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
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ABSTRACT

This information manual from the Coordinating Council for Higher Education in California is divided into three sections. Section one contains the Donahoe Higher Education Act, Council Special Rules of Order, Council Membership, Method of Appointment and Terms of Office of Council Membership, Council Members Addresses, Council's 1972-73 Budget, Council Staff, Council Resolutions List, Council Publications List, and the Schedule of Meetings of the Council and the Governing Boards. The second section is comprised of the higher education fact sheets including listings of the California institutions of higher education, fall enrollments in California higher education, enrollment projections for California public higher education, state support for higher education, 1972-73, faculty salary schedules at the University of California, and faculty salary schedules at the California State University and Colleges. 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DONAHOE HIGHER EDUCATION ACT

Division 16.5. Higher Education

(Division 16.5 added by stats. 1960 (1st Ex.Sess.), Ch. 49)

CHAPTER 1

General Provisions

22500. Definition of public higher education

Public higher education consists of (1) all public junior colleges heretofore and hereafter established pursuant to law, (2) all state colleges heretofore and hereafter established pursuant to law, and (3) each campus, branch and function of the University of California heretofore and hereafter established by the Regents of the University of California.

22500.1. Legislative policy

It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Legislature that all resident applicants to California institutions of public higher education, who are determined to be qualified by law or by admission standards established by the respective governing boards, should be admitted to either (1) the public community colleges, (2) the California State Colleges, or (3) the University of California.

22501. Policy of Legislature relating to acquisition of sites for new institution and instruction beyond 14th grade

It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Legislature not to authorize or to acquire sites for new institutions of public higher education unless such sites are recommended by the Co-ordinating Council for Higher Education and not to authorize existing or new institutions of public education, other than those described in subdivisions (2) and (3) of Section 22500, to offer instruction beyond the 14th grade level.

Nothing in this section shall be construed to require any further recommendations as a prerequisite to legislative action with respect to state colleges intended to be in operation by 1965 or University of California campuses intended to be under construction by 1962, as set forth in the recommendations contained in the Master Plan for Higher Education printed at page 42, paragraphs 4 and 6, Senate Journal (Regular Session) for February 1, 1960.

22502. Duty of each segment to strive for excellence in its sphere

Each segment of public higher education shall strive for excellence in its sphere, as assigned in this division.

22503. Division does not apply to state nautical school

This division shall not affect the existence or status of the state nautical school.



22504. Division supersedes conflicting provisions

The provisions of this division shall supersede the provisions of any other law which coefflict with the provisions of this division.

22504.5. Information concerning pupils

No teacher, official, caployee, or governing board member of any public or private community college, college or university shall permit access to any written records concerning any particular pupil enrolled in the school in any class to any person except under judicial process unless the person is one of the following:

- (a) Either parent or a guardian of such pupil.
- (b) A person designated, in writing, by such pupil if he is an adult, or by either parent or a guardian of such pupil if he is a minor.
- (c) An officer or employee of a public, private, or parochial school where the pupil attends, has attended, or intends to enroll.
- (d) An officer or employee of the United States, the State of California, or a city, city and county, or county seeking inforcation in the course of his duties.
- (e) An officer or employee of a public or private guidance or welfare agency of which the pupil is a client.

Restrictions imposed by this section are not intended to interfere with the preparation and distribution of community college, college and university student directories or with the furnishing of lists of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of community college, college and university students to proprietors of off-campus housing. Such restrictions are not intended to interfere with the giving of information by school personnel concerning participation in athletics and other school activities, the winning of scholastic or other honors and awards, and other like information.

Notwithstanding the restrictions imposed by this section, a governing board may, in its discretion, provide information to the staff of a college, university, or educational research and development organization or laboratory if such information is necessary to a research project or study conducted, sponsored, or approved by the college, university, or educational research and development organization or laboratory and if no pupil will be identified by name in the information submitted for research. Notwithstanding the restrictions imposed by this section an employer or potential employer of the pupil may be furnished the and and scholastic record of the pupil and employment recommendations prepared by members of the school staff.



22505. Willful disruption of campus; disciplinary actions; hearing; interim suspension

The chief administrative officer of a community college, state college, or state university snall take appropriate disciplinary action against any student, member of the faculty, member of the support staff, or member of the administration of the community college, state college, or state university who, after a prompt hearing by a campus body, has been found to have willfully disrupted the orderly operation of the campus. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit, where an immediate suspension is required in order to protect lives or property and to insure the maintenance of order, interim suspension pending a hearing; provided that a reasonable opportunity be afforded the suspended person for a hearing within 10 days. The disciplinary action may include, but need not be limited to, suspension, dismissal, or expulsion. The provisions of Section 24308 to 24310, inclusive, shall be applicable to any state college employee dismissed pursuant to this section. The chief administrative officer of each such institution shall submit periodic reports as to the nature and disposition of cases acted upon pursuant to this section to his governing board.

CHAPTER 1.5

Capital Outlay Fund for Public Higher Education

22510. Creation of capital outlay fuel for public higher education

A fund in the State Treasury is hereby created, to be known as the Capital Outlay Fund for Public Higher Education. All money in the Capital Outlay Fund for Public Higher Education, including any money deposited in said fund from any source whatsoever after the effective date of this chapter, shall be available, when appropriated by the Legislature, for expenditure for capital outlay purposes relating to public higher education including, but not limited to, acquisition of sites and construction of new institutions of public higher education thereon.

22511. "Fund" defined

As used in this chapter, "fund" means the Capital Outlay Fund for Public Higher Education.

22512. "Public higher education" defined

For purposes of this chapter "public higher education" shall consist of (1) all public community colleges heretofore and hereafter established pursuant to law, (2) all state colleges heretofore and hereafter established pursuant to law, and (3) each campus, tranch and function of the University of California heretofore and hereafter established by the Regents of the University of California.

22513. Investment of fund

The Director of Figures shall cause all moneys in the fund which are in excess of current requirements to be invested and reinvested from time



to time in securities described in Section 16430 of the Government Code, and such securities may be sold or exchanged if in his opinion such sale or exchange is in the best interests of the state in effectuating the purposes of this chapter. All income derived from such investment, reinvestment, sale, or exchange shall be credited to the fund.

CHAPTER 1.6

Admissions [new]

22520. Legislative intent

it has been and continues to be the intent of the Legislature that all qualified California youth be insured the opportunity to pursue higher learning.

The enrollment situation and admissions policies and procedures among California's public institutions of higher learning have been the subject of extensive public concern, and admissions practice has failed to reduce public uncertainties.

22521. Legislative intent

It is the intent of the Legislature that each resident of California who has the capacity and motivation to benefit from higher education should have the epocitumity to enroll in an institution of higher education. Once enrolled we should have the opportunity to continue as long and as far as his capacity and motivation, as indicated by his academic performance and commitment to educational advancement, will lead him to meet academic standards and institutional requirements.

22522. Enrollment planning and admission priority practice

It is further the intent of the Legislature that the following categories be established insofar as practicable in the following order for the purpose of caroliment planning and admission priority practice at the undergraduate resident student level for the California State Colleges and the University of California.

- (1) Continuing undergraduate students in good standing.
- (2) Galifornia residents who have successfully completed the first two years of their baccalaureate program.
- (3) California residents entering at the freshman or sophomore levels.

It is further the intent of the Legislature that within each of the proceeding corollment categories, the following groups of applicants receive priority consideration in admissions practice in the following order:

(a) Residents of California who are recently released veterans of the armed forces of the baited States.



- (b) Transfers from California public community colleges.
- (c) Applicants who have been previously enrolled at the campus to which they are applying, provided they left such institution in good standing.
- (d) Applicants who have a degree or credential objective that is not generally offered at other public institutions of higher learning within California.
- (c) Applicants for when the distance involved in attending another institution would create financial or other hardships.

It is further the intent of the Legislature that those veterans referred to in paragraph (a) who were enrolled in good standing at a campus of the University of California or at one of the California state colleges prior to military service receive priority over other veterans recently released from military service.

(4) Residents of other states and forcign countries.

The segments may, in implementing these enrollment plans and admissions priorities, consider the overall needs of students in maintaining a balanced program and a quality curriculum.

22523. Record of applicants denied admission; information collection system

The California State Colleges and the University of California shall keep a record of the applicants denied admission and develop and utilize an information collection system which will indicate the number of qualified applicants who could not be accommodated at their campus of first enoice and were recirceted to campuses of alternate choice and the number of qualified redirected applicants who declined an offer of admission to an alternate campus.

22524. Reports

The Trustees of the California State Colleges and the Regents of the University of California shall submit to the Legislature on the fifth calend r day of each regular session of the Legislature a report on the progress made on the implementation of the enrollment plans and admissions priorities system and on the establishment of the information system and the findings that are made available.

CHAPTER 2

University of California

22550. University is primary academic agency for research

The Legislature hereby finds and declares that the University of California is the primary state-supported academic agency for research.

22551. Scope of instruction by university; exclusive jurisdiction in specified professions

The university may provide instruction in the liberal arts and sciences and in the professions, including the teaching profession. The university has exclusive jurisdiction in public higher education over instruction in the profession of law, and over graduate instruction in the professions of medicine, dentistry, and veterinary medicine.

22552. Doctoral degrees

The university has the sole authority in public higher education to award the doctoral degree in all fields of learning, except that it may agree with the state colleges to award joint doctoral degrees in selected fields.

22553. Too of university library and research facilities

The university may make reasonable provision for the use of its library and research facilities by qualified members of the faculties of other institutions of public higher education in this State.

CHAPTER 3

The California State Colleges

22600. Trustees of the California state university and colleges; administration of state university and colleges

Ine California State University and Colleges shall be administered by a board designated as the Trustees of the California State University and Colleges, which is hereby created.

22600.1 Alternative titles for trustees and chancellor of California state colleges

Whenever, in any law, the term "Trustees of the State College System of California" or the "chief executive officer of the State College System" is used, such across shall be decided to mean the Trustees of the California State Colleges and the chancellor of the California State Colleges respectively.



22601. Composition, appointment and terms

The board shall be composed of the following four ex officio members: the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the person named by the trustees to serve as the Chancellor of the California State Colleges; and 16 appointive members appointed by the Governor and subject to confirmation by two-thirds of the Senate. The Speaker of the Assembly shall have the status of a legislative interia committee on the subject of the California State Colleges and shall rect with the board and participate in its work to the excent that such participation is not incompatible with his position as a Member of the Legislature.

22601.5 Terms

The term of the appointive trustees shall be eight years.

22602. Vacancies

The expiration of a trustee's term of office as a member of the State Board of Education or any carlier vacancy in that office shall create a vacancy in his trustership, unless the term escribed thereto by lot has already expired. In case of any vacancy on the board of trustees, the Governor shall appoint a successor for the balance of the term as to which such vacancy exists.

22603. Chancellor of California state colleges and President of University; duties

If the trustees and the Regents of the University of California both consent, the chancellor of the California State Colleges shall sit with the Regents of the University of California in an advisory capacity and the President of the University of California shall sit with the trustees in an advisory capacity.

22604. Powers, duties, and functions of trustees; operative date

The Trustees of the California State Colleges shall succeed to the powers, duties and functions with respect to the management, administration and control of the state colleges heretofore vested in the State Board of Education or in the Director of Education, including all powers, duties, obligations, and functions specified in Article 2 (commencing at Section 24501) of Chapter 11 of Division 18 of this code, and all obligations assumed by the State Board of Education pursuant to that criticle prior to July 1, 1961.

On and after July 1, 1961, the Trustees of the California State Colleges that I have full power and responsibility in the construction and development of any state college campus, and any buildings or other facilities or improvement connected with the California State Colleges. Such powers shall be exercised by the Indutees of the California State Colleges not Attachadin, the provisions of Chapter 2



(commencing at Section 14100) and Chapter 3 (commencing at Section 14250) of Part 5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, except that the powers shall be carried out pursuant to the procedures prescribed by these laws.

The provisions of this chapter relating to the transfer of the powers, duties, and functions with respect to the management, administration and central of the state colleges shall become operative on July 1, 1961.

The Trustees of the California State Colleges may accept gifts of land, or gifts of options on land, may accept and expend gifts of mone, for the purchase of land or options on land and may enter into negotiations and contracts for the purchase of land for a future state college site in the vicinity of any of the areas specified in the recommendations contained in the Master Plan for Higher Education printed on page 42, paragraph 5, Schate Journal (Regular Session) for February 1, 1960, except that such gifts, expenditures, negotiations, and contracts shall not obligate the expenditure of any state funds for the purchase of such land or for development on such land, unless the legislature shall accommendity approve the obligation by appropriating the funds for that specific purpose.

Any such acceptance or acceptance and enpenditure or negotiations and contract way be conditioned upon an automatic reversion back to the donor or accountic termination of the negotiations and contract if a new state college is not established at a specific site prior to a specific date designated by the trustees and the donor or the trustees and the person or corporation with whom the trustees are negotiating or contracting.

22005. Independence from political and sectarian influence; no denial of admission on account of sex

The California State Colleges shall be entirely independent of all political and sectorian influence and kept free therefrom in the appointment of its trustees and in the administration of its affairs, and no person shall be descreed administration to any department of the state colleges on economic of sen.

22606. Scope of instruction by state colleges; faculty research

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it is consistent with the primary function of the state colleges and the facilities provided for that function.

22607. Employees

All state employees employed on June 30, 1961, in carrying out functions transferred to the Trustees of California State Colleges by this chapte persons employed by the Director of Education in the Divis te Colleges and Teacher Education of the Department of Education, are transferred to the California State Colleges.

Nonacademic employees so transferred shall retain their respective positions in the state service, together with the personnel benefits accumulated by them at the time of transfer, and shall retain such rights as may attach under the law to the positions which they held at the time of transfer. All nonacademic positions filled by the trustees on and after July 1, 1961, shall be by appointment made in accordance with Chapter 9 (commencing at Section 24201) of Division 18 of this code, and persons so appointed shall be subject to the provisions of Chapter 9.

The trustees shall provide, or co-operate in providing, academic and administrative employees transferred by this section with personnel rights and benefits at least equal to those accumulated by them as employees of the state colleges, except that any administrative employee may be reassigned to an academic or other position commensurate with his qualifications at the salary fixed for that position and shall have a right to appeal from such reassignment, but only as to whether the position to which he is reassigned is commensurate with his qualifications. All academic ...d administrative positions filled by the trustees on and after July 1, 1961, shall be filled by appointment made solely at the discretion of the trustees. The trustees shall establish and adjust the salaries and classifications of all academic, nonacademic, and administrative positions and neither Section 18004 of the Covernment Code nor any other provision of law requiring approval by a state officer or agency for such salaries or classifications shall be applicable thereto. In establishing and adjusting such salaries, consideration shall be given to the maintenance of the state colleges in a competitive position in the recruitment and retention of qualified personnel in relation to other educational institutions, private industry or public jurisdictions which are employing personned with similar duties and responsibilities. The establishment and adjustment of salaries for nonacademic employees shall be in accordance with the standards prescribed in Section 18850 of the Government Code. The trustees, however, shall make no adjustments which require expenditures in cucess of existing appropriations available for the payment of salaries. The provisions of Chapter 9 (commencing at Section 24201) of Division 13 of this code relating to appeals from dismissal, demotion or suspension shall be applicable to academic employecs.

Persons excluded from the transfer made by this section shall retain all the rights and privileges conferred upon civil service employees, by law. Personnel of state agencies employed in state college work other than those transferred by this section and who are employed by the trustees prior to July 1, 1962, shall be provided with personnel rights and benefits at least equal to those accountated by then as employees or such state agencies.



CHAPTER 3.7

Rules of Student Conduct [new]

22635. Rules of student behavior

The Regents of the University of California, the Trustees of the California State Colleges, and the governing board of every community college or school district maintaining a community college, shall adopt or provide for the adoption of specific rules and regulations governing student behavior along with applicable penalties for violation of such rules and regulations. Such institutions shall adopt procedures by which all students will be informed of such rules and regulations, with applicable penalties, and any revisions thereof.

22636. Application to the regents of the university of California

The provisions of this chapter shall apply to the Regents of the University of California to the full extent authorized by Section 9 of Article IX of the California Constitution, and it is the intent of the Legislature that the regents adopt rules and procedures which they deem appropriate for carrying out the purposes of this chapter.

CHAPTER 4

Community Colleges

22650. Community colleges as part of public school system; duties of state board of education

The public community colleges are secondary schools and shall continue to be a part of the public school system of this state. The State Board of Education shall prescribe minimum standards for the formation and operation of public community colleges and exercise general supervision over public community colleges.

22651. Scope of instruction by community colleges

Public community colleges shall offer instruction through but not beyond the 14th grade level, which instruction may include, but shall not be limited to, programs in one or more of the following categories: (1) standard collegiate courses for transfer to higher institutions; (2) vocational and technical fields leading to employment; and (3) general or liberal arts courses. Studies in these fields may lead to the associate in arts or associate in science degree.

CHAPTER 5

Co-ordinating Council for Higher Education

. 22700. Creation and composition of council; appointment of members; terms



- (a) There is hereby created an advisory body, the Coordinating Council for Higher Education, to be composed of one representative each of the University of California, the California State Colleges, the public community colleges, the private colleges and universities in the state, one nonvoting ex officio member of the State Board of Education, and six representatives of the general public. The university shall be represented by a person appointed by the regents. The California State Colleges shall be represented by a person appointed by the trustees. The public community colleges shall be represented by a person appointed by the Board of Covernors of the California Community Colleges. The private colleges and universities shall be represented by a person appointed by the Governor after consideration of a list or lists of not less than three persons submitted to him by an association or associations of such institutions and subject to confirmation by the Senate. The State Board of Education shall be represented by a board member appointed by the president of the board. The general public shall be represented by six members appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the Senate. The terms of the appointments made pursuant to this section shall be as follows:
 - (1) The representative appointed by the regents shall serve a one-year term.
 - (2) The representative appointed by the trustees shall serve a one-year term.
 - (3) The representative appointed by the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges shall serve a one-year term.
 - (4) The representative appointed by the president of the State Board of Education shall serve a one-year term.
 - (5) The term of office of all of the other members of the council appointed pursuant to this section is four years, and they shall hold office until the appointment of their successors.
 - (6) Any person appointed pursuant to this section may be reappointed to serve additional terms.

No appointing authority specified in this section shall appoint any person to alternate membership on the council with the following exceptions who shall be appointed by the appropriate appointing authority: one alternate each for the representative of the regents, the trustees and the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges. Each alternate shall be appointed for an annual term.

No person appointed pursuant to this section shall, with respect to any matter before the council, vote for or on behalf of, or in any way exercise the vote of, any other member of the council.

- (b) Those members of the council described in subparagraph (5) of subdivision (a) who are serving on the effective date of the amendments to this section at the 1971 Regular Session of the Legislature shall have their appointments continued or terminated as follows:
 - (1) The term of office of those members appointed originally on November 21, 1969, shall expire and the Governor shall make new appointments, or reappointments, two for terms of two years, and one for a term of one year.
 - (2) The term of office of the member originally appointed on March 18, 1969, shall expire and the Governor shall make a new appointment or a reappointment for a period of three years.
 - (3) The terms of office of those members appointed originally on November 21, 1967, and January 11, 1968, shall expire, and the Governor shall make new appointments or reappointments, each for a period of four years.
 - (4) The term of office of the member representing the private colleges and universities shall expire and the Governor shall make a new appointment or a reappointment for a term of three years.

22701. Appointment of director and staff

The council shall appoint and may remove a dictor in the manner hereinafter specified. He shall appoint persons to such staff positions as the council may authorize.

22702. Rules; votes required

The council shall prescribe rules for the transaction of its own affairs, subject, however, to the following requirement and limitations: (1) The votes of all representatives shall be recorded; (2) effective action shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the council and (3) the affirmative votes of two-thirds of all the members of the council shall be necessary to the appointment or removal of the director.

22703. Function of council

The co-ordinating council shall have the following functions, advisory to the governing boards of the institutions of public higher education and to appropriate state officials; (1) review of the annual budget and capital outlay requests of the university and the California State Colleges, and presentation of comments on the general level of support sought; (2) advice as to the application of the provisions of this division delineating the different functions of public higher education and counsel as to the programs appropriate to each segment thereof, and in connection therewith shall submit to the Governor and to the Levislature within five days of the beginning of



each general session a report which contains recommendations as to necessary or desirable changes, if any, in the functions and programs of the several segments of public higher education; and (3) development of plans for the orderly growth of public higher education and the making of recommendations on the need for and location of new facilities and programs.

22704. Collection of data pertinent to planning and coordination; furnishing information to Governor and legislature

The council shall have power to require the institutions of public higher education to submit data on costs, selection and retention of students, enrollments, plant capacities and other matters pertinent to effective planning and coordination, and shall furnish information concerning such matters to the Governor and to the Legislature as requested by them.

22705. Short title

1

This division shall be known and may be cited as the Donahoe Higher Education Act.

CHAPTER 6

Federal Assistance for Higher Education

22750. Acceptance of federal assistance for higher education

- (a) The people of the State of California accept the provisions of, and each of the funds provided by, the act of Congress entitled "An act to authorize assistance to public and other nonprofit institutions of higher education in financing the construction, rehabilitation, or improvement of needed academic and related facilities in undergraduate and graduate institutions," approved December 16, 1963.
- (b) The people of the State of California accept the provision of, and each of the funds, if any, provided by Title I and Title VI of the Federal Higher Education Act of 1965 (P.L. 89-329).
- 22751. Agreement to comply with federal requirements

In accepting the benefits of the act of Congress, the people of the State agree to comply with all of the provisions and to observe all of its requirements.

22752. Coordinating council for higher education designated to cooperate with federal government in administering program

The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is designated as the state educational agency to carry out the purposes and the provisions of the act of Congress. The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is hereby vested with authority to prepare and submit to the United States Commissioner of Education any state plan required by said act of Congress, to prepare and submit amendments to such state plans, and to administer such state plans or amendments thereto, in accordance with said act of Congress and any rules and regulations adopted thereunder. Any such state plan or amendment thereto prepared by the Coordinating Council for Higher Education shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Finance. The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is hereby vested with all necessary power and authority to cooperate with the government of the United States, or any agency or agencies thereof in the administration of the act of Congress and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder.

22753. Authorization for state's higher education governing agencies to administer federal benefits

The Trustees of the California State Colleges on behalf of any state college, the Regents of the University of California on behalf of the university, and the Board of Governors of the State Nautical School on behalf of the State Nautical School, are vested with all necessary power and authority to perform all acts necessary to receive the benefits and to expend the funds provided by said act of Congress and with $\varepsilon 11$ necessary power and authority to cooperate with the government of the United States, or any agency o agencies thereof, and with the Coordinating Council for Higher Education for the purpose of receiving the benefits and expending the funds provided by said act of Congress, in accordance with said act, or any rules or regulations adopted thereunder, or any state plan or rules or regulations of the Co-ordinating Council for Higher Education adopted in accordance with said act of Congress. Whenever necessary to secure the full benefits of said act of Congress for loans or grants for academic facilities, such trustees, regents, or board of governors may give such security as may be required and may comply with such conditions as may be imposed by the federal government.

22754. Designation of state treasurer as custodian of federal funds

The State Treasurer is designated as the custodian of all funds received by the State from the government of the United States, or of any agency or agencies thereof, under the federal act and he is authorized to receive and provide for the custody of all moneys so received.

22755. Authorization for payment of funds by state treasurer

The funds received by the State under the provisions of the federal act shall be paid out by the State Treasurer on warrants drawn by the Controller and requisitioned by the Coordinating Council for Higher Education in carrying out the purposes of the federal act.

22756. Coordinating council for higher education designated to cooperate with federal government in administering federal higher education act

The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is designated as the state educational agency to carry out the purposes and the provisions of Title I and Title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (P.L. 89-329).

The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is hereby vested with authority to prepare and submit to the U.S. Commissioner of Education any state plan required under said titles of said act of Congress, to prepare and submit amendments to such state plan, and to administer such state plan or amendments thereto, in accordance with said act of Congress, and any rules and regulations adopted thereunder. Any such state plan or amendment thereto prepared by the Coordinating Council for Higher Education shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Finance.

The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is hereby vested with all necessary power and authority to cooperate with the government of the United States, or any agency or agencies thereof in the administration of the act of Congress and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder.

22757. Office of governor designated to cooperate with federal government in administering Tederal housing act

The office of the Governor is designated as the state educational agency to carry out the purposes and the provisions of Section 802 of Title VIII of the Housing Act of 1964.

The office of the Governor is hereby vested with authority to prepare and submit any state plan required by said section of said act of Congress, to prepare and submit amendments to such state plan, and to administer such state plan or amendments thereto, in accordance with said act of Congress, and any rules and regulations adopted thereunder. Any such state plan or amendment thereto prepared by the office of the Governor shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Finance.

The office of the Covernor is hereby vested with all necessary power and authority to cooperate with the government of the United States, or any agency or agencies thereof in the administration of the act of Congress and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder.

22757.5. Federal funds for community colleges; powers of state board and local hourds

The State Board of Education is vested with all necessary power and authority to perform all acts necessary to authorize governing boards of districts maintaining community colleges to receive the benefits and to

expend the funds provided by any acts of Congress under which districts maintaining community colleges may be eligible to receive benefits, including, but not limited to, Title VII of the Housing Act of 1961 (Pub.Law 87-70), as amended, and any of the acts of Congress referred to in this chapter. The board is yested with all necessary power and authority to authorize districts maintaining couronity colleges to cooperate with the government of the United States, or any agency or agencies thereof, for the purpose of receiving the benefits and expending the funds provided by said acts of Congress, or any rules or regulations adopted thereunder, or any state plan or rules or regulations of the Coordinating Council for Higher Education adopted in accordance with any of said acts of Congress under which the Coordinating Council for higher Education is designated in this chapter as the state educational agency. Whenever necessary to secure the full benefits of said acts of Congress, the governing board may give such security as may be required and may comply with such conditions as may be imposed by the federal government. The funds received by the district under the provisions of said acts of Congress shall be deposited in the county treasury as provided for in Section 17152.

This section shall be applicable to only those acts of Congress which have been enacted prior to January 1, 1967.



SPECIAL RULES OF ORDER OF THE COORDINATING COUNCIL FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

- 1. QUORUM. The presence of a majority of the voting members of the Coordinating Council, or designated alternates in place of members, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Member, as used in these by-laws shall mean either a regular voting member, or a designated alternate acting officially in the place of a voting member.
- 2. <u>VOTING</u>. Each voting member shall be entitled to one vote which must be cast in person when a vote is required at a meeting of the Council. When Council action is required between regularly scheduled Council meetings, and it is not possible to convene a meeting of a majority of the members of the Council, such members may cast their votes by mail on questions presented to them by the President or the Director. The votes of all representatives shall be recorded. On a roll call vote, names of members shall be called in alphabetical order and their votes shall be recorded. Effective action shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Council, except that the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the regular voting members shall be necessary for the appointment and removal of the Director.
- 3. OFFICERS. Officers of the Council shall be a President and a Vice President, both of whom shall be elected from among the members (but not to include alternates) of the Council by a vote of the majority of the members of the Council, such election to take place at the meeting of the Council next preceding July 1 of each year. The term of the President and the Vice President shall be for one year, from July 1 through June 30. In the event the timely election of officers required by these Rules of Order does not take place, the elected officers of the Council shall retain office until such time as they are no longer members of the Council, resign from office or are not re-elected, whichever event shall occur first.
- 4. MEETINGS. Meeting dates shall be proposed by the Director and approved by the Council. Extraordinary meetings of the Council may be called by the President, following consultation with the Director or by a vote of two-thirds of the voting membership of the Council (not to include alternates except when acting in place of and with express consent of the member). Notice of all meetings shall be given to teach member and to each designated alternate by mailing a copy of such notice with an agenda not less than five working days before such meeting to the address of record of such member or alternate. The right to written notice may be waived by written waiver at any time by individual members of the Council. Meetings will ordinarily be held in Sacramento, but may be held any place in California designated

by the Council. The President, or in his absence the Vice President, shall preside at meetings. In the absence of the President and the Vice President, any member elected by a majority of the voting members present shall preside.

- 5. COUNCIL AGENDA. The Director of the Council shall determine the agenda of the Council's meetings, with the exception of extraordinary meetings called by the President or members of the Council as provided for in Section 4 above. A member of the Council who wishes to have an item placed on the agenda for Council action shall make a written request of the Director who may, at his discretion, either place it in the agenda as requested or refer the request to the full Council. Referral to the Council will not place the item on the agenda but will permit the Council to vote on its inclusion or exclusion at the next succeeding meeting. The necessity of staff preparation of material required as foundation or background for the inclusion of the requested agenda item should play a significant if not exclusive role in the Director's determination of whether to include the item as requested or refer the request to the full Council.
- 6. MINUTES. Action minutes based on the stenographic record (and the taped record, if any) and supplemented by notes taken by the staff shall be kept by the Director of all Council meetings. For the benefit of individual Council members who wish to have certain statements included in the minutes, such statements shall be prepared in writing and submitted during the meeting or within two weeks following the meeting. These statements shall be appended to the minutes. Minutes shall be presented to the Council for corrections and approval at the next regularly scheduled meeting.
- 7. RULES OF ORDER. The rules contained in the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Council in all circumstances to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with State law or the Special Rules of Order of the Coordinating Council.
- 8. ORAL PRESENTATIONS TO THE COUNCIL. The Coordinating Council is a public agency which may be addressed by any person whom the President of the Council or the appropriate Committee chairman recognizes. The following guidelines shall apply:
 - A. The subject of the proposed address to the Council shall be explored when feasible with the Council staff in advance of the Council meeting so that Council meeting time will not be used for matters which might be disposed of administratively.
 - B. A written request to address the Council or one of its Committees on a matter before the Council shall be made to the Director of the Council prior to, or during the meeting of the Council at which the requested oral presentation is to be made, on forms to be provided by the Council.

- C. The request to address the Council shall include the name and address of the person wishing to speak, the name of the organization represented, if any, and a brief statement of the subject of the address.
- D. Prior to addressing himself to the Council, the speaker shall identify himself by name and organization, if any.
- E. Five minutes may be allotted to each speaker and twenty minutes to each topic, subject to extension at the discretion of the President of the Council.
- F. Staff members of the Council or of the segments may address the Council on invitation of the President, Director of the Council, or any member of the Council.
- 9. AMENDMENTS. The affirmative vote of two-thirds of the voting members of the Council shall be required to amend or abolish these Rules of Order and at least thirty days' written notice shall be given to each member and alternate prior to voting to amend or abolish these Rules.
- 10. CONSITTEES. The Council may meet as a Committee of the Whole. It may create temporary ad hoc Committees of Council members to examine specified issues, such Committees to terminate when they have reported to the Council.
 - A. Each such Committee shall have a Chairman who shall be designated by the President of the Council.
 - B. Meetings of such Committees shall be held as frequently as needed on call of the Chairman of the Committee or the President of the Council, or the Director, in consultation with either the Chairman or the President.
 - C. Council members may attend meetings of Committees on which they do not hold membership. Any vote upon matters before the Committee, however, will be only by members of the Committee itself (or by their designated alternate).
 - D. Procedures for the appearance of persons vishing to address Committee meetings shall be in accord with those for meetings of the Council itself.
 - E. Committee reports may be considered by the Council at its first full meeting following the meeting of the Committee or thereafter.
 - F. Recommendations of the Committees are in no way binding upon the Council as a whole.

- G. Each Council member shall receive all materials and documents intended for use by any Committee and shall be notified of times and places of Committee meeting..
- H. A written record of actions take 1 by Committees shall be kept by the Director and furnished to the Council.
