laboratory tests, X-ray procedures, and assisting with or carrying out treatments prescribed by the physician. She may also take care of receiving patients, making appointments, completing forms, collecting fees, typing business letters and assisting in keeping medical records.

MEDICAL CLERK TYPIST usually works with a physician or medical secretary, as a receptionist-typist, a typist, junior secretary, bookkeeper and/or technical assistant in a doctor's office, hospital, health agency, clinic, or other medical or health setting.

***MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNICIAN** works under supervision of a Medical Technologist and Pathologist in performing tests in urinalysis, grouping and typing of blood, analysis of blood and body fluids, and taking electrocardiograms and basal metabolism tests, both of which involve direct handling of the patient. The Medical Laboratory Technician performs more complex procedures than the laboratory assistant, but does not usually handle supervisory or educational tasks of the Medical Technologist. (D.O.T. 078.381)

* Some A.A. Degree programs are entitled Medical Laboratory Technologist.

MEDICAL LIBRARIAN administers and maintains a hospital library containing medical books, reports, journals, and bibliographic tools for the use of physicians, staff, and students. The librarian selects, classifies, and issues books and other materials, assists readers in answering requests for information and in preparing bibliographies, translations, abstracts, and reviews. (D.O.T. 100.168)

MEDICAL RECORD ADMINISTRATOR works with the development, use and maintenance of the patient's records for purposes of proper medical care, treatment, research and education. The Medical Record Librarian may work in a hospital, nursing home, clinic, or medical research center. Some serve as consultants in hospitals or to health-related institutions or businesses. (D.O.T. 100.388)

MEDICAL RECORD TECHNICIAN works closely with the Medical Record Administrator (normally under the supervision of the latter), with administrators, physicians, nurses, and other health personnel. Tasks may include preparing and maintaining patient information, transcription of reports and patient histories; responsibility for completion, accuracy and coding of individual and group records for completeness and accuracy as official records. (D.O.T. 249.388)

MEDICAL SECRETARY works for a physician or group of physicians in offices, hospitals and health programs. Duties may include stenography and typing of medical records and correspondence, screening of visitors and telephone calls, scheduling of appointments, and filing. (D.O.T. 201.368)

MEDICAL TECHNOLOGIST works with the pathologist (M.D.) and other physicians on diagnostic and treatment procedures in the causes and cures of diseases. The Medical Technologist is part of the clinical team which performs the chemical, microscopic, bacteriologic and other tests necessary for identification and treatment of diseases. Most of this work is in the medical laboratory. (D.O.T. 078.381)

MEDICAL TRANSCRIBER transcribes medical reports on diagnostic workups, therapeutic procedures, and clinical resumés for inclusion in medical records

and for transmission to physicians or other medical care facilities, using transcribing machine and typewriter. (D.O.T. 208.588)

***HUMAN SERVICES ASSOCIATE**

Works with mental health professionals under the supervision of a professional staff member. Assists mentally ill patients by using individual, group and family counseling and other basic treatment methods for mental illness in specific areas such as psychiatry, nursing services, social services, psychology and rehabilitation.

* Terminology interchangeable depending on institution.

NEUROMETRIC TECHNICIAN is a radiologic technologist, an EEG technologist, or a nuclear medicine technologist who has been trained in three areas of neurometrics: electroneuromyography, echoencephalography, and thermography.

NURSING ASSISTANT (AIDE) works under supervision of the nurse, making beds, bathing patients, delivering messages, maintaining linen supply, and escorting patients in the hospital. The Nursing Assistant administers some services directly to the patient.

NURSE, LICENSED PRACTICAL, shares in direct care of the patient under supervision of a physician or Registered Nurse. Licensed Practical Nurses work in doctors' offices, hospitals, homes, public health agencies and other institutions. (D.O.T. 079.378)

NURSE, REGISTERED, is responsible for the direct care of the patient, assisting the physician in administering treatments and medications, planning and coordinating the nursing care, and supervision of nursing personnel. Nurses may earn advanced degrees or certificates in such specializations as midwifery, anesthesia, community health administration, and other areas of medical, surgical, obstetric, pediatric, geriatric, and psychiatric nursing. They may qualify to teach and interpret this care to others. They may be involved in the planning, directing, and evaluation of nursing personnel working with them. Opportunities in nursing exist not only in hospitals, but also in public health, education, industry, private care and government service. (D.O.T. 075.378)

NUCLEAR MEDICINE TECHNICIAN operates radioscopic equipment, such as scintillation detectors and scanners, to produce scanograms and measure concentrations of radioactive isotopes in specified body areas and body products to obtain information for use of physicians in diagnosing patient illnesses. (D.O.T. 078.381)

NUTRITIONIST plans and conducts programs concerning nutrition to assist in promotion of health and control of disease with medical personnel, health and other agencies on nutritional phases of their programs.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY ASSISTANT works under supervision of the Occupational Therapist or physician in carrying out with the patient a therapeutic activity program in arts and crafts, recreation or industrial skills. These activities may include skills in self-care, homemaking, reading, writing, and prosthetics, depending upon the type of health facility in which the Occupational Therapy Assistant works. (D.O.T. 079.368)

OPERATING ROOM TECHNICIAN works under medical supervision in treating patients in the operating and emergency rooms. The Operating Room Technician may, in general, assist in major or minor surgery, help to set up the operating room, handle physicians the necessary instruments during surgery, and help in post-operative treatment.

ORTHOPTIST works under supervision of an ophthalmologist (a physician specializing in diseases of the eye). The Orthoptist uses various tests and instruments to help make diagnoses, and to help patients correct certain eye muscle imbalance.

PHARMACIST is a specialist in the science of drugs: the preparation and dispensing; the identification; analysis and selection. The Pharmacist may act as a consultant or instructor on the usage of drugs, or may be involved in drug research. Pharmacists may be managers of hospital pharmacies, or be involved in community pharmacies. (D.O.T. 074.181)

PHYSICAL THERAPIST works with physicians, nurses and other specialists in helping patients with muscle, nerve, joint or bone diseases or injuries to overcome their disability through therapeutic exercise, massage and use of heat and cold; instructs and helps prepare the patient and/or family in relation to the therapy. (D.O.T. 079.378)

PHYSICAL THERAPY ASSISTANT works under supervision of the Physical Therapist helping with treatments and therapy necessary for restoring bodily functions in patients with physical disability. The treatment may include physical exercise, the use of mechanical apparatus, massage, applications of heat and cold, light, water or electricity. The assistant may handle the office routine including record-keeping, scheduling and inventory.

PHYSICIAN'S ASSISTANT is qualified by academic and practical training to provide patient services under the supervision and direction of a licensed physician who is responsible for the performance of that assistant. (Also called Health Assistant)

PULMONARY TECHNICIAN operates a variety of electromechanical respiration equipment, such as respirometer, radiometer, and intermittent-positive-pressure-breathing machine, to obtain data relative to functioning of patients respiratory processes for use by physician in diagnosing and treating pulmonary disorders. (D.O.T. 078.-T)

***RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGIST** works under the supervision of the radiologist (physician) or chief radiologic technologist. The Radiologic Technologist is trained to operate X-ray equipment including deep therapy units and linear accelerators. The Technologist may specialize in X-ray technology, nuclear medicine, or radiation therapy technology. Responsibilities include assisting with the preparation and treatment of the patient, operation of the equipment during treatment and proper maintenance of treatment records. (D.O.T. 078.368)

* Sometimes called X-ray Technician or X-ray Technologist.

RESPIRATORY THERAPIST is trained and qualified in oxygen therapy, inhalation therapy, and respiratory physical therapy. (See Inhalation Therapist)

SPEECH PATHOLOGIST diagnoses, treats, and performs research related to speech and language problems. (D.O.T. 079.108)

SURGICAL TECHNICIAN (see Operating Room Technician)
X-RAY TECHNICIAN; X-RAY TECHNOLOGIST (see Radiologic Technologist)

Grace Whiting Myers-Malcolm T. MacEachern Student Loan Fund. Eligibility for Loan: Persons are eligible to apply for a loan if they have been accepted for enrollment into a school approved by the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association for the education of Medical Record Librarians or Medical Record Technicians. Students enrolled in a four year course leading to a degree in Medical Record Science may apply for a loan at the

completion of their third year of schooling. Registered Record Librarians who wish to study for baccalaureate or advanced degrees and have been accepted by regionally accredited colleges or universities as candidates for a degree may apply for a loan. Many American Medical Association-Approved Schools of Medical Technology and Schools of Cytotechnology waive tuition and pay stipends to students. NURSING

The Nursing Student Loan Program. Federally supported loans are available at schools of professional nursing for students who need assistance to pursue a full-time course of study at the school. The amount of an individual loan will depend upon the student's need as determined by the school; however, no loan may exceed \$1,500 per academic year. The aggregate amount a student may receive for all years is \$6,000.

The total loan is repayable over a ten year period beginning nine months after the student ceases to pursue a full-time course of study at a nursing school. Repayment on a loan may be deferred during periods of active military duty and service in the Peace Corps (up to three years each) and during periods of advanced professional training in nursing (up to five years).

Application blanks may be obtained from an officer of the local Elks Lodge or the Secretary of the State Elks Association and must be filed on or before February 15th with the Secretary of Lodge Foundation Chairman of the B.P.O. Elks Lodge in the city in which the applicant is resident.

General Motors Corporation has a scholarship program that offers 300 four year college scholarships annually. Applicants must be high school seniors and U.S. citizen. Candidates apply directly to the colleges at which General Motors Scholarships are available.

College scholarship committees in more than two hundred participating institutions select the awardees. Stipends range from \$200-\$2,000 a year depending on demonstrated need. There is no limitation on course of study or career. Both young men and women are eligible. Descriptive materials are available in the secondary schools early in the school year.

The Health Professions Scholarship Program provides federally supported scholarship awards which are available at participating schools of medicine, dentistry, osteopathy, optometry, pharmacy, podiatry, and veterinary medicine for students of exceptional financial need to pursue a full-time course of study. The amount of an individual scholarship depends upon the student's need as determined by the school; however, no scholarship may exceed \$2,500 per year.

The National Achievement Scholarship Program for outstanding Negro students awards more than three hundred scholarships annually. Candidates request consideration on the basis of scores on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Tests. Taken as second semester juniors or first semester seniors. Other qualifications are the same as for the National Merit Scholarship Program in which all Achievement candidates simultaneously participate.

In 1969 the Achievement program offered 250 National Achievement \$1,000 scholarships and 50 or more-sponsored four year Achievement scholarships. The former carry a one-time stipend of \$1,000 paid upon enrollment in an accredited U.S. college or university. Stipends of the latter are individually determined and are related to the student's financial need to attend the college of his choice within limits which may vary with sponsorship but generally fall in the range of \$250-\$1,500 per year. Four Year Achievement scholarships are guaranteed for four years if the student maintains normal progress toward a bachelor's degree in an accredited U.S. college or university.

The program is administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, 990 Grove Street, Evanston, Illinois 60201.

The National Merit Scholarship Program offers about 1,000 one-time non-renewable National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships and about 1,800 four year sponsored Merit Scholarships in nationwide competition. Candidates take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in their high schools in the junior year. Semi-finalists are selected on the basis of test scores, state by state. Most become finalists by confirming NMSQT performance on a second test, filing biographical and financial information, and receiving their high school's recommendation. All scholarship winners are chosen from the same group of about 15,000 finalists. Basic number of National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships are apportioned state-by-state in relation to school population. Most Merit Scholarships

are named for their sponsors (e.g., Shell Merit Scholarships), who include some 390 corporations, unions, foundations, other organizations and individuals.

Merit Scholars are chosen without respect to race, religion, country of origin or financial need. The winner of a National Merit Scholarship receives a single payment of \$1,000 upon enrollment in an accredited U.S. college or university. The stipend of a four year Merit Scholarship is related to the student's financial need to attend the college of his choice within limits which may vary with sponsorship but generally falls in the range of \$100-\$1,500 per year. A four year Merit Scholarship is guaranteed for four years if a student maintains normal progress toward a bachelor's degree in an accredited U.S. college or university.

The Merit Program is administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, 990 Grove Street, Evanston, Illinois 60201.

The Rehabilitation Services Administration provides teaching grants and traineeship grants to educational institutions as well as grants to support training activities in state rehabilitation programs and in facilities for the mentally retarded. Individual traineeships are awarded by participating universities to selected graduate students interested in rehabilitation careers. Included are careers in physical medicine and rehabilitation, dentistry, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology and audiology, rehabilitation nursing, rehabilitation social work, prosthetics and rehabilitation psychology, rehabilitation counseling, recreation for the ill and handicapped, work evaluation and rehabilitation workshop administration, and other specialized fields such as re-habilitation of the blind, deaf and mentally retarded.

LOANS—GENERAL

The National Defense Student Loan Program. College students or prospective college students in need of financial assistance to continue or begin college education may borrow for college expenses in one year a sum not exceeding \$1,000 or during college course a sum not to exceed \$5,000. A graduate or professional student may borrow up to \$2,500 per year, but the total loans during undergraduate and graduate study may not exceed \$10,000.

Repayment of the loan begins nine months after a borrower ceases to carry at least one-half the normal academic work load and is to be completed within ten years. Interest of 3% will begin at the time the repayment period begins. Up to 50% of a loan (plus interest) may be cancelled in the event the borrower becomes a full-time teacher in a non-profit elementary or secondary school or in an institution of higher education. Teaching in a designated school located in a poverty area or teaching handicapped youths in an elementary or secondary school system will cancel his obligation at the rate of 15% a year.

Interested students should consult their guidance counselor or the student financial aid officer of the college or university in which they are or expect to be enrolled.

Pickett and Hatcher Educational Fund makes loans to financially needy students enrolled in colleges and universities offering broad liberal education with preference being given to undergraduate students. Loans are not available for strictly professional education such as law, medicine or the ministry (teaching is an exception).

Loans may include amounts required for fees, tuition, room and board up to an annual amount of \$1,000 with the total borrowed not to exceed \$4,000. The loans will bear interest of 2% per annum while in school and 4% after

student leaves school. Repayment is to start six months after student leaves school and is to include an amount which is not less than ten per cent of the income.

The Health Professions Student Loan Program makes available federally supported loans at participating schools of medicine, dentistry, osteopathy, optometry, pharmacy, podiatry and veterinary medicine for students who need assistance to pursue a full-time course of study.

The amount of the loan depends upon the student's need as determined by the school; however, no loan may exceed \$2,500 per academic year. The loan is repayable over a ten year period beginning one year after the student ceases to pursue a full-time course of study at a health professions school. During the repayment period, interest accrues on the total loan at the rate of 3%. Repayment of a loan may be deferred during periods of active military duty and service in the Peace Corps (up to three years each) and during periods of advanced professional training, including internships and residencies (up to five years).

The program includes a forgiveness provision which enables a physician (M.D. and D.O.), dentist, or optometrist to cancel his loan in return for practicing in a shortage area or a rural, low-income shortage area. Up to 50% of the loan, plus interest, that is unpaid on the first day of such practice may be forgiven at the rate of 10% for each year of practice in a shortage area. Up to 100% of such unpaid balance, plus interest, may be forgiven at the rate of 15% for each year of practice in a rural, low-income shortage area.

NATIONAL HEALTH SCHOLARSHIPS are available to those students who are U.S. Citizens, are planning a career in nursing, occupational therapy, or physical therapy. Each scholarship has the value of \$500 per year for four

United Student Aid Funds, Inc. makes loans available to all students at participating colleges in amounts from \$1,000-\$5,000 a year for undergraduates and from \$1,500-\$7,500 for graduate students.

Notes under this program draw 7% simple interest. In the case of many loans, much of the interest will be paid by the federal government. Repayments start the first day of the tenth month after finishing graduate or undergraduate education. Monthly installments usually are not less than \$30 or more than \$100.

Federal Government Cooperative Education Programs for nearly all college majors. High school graduates may be eligible for these programs. The work study type program leads to a B.S. degree and usually lasts five years. Student trainees receive a salary during periods of employment according to Civil Service standards. Some financial assistance toward tuition, books and related fees may be paid by the sponsoring activities. Students wishing to be considered should apply to the agency in which employment is desired. Most federal agencies employ some student trainees; however, the largest employers

Veterans' Pension and Re-Adjustment Assistance Act of 1967 (Cold War GI Bill). Objective: To provide educational opportunities for a potential of over five million qualified servicemen or women now in civilian life or on active duty in the armed forces.

Eligibility: Any veteran of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force or Coast Guard who has served and was honorably discharged; (1) Continuously on active duty for at least 181 days ending after January 31, 1955. (2) A veteran who served less than 181 days, if his active duty was ended by a service-connected disability. (3) Persons still in service, if they have had at least two years active duty.

Duration and Benefits: Benefits will be paid a maximum of thirty-six months, based on one month of benefits for each month of active duty.

(a) Veteran Student Enrolled at Less Than $\frac{1}{2}$ Time: Payment based on the

rate of the cost of tuition and fees, not to exceed \$41 per month up to $\frac{1}{4}$ time or \$81 per month if more than $\frac{1}{4}$ time but less than $\frac{1}{2}$ time.
(b) In-Service Student: Payment based on the rate of the cost of tuition and fees but limited to:

If $\frac{1}{4}$ time or less \$41 per month
If more than $\frac{1}{4}$ time but less than $\frac{1}{2}$ time \$81 per month
If $\frac{1}{2}$ time or more not to exceed the single veteran rate in the foregoing allowance rate chart.

Availability of Training: In approved courses at a (public or private) college, vocational, business, high school, correspondence school, on the job training, institutional on the farm training, and flight training.

High School Training: Benefits are available to complete high school training or refresher courses to qualify for higher education without a charge against the basic entitlement.

Time Limitation: Benefits will not be paid beyond eight years from the date of the last discharge or release from active duty if the discharge was on or after June 1, 1966.

Application: Write or visit the Veterans Administration office nearest your place of residence.

Junior GI Bill.

Objective: To provide educational opportunities for approximately 185,000 children of veterans who died or were permanently and totally disabled in or as the result of service in the armed forces of the United States.

Eligibility: (1) Students whose parents died or are permanently and totally disabled from disease or injury incurred or aggravated in the armed forces during the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, or the Korean War. (2) Benefits are also extended to children of veterans who died or are

permanently and totally disabled while in the armed forces during the following periods: (a) Beginning September 16, 1940 and ending December 6, 1941; (b) Beginning January 1, 1947 and ending June 26, 1950; and (c) While selective service is in operation from the end of the Korean War, (January 31, 1955). (3) Assistance is available to eligible students, during the period which begins on date of 18th birthday or successful completion at high school, whichever occurs first, and ends on reaching the 26th birthday.

Exceptions: The period will be extended where (1) Student's individual deadline falls in the middle of a term, in which case they would be permitted to complete the semester at term; (2) Persons enter military service before age 26; (3) When students become eligible under the act and are over 18 but under 26 years of age.

Duration and Benefits: A maximum of 36 months of training and education may be obtained with payments of \$130 per month paid upon completion of each month of full-time training, \$95 for ¾ time, and \$60 for ½ time.

Availability of Training: In approved colleges (public and private) vocational, business schools, and other educational institutions.
