ABSTRACT

Subtitled "A 'Mixed Bag' of Information on American Culture of the 1920's and 1930's," the resource guide was prepared by a librarian to stimulate student interest in studying this period in United States History and to provide the social studies teacher with suggestions for student research. Introductory material encourages students to approach a social studies assignment with a positive attitude, to look beyond the school library for resources, and to browse for ideas. A check list offers a step by step outline of a search procedure. The body of the guide is arranged according to the Dewey Classification system, which is instructional in the use of libraries and encourages browsing. Topic Ideas are listed within each major and sub area, providing more than one hundred suggestions for projects, research reports, and reading areas. An examination of the period through this guide offers an interdisciplinary approach to life and the times: the history, industry and commerce, sociology, creative arts, culture, science and technology. The quide is suitable for both the junior and senior high school level. Short bibliographies are listed with most of the sections. The accompanying Mini Bibliography provides reference to fictional works of and about the period, annotated non-fictional works, and some audiovisual materials. (JMB)

PREFACE

TO STUDENTS

When you are given a history assignment, such as your present one - A research paper on American culture in the 1920's and 1930's - your immediate reaction might be, to put it mildly, quite negative. The purpose of this "mixed bag" is to show you that such assignments can be both interesting and fun.

The 20's and 30's are two of the most fascinating decades in the history of the United States: An era of prosperity, gaity and youth, followed by the hardest times of our history.

To gather material for this assignment, don't limit yourself to the history section of the library. You'll find interesting and fascinating pieces of information everywhere. Many of the areas everlap, so spend some time digging for material.

TRY BROWSING - YOU'LL LIKE IT

To aid you in your search for material, the following pages (set up by Dewey Decimal Classifications) will give you ideas for your assignment and hints on where to find material.

Most of the following pages will refer to a few books on a specific subject. These represent only a few of the library's holdings, but they will serve as a "starter". Refer also to the "Mini-Bibliography" listing books containing material on all subject areas. (Use check list on following page)

- Look through the following pages and select a topic of interest to you.
- 2. Check some of the books listed in the "Mini-Bibliography" for background material on your topic. You might also want to check other books in the history section which were not included in this bibliography. Use the index in the back of the book to locate material.

- 4. Gc to the Dewey Decimal sections referred to on attached sheets. BROWSE.
- 5. We have selected issues of the <u>New York Times</u> on microfilm. This will be one of your best sources of information on almost every topic. Subject index available.

Note: Other libraries in the area have complete issues of the New York Times on microfilm.

- 6. Check with librarian to see if other audio-visual materials are available. (Records, filmstrips, etc.)
- 7. Use Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature to locate magazine articles. If the school's magazine files do not go back far enough, check the holdings of other libraries in the area.
- 8. Check biographies both individual and collective.
- 9. Fiction Books
- 10. Check vertical or pamphlet file.

Included in this section are books on philosophy, psychology, logic, sensationalism and ethics. Material for the following topics will also be found in other areas of the library, particularly in Social Studies section.

Reasons for revolution of younger generation in manners and morals:
Post war disillusionment, Freudian teachings, automobile, prohibition, sex and confession magazines, movies, technology. Youth bent on changing the world by slapping conventions in the face. Liberation was their keyword.

Generation Gap! Todays grandmothers and grandfathers were "only yesterday" wearing raccoon coats, carrying hip or garter flasks, drinking bootleg booze, petting in autos, dancing the Charleston, and shocking their parents!

Sensationalism surrounding gangster funerals. (Cost up to \$100,000. Al Capone sent rival \$8,000 funeral wreath!) Other sensationalism: Valentino's death, Lindbergh kidnapping, Scopes Trial, Morro Castle disaster, Man on Ledge, etc.

Discuss "Lost Generation" epitomized by Hemingway, Fitzgerald, Gertrude Stein, etc.

Rise of social consciousness in 1930's.

Family ethics, ethics of temperance and intemperance, sexual ethics.

Note: Don't forget the collective biographies. Instead of books about a single individual, a collective biography gives the lives of a group of people. Sample titles: Poets of our Time, Famous Negro Music Makers, Great American Heroines, etc.

Sherwood Anderson, <u>Kit Brandon</u>: Depicts the confusion of values in American life in the 20's, factory working conditions and bootlegging.

Gertrude Atherton, <u>Black Oxen</u>: Story of life in the sophisticated social and literary circles of New York City in 1922.

Ray Bradbury, <u>Dandeline Wine</u>: One summer in the life of a 12 year old boy in a small town in Illinois in 1928.

John Dos Passos, Trilogy U.S.A.: Pictures social and economic problems of the 20's.

Theodore Dreiser, An American Tragedy: Graphic picture of American society in the 20's.

F. Scott Fitzgerald: The Beautiful and Dammed, This Side of Paradise, The Great Gatsby, re the Jazz Age

Harper Lee, To Kill a Mockinbird: 2 children growing up in the 30's in Alabama witness violence when lawyer father defends Negro.

John Steinbeck's <u>In Dubious Battle</u>, <u>Of Mice and Men</u> and <u>The Grapes of Wrath</u> re migrant workers.

Robert Penn Warren, All the King's men, Based on life of Huey Long

Thomas Wolfe, You Can't Go Home Again: Observations on economic and political life from Depression to spread of Nazism.

Upton Sinclair's books: Oil, Boston, The Wet Parade, Between Two Worlds and Another Pamela on social problems.

Contains exerpts from writings of the period, short biographies, numerous illustrations. Coverage of rural America, crime, strikes, role of women, fads, new morality and the arts.

An informal history of the 20's. Covers political, economic, social and cultural aspects.
