ABSTRACT

This report summarizes the characteristics of 1971 and 1972 Hofstra freshmen as determined by the American Council of Education survey of freshmen. Responses to almost all of the questionnaire items are summarized in tabular form. In the tables, comparative data are also presented for the 110 freshmen at New College. In addition, comparative data are presented for about 87,000 freshmen tested in about 190 four-year colleges throughout the United States. (Author/MJM)

Characteristics of 1971 and 1972 Hofstra Freshmen

This is the second year that Hofstra cooperated with the American Council on Education (ACE) in their survey of freshmen. This is a large program in which 500 schools (encompassing 1.3 million students) have participated since 1966. The ACE standardized questionnaire was administered to all incoming freshmen. It contained 30 items for which national norms are available and ten questions specifically related to Hofstra, for which no national norms are available.

Responses to almost all of the questionnaire items by both 1971 and 1972 Hofstra freshmen are summarized in the tables that follow. In the tables, comparative data are also presented for the 110 freshmen at New College. In addition, ACE normative data are presented for about 87,000 freshmen tested in about 190 four-year colleges throughout the United States. All figures in the tables are percentages to the nearest whole number. If an item was added or deleted in 1972, the item was included in the table but the data for that year was left blank.

We will not discuss specific comparisons in the tables, leaving it to the reader to make useful comparisons. Breakdowns are available for males and females at the CSHE office.

The national data were reported in the February 12, 1973 edition of the Chronicle of Higher Education. Comparisons were made with previous surveys. Since Hofstra data are available only for two years, extensive longitudinal comparisons were not possible for our students. We thought, however, that nationwide comparisons and some comments on the Hofstra students would be of interest.

The following statements about the national sample of freshmen are direct quotes or paraphrases from the Chronicle article:

a more conservative posture is evident in the freshmen's responses to politically oriented questions;
this year's freshmen emerge in several ways as being more serious about academic pursuits;
the current freshmen appear to be as strongly concerned about a number of social issues as last year's freshmen;
a continued rise in freshmen's preference for "people-related" disciplines;
there is an increase in percentage of freshmen undecided about major.

Just as the national sample, Hofstra freshmen seem more politically conservative and about as concerned about a number of social issues as last year's freshmen. They also seem to be more serious than last year's freshmen about academic pursuits, yet less aspiring to higher degrees. There is an increased interest in business and pre-professional majors and a lessened interest in education and liberal arts. There also seems to be an increased interest in succeeding financially and raising a family compared to last year's freshmen.

The background of this year's Hofstra freshmen appears a little different from last year's. There are more males; the parental income is higher; fewer reared as Jewish; fewer with no religious preference; more "A" and "C" high school averages; more who ranked in bottom half of high school class; and more interested in sports and social activities.
