#### ABSTRACT

The purpose of this course of study is to serve as a guide for providing newly employed vocational rehabilitation agency personnel with educational experiences that better prepare the trainees to serve themselves, their clients, their agency, and their community. The course reflects the belief that generic educational material and experiences are necessary for newly employed rehabilitation personnel; and that race flexibility in coverage is maintained to insure the program staff the opportunities to respond to trainees requests and needs. The training process itself attempts to integrate those elements considered most conducive to effective learning: (1) provide identification models for effective functioning through the interactional process with the program staff: (2) provide the conditions or atmosphere that will afford the trainee an experiential base calculated to enhance self-development and understanding; and (3) to provide that which is taught and reinforced didactically attempts to influence trainee behaviors and attitudes. #### INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this course of study is to serve as a guide for providing newly employed Vocational Rehabilitation agency personnel with educational experiences so as to better prepare the trainees to serve themselves, their clients, their agency, and their community.

The course of study contained here is reflective of the belief that generic educational material and experiences are necessary for newly employed Rehabilitation Personnel. No particular Vocational Rehabilitation setting or client caseload assignment receives emphasis.

This outline is not necessarily idhered to completely. Nor is it totally inclusive of what may occur in a specific training session. Flexibility in coverage is maintained so as to insure the program staff opportunities to respond to trainees' requests and needs.

The training process itself attempts to integrate those elements which are considered most conducive to effective learning: (1) through the interactional process with the program staff, provide identification models for effective functioning; (2) provide the conditions or atmosphere that will afford the trainee an experiential base calculated to enhance self-development and understanding; (3) what is taught and reinforced didactically is an attempt to influence trainee behaviors and attitudes.

In short this course content and the training situation in which it occurs hopes the trainee can better find out what Vocational Rehabilitation is; who he is in Vocational Rehabilitation; and what he as a person has to offer to others in conjunction with the Vocational Rehabilitation Agency.

USE OF MEDICAL CONSULTATION (12 Hours)

- A. The counselor's medical duties and responsibilities, in cooperation with the supervisor and the medical consultant revolve around the following activities:
  - 1. Identify the disability

  - 8. Appraising the results of service through continual evaluation
  - 9. Maintaining good relationships with the medical community and cooperating health and welfare agencies
  - 10. Extending the rehabilitation program to the community as an aid in the solution of problems associated with adjustment to disability.
- B. The counselor will be more effective in counselor-client relationships through medical consultation services if he acquires and maintains an awareness and understanding of the:
  - 1. Possibility of physical restoration as a means of improving the client's employability
  - 2. Content of medical reports, including diagnosis and recommendations
  - 3. Skills of medical specialists in the diagnosis and treatment phases
  - 4. Residuals of a disabling condition, the limiting effect, the physical stability of the client and the progress of client under treatment
  - 5. Effect of trauma and disease processes on individual behavior

- 6. Validity of the client's explanation of disability, and his statements as to its relationship to employment
- 7. Basis for making decisions with dispatch and confidence regarding eligibility, and services necessary for the client's rehabilitation, including training and employment
- 8. Essential need to develop working relationship with clients, their families, professional co-workers, trainers and employers through more adequate interpretation of limitations imposed by disability and the remaining abilities of clients

  - 1. Should keep the General Practitioner informed as to the Patient's Rehabilitation Program and Medical Problems.

- 2. Send a final report to the General Practitioner consisting of any speciality work, drugs, physical therapy, occupational therapy, appliances or medical advise that has been done by Vocational Rehabilitation.
- 3. Consult the General Practitioner for any complications that arise.
