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**ABSTRACT**

The annual report of the Alabama Consortium for the Development of Higher Education (ACDHE) is presented in relation to its member institutions and ACDHE committees. The member institutions, including Alabama A&M University, Huntingdon College, Judson College Miles College, Stillman College, the University of Alabama, and the University of Montevallo, are briefly described and ACDHE committee members for each institution are listed. The work of committees include coordinating council of chief academic officers, visual and performing arts, computers, curriculum and international programs joint purchasing libraries, media, public relations and science heads. Funding, the basic skills programs, and other accomplishments are included. (MJM)

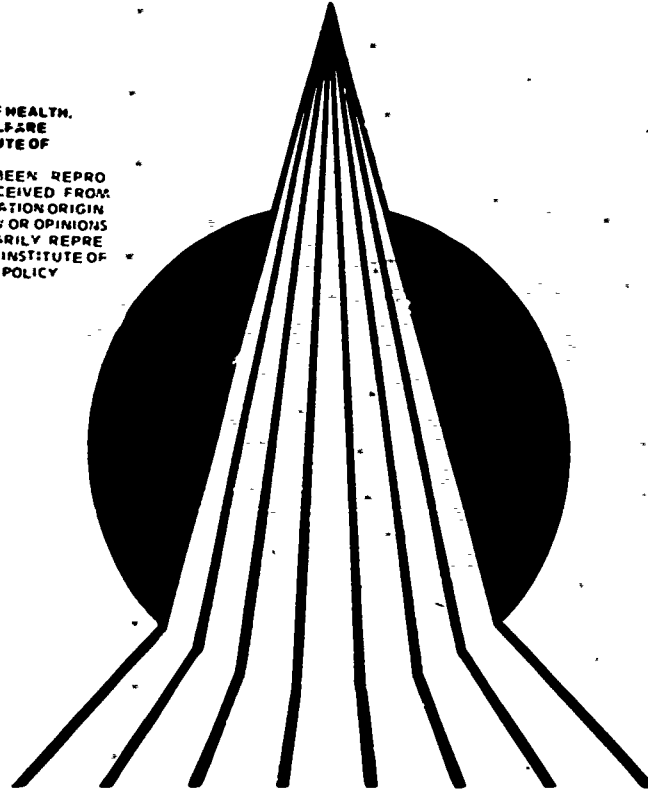

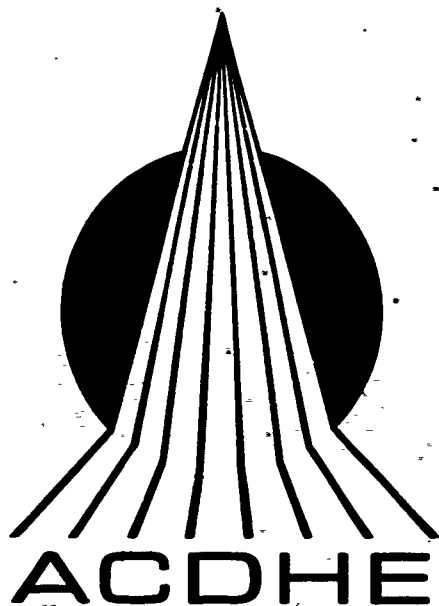
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## ALABAMA CONSORTIUM FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION

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It would seem highly improbable that a handful of colleges and universities with such diverse characteristics—religious and non-sectarian, State-supported and privately owned, predominantly black and predominantly white, large and small, urban and rural—could find a common bond through which they could work together in meaningful, constructive programs. The Alabama Consortium for the Development of Higher Education, organized in late 1968 as a unique cooperative venture among colleges and universities with quite uncommon backgrounds, has done just that.

Alabama A & M University—a State-owned, predominantly black, land-grant university in mountainous North Alabama near Huntsville. Huntingdon College—a Methodist-supported, liberal arts college in Montgomery. Judson College—a Baptist-endowed, women's, liberal arts college located in Marion. Miles College—a privately-owned, predominantly black, metropolitan institution located in Birmingham. Stillman College—a Presbyterian, predominantly black, liberal arts college at Tuscaloosa. The University of Alabama—a large, State-owned university with a wide variety of undergraduate and graduate programs and courses, listed among the leading colleges and universities in the South. The University of Montevallo—a State-owned university which less than a decade ago was a women's liberal arts college. The Missile and Munitions Center and School—an affiliate institution located at Redstone Arsenal, one of the nation's foremost space facilities. Air University—another affiliate institution, the professional military education center of the United States Air Force with headquarters at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama.

These nine institutions, with qualities more unique to each than similar to the others, comprise ACDHE. Without question, the vast individual differences with the member institutions have stirred an exciting, forward-moving momentum throughout the Consortium; and as a result, ACDHE can indicate to other institutions how to work together and seek solutions to the problems of each, how to enhance the texture of higher education in the State, and how to become aware that institutions which seem poles apart in backgrounds, interests, and goals are not really so different after all. In fact, members of the Consortium like to consider this melding of dissimilar institutions as a step toward sharing and cooperation among all institutions of higher education in Alabama, the region, and perhaps the nation.

A program to enable high school graduates deficient in the most basic learning skills to prepare themselves for college level study, a traveling student art show, lecture-discussions with career diplomats from the State Department, library sharing among member institutions, and workshops aimed at bringing ACDHE faculty members closer together are just a few of the myriad accomplishments which were realized by the Consortium in 1971-72. Most of the ACDHE programs are the direct results of task force committee action. Indeed, the tremendous growth of ACDHE during the year was sparked primarily by the work of these major task force groups. Therefore, an insight into the Consortium comes from a look at the ACDHE committees:

## **COMMITTEES**

The COORDINATING COMMITTEE, as its name implies, provides leadership for the Consortium by coordinating all program planning and implementation. Overseeing the day-to-day operation of ACDHE, this Committee works toward increasing participation in the Consortium, serves as a communication link among the work groups, secures additional program funding, evaluates regional cooperative activities, and helps the other committees carry out their specific functions.

During 1971-72, the Coordinating Committee authorized an ACDHE goals study which should provide a clearer understanding of how the Consortium is viewed by members of the participating institutions and enable ACDHE to map out realistic future directions. This Committee also authorized ACDHE participation in a consortia goals study conducted under the aegis of The George Peabody College for Teachers. This study will more fully bring to light the real value of cooperative activities.

Committee activity is the real heartbeat of the Consortium with the COUNCIL OF CHIEF ACADEMIC OFFICERS playing a major role in faculty and curricula development. The Council is developing an ACDHE Faculty Inventory which will place the Council in a better position to plan joint use of faculty. The inventory is designed to gather information in five categories: basic personnel information, academic training, teaching-research experience, faculty workloads, peripheral expertise, and attitudes toward faculty sharing. To date, seventy-five per cent of the ACDHE faculty have responded, and the specified information is currently available through an automatic retrieval system. Already the inventory findings reveal certain academic areas which show great potential for faculty sharing and for assisting individual academic administrators in planning programs which will more effectively utilize resources in ACDHE.

In June of 1972, the Council sponsored a workshop at Huntingdon College which focused primarily on the College Level Examination Program. A follow-up workshop was held at Miles College where participants evaluated the use of CLEP by member institutions and discussed other non-traditional programs.

The Council has coordinated the use of the communication network for telelectures and is expanding telelecture use in instructional programs. The Council sponsored a workshop for faculty in eight disciplines—education, social work, geography, business, history, religion and philosophy, psychology, and science. Held on the campus of The University of Alabama, the workshop gave faculty in those areas the opportunity to pool information about the member institutions and to develop new ways of working together in human and physical resources.

With the help of Mr. Edward Finnell, Director of Cooperative Education at The University of Alabama, the Council developed the ACDHE Cooperative Education proposal which has been funded in the amount of \$20,000 for the 1972-73 year. Mr. Finnell is now serving as a consultant to assist ACDHE institutions in implementing cooperative education programs on each of the member campuses for the 1973-74 year.

The COMMITTEE ON VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS, working through four task forces—Visual Art, Dance, Drama, and Music—laid the groundwork for a number of cooperative activities during the year. All member institutions were involved in the first Annual Traveling College and University Art Show held during the spring of 1972. Featuring the works of thirty students from all the member schools, the exhibit began with the

Arts Festival at the University of Montevallo and subsequently was taken to all ACDHE institutions. Other productions, including dramatic presentations and musical events, were also shared last year by the Consortium institutions and more cultural exchanges are envisioned for the coming year.

The COMPUTER COMMITTEE met for the first time in April, 1972, with an organizational discussion which focused on computing hardware, use of the computer on each member campus, and possible ways of sharing existing facilities. This Committee is writing a proposal which ACDHE will submit to a national foundation requesting funds for a computer terminal on each campus to be linked with the new computer system which is being installed at The University of Alabama.

The CURRICULUM COMMITTEE's primary project has been the planning of the ACDHE Basic Skills Program with the prospect of receiving funds to plan and implement the program "Discovery '73." The Committee also sponsored a workshop on "Resource Materials in Black Studies" held at Stillman College in April. Dr. Van Allen, Director of the Technical Assistance Consortium To Improve College Service (TACTICS) in Washington, D.C., presented the keynote address. The workshop also featured presentations and discussions on art, music, literature, history, social concerns, and religion.

The INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS COMMITTEE, intent on expanding the cross-cultural study opportunities for students and faculty at member institutions, published an ACDHE brochure describing programs offered in Western Europe, Southeast Asia, Latin America, and Africa. The Committee also organized the first ACDHE Forum on International Studies, using the theme, "United States—Latin American Relations: Conflict and Accommodation." Held at Judson College, the forum included among its guests selected members of the administration, faculty, and students of the Consortium institutions.

During the 1971-72 year, the International Programs Committee was engaged in a host of additional activities. The Committee coordinated the multi-campus visit of John J. Kadilis, a Foreign Service Officer with the State Department's Soviet Desk, who presented lectures and seminars on U.S.-Soviet relations. Through the leadership of this Committee, the Consortium was awarded two grants from the United States Department of State for the academic year 1972-73. The first grant of \$15,000 provides for a Foreign

Scholar in Residence (Dr. Nibondh Sasidhorn, Dean of Social Sciences at Chiang Mai University in Thailand), visiting foreign scholars during the year, a foreign student seminar, and Fulbright Scholars from ACDHE institutions to study abroad. The second grant was for a series of Community Meetings. This "ACDHE International Programs Week" enabled students, faculty, and interested community groups to meet with staff members from the State Department.

The JOINT PURCHASING COMMITTEE shares purchasing information which might be beneficial to member institutions. In addition, consultants from consortia in South Carolina and Ohio have discussed with members of this Committee how joint purchasing has been effective in those states, enabling the Committee to more practically pursue ways in which the Consortium may undertake joint purchasing.

The LIBRARIES COMMITTEE has daily conversations concerning library sharing through use of the ACDHE communication network. The ACDHE libraries contain four million combined holdings—all available to the requesting institutions overnight. A teletypewriter exchange system (TWX), leased by the Consortium and housed at The University of Alabama, puts ACDHE libraries in contact with more than five hundred specialized libraries throughout the country with requests being filled within one week instead of the usual three. This increased use of library resources through a high-speed system has been most beneficial to all member institutions. Aside from the communication system, a *Union List of Current Periodicals* is available to all ACDHE libraries. During the year, the Committee also sponsored a workshop at Air University to initiate ACDHE cooperation with the Air University Library, a specialized unit with approximately one million holdings.

The MEDIA COMMITTEE sponsored two concurrent one-day workshops at Alabama A & M University and the Missile and Munitions Center and School at Redstone Arsenal. Featured speaker was Robert Ruezinsky, Chairman of the Department of Media and Technology, Montclair State College, Montclair, New Jersey. The major audio-visual and instructional television vendors of the State participated in the conferences, displaying their products and presenting ways to use them for instructional purposes. This Committee, additionally, has written a proposal requesting support for a mobile video production unit capable of making video tapes. If the mobile system becomes a reality, lectures by Consortium faculty may be recorded by video tape,

thereby broadening the faculty and student instructional opportunities at ACDHE institutions.

The PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE's projects undertaken last year include completion of a slide-talk show, publication of a combined annual calendar, numerous news releases about Consortium activities, publication of a newsletter, the *ACDHE Report*, and publication of the *ACDHE Annual Report*. A Birmingham television station is planning a documentary on the Consortium and its member institutions.

The SCIENCE HEADS COMMITTEE, seeking to benefit ACDHE science departments through mutual undertakings, sponsored a Distinguished Visiting Scientist Program through which science faculty from one member institution met with faculty and students at other Consortium institutions. Science classes have been made more interesting with scheduled and impromptu lectures via the communication network. Members of this Committee also have written a College Science Improvement Project Proposal and submitted it to a national foundation. Such a project, if funded, would greatly enrich faculty and student programs, including joint faculty research, student research, faculty workshops, and joint use of faculty.

## FUNDING

Title III funding which totaled \$60,000 for 1971-72 provided the "seed money" the Consortium needed to harvest tangible results from committee activities. The additional Title III funding for 1972-73 in the amount of \$175,000 will enable ACDHE to carry out more fully the Basic Skills and faculty enrichment programs and to explore and develop other programs which would prove beneficial to ACDHE institutions in addition to continuing committee projects and activities.

Financial assistance from The Danforth Foundation has made possible the telephone communication network, bringing with it a number of advantages: the system has improved communication among member institutions; it has paved the way for committee meetings without travel; and it has allowed library personnel to discuss daily library exchanges and receipt of materials (through TWX) from remote libraries. The network also has encouraged faculty sharing over telelecture, and has opened up the possibility of joint use of computers during 1973.



## **THE BASIC SKILLS PROGRAM**

Regretfully, large numbers of high school students who wish to continue their education at ACDHE institutions are simply not prepared to cope with study at the college level. Often, these students have background deficiencies or have only marginal preparation in the most essential skills, such as reading, writing, listening, and speaking. Thus, the ACDHE Board of Directors in May of 1971 established the Basic Skills Program as a top priority.

The program was set in motion during a workshop of the Curriculum, Innovative Programs, and Libraries Committees, held at Stillman College during the summer of 1971. Dr. Harold Stinson, President of Stillman, discussed basic skills with the participants and has continued to be a guiding force behind the program's development. A second such workshop was held on the Stillman campus in September of 1971, involving faculty, counselors, and admissions and recruitment personnel who now constitute the ACDHE Basic Skills Team. Main speaker for that workshop was Dr. Robert Stoltz, Regional Director of the Southern Regional Office, College Entrance Examination Board. He also worked with various groups concerned with communication skills, quantitative skills, media, recruitment, and admissions.

Subsequently, task force groups met at Miles College and the University of Montevallo to consider communication skills and quantitative skills; and in February of 1972, the Basic Skills Team held its final workshop at Stillman College with Dr. John McKee, Executive Director of the Rehabilitation Research Foundation, as speaker. He told the workshop participants about the Individually Prescribed Instructional (IPI) Program developed by his research foundation. The session concluded with the appointment of ad hoc committees on recruitment, admission, and curriculum.

Title III funds are now being implemented for the ACDHE Basic Skills Program for 1972-73. During the summer of 1973, personnel from each member campus will participate in giving potential college and university students instruction in the basic skills of reading, writing, listening, speaking, and computational skills. The program is entitled "Discovery '73," an eight-week basic skills summer program for 100 prefreshman students who, if they reach a designated level of competence, will enter ACDHE institutions in the fall of 1973. In similar fashion, "Discovery '74" and "Discovery '75" are planned. Hopefully, the Basic Skills Program will result in large numbers of students with deficient backgrounds gaining admittance to ACDHE institutions and, importantly, pursuing successful college careers.

## **OTHER ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

To be certain, the Alabama Consortium for the Development of Higher Education is at the forefront in the national consortia movement, as evidenced by the Consortium's regional and national activities during the 1971-72 academic year.

Two of the Consortium's leaders, Dr. Thomas Diener, Chairman of the ACDHE Coordinating Committee, and Dr. Lillian Manley, Executive Director of ACDHE, were appointed by the American Association for Higher Education Board of Directors to serve on the seven-member Advisory Committee to the Office of Coordinator of Cooperative Programs. The AAHE just recently established this office to work with existing consortia and institutions interested in interinstitutional cooperation.

The Alabama Consortium was one of seven consortia invited to a Consortia Leaders Development Conference held in St. Louis, Missouri, during the spring of 1972. Nine representatives from ACDHE participated in this conference which was sponsored by The Danforth Foundation and focused on faculty involvement in interinstitutional cooperation.

On the regional level, ACDHE was one of nine consortia invited to participate in a seminar sponsored by the Southern Regional Education Board in September, 1971. In May of 1972, Dr. Lillian Manley hosted the SREB jurisdiction consortium directors at a meeting in Birmingham sponsored by the ACDHE Coordinating Committee, the Southern Regional Education Board, and The University of Alabama Institute of Higher Education Research and Services. (Dr. Manley had been selected as convener of this meeting by the regional consortia leadership.) The conference focused on financial development for consortia.

Now on the threshold of its third year of real activity, ACDHE has already had a significant impact on higher education in Alabama and the South. The seven colleges and universities that comprise ACDHE have a combined enrollment of approximately 22,000, representing more than twenty per cent of the total enrollment of all institutions of higher education in the State of Alabama. This numerical base, along with the vast differences of the member institutions, enables the Alabama Consortium for the Development of Higher Education to serve as a model for what other institutions might cooperatively undertake. In fact, 1971-72 has really been a model year for ACDHE as its members have worked hand in hand to create meaningful programs, to plan effectively together, to evaluate the fruits of joint labors, and to provide more services for member institutions, their students and faculty.

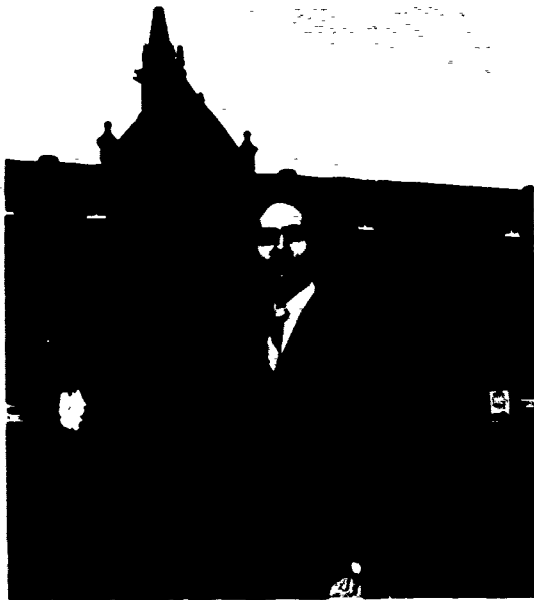

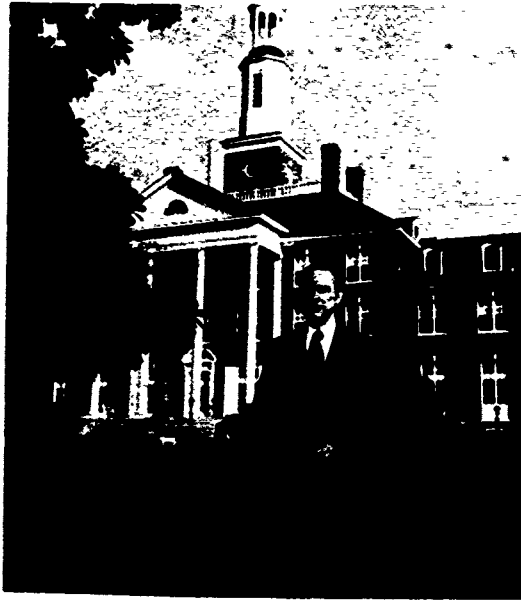
