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ABSTRACT

Intended to provide educators, research workers, and others interested in career education with a catalog of ideas useful in promoting career development, this bibliography identifies approximately 500 publications, reports, audio, video, and manipulative materials available for purchase from commercial suppliers or short-term loan from the Indiana Career Resource Center. Each section is color coded and contains resources appropriate to users at the (1) elementary, (2) middle and secondary, and (3) post-secondary levels. Entries are arranged alphabetically by title or author in categories depicting the type (e.g., printed information, films) of resource and include publication information and a short descriptive statement which lists the nature, suggested use, price, source of entry, and whether or not the material is available in a series. Preceding each color-coded section is a divider paper which contains page-oriented content-at-a-glance charts to assist in location of a resource. In addition to the annotated sections, another section lists technical equipment available from the Center, and a final section lists professional references and test instruments. An introductory section describes the services of the Center. (SB)

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PREFACE TO THIS SECOND PRINTING

The purpose of this volume is to provide educators, research workers, and others interested in career education with a catalog of ideas useful in promoting career development. An initial form of this document was prepared and disseminated during 1971.

We are especially grateful for the feedback from users of that first Bibliography. Their suggestions have provided several improvements in this newest volume. First, color coding allows the user to enter the document at a point approximating the age level for which resources are most appropriate. Second, the initial page of each section summarizes the contents for ease of location. Third, a description of the services of the Indiana Career Resource Center is included in an introductory section and not as a portion of the available resources.

This Bibliography identifies about 500 publications, reports, audio, video and manipulative materials available for purchase from commercial suppliers or short-term loan from the Indiana Career Resource Center.

Throughout the listings some duplication of entries is unavoidable, but this has been kept to a minimum for user convenience. Inclusion of items in the listing does not imply that any quality evaluation has been conducted using that item in a learning environment, but simply that the resource is presently available for use.

INTRODUCTION

During the last year the U. S. Office of Education has involved itself with an introduction and unfolding of the concept of career education. Commissioner Marland has designated it an area that is to have high priority in national education concern. There presently exists some debate surrounding the definition of this concept, but the term does suggest a developmental approach to purposeful career planning, entry and satisfaction.

This present direction in career education brings out a problem that has been recognized for some time; namely, that education of youth cannot be dichotomized or trichotomized according to their post-secondary pursuits. Every child entering the educational institution is preparing for a career and the educational institution needs to offer a continuous, deliberate, and visible means for him to carry out that preparation. If one of the purposes of education is to prepare the student for the adult society, it is necessary for that system to structure a curriculum that will provide meaningful relationships between the conditions in the educational setting and those he may encounter upon leaving that environment.

The question concerning relationships between the educational and work settings has been the concern of the Indiana Career Resource Center since its inception in the late 1960's. The Center was established as a collection and dissemination point for career development related materials and ideas useful to counselors and teachers in the secondary school level. Later experiences with youth have shown that appropriate materials and ideas can be introduced at all levels of education (and even beyond) to bring about purposeful career planning.

To assist Indiana educators and youth in the implementation of career education, the Center provides the following services and resources:

1. Career Presentations for Student Groups
With a goal for motivating and involving students in the utilization of career-related media, several formats are field-tested for use with large groups of students. Staff members are available to present or assist in the presentations.
2. Professional Group Activities, Workshops, and Seminars
Counselors, teachers, and school administrators at all educational levels may utilize the planning and organizational capacity of the Center to assist in the presentation and conduct of career seminars, conferences, workshops, days, job fairs, curriculum design, etc. A mobile training laboratory has been equipped to carry out this function in Indiana.
3. Community Outreach Activities
Community-based agencies, organizations, business and industry groups are invited to cooperate in programs designed to focus the collective strengths of both in and out of school agencies on the career planning of selected segments of the community. Mutual sharing in this manner brings about community cooperation in career education.
4. Career Counseling
Although somewhat limited as a service, career counseling is conducted with individuals requesting assistance through the Center. The tools and techniques of career counseling are introduced to those individuals in the educational community who are being trained as professional counselors.
5. Consultant Services
The staff members of the Career Resource Center are available for consultation with regard to the development of career programs, curricula, resource centers, media, or formal evaluation.

6. Career-related Resource Materials

The remainder of this document is a description of the resources that are available either commercially or for loan from the Center for specific purposes. This collection has been located or developed for influencing individuals or groups of persons toward purposeful career planning directions. The experiences provided by the resources are intended as building blocks toward the making of career decisions.

ORIENTATION TO CONTENT USE

The content of this volume is arranged in a specific manner so that potential users may extract desired information easily. The content focuses on those resources useful in career education and career development which supplement more traditional resources normally found in libraries, learning centers, and guidance bookshelves.

Color coding - each section is color coded and contains resource descriptions appropriate to users in specific categories as follows: Orange pages are used for elementary school level resources. Green pages are used for middle and secondary school resources. Gold pages are used for post-secondary resources. Technical equipment is outlined on beige pages. Professional references and test instruments are described on white pages.

Divider Chart - a heavy paper divides each section and the heavy divider separating the first three sections contain page-oriented content-at-a-glance charts to assist in quick location of appropriate resources.

Content summary - a short descriptive statement is given for each resource, where appropriate, listing the nature, suggested use, price, and source of the entry. Where material is available in series, examples are given.

He (she) also evaluates all the other players in terms of these cards. A comparison is then made between how the player perceives himself (herself) and how others perceive him (her).
