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## ABSTRACT

Over 350 books chosen to meet the needs of the reluctant reader in junior and senior high school are grouped under 10 topical headings: Adventure, Animals, Biography, Family Life, Folk Tales, Informational, People, People with Foreign Setting, Vocational, and Poetry. Brief annotations and approximate reading and interest levels by grade are given for each book. A sample reading interest inventory, a bibliography of sources consulted for this study, suggestions for dealing with reluctant readers, and lists of reading improvement materials and book clubs for teenagers are also included. 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## FOREWORD

In recent years parents and teachers have been concerned not only with "why Johnny can't read" but also with the fact that those children who *can* read do not all have the same level of reading comprehension. The young person who reads slowly, or with little grasp of the content of his book, faces a reading assignment with fear and reluctance, whether he is in elementary school, high school, or college. While some teachers are working on the problem of how to be sure "Johnny" will be able to read more readily and effectively, other teachers must accept the need of the reluctant reader now.

The teacher in high school who discovers that a student in a tenth grade literature class has never read a whole book and who finds the reason to be that the student feels inadequate when presented with the material in the texts prepared for his courses will be wise to seek materials with which to pique that student's interests. A book which meets his reading comprehension, and which will enable him to finish a story at his own reading speed within a few days, will interest him and give him a sense of accomplishment.

The list of facts on page vii with the implications they present for the teachers has been compiled to aid teachers in locating the student's reading difficulties and to help them choose books that will meet some of the peculiar needs of reluctant readers.

Cognizant of the fact that this is not a complete list of all books available which may fit the reluctant reader's needs, the editors extend an invitation to readers of this booklet to send other titles to them at Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona.

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## PERTINENT FACTS HELPFUL IN DEALING WITH THE RELUCTANT READER

### Facts

1. Over one-half of our language is communicated by listening. This is a skill which must be learned before other learning can proceed.
2. *Poor readers are not all mentally handicapped.* Reading problems have social, environmental, physical, and emotional origins.
3. A reader forced to compete at a rate beyond his capability often produces reactions destructive to further learning.
4. Slower mental development limits one's ability to think in abstractions.
5. The slow learner has limited ability to use past experiences to which he can relate present problems. This limits his ability to solve problems.
6. A slow learner is easily distracted by extraneous stimuli.
7. The slow learner will achieve success through simple instructions.
8. A slow learner tends to repeat errors.
9. A slow learner tends to leave work incomplete.

### Implications for Teaching

1. Provide purposeful listening experiences.
2. Utilize diagnostic tests, personnel records, and consultations to determine a course of action for the individual student.
3. Select materials suitable to the level at which the reader may achieve success. Evaluation must allow for some success.
4. Plan the student's program so he can experience acceptance, security, love, and freedom for creativity and accomplishment.
5. Do not assume past experiences are part of the student's learning. Teach skills in situations where they are to be used.
6. Eliminate causes of distraction. Make materials readily available and avoid instructions to large groups.
7. Teach a single skill at a time. Show student what is to be learned. Help him. Have him use the skill in a practical situation.
8. Try to prevent errors.
9. Have short-term, attainable goals. Usually patience and guidance are required of the teacher.



10. A reluctant reader may be a drop-out or high school terminal student.
11. Psychological factors must be considered when determining reading interests of students.
  - a. Consider the personality of the students. (Seventy percent of retarded readers show personality maladjustment and usually exhibit defensive attitudes toward authority.)
  - b. Choose reading which appeals to the interests peculiar to the age level. (Studies show no significant difference of age interests among students of varying reading ability.)
  - c. Study the student's reading problem.
  - d. Include the strong environmental factors usually operating as you evaluate the problem.
12. Teacher attitude of genuine interest will set the stage for bringing student and book together.
13. A student cannot become interested in a book if he will not find it in the school library.
14. Reading interests can be fostered or stifled in the classroom. Studies of accelerated secondary classes of students with wide reading interests have revealed the following facts of special interest to the teacher of reluctant readers:
  10. Try to prepare suitable experiences related to the student's goals (job related skills, discriminatory reading, and role playing in job and family life situations).
  11. Testing and observation will be helpful here.
    - b. An interest inventory is recommended. (A sample follows the bibliography.) Observed reading habits of students.
    - c. Use reading tests.
    - d. Consider family and community background of interests and reading habits.
  12. Come to class armed with books. Present tantalizing scenes and hand out books to those interested. (Books at hand are much more interesting than those far off in the library.)
  13. *Know what is available in school and town libraries.* It may be necessary to start a room collection or to enlist the aid of the community. Students may be encouraged to start a paperback bookstore, or to participate in teenage book clubs.

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## FOR YOUR INFORMATION

Names of publishers are designated for each title by a code name for the current name of the publishing house which distributes the book. An out of print book may carry the name of the publisher as was known at the time of publication, but the reader should remember, for example, that older Winston books are now Holt books and that Longmans, Green books are now distributed by McKay; Walek now owns what once were the Oxford titles among books for children and young people. Also worth remembering is the fact that some publishers assign special names to books in their juvenile divisions; for instance, Farrar distributes Ariel titles. A list of publishers named in this book, with their addresses, appears on page 32.

Paperback editions have been indicated within the entry by P followed by the name of the paperback publisher.

Many good bookstores will cooperate in a book fair for either schools or clubs and will allow participants to purchase books shown at 20 percent discount.
