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ABSTRACT

This publication lists multi-ethnic reading, audio, and audio-visual materials for young children in day care center programs and homes. The listing, it is held, is by no means a complete one. The need for listing these materials arises from the fact that, historically, children's literature on minority races has been written from a prejudiced point of view, and in a derogatory manner, by white authors for a white audience. Another major reason for putting this list together is to encourage each minority to learn about the other through authentic and reputable authors. This way, the stereotyping and negative attitudes that have resulted from bad children's literature may be offset. In most listings there is sufficient information to order the books listed. Where possible, the cost, audience or grade level, and binding--paperback or hard cover--of the books is specified. Some of the films indicate that a preview is available prior to purchase. The listings are organized in four sections: Spanish, Indian, Black, and Reference Sources.

This is our first attempt at offering our members and other constituents a publication listing multi-ethnic reading, audio, and audio visual materials for young children in day care center programs and homes. The listing is by no means a complete one. We've only scratched the surface at this point. There is a growing movement among minorities to produce children's literature that deals with the culture and heritages of minority children or as recently expressed in REDBOOK magazine, books "that mirror their world." The market is swelling with these newly produced materials and our purpose here is to inform you of their availability.

Some will say that these materials have always been in existence and ask why the need for listing such separately. Let us answer by saying that historically, children's literature on minority races has been written from a prejudiced point of view and in a derogatory manner, by white authors for a white audience. These materials were usually offensive to the particular races used in the stories but were nonetheless hailed as great books by the white media and publishers. For example, LITTLE BLACK SAMBO, was quite humorous and entertaining for whites but Blacks were often emotionally disturbed after reading it. In this time of cultural awareness and racial pride, it's only logical that a rejection of this offensive literature would happen.

As you go over the list, we ask that you not limit your selection to just one minority group because another major reason for putting this list together is to encourage each minority to learn about the other through authentic and reputable authors. This way, the stereotyping and negative attitudes that have resulted from bad children's literature can be erased with new positive and truthful information. Hopefully, an appreciation of the various and different lifestyles as manifested by minorities will come about.

Much to our regret, the Day Care and Child Development Council cannot offer these materials to you through our Resources For Day Care Service. Limited funds and storage space make offering these publications and films almost impossible. However, we feel very strongly about making you aware of this material and emphasizing why it is needed, which explains why we have chosen this brochure method. We highly recommend for further insight into the world of minority children's literature, CHILDREN'S BOOKS, AND OUR PLURALISTIC SOCIETY. It is available from our office for \$3.50.

In most listings, you will find sufficient information to order the books you might be interested in. We have, in situations where possible, provided cost, audience or grade level, and indicated whether it's paperback or hard cover. Some of the films indicate that a preview is available prior to purchase, in case you are considering buying the film. A search for filmstrips and films was not as successful as we expected, we would be happy to hear about any that you know of. We would also like to hear from you about the books we have listed here. Let us know how you find them.
